



# Camp-meeting in South Nyasaland

DURING the month of May six camp-meetings were conducted in the South Nyasaland Mission Field. These gatherings proved to be the largest and best ever held in this territory. By a careful count, 32,534 men, women and children were present. This figure does not include a large number who were on the outside of the camp-meeting enclosure at the Malamulo, Thekerani and Cheleka mission stations. Thus it is safe to say that approximately 35,000 people came under the influence of these convocations. At three of the meetings there were over 8,000 present at each place. What an inspiration it was to stand before such a great sea of upturned faces, and preach the message. There are six more meetings to be conducted in the South East African Union; so the total attendance for the entire field no doubt will reach the 45,000 mark this year.

During these services, after a very careful and thorough examination of the candidates, seven hundred souls were baptised and received into church fellowship. When the other meetings are completed, the number baptised will pass the 1,000 mark. And we are pleased to say that during each of the six camp-meetings, a large number responded to the earnest gospel appeal made to give the heart to Jesus, and unite with the Bible class for the first time.

## Malamulo Mission

This is where the union training school is located. About 500 students, in all standards up to and including the training course, are in attendance. Elder Nash, the director of the station, has the work well in hand. He is assisted by a number of able workers, and this mission is proving to be a mighty factor in helping to build up a strong work throughout the field. Since our visit to this mission one year ago with Elder Watson, a splendid print shop has been erected, a large church building is nearing completion, and a very commodious European ward containing four large rooms has been completed. Really, this building will mean much toward the enlarging of our medical work at Malamulo.

Dr. E. G. Marcus has certainly carried forward a large medical programme for Europeans, natives and the lepers. Many thousands of patients have come under the care of the doctor, his faithful nurses, and his native helpers, during the last year. He has left the mission now for post-graduate work and a much needed rest. Truly it was very touching to listen to the tributes of gratitude and appreciation paid to Dr. Marcus by the natives assembled in the church the night just prior to his departure. Without question he is held in high esteem by those who have come under his medical

ministry during recent years at this centre of influence.

Miss Rena Curtis is now taking supervision of the girls' and women's work, for which we are extremely thankful. We believe this feature of our work has a very bright future before it at Malamulo.

During the visit of the new governor (which took place while the camp-meeting was in session), His Excellency expressed surprise, as well as his sincere appreciation of what the institution was achieving toward the uplift of the native peoples. He was especially impressed with the girls' compound and the leper colony. We now have 250 lepers under treatment. His Excellency expressed the fond hope that we would build up the camp to where it would care for five hundred persons.

When he left the mission we told him we had felt honoured by his visit. To this he replied, "Not so, for the honour and pleasure have been all mine." There is no question but that this high official was greatly moved and touched with what Malamulo is doing.

## Thekerani Mission

It was indeed a pleasure to spend the week with Brother Stevenson and family, as well as to attend the camp-meeting of over 8,000 people at this station.

Brother and Sister Stevenson are doing a splendid work. Aside from the evangelistic work, station work, work for the women, and the supervising of the school work, this mission has over fifty out-schools, together with a large number of churches and Bible classes to look after.

The mission and its various compounds are well laid out. Since our visit to this place a year ago, a splendid girls' compound has been laid out, and several homes erected. The grassy plots and flowers gave a beautiful appearance to the grounds. And to me it was interesting to learn that this compound, together with the others on the place, has been made possible without hardly any cost to the cause. The work has been done almost entirely by student and native labour. Surely the work at Thekerani is onward!

## Matandani Mission

While it was not the writer's privilege to attend the camp-meeting at Matandani this year, yet it was encouraging to visit the place for a few hours. Here we found Brother and Sister Jewell, together with Miss Donald, of good cheer and pushing their work with vigour. The mission campus, buildings, etc., give a neat appearance and revealed a strong work being carried forward. Sister Jewell is doing a large medical work as well as getting the girls' work well under way. We are pleased

with all we observed during our brief visit.

## Thambani, Cheleka and Chinyama Missions

These three missions are in charge of native directors. They have been well laid out, and the work being done at each place is a credit to our society. However, these native directors are not satisfied: they are aiming to bring their work up on to a still higher plane of efficiency, and in this they will succeed. As I visited these places, and especially the one at Thambani, I wished all of our European believers could see it. It is a beauty spot, clean and uplifting. It would cause one to feel that mission work for the native peoples does pay in no small reward.

At all of these six camp-meetings, Elders Evans, Wellman, Mrs. Wright and the writer joined Brother H. M. Sparrow and his associate workers in the spiritual activities conducted. We divided our forces so that two strong camp-meetings were cared for over each week-end: thus we were able to conduct the six gatherings during the three weeks we spent in the union.

This year special meetings were held for fathers, mothers and children, each being conducted in separate places at the same hour. These meetings met with hearty approval. Many native fathers and mothers told us they had longed for such help, and that now they would be able to go back and conduct better homes.

As we left Nyasaland this time, we could not help but recall the words of Elder Watson one year ago when he said upon his departure from the field: "My soul has been greatly blessed because of what mine eyes hath seen and my ears hath heard in Nyasaland." And, too, brethren and sisters, we may well add that Elders Evans and Wellman were touched in like manner. Indeed they were surprised. Truly the work in that great field is onward. God is blessing Elder Sparrow and his staff of labourers; and we pray that 1935 will be the best year ever witnessed in the onward march of the truth in old Nyasaland.



### Angola Teachers' Institute

MILTON ROBISON

AN institute for native teachers or catechists was held at Bongo Mission from March 29 to April 30. It was a pleasure to meet with the twenty-five faithful workers and try to help them prepare for better service. They have many problems, but in spite of these a good work is being done. All their school work must be in the Portuguese language, which makes it very difficult, especially in the beginners' classes. Brother Cadwallader's Oral English Manual has been a great blessing to the work in Angola.

Some of the teachers have had to work with very little normal training, but Bongo Mission is helping to meet this need, and the influence of their Training Course is being felt in the field.

The Angola teacher has to be very practical as he must go out to the village, build his own house, build the school house which serves also as a church, supervise the school garden, organise hearers' and baptism classes, hold evangelistic efforts, conduct the Sabbath services as well as teach the school. It is wonderful how God blesses these faithful workers; souls are brought into the kingdom from the darkness of heathenism and superstition as a result of their efforts.

### A Fruitful Ministry

SAILING home on the S. S. "Watussi" some weeks ago Elder W. L. Davy and family watched a couple board their ship at Luderitzbucht, in South West Africa. Later on during the voyage they made friends with this couple and learned that the wife was a Sabbath keeper, and the husband a prospective one.

The story related to Elder Davy was to the effect that the couple first learned a little of the truth from Elder L. E. Conradie of the Central European Division. Later they purchased a copy of "Daniel and Revelation" from a member of the literature ministry in Germany. A few years later they sailed for South West Africa and took up residence there. Years passed, and one day a young man called at their home canvassing for a book entitled "Bible Readings." He took their order,

and also studied the Bible with them in the evenings during his stay in their vicinity. This young man was a student-colporteur from Helderberg College—Fred Ficker, now the Field Missionary Secretary of the South African Conference. A year later another young man called at their home offering a book for sale. The book was "Home Physician" and the young man, Hermann Ficker, a brother to Fred. He also gave Bible studies to the couple. Just after this the wife decided to keep the Sabbath and has done so ever since. The husband is returning to Germany to wind up his affairs and will then take his stand by the side of his faithful wife.

So the good work of the literature ministry goes on. There is nothing spectacular about it; no limelight, no display; just a silent movement, but oh, so positive, so constant, so unshakeable, so fruitful.

May God continue to inspire, encourage, and guide the faithful men and women of the literature ministry as they distribute the printed page through this great field. Pray for them, dear reader.

### Kampdienste in Suid-Nyasaland

GEDURENDE Meimaand was daar kampdienste op ses verskillende plekke gehou in die Suid-Nyasaland Sendingveld. Dit was die grootste en beste dienste wat ons nog ooit in hierdie streek gehou het. Deur noukeurig te tel het ons vasgestel dat 32,534 mans, vrouens, en kinders by die dienste teenwoordig was. Hierdie syfers sluit nie die groot getal in wat buite die kampdiens-terreine was op Malamulo, Thekerani, en Cheleka sendnigstasies nie. Ons kan dus met veiligheid sê dat daar ongeveer 35,000 siele was wat onder die invloed van hierdie groot byeenkomste gekom het. Op drie verskillende plekke was daar oor die 8,000 persone teenwoordig. Dit was besielend om voor sulke groot skare te staan en die boodskap te verkondig. Aangesien daar nog ses kampdienste gehou moet word in die Suid-oes Afrikaanse Unie, sal die getal

wat die dienste bygewoon het in hierdie veld seker nog op 45,000 te staan kom.

Na 'n baie grondige ondersoek het ons tot dus ver by hierdie dienste sewehonderd siele gedoop en by die kerk toegevoeg. Na die ander kampdienste afgeloop is, sal die getal van gedooptes seker meer as duisend wees. Dit doen ons ook genoë om te sê dat daar by elkeen van hierdie dienste 'n groot aantal was wat die Here Jesus vir die eerste keer bely het en by die Bybel-klasse aangesluit het.

van die laagste klasse tot die Normaal kursus. Leraar Nash, die bestuurder, het die werk goed onder beheer. Hy word bygestaan deur 'n aantal bekwame werkers, en hierdie inrigting dra baie daartoe by om die werk oor die hele veld te versterk. Sedert my laaste besoek hier saam met Leraar Watson, is daar 'n drukkery opgerig, asook 'n groot kerkgebou, en 'n Europese hospitaal-afdeling van vier kamers. Laasgenoemde gebou sal baie betekenis vir die uitbreiding van ons mediese werk op Malamulo.

Dr. E. G. Marcus het sonder twyfel 'n groot werk gedoen onder Europeane, sowel as onder die natuurlike en melaatses. Oor die afgelope jaar was daar duisende behandel deur die dokter, sy getroue verpleegsters, en natuurlike helpers. Hy is nou weg vir verdere studies en 'n welverdiende vakansie. Dit was voorwaar aandoenlik om te hoor hoe die natuurlike hul dankbaarheid en waardering uitspreek in die kerk die aand voor Dr. Marcus se vertrek. Hy staan gewis hoog aangeskryf by diegene wat die afgelope jare onder sy behandeling was.

Mej. Rena Curtis het nou toesig oor die werk onder die meide, en hiervoor is ons baie dankbaar. Ons is oortuig dat hierdie deel van die werk op Malamulo 'n skitterende toekoms het.

Die nuwe Goewerneur het Malamulo besoek terwyl die kampdienste aan die gang was, en hy het sy verbasing, sowel as waardering uitgedruk oor wat by die inrigting gedoen word vir die opheffing van die natuurlike. Wat veral 'n indruk op hom gemaak het, was die kompond vir die jongmeide en die leprose gestig. Daar is nou 250 melaatses onder behandeling. Sy Edele het die hoop uitgespreek dat die gestig nog sal uitbrei totdat dit 500 persone kan opneem.

Met sy vertrek het ons hom meegedeel dat ons geëerd voel oor sy besoek; maar hy het geantwoord, „Gladnie, dit was vir my 'n eer en 'n plesier." Sonder twyfel het hierdie hoë beaamte onder 'n diepe indruk gekom van wat daar op Malamulo aangaan.

#### Thekerani Sending

Dit was vir ons 'n plesier om die week met Broeder Stevenson en sy gesin deur te bring, asook om die kampdiens by te woon waarop oor die 8,000 siele teenwoordig was.

Broeder en Suster Stevenson doen uitstekende werk. Behalwe die werk op die stasie, die evangelistiese werk, die werk onder die vrouens, die skoolwerk, is daar nog oor die vyftig statskole, en 'n groot aantal kerke en Bybelklasse wat moet behartig word.

Die sendingstasie en die bybehorende geboue is goed uitgelê. Sedert ons laaste besoek 'n jaar gelede, is daar 'n kompond vir meide, en verskeie wonings opgerig. Die grasperke en blomme laat die gronde baie mooi lyk. Dit was van groot belang vir my om te verneem dat die kompond, tesame met die wat tevore opgerig is, byna niks gekos het nie. Die werk is byna uitsluitlik deur die studente en natuurlike self gedoen. Die werk op Thekerani gaan vooruit.

#### Matandani Sending

Hoewel ek nie hierdie keer die kampdienste op Matandani bygewoon het nie, was dit tog bemoedigend om die stasie vir 'n paar uur te besoek. Ons het Broeder en Suster Jewell en Mej. Donald vol moed aangetref. Die stasie en die geboue lyk baie mooi en is bewys dat daar 'n goeie werk gedoen word. Suster Jewell doen

baie mediese werk, sowel as werk onder die meide. Ons was bly oor alles wat ons in die paar uur gesien het.

### Thambani, Cheleka, en Chinyama Stasies

Hierdie drie sendingstasies word deur naturelle bestuur. Die stasies is mooi uitgelê en die werk wat daar op elke plek gedoen word is 'n eer vir ons genootskap. Maar hierdie naturelle bestuurders is nie tevrede nie; hulle oogmerk is om die werk op 'n nog hoër peil te bring, en hulle sal ook daarin slaag. Toe ek hierdie stasies besoek het, veral Thambani, het ek gewens dat ons Europese gelowiges dit ook kon sien. Dit is 'n baie mooi plek, en baie skoon. Dit laat mens voel dat sendingwerk onder die inboorlinge terdeë die moeite werd is.

By al die ses kampdienste het Leraars Evans, Wellman, Mev. Wright en ek, Broeder Sparrow en sy medewerkers bygestaan met die dienste. Ons het ons kragte verdeel sodat daar oor die naweek op twee verskillende plekke dienste kon gehou word. Op hierdie wyse kon ons gedurende die ses weke wat ons in hierdie unie vertoef het, op ses plekke kampdienste hou.

Hierdie jaar was daar spesiale dienste gehou vir vaders, moeders, en kinders; die dienste was tegelyk op verskillende plekke gehou, en het groot byval gevind. Baie van die naturelle vaders en moeders het ons vertel hoedat hulle na sulke hulp verlang het, en dat hulle nou sal kan huis-toe gaan en hulle huise beter regeer.

Waar ons hierdie keer Nyasaland verlaat, kom die woorde van Leraar Watson weer tot ons, toe hy gesê het: „My siel het 'n groot seën ontvang deur wat ek in Nyasaland gesien en gehoor het.” En waarlik, broeders en susters ek kan sê dat Leraars Evans en Wellman net so aangedaan was. Hulle was verras. Die werk in hierdie groot veld gaan vooruit. God het Leraar Sparrow en sy medewerkers geseën, en ons bid dat 1935 die beste jaar sal wees wat die waarheid nog ooit in Nyasaland beleef het.

## 'n Vruggbare Bediening

TOE Leraar W. L. Davy onlangs op sy verlof gegaan het met die stoomboot „Watussi,” het hy gemerk dat daar 'n egpaar van Suid-Wes Afrika in Luderitzbaai aan boord gekom het. Later op die reis het hy vriende gemaak met hierdie egpaar en uitgevind dat die vrou 'n Sabbathouer is, en dat die man ook van plan is om een te word.

In 'n gesprek met hulle het Leraar Davy

verneem dat hulle vir die eerste maal 'n bietjie van die waarheid van Leraar L. R. Conradie, van die Sentraal-Europese Divisie gehoor het. Later het hulle van 'n kolporteur in Duitsland die boek „Daniel and Revelation” gekoop. 'n Paar jaar daarna het hulle na Suid-Wes Afrika verhuis en hul woning daar gemaak. Jare het verbygegaan toe daar eendag 'n kolporteur by hulle kom aanklop met die boek „Bible Readings.” Hulle het hom 'n bestelling gegee, en gedurende sy verblyf daar het hy hulle saans Bybelstudies gegee. Die kolporteur was niemand anders as Fred Ficker nie, destyds 'n student op Helderberg Kollege, en tans Veld-Sendingsekretaris van die Suid-Afrikaanse Konferensie. 'n Jaar later het daar weer 'n kolporteur by hulle gekom met die boek „Home Physician”—dit was Hermann Ficker, Fred se broer. Hy het hulle ook Bybelstudies gegee. Kort daarna het die vrou besluit om Sabbat te hou, en het sedert daardie tyd daarmee volgehou. Die man is nou op weg na Duitsland om sy sake te gaan reël, en dan sal hy saam met sy vrou die Sabbat hou.

KRITZINGER.—Brother Olivier Kritzinger of Nieuwe Plaats died at his home in Longkloof, on June 5, 1935, at the age of 56 years and one month.

Brother Kritzinger was one of the brethren who began keeping the Sabbath some years before they ever heard of others keeping the seventh-day Sabbath. After coming in touch with Brother B. P. de Beer, and Elder D. F. Tarr who instructed them further he united with the Seventh-

day Adventist Church, being baptised by Elder Tarr in 1916. From that time until his death Brother Kritzinger was a faithful member.

Brother Kritzinger was elected elder of the Longkloof church three years ago, which position he faithfully filled until his unexpected death. On Friday he complained of a pain at the heart, but was able to go to the church for the evening service, returning to his home to study the Sabbath school lesson, as well as to prepare a talk for Sabbath morning service before retiring for the night.
