

THE high pressure of modern life, and its exacting effects upon the minds of our young people, are well discussed in an editorial in the February issue of the *Woman's Home Companion*:

"Are we filling the lives of our children too full? Dr. Neilson, president of Smith College, said recently that by the time girls arrive at college they have lost the 'capacity for solitude.' He urges that parents should make a time-table for their children which would leave them some time to be quite alone. 'With theatres, movies, dancing masters, radio, and parties, parties, parties, there is no time left when a child can possess its own soul.' Parents, not only in cities and suburbs but even in small towns, know this to be true. Boys as well as girls are caught up in a wild whirl of activity such as earlier generations never knew and could not have endured. It gets to be a habit. We remember wistfully our own childhood with its long hours of quiet reading, of absorption in mighty projects of sewing or carpentry, of golden daydreams, or of simple idling in the sunshine.

"We have no patience with the futile desire to turn back the clock, to revert to old ways. But neither have we patience with an easy yielding to all the social pressures of the present moment. The telephone keeps ringing. Motor-cars toot their horns at the curb. There are always new films at the movie house. The neighbours' daughters are doing this and the boys at school are doing that, and our children must not be left out. So activities pile up, by emulation, imitation, and persuasion, until children run on schedules as closely packed as those of statesmen. The wise parent cuts through and provides for periods of solitude."

## Take Time For God

We approve of these statements; and we are interested in pointing out the disastrous effects of our current busy-ness upon the spiritual life. For there is one aspect of our daily doings which cannot be hurried—and that is religion. To build character, to strengthen the soul, takes time. To follow Jesus is more than mumbling prayers into a pillow at night, even if we have been running around on His errands all day.

"I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills." Ps. 121:1. But who has any time to gaze

at the hills now? We have to keep our eyes on the road, or we'll hit something.

"Be still, and know that I am God." "The Lord is in His holy temple: let all the earth keep silence before Him." Ps. 46:10; Hab. 2:20. Keep silence? Why, that's the very thing this modern world can't do!

"I meditate on all Thy works; I muse on the work of Thy hands." "Let the words of my mouth, and the meditation of my heart, be acceptable in Thy sight, O Lord, my strength and my Redeemer." Ps. 143:5; 19:14. "Meditate," "meditation"—what an old-fashioned flavour those words have!

Yet time to think is one of the prime requirements for the soul's drawing near to God. John Morley, the great literary critic, once offered an opinion of Macaulay, the English historian, in which he accused him of shallowness: "We can picture Macaulay talking, or making a speech in the House of Commons, or buried in a book, or scouring his library for references, or covering his blue foolscap with dashing periods, or accentuating his sentences and

barbing his phrases; but can anybody think of him as meditating, as modestly pondering and wondering, as possessed for so much as ten minutes by that spirit of inwardness, which has never been wholly wanting in any of those kings and princes of literature with whom it is good for men to sit in counsel?"

Now, if this "spirit of inwardness" is essential to literature, how much more is it essential to religion!

Parents who have laboured hard to rear their children, as the apostle advises, in "the nurture and admonition of the Lord," often are disappointed when their children, now grown, turn away in indifference from the faith which they have

been trained to cherish. The causes for such failure are various; yet we wonder if a partial reason may not be that the child has failed to cultivate, perhaps has never been encouraged to cultivate, that "spirit of inwardness." There has been much religion, but it has never gone in. It has been like a whitewash, which covers a fence but does not strengthen it. There have been church attendance and Bible lessons and Christian stories, and testifying in public meetings, and all manner of helpful spiritual exercises; but the power of the gospel of Christ has never reached the soul. The cry has never gone up, "God be merciful to me a sinner." The soul has never breathed, "Create in me a clean heart, O God."

This neglect to open the inner life to God does not come from any wickedness. It comes simply because we ourselves—and our children—are so extensively occupied with perfectly proper things. "Now it came to pass, as they went, that He entered into a certain village: and a certain woman named Martha received Him into her house. And she had a sister called Mary, which also sat at Jesus' feet, and heard His word. But Martha was cumbered about much serving, and came to Him, and said, Lord, dost Thou not care that my sister hath left me to serve alone? bid her therefore that she help me.

"And Jesus answered and said unto her, Martha, Martha, thou art careful and troubled about many things: but one thing is needful: and Mary hath chosen that good part, which shall not be taken away from her." Luke 10:38-42.

There is such a thing as balance. The whole tendency of our modern world is toward speed and activity, often a kind of whirligig activity.

"He that lacks time to mourn, lacks time to mend.

Eternity mourns that 'tis an ill cure  
For life's worst ills to have no time to  
mend them."

We are told of our Saviour that "in the morning, rising up a great while before day, He went out, and departed into a solitary place, and there prayed." Mark 1:35. Was not this one of the secrets of His power? He did not allow Himself to be rushed, therefore He was able to draw men to God.

We do not say that men should spend all night in prayer. But we think it would do us all good if we would spend a single hour in prayer,—in contemplating eternal things, as distinguished from transitory; in considering holy things, as contrasted with worldly; in weighing God's values, as different from human trivialities. If we would talk with our Father, and let Him talk with us, how much we might learn! what improvement we might make! what power we might receive!—*American Signs of the Times, Feb. 12, 1935.*

## Neem Tyd vir God

Die hoë druk van die moderne lewe, en die uitwerking daarvan op die gemoedere van die jongmense, word deeglik bespreek in die Februarie uitgawe van die *Woman's Home Companion*.

"Vul ons die lewens van ons kinders te vol? Dr. Neilson, president van Smith College, het onlangs gesê dat meisies, by die tyd dat hulle op kollege kom, die 'vermoë tot stille oorpeinsing' verloor het. Hy dring daarop aan dat ouers 'n tydtafel moet optrek waarin daar voorsiening gemaak word vir tye wanneer die kinders heeltemal alleen kan wees. 'Die skouburg, bioskoop, dansonderwysers, draadloos, en partytjies laat geen tyd vir die kind om oor sy eie siel te beskik nie.' Ouers, nie alleen in die stede en voorstede nie, maar selfs in die klein dorpie, weet dat dit die waarheid is. Seuns, sowel as dogters, word in hierdie draaikolk van bedrywigheid gevang, soos vorige geslagte dit nie geken het en nooit sou kon uitgehou het nie. Dit het gewoonte geword. Ons dink terug aan ons eie jong dae met hul lang ure vir lees, houtwerk, of naaiwerk, en die ure wat ons somer luilekker in die son weggedroom het.

"Ons het geen simpatie met die vergeefse poging om terug te keer na die ou orde van sake nie; maar nog minder keur ons die neiging goed om maar toe te gee aan die maatskaplike druk van ons dae. Die telefoon hou aan met lui. Motorkarre blaas hul toeters voor die deur. Daar

word altyd 'n nuwe prent vertoon in die bioskoop. Die bure se dogters maak só, en die seuns by die skool het weer iets anders aan die gang, en ons kinders moenie uitgesluit word nie. En so is dit die een ding op die ander; ons wedywer en aap na totdat ons kinders net so'n vol program het as ons staatsmanne. Wyse ouers skakel party van hierdie dinge uit, sodat hul kinders tye van stilte mag hê."

Ons stem saam met bogemelde uitlatings, en ons wil graag wys op die noodlottige gevolge van sulke gejaagdheid op die geestelike lewe. Daar is een deel van ons doen en late waarmee ons nie kan haastig wees nie, n.l., ons godsdien. Om die karakter te ontwikkel en die siel te versterk neem tyd. Om Jesus te volg beteken meer as om gebede saans teen 'n kussing af te rammel, al was ons ook die heeldag besig in Sy diens.

"Ek slaan my oë op na die berge." Ps. 121:1. Maar wie het nou se dae tyd om na die berge te kyk? Ons moet voor ons kyk of ons ry vas teen iets.

"Laat staan en weet dat Ek God is." „Maar die Here is in Sy heilige tempel—swyg voor Hom, o ganse aarde!" Ps. 46:11; Hab. 2:20. Swyg? Dis juis die ding wat ons moderne wêreld nie kan doen nie! „Ek dink aan die dae uit die voortyd; ek peins oor al u dade." „Laat die woorde van my mond en die oordenking van my hart welbehaaglik wees voor U aangesig, o Here, my rots en my verlosser!" Ps. 145:5; Ps. 19:15. „Dink," „oorpeins"!—hoe ouderwets klink hierdie woorde nie!

En nogtans is tyd vir oordenking een van die vereistes om tot God te genaak. John Morley, die groot literêre kritikus, het Macaulay, die Engelse historikus, eenmaal beskuldig van oppervlakkigheid: „Ons kan ons voorstel hoe hy 'n toespraak in die Laer Huis hou, of in 'n boek verdiep is, of gegewens in die biblioteek naslaan, of taferel uit die geskiedenis neerskryf: maar wie kan hom voorstel dat Macaulay ooit iets bepeins het of daaroor nagedink het; 'n eienskap wat nooit heeltemal gemis word by enige van die konings en prinse van die letterkunde nie."

As hierdie gees van innerlike bepeinsing dan so onontbeerlik is by die letterkunde, hoeveel te meer nie by die godsdien nie!

Ouers wat hul kinders opgevoed het in die „tug en vermaning van die Here" soos die apostel sê, is dikwels teleurgestel as hul kinders afwyk van die geloof waarin hulle opgevoed was. Daar is verskillende redes hiervoor; dog ons wonder of dit nie miskien gedeeltelik toe te skrywe is aan die feit dat die kind nagelaat het, of nooit miskien aangemoedig was om na te dink nie. Daar was baie godsdien, maar dit het nooit deurgedring nie. Dit was soos kalk wat die muur witmaak maar nie sterker maak nie. Daar was baie kerktog-gaan en Bybellesse en verhalde, getuënis-aflê in vergaderings, en baie ander geestelike oefeninge; maar die krag van die

evangelie van Christus het nooit die siel geraak nie. Die kreet, „Here wees my sondaar genadig,” het nooit uit die hart tot God opgestyg nie. Die siel het nog nooit gebed nie, „Skep vir my 'n rein hart, o God!”

Nalatigheid om die innerlike lewe vir God oop te maak is nie noodwendig die gevolg van boosheid nie. Dit ontstaan eenvoudig omdat ons en ons kinders te geheelal in beslag geneem word deur geoorloofde dinge. „En op hulle reis het Hy in 'n sekere dorp gekom, en 'n vrou met die naam van Martha het Hom in haar huis ontvang. En sy het 'n suster gehad met die naam van Maria; dié het aan die voete van Jesus gesit en na Sy woord geluister. Maar Martha was baie besig om alles klaar te maak. Sy kom toe daar staan en sê: Here, gee U nie om dat my suster my alleen laat bedien nie? Sê dan vir haar om my te help. Maar Jesus antwoord en sê vir haar: Martha, Martha, jy is besorg en verontrus oor baie dinge; Maar een ding is nodig; en Maria het die goeie deel uitgekies wat van haar nie sal weggeneem word nie.” Lukas 10:38-42.

As ons met ons Vader sou praat, en Hom toelaat om met ons te praat, hoeveel mag ons dan nie leer nie!
