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Where the Ends of the World Meet

JUST now the ends of the world are drawn together in one central web at the Exposition Auditorium in San Francisco. It is the forty-third session of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. Buzzing around me as I write are voices that only a short time ago were preaching the everlasting gospel in every land on earth. They have travelled—some for hours, others for days, many for weeks, and several for months to tell of the wonderful progress of this blessed message throughout the world. They have come to testify to the wonderful manner in which the great God of heaven is working among all nations, kindreds, tongues and peoples and moulding them, despite national boundaries and tribal customs, prejudices, and superstition, into one great universal brotherhood of faith, hope and love.

There has just passed my desk a national of China, arm in arm with a national from India, talking together like two long separated brothers just reunited. And so they are. They lived unconscious of their relationship to one another until this blessed message united them into the great family of God and the brotherhood of Jesus Christ. There goes a Solomon Islander—a fine looking fellow with dark skin and fuzzy pom-pom of hair, smiling down lovingly on a white-skinned brother from Central Europe. Such a meeting in the homeland of the Islander—before the advent of the third angel's message—would have ended disastrously for the fair-complexioned brother. What greater evidence is needed of the unifying influence of the old, old story.

Yes, there are many such living proofs walking about this great auditorium. There goes our beloved native brother, Pastor Isaac from old Solusi, with a white brother from North America, telling him, I suppose, of how the Spirit of God is bringing out souls from the caves and rocky koppies of Southern Rhodesia—subjects of the once mighty and evil Lobengula—and the

story of divine conquest through human medium illuminates both their faces with a holy joy as they converse.

From Central Europe—the powder keg of the world just now, where nationalism snarls across a dozen boundaries, and fear and hate is setting the stage for Armageddon—there are nationals to tell us the same story. From the regions of the great Amazon, from old Mexico and Central America, from four-score and eight states in North America, from the wild prairies of Canada, from that densely populated little island, Japan, from North Africa—well, why take space to enumerate them all—they come from the ends of the earth; one peaceful, happy brotherhood made one by the blood of the Lamb.

Five hundred and ninety delegates and about another nine thousand believers—a mighty gathering of a surety. [There were approximately twenty-five thousand at a later meeting.] Come with me into the spacious auditorium with a seating capacity of fifteen thousand. The main floor is many feet in width without a single pillar to obscure one's view of the rostrum; on either side of the main floor a sloping gallery, and above that another, with rows upon rows of seats, rising upward to a dizzy height, where the occupants appear like marionettes. Behind the huge rostrum is a mighty pipe organ of the Wurlitzer type and seated before it a choir of sixty voices. The body of the auditorium is divided into sections to accommodate the delegates with each Division designated by a standard on which is displayed the name of the Division. At the rear of the world delegation area, as well as at each side and in the galleries are seated the visitors from the various churches throughout North America.

At 7:30 P.M. the choir opens the song service—a pleasing melody of voices. At 8:00 P.M. the speaker of the evening and

chairman of the session—Elder C. H. Watson—supported by vice-presidents, General Conference officers, and some of the Division leaders file on to the rostrum. After the usual preliminaries the chairman opens the session with an earnest appeal for a reconsecration of workers, believers, and resources to the finishing of the great task entrusted to the remnant church. Outlining the vicious and chaotic conditions of the world, the emasculated condition of Protestantism, and the enfeebled nature of the great majority of Christian churches, he points the remnant church to its only power for the accomplishment of its God-given task—the Holy Spirit. He appeals to one and all to realise that their success depends not on organisation, or wealth, or knowledge, or prestige, or anything else—but on the Holy Ghost, by whose mighty power the apostolic church performed such wonderful deeds in world evangelism. He calls both workers and laity to a new and individual reconsecration, to a higher plane of spiritual living, and more concentrated efforts to finish the work of God on earth. This stirring appeal found a response in the hearts of all present and the forty-third General Conference session was ushered in on a high spiritual note which, the chairman urged, should be maintained throughout by faithful attendance at all devotional exercises—and by much private supplication to God.

This call will echo out to the ends of the earth, rallying the remnant church to the final battle in the age-long controversy between Christ and Satan. Oh, people of the Southern African Division, let the call find lodgment in your hearts, let the spirit of this great world convention grip you. Join anew with us in a deeper consecration, and by supplication—with thanksgiving for what God has already accomplished through us—let us march forward under the Holy Spirit's control and direction to complete the work in Africa.

Four Years in a Sabbath-Keeping Business

ON coming into contact with the Sabbath and Advent message, just over four years ago, the first thing that impressed my wife and me was the necessity of obedience,—“fully or not at all”—keeping in the light or going off into darkness, for there is no half-way house in this message.

The question then naturally confronted us, as it has many others, What are we going to do? What about my work? I had been fourteen years and a half in my then present situation in a large business house, and was faced with the possibility of being out of work.

Eventually the test came and I decided to apply for the Sabbath off. My request was turned down, and after a further application to the head office of the firm I was compelled to resign. I had very little capital and could not afford to be idle and so decided to try to start a business of my own in a small way. Although my capital even for that was decidedly small, we often recalled that the Lord had promised to help and the promise was surely kept, for a day or so later I was introduced to a gentleman at the station who was leaving by train that evening. On hearing of my difficulty he asked me to come along and see him. He allowed me credit for goods to the value of some £400. This in itself was somewhat remarkable as I had never had business dealings with him before and the country was passing through a stage of depression. These goods enabled me to make a start almost at once. We were also wonderfully helped in getting suitable premises at a reasonable rent, and were also quickly able to fix up an overseas shipper and buyer, and although the bills coming along to be met at a certain time tested our faith considerably “we were never let down”; the Lord fulfilled His promises.

The Way the Lord Works

At one time we were £40 short of meeting a bill. This bill was due the following day, the money having to be in the bank in the morning. This was a serious position for a new business, for, if a business is not able to meet its bills, credit is stopped, and one is placed in a very awkward position. The same day a lady friend came in and on hearing of our difficulty immediately left and in a short time returned with the necessary £40 which was placed in the bank ready to meet this bill on the following morning and a short time later

we were able to repay her this amount.

Later on we were again faced with a financial problem and this time no friend came along and we were put to the test of selling up our home to meet our business obligations. We sold at a sacrifice, but again we were marvellously helped and sufficient business came along to meet the balance and so the Lord's blessing has continued. Particularly have we noticed when large bills have been due that sufficient business has been sent along, but just enough to cover them, and that, often at a quiet time of the month when good business days could be least expected. Now, after three years out of our home we have been enabled to go back again, and all that is necessary for our comfort replaced; and after four years of business we find ourselves becoming established, and our business being built up in a most wonderful manner, in spite of being told that we would not last six months and that it was impossible to make a business pay, closing on Saturdays. Although it has sometimes been dark, the Lord has always kept His promises to us and has helped and guided us in His own due time. Just that quiet help when it is most needed, giving us that confidence in the knowledge of His ever watchful care, enabling us to carry on in His service.

On first hearing this truth our decision was to pay the Lord's tithe, acknowledging all things as the Lord's and this, we believe, has resulted in the blessings we have received.



How Can I be More Useful?

BECAUSE they are not connected with some directly religious work, many feel that their lives are useless, that they are doing nothing for the advancement of God's kingdom. If they could do some great thing, how gladly they would undertake it! But because they can serve only in little things, they think themselves justified in doing nothing. In this they err. A man may be in the active service of God while engaged in the ordinary, everyday duties,—while felling trees, clearing the ground, or following the plow. The mother who trains her children for Christ is as truly working for God as is the minister in the pulpit.

Many long for the special talent with which to do a wonderful work, while the duties lying close at hand, the performance of which would make the life fragrant, are lost sight of. AT the General Conference many wonderful reports were given of mission progress in all the world. All those who take the *Review and Herald* will follow with interest the reports of our general men from Asia, Africa, South America, China, yes, from pole to pole, east, west, and everywhere. Are you interested in reading these reports of progress of the third angel's message in all the world? Yes, you answer. Now let us draw a parallel to our reporting system of missionary work of the church. Why report the missionary work we do from week to week?

1. For information. As in the military affairs, so in the church, it is necessary to know how the battle is progressing. When the leaders do not know what is being done, they cannot plan intelligently for what remains to be done.

2. For encouragement to the members in the soul-winning programme of the church.

3. To glorify God. “Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven.”

4. To stimulate activity in any cause it is necessary to know what others are doing and to work in harmony with the brethren and general plan of progressive, intensive work.

5. Who should report? “To every one who becomes a partaker of His grace, the Lord appoints a work for others.”—“*Ministry of Healing*,” page 148. There are some who try to hide behind a text and make it an excuse for failure to join the ranks of reporting church members, and the text reads, “When thou doest alms, let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth.” In answer to the verse quoted above we read from “*Testimonies*,” Vol. I, page 193: “With many, the left hand does not know what the right hand does, for the right hand does nothing worthy of the notice of the left hand. . . . I was shown that this scripture does not apply to those who have the cause of God at heart. . . . The good works of the children of God are the most effectual preaching that the unbeliever has.”

The missionary reporting system is, therefore, all-embracing, and calls for a full 100 per cent reporting membership, representing all lines of work divinely appointed and set in operation in the remnant church. The reports include missionary work from the isolated as well as those who belong to groups of organised churches in the conference.

The missionary aim of the church is “Every church member a missionary worker, every worker a reporting member.”

Think for Yourself

ARE we aware of the danger in failing to exercise our God-given faculties in all that relates to salvation? Is it sufficient to be possessors of volumes containing light for our very time, and lack an intimate knowledge of their message of guidance? Do we place too low an estimate on salvation's cost and remain content with a nominal experience? While living moral lives, cherishing high ideals, are we being overcome with the cares of life?

Pertinent questions, these, in the light of the following: "Those who are content to devote their lives to physical labour, and leave others to do the thinking for them, while they simply carry out what other brains have planned, will have strength of muscle, but feeble intellects. Their influence for good is small in comparison to what it might be if they would use their brains as well as their muscles. This class fall more readily if attacked by disease, because the system is vitalised by the electrical force of the brain to resist disease. Men who have good physical powers should educate themselves to think as well as to act, and not depend upon others to be brains for them."—"Counsels on Health," pages 181, 182.

Here is an electrical treatment from the brain gained by the study of Divine revelation. In contrast with this, and placing a premium on an absence of thought, we are told by Mrs. Eddy, in *Science and Health*, that the unthinking lobster grows a claw to replace the one lost. Thus we are left to a choice of philosophy, "study to show thyself approved," or the lobster logic.

With the Creator concerned about our

physical welfare as expressed in the following lines, how interested we should be: "The Creator watches over the human machinery, keeping it in motion. Were it not for His constant care, the pulse would not beat, the action of the heart would cease, the brain would no longer act its part.

"The brain is the organ and instrument of the mind, and controls the whole body. In order for the other parts of the system to be healthy, the brain must be healthy. And in order for the brain to be healthy, the blood must be pure. If by correct habits of eating and drinking the blood is kept pure, the brain will be properly nourished. It is the lack of harmonious action in the human organism that brings disease."—"Counsels on Health," pages 586, 587. It is then of vital importance that we maintain our bodies in a well ordered condition, exercising our faculties to His glory that we may prove what is that good and acceptable, and perfect will of God.

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Vier Jaar in 'n Sabbathou-Besigheid

DIE eerste ding waarvan my vrou en ek oortuig was toe ons vier jaar gelede die Sabbat- en Adventboodskap aangeneem het, was gehoorsaamheid — algehele gehoorsaamheid. Ons het besef dat ons in die lig sou moes wandel, of in die duisternis, want daar is nie soets as gedeeltelike gehoorsaamheid in verband met hierdie boodskap nie.

Die vraagstuk waarvoor ons, soos ook baie ander, te staan gekom het was, Wat gaan jy doen? Wat omtrent jou werk? Ek was toe reeds veertien en 'n half jaar in my huidige betrekking, en die moontlikheid was daar dat ek my betrekking sou verloor.

Eindelik het die toets gekom en ek het 'n versoek ingestuur om die Sabbath vry te hê. Die versoek was afgewys, en na nog 'n applikasie aan die hoofkantoor was ek verplig om te bedank. Daar ek so te sê geen geld gehad het nie, kon ek nie stilsit nie en ek het besluit om 'n besigheidjie van my eie te begin. Hoewel my geldjies selfs hiervoor maar baie ontoreikend was, het ons dikwels gedink aan die Here se beloftes om te help, en Hy het ook; want 'n dag of wat later was ek op die stasie aan 'n man voorgestel wat daardie aand sou vertrek. Toe hy van my moeilikhed hoor, het hy my gevra om hom te kom sien. Hy het my goedere ter waarde van £400 op skuld laat kry. Dit was merkwaardig aangesien ek nog nooit tevore met hierdie persoon sake gedaan het nie, en te meer daar dit gedurende die depressie was. Met hierdie goedere kon ek byna dadelik besigheid begin. Ons was ook op 'n wonderbaarlike wyse gehelp om 'n gesikte besigheidslokaal te kry wat nie te duur was nie. Ons het gou daarin geslaag om met 'n uitvoer firma oorsee in aanrakning te kom asook met 'n koper. Ons geloof was dikwels beproef deurdat ons wissels moes honoreer, maar die Here het ons nooit in die steek gelaat nie; Hy het Sy beloftes gestand gedoen.

Hoe die Here Werk

Eentyd het ons £40 kort gekom om 'n wissel te honoreer. Hierdie wissel was die volgende dag betaalbaar en die geld moes in die oggend gedeponeer word. Dit was 'n haglike posisie vir 'n nuwe besigheid, want as ek in gebreke gebly het om die wissel te honoreer sou my krediet gestop word, en dit sou my in 'n benarde posisie geplaas het. Daardie dag het 'n vriendin ons besoek, en toe sy van ons moeilikhed hoor is sy dadelik daar weg en in

'n kort tydjie was sy terug met die nodige £40 waarmee ons die wissel die volgende dag gehonoreer het. Ek was gou in staat om die bedrag aan hierdie dame terug te betaal.

Later was ons weer in geldelike moeilikhede, en hierdie keer het daar nie 'n vriend opgedaag om ons uit te help nie. Ons moes ons huis verkoop om ons verplittings na te kom, en dit teen 'n groot verlies; dog weer was ons op wonderbaarlike wyse gehelp, want ons het genoeg sake gedaan om alles te betaal. Ons het veral opgemerk dat as ons groot wissels moes betaal het ons altyd genoeg sake gedaan — maar net genoeg om die bedrag op te maak; en dikwels het dit gebeur in maande wat gewoonlik swak besigheidsmaande was. Nou, na ons drie jaar uit ons huis was kon ons weer teruggaan en weer alle geriewe geniet. Na vier jaar se besigheid vind ons dat ons begin selfstandig word en dat ons besigheid op 'n merkwaardige wyse ontwikkel het ten spyte van die waarskuwing dat mens nie kan besigheid doen en Saterdae toemaak nie en dat ons nie ses maande sou staande bly nie. Hoewel dit soms donker was, het die Here Sy beloftes nagekom en ons op Sy eie tyd gehelp en geleid. Die hulp het gekom wanneer ons dit die nodigste gehad het en dit het ons vertroue in Sy sorg versterk en ons in staat gestel om vol te hou in Sy diens.

Toe ons die waarheid gehoor het, het ons besluit om die Here se tiende te betaal, en ons glo dat dit daarom is dat die Here ons gesêen het.

leerlinge kon kry nie. Die Europese sendeling het ook weer die plek besoek en by die leerlinge aangedring om die skool te besoek, maar hulle het geantwoord: „Ons is Sewende-dag Adventiste en sal nie na u skool gaan nie. U wil net hê dat ons by u kerk moet aansluit.”

Die gelowiges daar was baie vroeg in hulle ervaring alleen gelaat, en die groot vraag was „Sou hulle staande bly?” Maar Hy wat die goede werk begin het, het gesorg vir Sy skape. Sabbat, 6 Junie, was 'n dag van vreugde en blydschap vir daardie gelowiges. Broeders Staples en Willmore het van Johannesburg oor gekom, terwyl ons van Louis Trichardt na Naboomspruit gegaan het. 'n Studie Insake Indiening van Rapporte

DAAR was wonderbaarlike rapporte ingedien tydens die Wêreldkonferensiesitting, in verband met die uitbreiding van sendingwerk in alle dele van die wêreld. Diegene wat die *Review and Herald* lees het natuurlik baie belang gestel in die rapporte van ons Divisie-leiers uit Asië, Afrika, Suid-Amerika, China—ja van pool tot pool, oos, wes en uit alle dele. Stel u belang in hierdie rapporte in verband met die vordering van die derde engel se boodskap oor die ganse wêreld? U antwoord natuurlik, ja. Laat ons nou 'n vergelyking maak tussen hierdie rapporte en rapporte in die kerk. Waarom moet ons die sendingwerk rapporteer wat ons van week tot week doen?

1. Vir informasie. Net soos in militêre kringe, is dit ook nodig vir die kerk om verslag te doen sodat ons kan sien hoe die stryd vorder. As die leiers nie weet wat verrig is nie, dan kan hulle ook nie verstandig planne maak vir wat nog moet gedoen word nie.

2. Vir bemoediging van die kerklede in verband met hul program om siele te win.

3. Om God te verheerlik. „Laat julle lig so skyn voor die mense, dat hulle julle goeie werke kan sien en julle Vader wat in die hemele is verheerlik.”

4. Om belangstelling op te wek in enige saak is dit nodig om te weet wat ander doen, en ook om saam te werk met die broeders in die program van vooruitstredende, intensiewe werk.

5. Wie moet rapporteer? „Aan elkeen wat Sy genade deelagtig word, gee die Here 'n werk om te doen vir andere.” „Ministry of Healing,” bls. 148. Daar is sommige wat probeer om agter 'n teks te skuil en dit te gebruik as 'n ekskuus om nie te rapporteer nie. Die teks lees as volg: „As jy liefdadigheid bewys, laat jou linkerhand nie weet wat jou regterhand doen nie.” In antwoord hierop lees ons die volgende in „Testimonies,” Deel I, bls. 193: „In baie gevalle weet die linker hand nie wat die regter hand doen nie, want die regter hand doen niks wat die moeite werd is vir die linker hand om op te merk nie. . . . Aan my was getoond dat hierdie skriftuur nie betrekking het op diegene wat die saak van God op die hart het nie. . . . Die goeie werke van die kinders van God is die doeltreffendste manier om vir die ongelowiges te preek.”

Die stelsel van inflewering van rapporte sluit almal in en verg van al die lede dat hulle sal verslag doen in verband met alle takke van die werk wat deur God ingestel is in die laaste kerk. Dit sluit ook in rapporte van die werk van afgeleë lede, sowel as van die georganiseerde kerke in die konferensie.

Die sendingdoelwit van die kerk is: „Elke kerklid 'n sendingwerker, en elke werker 'n rapporterende lid.”

Dink vir Usself

BESEF ons die gevvaar om na te laat om ons deur God gegewe verstandelike vermoeëns te gebruik in verband met die saligheid? Is dit genoeg om in besit te wees van die boekdele wat die lig vir ons dæ bevat, en tog onbekend te wees met die boodskap wat hulle bevat? Skat ons die prys van die saligheid te gering, en is ons tevrede met 'n ervaring wat net in naam bestaan? Word ons, terwyl ons sedelike lewens mag ly en hoë ideale koester, oorwin deur die sorge van die lewe?

In die lig van die volgende is dit passende vrae hierdie: „Diegene wat tevrede is om hul lewens te bestee aan liggaamlike werk en ander toe te laat om vir hulle te dink, sal terwyl hulle slegs uitvoer wat ander uitgedink het, sterke spiere hê, maar 'n swak verstand. Hul invloed ten goede is gering vergeleke met wat dit kan wees as hulle hul brein sowel as hul spiere sou gebruik. Hierdie klas gaan gouer ten gronde as hulle deur siekte aangeval word, omdat die gestel lewenskrag van die elektriese energie van die brein ontvang om siekte te weerstaan. Mense wat liggaamlik sterk is moet hulself leer om te dink sowel as te werk, en moet nie afhanklik wees van ander om vir hulle te dink nie.” —„Counsels on Health,” bls. 181, 182.

Deur 'n studie van goddelike openbaring word die liggaam versterk deur elektriese krag van die brein. Maar in teenstelling hiermee leer mev. Eddy ons, in *Science and Health*, dat die kreef, wat nie dink nie, 'n ander knyper kweek in die plek van die een wat hy verloor het. Ons kan dus kies om ons daarop toe te lê om ons „beproef aan God voor te stel,” of ons kan maak soos die kreef.

Aangesien die Skepper in die volgende woorde soveel belang stel in ons liggaamlike welsyn, hoeveel belangstelling behoort ons te toon!

„Die Skepper waak oor die menslike masjienerie en hou dit aan die gang. As dit nie was vir Sy voortdurende sorg nie, dan sou die pols en die hart stop, en die brein sou nie meer werk nie.

„Die brein is die orgaan en instrument van die verstand en dit kontroleer die ganse liggaam. Om die ander dele van die liggaam gesond te hou, moet die brein gesond wees; en om die brein gesond te hou, moet die bloed rein wees. As ons die bloed skoon hou deur korrek te eet en te drink, sal die brein behoorlik gevoed word. Dit is gebrek aan harmonieuse werking van die menslike gestel wat siekte veroorsaak.” —„Counsels on Health,” blss. 586, 587. Dit is dus van die allergrootste belang dat ons ons liggamine in 'n goeie toestand hou en ons verstandelike vermoeëns gebruik tot verheerliking van Hom „sodat julle kan beproef wat die goeie en welgevallige en volmaakte wil van God is.”

look vastly different today. We have turned our attention to the less populous areas of this vast continent in times past, mostly because of the bad reputation the West Coast of Africa has had climatically. True, it is the black man's country. On the other hand, climate is no excuse for neglecting the most densely populated country in all Africa.

Eight families plus one single lady comprise the present European staff of workers in Nigeria. They are heroically developing a staff of native workers, as well as organising the growing membership to become an evangelistic force. You need not be a mathematician to figure out that each family is responsible for over 2,500,000 people. The task is stupendous and humanly speaking, impossible. However, with God all things are possible. With the power of God great things are done. So in Nigeria the slender force of workers are happy to link up with Almighty God in service and they have not been disappointed with the results.

Two thousand five hundred new members were added to the Sabbath schools during the 1935 twelve-month period, bringing the total number of adherents up to 10,000 in Nigeria. Certainly the harvest is ripe! The cry is, "Where are the reapers?"

In the midst of rejoicing over increased membership and a good financial showing, a cup of sorrow was given to the believers to drink. Miss Wharrie, the union treasurer, had just returned from furlough full of life and plans for aggressive advance. In the midst of preparation for the annual committee session she was struck down by the dreaded mosquito. Cerebral malaria laid her in the grave after five days' illness. I entered a house of sorrow, our sister having been laid to rest the day previous to my arrival. Memorial services were held on the Sabbath. Both European and African workers mourn the loss of a beloved and faithful worker.

CAMP-MEETINGS are wonderful things! They create a great spirit of oneness and sacrifice. Brother Till, in the Awton district, was greatly encouraged to see a substantial increase in attendance. At least twenty groups of believers were represented, some having walked as far as sixty miles to attend. Especially noticeable was the increased number of women attending. That is taken as a hopeful sign of an awakening among them. At least a dozen mothers were present from one church, with a bundle of food on the head and a baby tied on the back. These mothers had walked fifteen miles to be present. There must be something out of the ordinary going on in the heart to compel them to make such a physical effort on behalf of spiritual things. The South-Eastern Nigerian camp-meeting numbered over 4,000 in attendance.

A large girls' school compound was in

process of erection at the time of my visit at Aba. It is hoped that this girls' school will meet a long-felt need in South-east Nigeria.

The clinic in North Nigeria is continuing to wield an influence impossible to estimate. It has been breaking down prejudice and slowly winning its way into the hearts of these primitive peoples. Doubtless the medical work has done its part in bringing about an awakening among a group of villages a few miles from the mission. It was my privilege to meet with these scantily clad folk in morning worship in a church building they were erecting themselves. They were very attentive, showing evidence of the mighty power of God in their lives. The first-fruits will soon be baptised.

I had the joy of attending a workers' meeting in the south-east section of the field. The workers take God at His word, and signs and wonders are following.

A Missionary Volunteer band was out preaching in a certain village. In this village a man lived who became possessed of an evil spirit every time he heard the village drum beat.

It is hoped that sufficient funds will be in hand to commence building operations by September. This will give us time for the building to be ready for use at the opening of school in the new year.

ACCORDING to a bulletin of the "Empire Exhibition South Africa 1936" we learn that Nigeria and the islands of Mauritius and Seychelles are to support the Empire Exhibition at Johannesburg.

From the above-mentioned bulletin we quote the following:

"Few South Africans have any idea of the enormous size of Nigeria," said Mr. B. M. Bellasis, general manager of the Empire Exhibition.

"The total area is about three-quarters of the size of the Union, namely, 372,000 square miles, with a population of just on 22,000,000."

Nigeria is a member of the British Commonwealth of Nations.

By reading the article by Elder C. V. Anderson on page 3 you will notice that Nigeria is also a member of the great family of countries in our world-wide work.

Nigeria, like all other heathen countries, is waking up.

AN official catalogue of the Empire Exhibition at Johannesburg is now under way and will be a volume estimated to reach something like 600 pages. A first edition of 50,000 copies is about to be printed by Messrs Hortors, Ltd., of Johannesburg.

About 1,000 different firms, South African and overseas, will be listed in the Exhibition catalogue and the number of products to be indexed is likely to run into 10,000 different lines.

It will be a veritable encyclopedia on the resources of the British Commonwealth.

TODAY, June 24, a telegram from Doctor Hankins of Durban conveys the sad news that Elder Walston, one of our beloved pioneers, has passed away.
