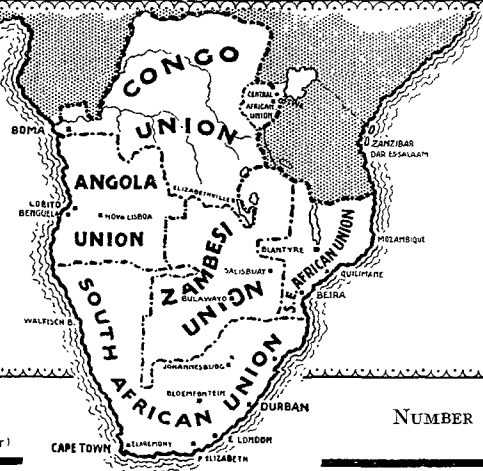

Literature Ministry Convention

FROM north, east, south, and west our labourers in the literature ministry gathered in to Johannesburg last month for their annual convention.

What a gathering it was. No one remembered ever having seen one like it before. Every one settled down to business in earnest from the very first service and throughout the whole convention there was manifest a wonderful spirit of earnest consecration and zeal.

The keynote of the convention was evangelism; story after story was related of interests created through the ministry of the printed page. Out on scattered farms, in little dorps, and in busy towns, our faithful colporteurs have left behind them newly kindled torches of truth. Evidences of God's watchful care over this important branch of His work were revealed again and again in the experiences recounted during the convention. In spite of opposition from several quarters and in face of distressing financial conditions, our colporteurs were led from victory to victory under His guiding hand.

ventist in the Division to remember the men and women of the literature ministry in their daily prayers. All are of excellent courage, and filled with earnest faith, but owing to the exacting nature of their work, they need the prayers of this denomination as no other body of workers do.

S. A. Conference President's Report

(Concluded)

DEPARTMENTS

Home Missionary and Sabbath School.

Elder F. G. Clifford, one of the leading evangelists of the former Natal-Transvaal Conference, was called to carry the Home Missionary, and the Sabbath School work. Elder Clifford's reports of these departmental activities will be of special interest. One of the outstanding achievements of Elder Clifford's efforts in the Home Missionary Department is the excellent *Signs* campaign which was promoted from his department the latter part of last year.

Elder Clifford, accompanied by Brother F. E. Potter, Home Missionary Secretary for the Southern African Division, has recently made an extended tour of most of the field, promoting the various lines of missionary work in our churches.

Missionary Volunteer Department.

Elder A. W. Staples, one of the successful evangelists of the former Cape Conference, was appointed to the responsibility of the Union Missionary Volunteer secretaryship. Elder Staples has given, in the few months he has been in the M. V. Department, a decided spiritual lead to our young people. He has brought his evangelistic powers definitely to bear within the church. Elder Staples is enthusiastically promoting the M. V. Evangelistic Fund plan, which was launched by the late Natal-Transvaal Conference, wherein the young people of the conference undertake to raise sufficient funds to finance at least one specific evangelistic effort each year. The successful effort which Elder John Raubenheimer just closed at Kroonstad was thus financed. This year the young people are raising funds for Graaff Reinet, in the Cape Province. Elder Staples will have an inspiring report.

Educational Department.

Elder Hanson, the former Educational Secretary for the South African Union Conference, has been continued in this position. He has, however, been relieved of other departmental work which he previously carried, so that now his entire time is devoted to the expanding educational work within the Union. We are happy to report a growing interest in Christian Education in the South African Conference.

Field Missionary Department.

Brother L. A. Vixie, formerly the Division Field Missionary Secretary, being desirous of a more direct contact with a larger number of our European colporteurs, was happy to accept the call to the Field Missionary secretaryship of the South African Union Conference. Since Brother Vixie's coming into the field, our book work has registered a distinct advance. While Brother Vixie is away on furlough, Brother Fred Ficker, one of our Helderberg graduates, and a successful colporteur, is carrying on, in a commendable way, the

strong work begun by Brother Vixie. Brother Ernest Stevenson, another one of our colporteurs, is giving much appreciated assistance to Brother Ficker. We will all be interested in the report from our Field Missionary Department.

Religious Book Depository.

In the re-organisation of the field, the Religious Book Depository was placed under the capable management of Miss P. E. Willmore, the former secretary-treasurer of the Cape Conference, and Religious Book Depository (Port Elizabeth). Miss Willmore's previous years of experience in dealing with our churches and our colporteurs have qualified her to fill the position of secretary of our enlarged depository with exceptional ability.

Unfortunately, for several years, the Religious Book Depository (Johannesburg) had been labouring under the incubus of a large debt. It was hoped that in the amalgamation the accumulated surplus of the Religious Book Depository (Port Elizabeth), amounting to nearly £1,000, would liquidate this debt and put the combined depository on a sound cash basis. It was found, however, that the savings of the Port Elizabeth depository were not sufficient to absorb the debt of the Johannesburg depository and still have sufficient working capital to carry on. Therefore, it became necessary for the united depository to avail itself of a previous arrangement which had been entered into on behalf of the Johannesburg depository by the Division, Sentinel Publishing Company, the union, and the local field, for the second payment of a sum of £80 each. The book depository is very grateful for the liberal assistance given by these organizations. This timely lift, together with the economies effected in the amalgamation, the increased scope of the work, and the new impetus given to the book work in the field has at the beginning of 1934, for the first time, enabled the depository to launch out on an entirely self-supporting budget.

CAMPAIGNS

To some degree, our campaigns have registered the effects of the period of depression and drought through which we have been passing. This is particularly true of the Harvest Ingathering campaign, but we are glad to report a slightly upward curve for 1933, and we expect 1934 to see us well on the way back to previous records, and thence on to greater achievements. The following tabulation will briefly summarise the facts for the past four years:

Rapport van die President van die S. A. Konferensie

Departemente

Buurtsending en Sabbatskool.

Ouderling F. G. Clifford, een van ons vername evangeliste in die gewese Natal-Transvaal konferensie was beroep vir die Buurtsending- en Sabbatskoolwerk. U sal belangstel in Ouderling Clifford se rapporte van die departemente. Een van die vernamste verrigtings van Ouderling Clifford se werksaamhede vir die Buurtsending was die uitstekende veldtog vir die *Tekens* verlede jaar.

Ouderling Clifford en Broeder F. E. Potter, die Sekretaris vir Buurtsending vir die Suidelike Afrikaanse Diwiesie het ver-gange 'n uitgebreide omreis deur byna die hele veld onderneem en die verskillende fases van sendingwerk in ons gemeentes opgebou.

Sendingvrywilligers Departement.

Ouderling A. W. Staples, een van ons volslae evangeliste van die gewese Kaap-konferensie, was aangestel as Sekretaris van Sendingvrywilligers van die Uniekonferensie. Ouderling Staples het die paar maande die jongeliede in diepere geestelike lewe gebring. Hy het sy evangeliese pogings nou binne in die gemeentes aange-wend. Ouderling Staples is geesdriftig besig met die S. V. Evangeliefonds-plan wat in die gewese Natal-Transvaal Konferensie be-gin is. Die jongeliede van die konferensie onderneem om genoegsame fondse in te samel om ten minste een bepaalde evange-liepoging elke jaar te onderhou. Die vol-slae poging van Ouderling Raubenheimer op Kroonstad was op die manier onder-steun. Die jongeliede samel vanjaar weer fondse in vir Graaff-Reinet in die Kaap-land. Ouderling Staples het 'n goeie rap-port.

Onderwysdepartement.

Ouderling E. D. Hanson het aangebly as Sekretaris vir Opvoeding in die Suid-Afri-kaanse Uniekonferensie. Hy is egter vry-gestel van ander departementele werk wat tevore op hom gerus het. Dus kan hy nou sy volle tyd wy aan die uitgebreide onder-wyswerk in die Unie. Dit verbly ons om mee te deel dat daar 'n bloeiende belang-stelling in Christelike Opvoeding in die Suid-Afrikaanse Konferensie is.

Veldsending Departement.

Broeder L. A. Vixie, die gewese Veldsen-ding-sekretaris van die Diwiesie, wou graag in nouer aanraking met meer van ons blanke kolporteurs kom, en was bly om die beroep vir Veldsending-sekretaris van die S. A. Uniekonferensie aan te neem. Vandat Broeder Vixie in ons veld is, het ons boekwerk waarlik gevorder. Terwyl Broeder Vixie op verlof is, druk Broeder Frikkie Ficker op prysenswaardige wyse die goeie werk van Broeder Vixie vorentoe. 'n Ander kolporteur, Broeder Stevenson, verleen gewaardeerde bystand aan Broeder Ficker. Ons verlang almal na die rapport van ons Veldsending-departement.

Religious Book Depository.

Met die re-organisasie van die veld, is die Religious Book Depository onder die be-kwame bestuur van Mej. P. E. Willmore geplaas, die gewese sekretaris-tesouiriere van die Kaap-Konferensie en Religious Book Depository (Port Elizabeth). Mej. Willmore se vorige ondervinding met ons gemeentes en ons kolporteurs het haar be-kwaam om die pos van sekretaressa van ons vergrote depôt deeglik te beklee.

Ongelukkig het die Religious Book De-pository vir etlike jare onder 'n groot skuldias gebuk gegaan. Die hoop was met die amalgamasie gekoester dat die opge-hoote surplus van die Religious Book De-pository (Port Elizabeth) wat byna-£1,000 bedra gebruik kan word om die skuld te dek, en die verenigde depôt te help om op vaste voet te staan. Dit was egter ge-vind dat die surplus van die Port Elizabeth depôt nie genoeg was om die skuld van die Johannesburg depôt te dek en die depôt met 'n genoegsame bedryfskapitaal te werk nie. Daarom was die verenigde depôt ge-noodsmaak om gebruik te maak van 'n vorige reëling wat die Diwiesie, Sentinel en die Unie, en die konferensie ten belange van die Johannesburg depôt getref het, om elk dubbeld £80 te betaal. Die Boek-depôt is baie dankbaar vir die vrygewige onderstand van die organisasies. Die waardeerde gif saam met die besparing as gevolg van die amalgamasie en die wyer uitgestrektheid van die werk, en die nuwe stoot wat die boekwerk in die begin van 1934 in die veld gekry het, het gehelp dat die depôt vir die eerste keer op 'n geheel selfstandige basis kon werk. Mej. Willmore gaan ons 'n baie aanmoedigende rapport gee.

VELDTOGTE

Tor 'n sekere mate kan 'n mens die uit-werking van die droogte wat net verby is, op ons veldtogte merk. Dis vernaamlik die geval met die Oesinsameling, maar ons is bly dat daar weer 'n klein styging in 1933 was. VAN noord, oos, suid en wes het ons werkers van die „leesstof-bediening” laas maand in Johannesburg vergader vir hul jaarlikse byeenkoms.

Voorwaar 'n besielende byeenkoms! Van die eerste diens af het daar groot belangstelling geheers en 'n merkwaardige gees van ernstige toewyding het die hele konvensie gekenmerk. Ons het gehoor van voorval na voorval waar belangstelling in die waarheid opgewek is deur ons boeke. Op eensame plase, in klein dorpies, en in besige stede steek ons getroue kolporteurs die toorts van waarheid aan. Uit die ondervindings wat gedurende die konvensie meegedeel is, het oor en oor geblyk hoe dat God Sy beskermende hand hou oor hierdie belangrike deel van Sy werk.
