### Harvest Ingathering

THE European workers have been very busy of late in the Harvest Ingathering work. I have found them all of good courage, and all report more Ingathering results over last year. The public has been very liberal this year. Brethren Bristow and Hurlow, junior, received much more from the copper belt than in previous years. Brethren Palvie, Eva and Christensen report better donations. Brother and Sister Unger have helped this field with its Ingathering work, and Mrs. Christensen has also done some fine work.

So far the European missionaries have collected over £550. The European laymen have not yet reported. This will give them a total of over £600. The African workers usually collect over £75. They are busy now with their work which means that the field will have about £700 when all the reports are in. Last year the European workers collected £400, the laity £74-12-0 and the Africans £75-10-0, which made a total of £549. So we can see that the results this year should be about £150 more than last year.

May this report encourage others to do their best. We rejoice with these brethren in their success.



### Investiture Services

IN the little mission church on Mufsofu Mission, situated some 450 miles north of Livingstone, it was my pleasant duty to conduct my first investiture since my arrival in Northern Rhodesia.

Pastor S. T. Palvie who, in spite of the press of urgent mission and school work, had sponsored the young people's work, had a fine group of boys and girls ready to receive Helper, Friend and Companion pins. These and other youth had qualified also for seventeen vocational honours and twenty reading course certificates.

The number of persons invested was not large, but when one is acquainted with the overcrowded life of our mission workers, one realizes that numbers are not all that count. That Brother Palvie should have found time outside of his school, mission and church duties to sponsor this class, and that the young people should have found time for the good work they accomplished, shows that the real Missionary Volunteer spirit burns as brightly here as anywhere in the world.

Two days later I was back at Rusanu Mission to witness another fine in-

vestiture programme. The students presented a most interesting programme of memory work, illustrated vocational talks, knot tying, and other demonstrations. The practical nature of the demonstrations indicate that our African youth will know how to apply in everyday life, the lessons they have learned in the progressive classes.

At the close of the service I was privileged to invest forty-two Helpers, forty-three Friends and eight Companions, and to award fourteen vocational honours, seventy-seven reading course certificates, and nine Bible year certificates. This record of achievement had been made possible by Miss C. L. Stevens' enthusiastic sponsoring and tireless efforts with teachers and students.

During my examination of the candidates, the thoroughness of the instruction and the exceptionally high standards upheld were aspects of the work which were especially impressive.

As those invested at these two services leave the schools for their homes — homes scattered over the length and breadth of the country among the great lakes of the North and along the upper reaches of the Zambezi — we believe they will let their light shine out into the darkness that surrounds them, and that these 121 lights will do much to hasten the spread of the gospel and bring nearer the coming of the Master.

### Wayside Efforts in the Cala District

IT is the greatest wish and prayer of my heart, that the plans laid for the hastening of the gospel truth in this generation may be crowned with success. At the beginning of October, 1949, Pastor De Beer, Brother Jonathan Mkosi and I went on a trip to the Cala District.

We left Butterworth at 11 A.M. When nearing Blythwood Institution in Nqamakwe District, I enquired of Pastor De Beer how the effort was to be conducted, seeing that we did not have the usual equipment. Pastor De Beer said that he was going to conduct the effort in a way which did not require a tent or a hall. We were to hold the meetings by the wayside. If we happened to find a good spot in one of the locations, we were to obtain the headman's permission and invite the people to come to the meeting. This procedure sounded very strange to me. I had been thinking in terms of a usual tent effort.

After reaching our destination, the following morning, we visited Brother Manzana, one of our isolated members. We then proceeded to a place known as Seplani, where we had the privilege of using a recording machine and a loudspeaker which Pastor De Beer had brought for the purpose. The interest of everyone present was held by the effective programme given. Our programme consisted of beautiful choir music and ended with a stirring sermon. The songs had been recorded by the Bethel church choir.

An announcement introducing our Voice of Prophecy Bible School was made, and all who desired to receive the lessons were invited to sign their names on a sheet of paper. A goodly number responded. After this meeting we returned to Cala. The following day we visited several places and in each we were cordially welcomed. Our main object was to arouse the interest of the people in a more concentrated search of the Scriptures. It is a pleasure to say that in all the places we visited, the people manifested encouraging interest.

Of all the places we visited, I wish to make special mention of Nyalasa,

where S. Ndungane is the headman. His presence in the meeting and the encouraging speech he gave, are enough proof of his appreciation. The following is a portion of his speech:

"Here is good fortune my people. I trust that we shall not let it go. Many times we absorb ourselves in matters that prove to be helpless in the end. May we hold on to it."

On our way home, we viewed the crowded locations below the mountains and we were convinced that it would take a long time for a worker to inform the people of the truth in these vast areas. We turned the car and visited one of these locations. The roadside was full of dead cattle — victims of the recent severe drought. The people asked us to pray to the Lord to send rain. We had a good meeting with them.

I have already received letters from some of the 155 people who signed for the Voice of Prophecy lessons during this trip. They are grateful for the lessons. Headman Ndungane has asked us to inform him when we make another visit and has promised to gather a larger audience. I am confident that when a trip of this nature is taken again, there will be a great harvest of precious souls.

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## Rhobecon Preparatory School

THIS institution has come into being as the result of great vision, great persistence, great sacrifice, and much hard work on the part of the workers and constituency of the Rhodesia-Bechuanaland Conference, and the workers of the Zambesi Union Mission, under the blessing of the Lord.

The school was projected for several years, but the lack of teaching personnel and means prevented its establishment. The constituency, however, kept asking for a school and the office kept on promoting it. At last when the plans committee at the 1949 camp-meeting submitted its report, and indicated that the school seemed as far away as ever because of financial difficulties, the tide was suddenly turned. Pastor Trumper, president of the Barotseland Mission

Field, stood up and pledged the first month's salary for a principal for the school. Then followed an inspiring scene as one after another, members and workers, stood and matched this generous and timely offer. In ten minutes nearly £700 was pledged for salaries and equipment.

The Division, the South African Union, and sister organizations and institutions within the union came forward with help and appropriations, and so the school was assured.

Rhobecon (Rhodesia - Bechuanaland Conference) School is a boarding school authorized by the government of Southern Rhodesia, and at present offers Standards I-VI. It is well equipped and has an enrolment of over 30, and a staff of consecrated teachers carrying

out the command of the Master, "Feed my lambs." Mr. John Burns heads the institution with Mrs. Burns and Mrs. Trumper as co-teachers, while Mrs. Fairchild heads the music department. Mrs. Botes is the business manager and treasurer, and Mrs. Alice Macdonald is the matron of the school and is a true mother and friend to both the children and the staff.

The school has had many advantages to enjoy but there have also been some setbacks and problems to battle against. With courage and determination, and with faith in God the staff press forward to build up an educational centre that will be a haven of refuge for Seventh-day Adventist youth of the Rhodesias and Nyasaland, and a credit to the denomination.

### Scatter the Temperance Number of the Signs

THE message which Seventh-day Adventists have been called to present to the world is one that is specially fitted to meet the spiritual need of the times. Exposing the evils of alcohol is a vital part of this message. In a special sense, therefore, we have been called not only to practise, but also to promote vigorously the cause of temperance. The urgent need of doing more in this direction is apparent on every hand as one sees the wretchedness, misery and broken lives caused by intemperance. To a large extent this is due to ignorance on the part of many, who started by taking an occasional drink, unmindful of the demon who would gradually gain control of their lives. We will never know how many young people have been led to ruin through not knowing the facts about alcohol.

The declared purpose of the ADVENTIST TEMPERANCE SOCIETY OF SOUTH AFRICA is: firstly, "To promulgate through popular education,

the facts concerning the evil effects of alcoholic beverages and narcotics," and secondly, "To develop an enlightened public opinion which will, by voice, pen and vote, lead to the complete eradication of the liquor traffic." Only as we bring to the attention of the public the baneful results of using alcoholic beverages can we win their sympathy and support. The liquor interests spend hundreds of thousands of pounds each year on advertising and on educating the public. We must do more than we have done to counteract this flood of deceptive propaganda.

In order to commence this formidable task of enlightening the public mind, the Division and South African Union Conference have combined in 1950 on a scheme which we are sure will be well worthwhile. They have arranged for the new temperance magazine, *Listen*, to be sent to all members of the House of Assembly and the Senate. The conferences and the Cape Field have undertaken to supply this same magazine to the members of the various provincial councils and magistrates. At the time when these actions were taken, it was recommended that an effort be made by the churches to place the temperance

number of the *Signs* in every home in their districts. The other organizations have done their share, and it is up to us now as church members to carry the message of temperance as contained in the special number of the *Signs* right into the homes of the people. The temperance number of the *Signs* will be an outstanding issue and one that you will be proud to hand to anyone. In fact some other temperance organizations have ordered large supplies in the past as they recognize its value as a promoter of temperance principles.

A large supply of this number will be printed so there will be plenty available for all to use. We would suggest that a concerted effort be made by all churches to see that a copy of this issue finds its way into every home, office, waiting-room or other place where people congregate. When you go to town take a supply with you and give them to others travelling in the bus or train. They will thank you for your good work and many souls will be saved from the hands of the enemy.

There may be individuals who cannot afford to give these papers away. For such there is another avenue open. Many thousands of copies can be sold

## Versprei die Matigheidsnommer van die Tekens

DIE boodskap wat Sewende-dag Adventiste aan die wêreld moet verkondig, is bedoel om te voorsien in die geestelike behoeftes van die tyd. Om die ewels van sterkdrank aan die kaak te stel, is 'n lewensbelangrike deel van daardie boodskap. Ons word dus nie slegs geroep om self geheelonthouers te wees nie, maar ons moet ook help om matigheid te bevorder. Die ellende en verdriet en lewenswrakke wat mens orals ten gevolge van drankmisbruik sien, is voldoende bewys van die dringende behoefte aan meer werk in hierdie rigting. Daardie ellende kan in 'n groot mate toegeskryf word aan die onkunde van mense wat eers so nou en dan 'n sopie

gedrink het om gesellig te wees sonder om te beseft dat hulle met 'n duiwel speel wat eindelik hulle meester sou word. Ons sal nooit uitvind hoeveel jongmense na die verderf gelei is deur onkunde betreffende die feite aangaande sterkdrank nie.

Die verklaarde doel van die SUID-AFRIKAANSE MATIGHEIDSVERENIGING is: eerstens, „Om deur behoorlike onderrig die ewels te verkonstig van die gebruik van alkohol en verdowingsmiddels.” en tweedens, „Om die publiek in te lig sodat hulle deur pen en stem sal aandrang op wetgewing wat die drankhandel totaal sal afskaaf.” Dit is alleenlik deur aan die publiek die dodelike gevolge van die gebruik van drank voor te lê dat ons hulle meegevoel en steun sal verwerf. Die drankhandel bestee elke jaar honderdduisende ponde aan advertensies en onderrigting. Ons moet meer doen as wat reeds gedoen is om hierdie vloedgolf van reklame teë te werk.

Om 'n begin te maak met hierdie geweldige taak om die publiek in te lig, het die Divisie en die Suid-Afrikaanse Uniekonferensie in 1950 'n gesamentlike plan aanvaar wat na ons mening goeie gevolge behoort te hê. Hulle het gereël dat die matigheidstydskrif, *Listen*, aan al die lede van die Volksraad en die Senaat gestuur word. Die konferensies en die Kaapse Veld het onderneem om die tydskrif aan al die provinsiale-raadslede en magistrate te voorsien. Toe hierdie besluit geneem is, is 'n verdere besluit geneem dat ons kerklede moet streef om die matigheidsnommer van die *Tekens van die Tye* in al die wonings in hulle omgewing te plaas. Die organisasies het hulle deel bygedra, en dit bly nou vir die lede om die matigheidsnommer van die *Tekens* te versprei. Die matigheidsnommer van die *Tekens* sal baie interessant wees, en u kan trots wees om dit aan enigiemand te gee. Ander matigheidsorganisasies het in die verlede groot hoeveelhede aangeskaf omdat hulle beseft dat dit 'n waardevolle bevorderaar is van die beginsels van matigheid.

Daar sal 'n goeie voorraad van hierdie uitgawe gedruk word sodat u genoeg kan kry vir eie gebruik. Ons wil aandrang dat elke lid 'n poging doen om in elke woning, kantoor, wagkamer of ander plek waar mense vergader 'n eksemplaar te laat. Wanneer u stad toe gaan, neem 'n voorraad met u saam en gee hulle aan mense op die bus of trein. Hulle sal u bedank vir u goeie werk, en talle siele sal uit die hande van die vyand gered word.

Daar is moontlik persone wat dit nie kan bekostig om hierdie tydskrifte weg te gee nie, maar vir hulle is daar ook 'n

kans. Duisende eksimplare kan verkoop word. Dit sal nie slegs 'n manier wees om die tydskrif te versprei nie, maar dit sal die verkoper self ook baat. Daar is onbepaalde geleenthede vir hierdie soort werk. As meer van ons mense net daarvan gebruik wil maak.

Tot dusver het die blanke sendelinge meer as £550 ingesamel. Die blanke leke het nog nie verslag gedoen nie, maar met wat hulle insamel, sal daar meer as £600 wees. Dit beteken dus dat daar vanjaar omtrent £150 meer sal wees as verlede jaar.

DIT was my aangename voorreg om in die klein sendingkerkie op Musofu Sendingstasie, ongeveer 450 myl noord van Livingstone, my eerste bekledingsdiens in Noord-Rhodesië te hou.

Leraar S. T. Palvie wat ten spyte van dringende sending- en skoolwerk die Strewerswerk ook behartig het, het 'n groep flink jongens gereed gehad om as Helpers, Vriende en Makkers beklee te word. Saam met 'n aantal ander jongmense het hulle ook sewentien vakhonneurs en twintig leeskursus-sertifikate gekry.

Dit was nie 'n groot groep wat beklee is nie, maar wanneer mens bekend is met die besige lewe op ons sendingstasies, besef jy dat getalle nie alles is nie. Die feit dat Broeder Palvie nog tyd gemaak het vir Strewerswerk benewens sy verantwoordelikhede in die kerk, in die skool en op die sendingstasie, is 'n bewys dat die Strewersgees daar net so helder brand as in enige ander plek op aarde.

Twee dae later het ek weer op Rusangu 'n bekledingsdiens bygewoon. Die leerlinge het 'n interessante program voorgedra. Hulle het stukke opgesê, voorgelide toesprake oor vakhonneurwerk gegee, knope gemaak en ander demonstrasies gegee. Aan die einde van die diens het ek gehelp met die bekleding van twee-veertig Helpers, drie-en-veertig Vriende en agt Makkers sowel as die uitreiking van veertien vakhonneurs, sewentig leeskursus-sertifikate en nege Bybelleesertifikate. Hierdie prestasie is te danke aan die leiding van Mej. C. L. Stevens en die onvermoeide werk van onderwysers en leerlinge.

Die deeglikheid van die onderrigting en die hoë standaarde wat gehandhaaf is, het in besonder 'n indruk op my gemaak.

Wanneer die leerlinge wat tydens hierdie twee dienste beklee is, na hulle wonings op die oewers van die groot mere en die bronne van die Zambezirivier gaan, sal hulle sekerlik skynende ligte wees temidde van die duisternis rondom hulle, en daardie 121 liggies sal veel bydra tot die verspreiding van die evangelie en dit sal die wederkoms van die Here verhaas.

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### Die Laerskool Rhobcon

HIERDIE inrigting is die gevolg van groot visie, volharding, opoffering en harde werk aan die kant van die werkers en die leke van die Rhodesië-Betsjoeanaland Konferensie en die werkers van die Zambezi Uniesending onder leiding van die Here.

Daar word reeds oor 'n tydperk van jare reëlings getref vir die skool, maar gebrek aan geld en personeel het nog altyd gekeer. Maar die lede het aangehou vra en die kantoor het ook gedurig aan die saak geroer. Toe die plannekomitee in 1949 aangekondig het dat die stigting van die skool nog net so ver in die toekoms was soos altyd omdat daar geen geld voor was nie, het sake skielik 'n ander wending geneem. Leraar Trumper, president van die Barotse-land Sending het opgestaan en beloof om die prinsipaal se salaris vir die eerste maand te waarborg. Daarna het ons 'n besielende toneel aanskou. Werkers en leke het een na die ander opgestaan en beloof om hulle deel by te dra. Binne tien minute is £700 beloof vir salarisse en toerusting.

Die Divisie, die Suid-Afrikaanse Uniekonferensie en ander organisasies en inrigtings binne die unie het daarna hulp en geld beloof, en die skool was verseker.

Rhobcon (Rhodesië-Betsjoeanaland Konferensie) Skool is 'n kosskool wat deur die regering van Suid-Rhodesië goedgekeur is, en dit bied tans van Standerds I tot VI aan. Die skool is goed toegerus en het dertig leerlinge en 'n aantal toegewyde onderwysers wat die bevel van die Here, „Laat my lammers wei,” uitvoer. Mnr. John Burns is hoof van die inrigting en Mev. Burns en Mev. Trumper is mede-onderwyseresse. Mev. Fairchild is hoof van die musiekdepartement. Mev. Botes is sakebestuurder en tesouriere, en Mev. Alice Macdonald is matrone en 'n opregte moeder vir beide leerlinge en personeellede.

Die skool geniet baie voorregte, maar daar was ook moeilikhede en vertraging wat beveg moes word. Met moed en vasberadenheid en geloof in God, werk die personeellede om 'n inrigting op te bou wat vir Sewende-dag Adventiste

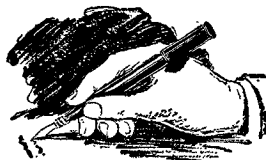

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deur die mooi musiek en die preek wat daarop gevolg het. Die kerkkoor te Bethel Sendingstasie het die plate gemaak.

Ons het van die Stem-van-Profesie Bybelskool vertel en almal genooi wat daarop wou inteken om hulle name op 'n vel papier te kom teken. 'n Hele aantal het van die geleentheid gebruik-gemaak. Na daardie diens het ons na Cala teruggegaan. Die volgende dag het ons aan 'n hele aantal plekke besoek gebring, en ons is hartlik verwelkom. Ons hoofdoel was om by die mense 'n verlanse op te wek om die Bybel deegliker te ondersoek. Ons is bly om u te kan meedeel dat die mense orals groot belangstelling geopenbaar het.

Van al die plekke waar ons aangery het, wil ek graag spesiaal melding maak van Nyalasa waar S. Ndungane die hoofman is. Die feit dat hy na die diens gekom en 'n bemoedigende toespraak gehou het, is bewys genoeg van sy waardering. Hy het hom gedeeltelik as volg uitgelaat:

„My volk, die geluk het ons getref. Ek vertrou dat ons dit nie sal los nie. Baiemaal bestee ons ons aandag aan dinge wat op die ou end nuttelos is. Mag ons aan ons geluk vashou.”

Op weg terug na ons huis, het ons na die lokasies op die vlakte onderkant die berge gekyk, en ons het tot die gevolgtrekking gekom dat dit lank sal neem vir werkers om daardie mense persoonlik te gaan waarsku. Ons het by een van daardie lokasies aangery. Langs die pad was orals dooi beeste—slagoffers van die onlangse droogte. Die mense het versoek dat ons die Here om reent moes vra. Ons het 'n goeie diens met hulle saam gehou.

Ek het reeds berig gehad van sommige van die 155 mense wat ingeteken het op die Stem-van-Profesie lesse. Hoofman Ndungane het gevra dat ons hom in kennis moet stel wanneer ons hom weer kom besoek, en hy het beloof om 'n groter gehoor daar te hê. Ek is vol vertroue dat wanneer daar weer 'n rit van hierdie aard onderneem word, daar 'n groot oes kosbare siele sal wees.

## TOT DIE DAG AANBREEK

SMIT.—Albertina, is op Saterdag-aand, 22 Julie, in die ouderdom van 67 jaar op Heidelberg, Transvaal, oorlede.

Hierdie getroue suster het drie jaar lank gely. Gedurende daardie tyd was sy 'n sprekende beeld van die lydsaamheid van die heiliges. Alhoewel sy nie meer kon uitgaan om die Here se werk te doen nie, het sy nogtans vermaan en tereggewys as 'n voorbeeldige moeder in Israel.

Suster Smit en haar eggenoot, Broeder A. Smit, wat haar oorleef, het die boodskap in 1919 gehoor en in 1921 is hulle gedoop. Hulle het vier seuns en drie dogters opgelei in die vrees van die Here.

Leraar A. van den Berg van Vanderbylpark het die begrafnis waargeneem, en uit persoonlike kennis getuig van die ywerige toewyding wat tant Berta aan die dag gelê het in haar diens vir die Meester en vir ander. Nooit het sy teruggestaan as daar iets vir Gods saak gedoen moes word nie. Altyd was haar antwoord: „Here hier is ek, stuur my.” Nagte het sy by siekbeddens gewaak en gedien en nooit kon sy dink dat sy eendag ook lyding sou moes verduur nie. Maar daardie lyding het haar gelouter soos fyn goud en ons weet dat sy die stem van die aartsengel sal hoor op daardie opstandingsdag vir die regverdige wat baie naby in die toekoms is.
