The Object of His Supreme Regard

DEAR BRETHREN OF THE GENERAL CONFERENCE:

I testify to my brethren and sisters that the church of Christ, enfeebled and defective as it may be, is the only object on earth on which He bestows His supreme regard. While He extends to all the world His invitation to come to Him and be saved. He commissions His angels to render divine help to every soul that cometh to Him in repentance and contrition, and He comes personally by His Holy Spirit into the midst of His church. "If Thou, Lord, shouldest mark iniquities, O Lord, who shall stand? But there is forgiveness with Thee, that Thou mayest be feared. I wait for the Lord, my soul doth wait, and in His Word do I hope. My soul waiteth for the Lord more than they that watch for the morning." "Let Israel hope in the Lord: for with the Lord there is mercy, and with Him is plenteous redemption. And He shall redeem Israel from all his iniquities."

Ministers and all the church, let this be our language, from hearts that respond to the great goodness and love of God to us as a people and to us individually, "Let Israel hope in the Lord from henceforth and forever." "Ye that stand in the house of the Lord, in the courts of the house of our God, praise the Lord; for the Lord is good: sing praises unto His name; for it is pleasant. For the Lord hath chosen Jacob unto Himself, and Israel for His peculiar treasure. For I know that the Lord is great, and that our Lord is above all gods." Consider, my brethren and sisters, that the Lord has a people, a chosen people,

His church, to be His own, His own fortress, which He holds in a sinstricken, revolted world; and He intended that no authority should be known in it, no laws be acknowledged by it, but His own.

Satan has a large confederacy, his church. Christ calls them the synagogue of Satan because the members are the children of sin. The members of Satan's church have been constantly working to cast off the divine law, and confuse the distinction between good and evil. Satan is working with great power in and through the children of disobedience, to exalt treason and apostasy as truth and loyalty. And at this time the power of his satanic inspiration is moving the living agencies to carry out the great rebellion against God that commenced in heaven.

CLEAR, DECIDED DISTINCTIONS

At this time the church is to put on her beautiful garments—"Christ our righteousness." There are clear, decided distinctions to be restored and exemplified to the world in holding aloft the commandments of God and the faith of Jesus. The beauty

of holiness is to appear in its native lustre in contrast with the deformity and darkness of the disloyal, those who have revolted from the law of God. Thus we acknowledge God, and recognize His law, the foundation of His government in heaven and throughout His earthly dominions. His authority should be kept distinct and plain before the world; and no laws are to be acknowledged that come in collision with the laws of Jehovah. If in defiance of God's arrangements the world be allowed to influence our decisions or our actions. the purpose of God is defeated. However specious the pretext, if the church waver here, there is written against her in the books of heaven a betraval of the most sacred trusts, and treachery to the kingdom of Christ. The church is firmly and decidedly to hold her principles before the whole heavenly universe and the kingdoms of the world; steadfast fidelity in maintaining the honour and sacredness of the law of God will attract the notice and admiration of even the world, and many will, by the good works which they shall behold, be led to glorify our Father in heaven. The loyal and true bear the credentials of heaven, not of earthly potentates. All men shall know who are the disciples of Christ, chosen and faithful, and shall know them when crowned and glorified as those who honoured God and whom He has honoured, bringing them into possession of an eternal weight of glory....

The Lord has provided His church with capabilities and blessings, that they may present to the world an image of His own sufficiency, and that His church may be complete in Him, a continual representation of another, even the eternal world, of laws that are higher than earthly laws. His church is to be a temple built after the divine similitude, and the angelic architect has brought His golden measuring rod from heaven, that every stone may be hewed and squared by the divine measurement, and polished to shine as an emblem of heaven, radiating in all directions the bright, clear beams of the Sun of Righteousness. The church is to be fed with manna from heaven, and to be kept under the sole guardianship of His grace. Clad in complete

armour of light and righteousness, she enters upon her final conflict. The dross, the worthless material. will be consumed, and the influence of the truth testifies to the world of its sanctifying, ennobling character. . . .

DIVINE EXPERIMENTS

The Lord Jesus is making experiments on human hearts through the exhibition of His mercy and abundant grace. He is affecting transformation so amazing that Satan, with all his triumphant boasting, with all his confederacy of evil united against God and the laws of His government, stands viewing them as a fortress impregnable to his sophistries and delusions. They are to him an incomprehensible mystery. The angels of God, seraphim and cherubim, the powers commissioned to co-operate with human agencies, look on with astonishment and joy, that fallen men, once children of wrath, are through the training of Christ developing characters after the divine similitude, to be sons and daughters of God, to act an important part in the occupations and pleasures of heaven.

To His church, Christ has given ample facilities, that He may receive a large revenue of glory from His redeemed, purchased possession. The church, being endowed with the righteousness of Christ, is His depositary, in which the wealth of His mercy, His love, His grace, is to appear in full and final display. The declaration in His intercessory prayer, that the Father's love is as great toward us as toward Himself, the only-begotten Son, and that we shall be with Him where He is, forever one with Christ and the Father, is a marvel to the heavenly host, and it is their great joy. The gift of His Holy Spirit, rich, full, and abundant, is to be to His church as an encompassing wall of fire, which the powers of hell shall not prevail against. In their untainted purity and spotless perfection, Christ looks upon His people as the reward of all His suffering, His humiliation, and His love, and the supplement of His glory-Christ, the great centre from which radiates all glory. CONSERVING OUR MEMBERSHIP GAINS

NE of the great tragedies confronting the church today is the losses due to apostasy. What are the causes for these losses? Why do people leave the church? We should give attention to this problem and seek to find a better way to conserve our gains. It is not enough to be content merely to bring people into the church. There must be a united attempt to conserve these gains.

Frequently one hears a charge made that losses are sustained because the evangelist does not do a thorough work of instruction before bringing new members into the church. Although we believe this point often is over-emphasized, we do not for a moment defend careless, haphazard, and inefficient evangelistic work. We are told:

"If the interest steadily increases, and the people move understandingly, not from impulse, but from principle, the interest is much more healthy and durable than it is where a great excitement and interest are created suddenly, and the feelings are excited by listening to a debate, a sharp contest on both sides of the question, for and against the truth."—Testimonies, Vol. 3, p. 218.

We must never forget that "God would be better pleased to have six truly converted to the truth as the result of their labours than to have sixty make a nominal profession and yet not be thoroughly converted. These ministers should devote less time to preaching sermons and reserve a portion of their strength to visit and pray with those who are interested, giving them godly instruction, to the end that they may 'present every man perfect in Christ Jesus.'"—Ibid., Vol. 4, 317.

Although it is true that we suffer losses because people are not thoroughly *indoctrinated*, it is more likely true that we suffer losses because the people are not thoroughly *converted*. Many have a theoretical knowledge of the message. It has

reached the mind, but has not touched the heart. That is why we should emphasize the tremendous importance of moving the heart first and bringing about the complete conversion of the individual to the Lord Jesus Christ.

Many of the doctrines that the Advent message brings to the people are new and startling to them. Because of this, a very real need exists for a second series of studies or meetings at which time the convert can re-study the truths that he has learned.

"When the arguments for present truth are presented for the first time, it is difficult to fasten the points upon the mind. And although some may see sufficiently to decide, yet for all this, there is need of going all over the very same ground again, and giving another course of lectures."—
Evangelism, p. 334.

This is not an idle suggestion made by the messenger of the Lord. Its importance is emphasized by the following quotations:

"After the first efforts have been made in a place by giving a course of lectures, there is really greater necessity for a second course than for the first. The truth is new and startling, and the people need to have the same presented the second time, to get the points distinct and the ideas fixed in the mind."—Ibid.

We now come to a most important phase of holding the interest of the people. The new converts should be integrated as quickly as possible into some of the activities and functions of the church. The instructions on this point are abundant.

"God's Spirit convicts sinners of the truth, and He places them in the arms of the church. The ministers may do their part, but they can never perform the work that the church should do. God requires His church to nurse those who are young in faith and experience, to go to them, not for the purpose of gossiping with them, but to pray, to speak unto them words that are 'like apples of gold in pictures of silver.' "—Testimonies, Vol. 4, p. 69.

New converts should not be given the weightier responsibilities of church leadership until they have been thoroughly trained and have had sufficient time for orientation. This, however, does not exclude their participation in the wide activities of an aggressive congregation. They should be encouraged to enter into the work of the Dorcas society, Temperance society, home missionary youth projects. services, activities, Society of Missionary Men, and Sabbath school. In all these branches and departments of the church there are many opportunities for service.

The responsibility of the church to those who are new in the faith is a part of the work that must not be overlooked. Every church member has a direct responsibility in caring for the newly won convert. The guardianship plan is a very worthwhile one. Any church board or pastor who will give serious attention to this plan will find great success in its use. The assigning of a new convert to an older member of the church, with the older member serving as the spiritual guardian, will do much to obviate the sense of loneliness and helplessness during the time of adjustment.

"Those who have newly come to the faith should be patiently and tenderly dealt with, and it is the duty of the older members of the church to devise ways and means to provide help and sympathy and instruction for those who have conscientiously withdrawn from other churches for the truth's sake, and thus cut themselves off from the pastoral labour to which they have been accustomed. The church has a special responsibility laid upon her to attend to these souls who have followed the first rays of light they have received; and if the members of the church neglect this duty, they will be unfaithful to the trust that God has given them." -Evangelism, p. 351.

If the new member is absent from any of the services of the church, the guardian can immediately call upon him to determine the reason for his absence, and then make appropriate report to the pastor. It is

this part of the follow-up work that is so necessary.

"The kindly interest we manifest in the home circle, the words of sympathy we speak to our brothers and sisters, fit us to work for the members of the Lord's household, with whom, if we remain loyal to Christ, we shall live through eternal ages. 'Be thou faithful unto death,' Christ says, 'and I will give thee a crown of life.' Then how carefully should the members of the Lord's family guard their brethren and sisters! Make yourself their friend. If they are poor and in need of food and clothing, minister to their temporal as well as their spiritual wants. Thus you will be a double blessing to them."-Ibid., p. 353.

It is by rolling the burden of souls upon the hearts of all of us that we will be able to hold and keep them close to the church and to Christ .-

HEALTH EVANGLISM IN OUR GREAT CITIES

GREAT work is yet to be done A in the cities of the earth, a work that is to go forth with great power and to be followed with marvellous. results. This work calls for special planning and special workers. It is a work we need to set our hearts and hands to doing now.

"There is no change in the messages that God has sent in the past. The work in the cities is the essential work for this time. When the cities are worked as God would have them, the result will be the setting in operation of a mighty movement such as we have not yet witnessed.

"The medical missionary work is a door through which the truth is to find entrance to many homes in the cities."-A Call to Medical Evangelism and Health Education (1950 ed.), pp. 14, 15.

Without doubt as our medical missionary workers and ministerial workers unite, "the door through which truth is to find entrance" will be opened. "It is as these lines of work are united that we may expect to gather the most precious fruit for the Lord."—Medical Ministry, p. 27.

OPPORTUNITIES IN BRITISH ISLES

In London we have had the truth of this and other similar statements from the Spirit of prophecy fulfilled in a very remarkable way. Never have we had such opportunities in medical evangelism in the British Isles as now. The new evangelistic centre on Regent Street in the heart

of London has placed us on the very highway of British life. Coming to the meetings are teachers, businessmen and businesswomen, doctors, executives, and other professional people. Nearly two thousand a week were attending the meetings during the summer and holiday months last year. There were countless more who came to the reading room or stopped long enough to pick up the evangelistic sermons.

The statement heard most frequently from those attending the meetings expressed gratitude for having health of body and health of soul presented together. In the midweek meetings both a medical and a gospel worker spoke. As the listeners came to understand that physically, mentally, and spiritually man is inter-related, and that he can be happy only by trusting and obeying all the laws of God, they began to change their habits of life. This is the goal for which we are striving. This approach to health makes an ordinary health talk take on much more significance than a mere recital of physiological facts. It links healing of body and soul together.

HEALTH TALKS NOT ENOUGH

We are told that we should not only talk to people about health, but also have activities that will be practical in helping them to change their course of living. Health talks are not enough. So Miss Kathleen Mohon, the health instructor at the

New Gallery Centre in London, conducts nutrition and food preparation classes each Thursday afternoon and evening. Since by "indulgence of perverted appetite, man loses his power to resist temptation" (The Ministry of Healing, p. 335.), how important then becomes the question of healthful cookery. In the work for the large cities we are to provide for thorough instruction in the science of food preparation.

Dr. Siegfried Kotz, on furlough from Africa, helped to start the first project for a Youth Health Club. This group meets every Sunday afternoon at the Centre. Some time is spent making bandages from bed sheets for the hospital at Malamulo Mission in Africa. A first-aid course was also begun for the youth.

A health information centre will also be a permanent feature of this evangelistic centre. It will consist of exhibits and models on general health, how the body works, and personal hygiene. Posters, slides, films, and free brochures from the Central Council of Health Education. Ministry of Health, and other agencies will be used. It is hoped that soon a small treatment room can be started. The equipment has been donated by Dr. F. C. Shone, who at present is giving two afternoons a week to meeting people who wish medical consultations.

MEDICAL PANELS APPRECIATED

At the Sunday evening services a medical panel was held just prior to the sermon, with Victor Cooper acting as moderator. The help of our physicians at the sanitarium and those in private practice made this one of the outstanding medical features of the evangelistic series this past summer and fall.

With just a very few additional items, the present dining facilities could be made available to the public for a noon meal. We trust that this feature can be realized, since "the opening of hygienic restaurants is a work that God would have done in the cities. If wisely conducted, these restaurants will be missionary centres."-A Call to Medical Evangelism and Health Education, p. 21.

The reading room and library are filled with our good health literature,

HOW ENOCH WALKED WITH GOD

N THE mount of transfiguration, Moses was a type of those who shall be raised in the first resurrection. Enoch stood for those who look forward to translation in the last generation. We who live today in expectant hope of Christ's soon coming should have a special interest in one who was taken from this world without seeing death.

The information we have about the life of Enoch is very meagre, but it is enough to suggest the kind of life he lived.

The fifth chapter of Genesis mentions ten patriarchs who lived in the years between the time of Adam and the Flood. Seven of these men lived more than 900 years. One lived to be 895 years of age, and one 777. In contrast to these Enoch's life on earth was cut short, for he was taken from this world at the age of 365 years. Thus, comparatively speaking, we might think of Enoch as a young man who had walked closely with God most of his life.

The only extended comment in this chapter on the antediluvian patriarchs in the line of Seth is not concerning those who live the longest, but of one who lived the shortest here on earth. It says of him:

"And Enoch lived sixty and five years, and begat Methuselah: and Enoch walked with God after he begat Methuselah three hundred years, and begat sons and daughters: and all the days of Enoch were three hundred and sixty and five years: and Enoch walked with God: and he was not; for God took him." Gen. 5:21-24.

The outstanding achievement of this man's life was that he "walked with God." Why is this chapter silent concerning what the other men accomplished or even what other things Enoch achieved?

In Gensis 4 we are given a list of certain great men in the line of Cain. Here the achievements of these men are recorded. One was a great cattleman; another, a musician; another, an artisan, and one named Enoch had a city named after him.

The chief lesson for us to learn from the records of these two chapters is that the most important thing in life is not to build cities, acquire wealth, or achieve worldly fame or honour, but to develop a character after the likeness of God. This can only be done by taking time to walk and commune with God.

"In All the Duties of His Daily Life"

How did Enoch walk with God? Here is the answer.

"Enoch's walk with God was not in a trance or a vision, but in all the duties of His daily life. He did not become a hermit, shutting himself entirely from the world; for he had, in the world, a work to do for God. In the family and in his intercourse with men, as a husband and father, a friend, a citizen, he was the stead-fast unwavering servant of God.

"His faith waxed stronger, his love became more ardent, with the lapse of centuries. To him prayer was as the breath of the soul. He lived in the atmosphere of heaven:"—Testimonies, Vol. 8, pp. 329, 330.

"I wish I could impress upon every worker in God's cause the great need of continual, earnest prayer. They cannot be constantly upon their knees, but they can be uplifting their hearts to God. This is the way that Enoch walked with God."—Ibid., Vol. 5, p. 596.

We can develop godlike characters only through meeting the many, and varied, daily experiences that come to us, and not by avoiding them. Sometimes we become weary in well doing. We would like to escape the the difficulties, and trials, problems presented to us as we go about our daily duties. We long for a place of quiet and peace. But Christ knew that it is only by the buffeting experiences of life that men are fashioned in the divine likeness. Thus He petitioned the Father: "I pray not that thou shouldest take them out of the world, but that Thou shouldest keep them from the evil." John 17:15.—Review and Herald.

THE PRESENCE OF GOD

WITH a stone for his pillow, the earth for his bed, the stars for his coverlet, and the quiet of the desert night for a benediction, heaven opened for Jacob, the lonely fugitive.

Jacob had arrived, weary and worn, at this place on the second day of his flight from home. The sun was about to set, and his heart was sad and fearful. As he lay down to rest he must have felt quite forsaken. How disturbed his thoughts must have been as he went to sleep! Then the heavenly vision burst upon him, and he heard the voice of God saying, "Behold, I am with thee, and will keep thee in all places whither thou goest." Gen. 28:15.

As Jacob awoke in the night how wonderful was the realization that God was near. With a heart full of longing and gratitude he exclaimed, "Surely the Lord is in this place; and I knew it not. . . . This is the gate of heaven." Verses 16, 17.

The lesson is for everyone. "God is no respecter of persons." Acts 10:34. As Paul declared, He is "not far from every one of us." Acts 17: 27. To those who have a special need and an open heart God will reveal Himself in some conscious manner. Any place may be the gate of heaven. Anyone may sense the nearness of God.

Too often God is present to bless and help when we know it not. But all our senses are closed to Him by preoccupation with our troubles or our attempts to solve them. We are out of tune with One who could answer all our needs because we are too much in tune with the world.

How often we lie down with heavy thoughts and wake with heavier ones, and then go forth to meet the world bearing our heavy burdens. What a difference it would make if only we realized that God was near by waiting to carry the load!

Not only to Jacob does God say, but to every troubled soul, "Behold, I am with thee." We cannot drive God's presence from us. He declares: "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee." Heb. 13:5. But we can shut our minds and our hearts against Him so that He cannot reveal Himself to us.

Not only is there a sense of comfort in the thought of God's presence, but there should also be a sense of awe. Jacob said, "How dreadful is this place!" Gen. 28:17.

Such a realization will restrain us from doing that which would bring dishonour and grief to the Holy One. It was this sense of God's presence that caused Joseph to exclaim in a time of temptation: "How . . . can I do this great wickedness, and sin against God?" Gen. 39:9. Of this we read:

"Every soul, in going out and

coming in, in all business transactions, at all times and in all places, should act with the consciousness that he is moving under the inspection of God and heavenly angels, and that the Being who will judge every man's work for eternity accompanies him at every step, observing all his actions and scrutinizing all his motives. A consciousness of the presence of God and the peril of violating His precepts would take possession of his entire being. What a change would be seen in man, what a change in society, what evils would be left undone!"—Testimonies, Vol. 5, p. 628.

However, it is not from a sense of fear that we should hesitate to do wrong, but from a feeling of tender love for One who is ever near and ever longing to save us from our sins and prepare us for His eternal kingdom.—Review and Herald.

TRUST IN GOD'S GOODNESS

HAVE before me a letter from a broken-hearted father of the Middle West, a man who in facing the tests of life lost his faith. After describing the loss of his son in the war he questions, "We wonder if God cares. The Creator is a long way off, beyond the stars and the nearest one is twenty-five trillion miles away. That's pretty far away for God to be of much help to us as individuals."

Yes, heaven may be far away, we replied, but you have overlooked one fact, Jesus is the ladder let down for us connecting heaven and earth. And as we climb upward there is not one missing rung. All that we suffer He has already suffered, and He has made provision so that through Him we may endure all things. God does not ask us to pass through one trial which He Himself has not experienced. Have we been compelled to separate from friends and leave beautiful homes behind us? Jesus left His home in the heavenly mansions and was born in a manger because there was not room for Him in the inn. Have we lost a dear one? Our Father also lost His Son, looking on while wicked men put Him to death on a cruel cross. Have friends proved untrue? He was betrayed in the house of His friends, sold for thirty pieces of silver by one who was His disciple. We read:

"As the children are partakers of flesh and blood, He also Himself likewise took part of the same; that through death He might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil; and deliver them who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage. . . . Wherefore in all things it behooved Him to be made like unto His brethren, . . . for in that He Himself hath suffered being tempted, He is able to succor them that are tempted." Heb. 2:14, 16.

Then why need we fear? He is able, He is faithful, He has travelled all the roads before us, and has made provision for everything our soul requires. He never shuts one door but He opens another. The problem lies in our weak faith not in His ability to bless.

EXPERIENCE OF FOUR SOLDIERS

I was in Australia early in World War II. In those days shortly after

the immediate threat of invasion had passed, the war was moving northward, and Australians were breathing more freely. Troops returning from service in New Guinea and near-by islands were reporting harrowing experiences escape from jungle warfare. Many had escaped death only by a miracle. One small body of men found themselves one day entirely surrounded by enemy forces. Their experience attracted my attention because one man had opened his Bible to a certain text that they had accepted as the voice of God to them. I pass it on just as it was related to me by one of our brethren.

Four Australian infantrymen were completely cut off from the rest of their company and surrounded by a large enemy force. Escape was impossible, and death or imprisonment seemed almost certain. One man had suffered a bullet wound in the head, another was wounded in the chest, and a third carried an ugly wound in the hand. Hidden within hearing of the enemy, they ate their last rations, destroyed their mail and personal belongings, and prepared for what to them seemed the inevitable.

Then it was that one of the men thought of God and the Bible he always carried with him. Before opening the Book, he sent forth a prayer from the heart. He asked for guidance, and immediately his eyes fell on a text in Acts 16:13-"On the Sabbath we went out of the city by a riverside." He mentioned the matter to the other men. There was a river nearby. Could it be that they ought to try it? They decided to take this verse so divinely sent to them as a message straight from God. They crept out along the river. At times they were almost within arm's reach of enemy troops. Yet they stealthily crept on.

Three days later, with food gone and strength exhausted, they decided they could go on no farther when two of the men had identical dreams. They both saw one of their buddies coming toward them and leading them back to their unit. They awakened with the deep impression that if they kept going a little farther, they would surely meet this man. It gave them fresh courage and in that

I T WAS a privilege to have Pastor O. O. Mattison with us again for a trip to the Lushai Hills but it was unfortunate that he had to be disappointed in the extent of the trip. The permit to enter the hills came through a month late and when it came it permitted us to visit only Aijal and not Lungleh in the South Lushais.

The 115-mile trip to Aijal is inspiring though not exactly comfortable. Perched on top of the load on a Dodge military lorry for 12 hours gives one the full benefit of the fine scenery but also impresses the memory of the jogs and bumps that lasts for several days. However, most inspiring was the fine group of delegates present in Aijal from the churches of the North Lushai hills. About eighty were present many of whom had to walk for days to get there. Sabbath and Sunday were filled with inspirational meetings. A fine spirit of co-operation was manifested and delegates returned home with a greater determination to serve God faithfully. A similar meeting was called for Lungleh but unfortunately we were not able to attend.

The next leg of our trip took us from Silchar to Imphal over the hump in 20 minutes by plane. We met the Chief Commissioner of Manipur State who is a fine Syrian Christian gentleman from Travancore.

Our next plan was to reach the Assam Training School to be with the faculty and students over the Sabbath but stormy weather prevented our plane from landing in Gauhati, so we were forced to stay over night in Agartala where the storm had pulled off roofs and blown down trees and fences. When we were finally able to reach Gauhati on Friday it was too late to get to Jowai before the Sabbath so we changed our plans and decided to meet with our Rajasimla group in the Garo

Hills for the Sabbath. Though neither one of us knew exactly where to go we uneventfully covered the 60 miles by bus to the Dak bungalow where we planned to stay. On Sabbath morning it was very cloudy and the five mile walk to Rajasimla seemed forbidding. We were not disappointed. We got all we expected and more. After we had walked about three miles the heavens literally opened in a downpour such as is not to be seen everywhere. After about an hour of seeking shelter under trees we decided we might as well continue because we could get no wetter. After we walked a quarter of a mile we found a hut in which a lady was cooking her rice. Though she was rather shocked for a moment at our intrusion she soon caught the spirit of the situation and supplied us with all the firewood we needed for the next hour to dry out our clothes. By that time it stopped raining and we were able to be on our way again. We reached the church just as they were singing the closing song for Sabbath school.

It was an inspiration to meet for the church service with a congregation of about 80 people (all had not come because of the heavy rain). Brother Gayen, their pastor, was away at the Seminary Extension School and Brother Marak, one of the converts of less than a year was capably leading out.

After the service conducted by Pastor Mattison, we went to inspect the inspiring hill-top site for their new church and school combination. One of the members had donated over two acres of land and the other members were contributing Rs. 5,000 worth of materials and labour. We certainly wish them God's blessing in their building programme. Their faith is well portrayed by their works. Just where Sister Marak was able to get us such a fine meal at such short notice is hard to understand.

The next couple of days were spent at the Assam Training School where they were preparing for the first quarter examinations. All were of good courage and a fine spirit was manifested among teachers and students.

Arriving at the mission headquarters we found that Pastor Burr, the new President of the Assam Section, was out visiting the churches. He seems to be enjoying the cool and even the wet of the Assam hills. He is getting a good grasp of the work and I am sure that God is going to bless mightily the work done there. The Burr family seem happy in their new house, though the children comment that it is cold. We wish them all the blessings of the Spirit of God as they settle into their new home and their new work.

PROVIDENCES ON OKINAWA

ROM Okinawa there is a story to tell. There, as in Japan, young people are required to go to school six days a week. Anyone who attends church on Sabbath is interfering with the operation of the public schools. And the Okinawans believe that anybody who interferes with the education of their children is committing treason against their nation.

Up in the northern part of Okinawa, at Okuma, Hentona, and Kijoka, some high school students began attending our Sabbath school. They were very severely criticized by their teachers and principals for leaving school on Sabbath. When their parents heard it, they began to persecute them severely. Some of the parents beat their children; others chained them to trees to keep them from going to Sabbath school. Two of them threatened to kill their children, and one of these threats was published in the newspaper.

The problem of this "strange, treasonous Adventist sect" became widely known, not only in the three northern towns, but over all Okinawa. The superintendent of the schools of northern Okinawa used the principal newspapers of the island to spread the news.

Soon it became so serious that the American occupational authorities offered to step in and forcibly quiet the press of the local town and the school officials. But we didn't want this sort of thing. We made it very clear to our friends in the American civil government that we wanted everything to be done in an atmosphere of freedom, and that we felt it was best to leave things to God. We tried to explain as best we could to the newspapers, and some of them quieted down. Others intensified their activities.

Persecution of the young people

continued. What made matters even worse was that nearly all the children who were stepping out from school to go to Sabbath school were honour students of their schools. So their teachers added to their persecution by recalling the honours that had been given to them. Still they were faithful.

We claimed the promises of God in prayer, pointing out to Him that we were trying to maintain His standards of religious liberty even though we could have used the authority of the American occupation to quell the opposition. We reminded Him, too, that we knew that His power was greater than any other.

THE ANSWER TO OUR PRAYERS

Then again things began to happen. Mr. Miyagi's daughter, who happened to be in Tokyo, went to Japan Missionary College to visit an old friend, Mrs. Ire. She was deeply impressed, and began to study. She wrote home to her parents of her findings. She told them of our welfare work, of our educational work in Japan, and of the Voice of Prophecy. Her mother became interested.

Mrs. Miyagi, who is head of all the women's clubs in northern Okinawa, began to pass the word around to her friends. They became interested. Mrs. Miyagi began to take Bible studies. She is active and forceful, and soon her husband joined her in these Bible studies. As I write this article they are enthusiastically taking Bible lessons.

And now, under the leadership of the Miyagis, the whole attitude of the people is changing in northern Okinawa. We have no more attacks from the newspapers. We have been given license to start a new school at Shuri, Okinawa, to accommodate junior high school children. And this is but the beginning, for God's promises never fail—if we follow His plan.

LITERATURE RECORDS BROKEN IN INDONESIA

MOST refreshing report of progress has come to us in a letter just received from E. A. Brodeur, publishing department secretary for the Indonesia Union Mission. We quote:

"God has marvellously blessed the work of our faithful colporteurs during 1954. These consecrated men and women have carried our truthfilled literature to every part of Indonesia. Scores of souls have been won to the truth, and many churches have been raised up as a result of their untiring efforts.

"It was my privilege recently to baptize four people during a camp meeting in the North Celebes. These four people were in a group of eighteen who were won to the truth by colporteurs. where to find our temple, for she had been accustomed years before to attend services in rented quarters, but she searched for us and found our people in the new church building. Weeping, she briefly explained her story to one of our sisters. Our sister at once sent a note to the pastor asking for special prayer. Soon this young woman made her decision, and descended into the waters of baptism.

Another candidate, an old gentleman with gray hair and paralyzed hands, came to the Lord after a quarter of a century of procrastination.

And who is this crippled old man who is carried into the pool by two ministers? He is eighty-two. He lost his leg half a century ago in the battle of Cuenca, fighting for Eloy Alfaro. But would you believe it? He had been a giant in his time, and at eighty-two he is still probably one of the strongest men in Ecuador. His little finger can lift a hundredweight. His conduct has not been above reproach, whether he was in New York or Hamburg. The prison band found him last year in the municipal penitentiary. As soon as he was free he came to the temple, and for months he has not missed a meeting. He tells not only of a work of grace in his heart but of the healing, by the Lord, of many maladies. His faith is simple and genuine.

EVANGELISM IN DUNDEE, SCOTLAND

N SUNDAY, October 31, 1954, we began a campaign scheduled for six Sundays in the largest theatre in Dundee. We did not have sufficient funds to book the theatre for a longer period. This campaign began as the result of several answers to prayer. We were fortunate in securing this beautiful theatre for a sum that was one quarter of what is usually charged. This place was the only hall available on Sunday evening in Dundee.

We did not have the money to advertise in the usual way. There were no handbills, no posters, and only a very small advertisement in the week-end paper. Would the people come? The church here in Dundee devoted Sabbath, October 30, to prayer. The results were amazing! Seven hundred people came the first

night, eight hundred the second night, and from then on the attendance has grown.

We have preached the fundamentals of salvation, the glorious Second Advent hope, the importance of baptism, and the other great truths we love. On Sunday, February 6, the last night in the theatre, more than one thousand people flocked to the hall. All our services have been advertised as sponsored by "Your friends, the Adventists." When we asked the great crowd of Scots whether they would like the Adventists to sponsor another series in Dundee next winter, it was thrilling to hear those one thousand voices respond in a loud affirmative! Grateful people pressed coins into the hands of the stewards and murmured thanks "for the work of the Adventists."

Surely this Macedonian call must not go unanswered, for this land is thirsty for the Word of God. Recently members of the Dundee Presbytery of the Church of Scotland have been asking, "How can such a small church sponsor such a large work?" Our youth service, which was held at the same time as the evangelistic service, had a regular attendance of one hundred young people. The experiment in this field of evangelism shows great possibilities if a long term policy were adopted.

And what happened after the fifteenth week? By force of circumstances we had to transfer the people to our suburban church, seating only one hundred people. There was no other hall available. We did this by holding four identical services and packed 450 people into that little church on the sixteenth Sunday. Our problems have not been so much, How to get a crowd, but rather, What to do with the crowd that has come!

We have had our full share of opposition from the press and the other denominations. However, we are pleased to report that the press has recently shown a more friendly attitude and published a few lines regarding our work in Dundee and at the New Gallery in Regent Street, London.

Every Sunday we held a ten-minute season of special prayer after the close of our service and rarely did as many as a dozen people leave. The people often expressed their appreciation for this part of the meeting. One person said, "These meetings must not stop, for they just keep me going all week!" She has a terrible life with her husband who is a drunkard. Once she thought suicide would be a way out, but since attending the services she has learned of God's wonderful way. People of all classes have been attending and still are coming to our church where we are explaining step by step the full meaning of the plan of salvation.

On Sabbath, February 19, we were happy to have the first of a series of baptisms. At that time, four believers -"the firstfruits"—were added to the church. Our conference president, Bernard F. Kinman, was with us for this service. Since we began our ministry in Dundee, after having worked in the London campaign with Elder Vandeman, we have accepted the goal of doubling the church membership in two years. When we entered Dundee it stood at forty, and as we write it stands at fifty-six. We hope to achieve our purpose by June Review and Herald.

SOWING AND REAPING

YEARS ago a young woman in the city of Battle Creek, Michigan, almost became a Seventh-day Adventist. Some of her friends and neighbours joined the church, and gave her books and tracts to read. After that she almost forgot the message of truth she had heard and read in Battle Creek.

Jesus taught us to pray to Him who is indeed our Father. Do we realize that He cares for us just as we do for our own children, and watches over us? But how can we know that we are indeed the children of God? The Lord has plainly revealed to us how we can know this. "As many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God." Rom. 8:14. As obedient children have we surrendered ourselves to be led by the Spirit of God. How may we be sure of this experience? "The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God." Verse 16. In other words, when the Spirit and the Word of God indicate what we ought to do, then we give up our own way, choosing only to be led by Him. If this is so then we can know that we are indeed children of God and that the great God, the Ruler of the universe, is indeed our loving heavenly Father. We can know that He will watch over us in all our trials.

O what love is bestowed upon us poor unworthy creatures! Not only are we counted children of God, but God's own Son, our Saviour, is not ashamed to call us brethren. (Heb. 2:11.) Nor is this all. If you are a child of God, you are an heir of God and a joint heir with Christ to the heavenly inheritance! O may we appreciate what it means to repeat "Our Father"! These the words, expressing such a close relationship between us and our Father in heaven should never be spoken lightly or in vain.

REMOVING A MOUNTAINS-OF WHAT?

In Michigan and Wisconsin with their low rolling hills, the fact that my grandmother had a railway pass, had been "Out West" and had seen the mountains, always fascinated me, and I considered her one of the heroes of the family. For that reason, perhaps the much-quoted text of Matthew 17:20 has intrigued me through the years:

"And Jesus said unto them, Because of your unbelief; for verily I say unto you, If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye shall say unto this mountain, Remove hence to yonder place; and it shall remove; and nothing shall be impossible unto you."

Christ used this and similar expressions on three different occasions. At the time above a lunatic boy's father had brought his mad son to the staff of the Great Physician. As he suspected, they could do nothing for him. On another occasion Jesus had cursed the fig tree and it had withered away. Jesus answered:

"Have faith in God. For verily I say unto you, That whosoever shall say unto this mountain, Be thou removed, and be thou cast into the sea; and shall not doubt in his heart, but shall believe that those things which he saith shall come to pass; he shall have whatsoever he saith." Mark 11:22, 23.

In the Luke 17 record, Jesus had been instructing the disciples in the importance of forgiving their brethren. His formula far outstripped any of theirs—seventy times seven, and seven times in a day. The disciples asked for spiritual surgery: "Lord increase our faith."

"And the Lord said, If ye had faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye might say unto this sycamore tree, Be thou plucked up by the root, and be thou planted in the sea; and it should obey you." Luke 17:6.

There may have been physical mountains within sight, but in my humble opinion Jesus was looking at his disciples close by. He didn't mention the difficulty of curing mental diseases, but spoke of their lack of faith. Likewise at the fig tree, Jesus spoke of faith, belief, prayer, and forgiveness—not of the difficulty of killing a tree.

In Luke 17 the disciples asked for faith to overcome their hardness of disposition. Jesus granted their request as He will do for any who may feel the need for a forgiving spirit.

"He will have compassion upon us: he will subdue our iniquities; and thou wilt cast all their sins into the depths of the sea." Micah 7:19.

Modern bull-dozers, and hoists, and atom bombs may suffice to remove trees and even mountains, but it takes the old-fashioned grace of God to take the unforgiving spirit out of our hearts. That is the heart of Christian living.

"It is the spirit cherished which gives colouring to all our actions. A man at peace with God and his fellow-men cannot be made miserable. Envy will not be in his heart; evil surmising will find no room there; hatred cannot exist. The heart in harmony with God is lifted above the annoyances and trials of this life."—Testimonies, Vol. V. p. 488.

DO WE EMBARRASS GOD?

THERE is a great need in the church for expressing more reverence toward God, for demonstrating true respect for His sanctuary and for inspiring each member with the spirit of Christian courtesy.

For a recent Sabbath the pastor of our Battle Creek Tabernacle prepared a special sermon entitled "Do We Embarrass God?" This service will not soon be forgotten.

As the members entered the vestibule of the Tabernacle they were confronted with a striking poster bearing these words, "The Master Is Here!" Before the doors into the sanctuary stood these impressive placards, "God's House Is the Gate to Heaven."

Pondering these thoughts, the members stepped inside the auditorium to behold an unusual sight. At the altar letters of black forming the words "Reverence My Sanctuary" arrested their attention. Above the entrance to the minister's room was this solemn warning, "Be Still, and Know That I Am God"; over an exit was, "Thou God Seest Me"; and by the newly-decorated baptistry was seen, "The Lord Is in His Holy Temple." Another poster admonished all to "Be Silent, a Whisper Is Heard!" The primary, junior, and youth divisions also displayed these

silent reminders, and the hallways and stairs were posted with cards requesting each one to "Tread Softly!"

After the congregation quietly took their seats and opened the bulletin for the day, these words from the pen of Ellen G. White demanded rapt attention:

"When they enter the Lord's house it should be with hearts that are softened and subdued by such thoughts as these, 'God is here; this is His house. . . . I must have no pride, envy, jealousy, evil surmising, hatred, or deception in my heart, for I am coming into the presence of the holy God. This is the place where God meets with and blesses His people. The high and holy One who inhabiteth eternity looks upon me, searches my heart and reads the most secret thoughts and acts of my life." "—Testimonies, Vol. 5, p. 494.

After the choral anthem "Be Still, and Know that I Am God," the pastor read Psalms 90:1-7 and Hebrews 2:20 as the texts for his sermon. "Do We Embarrass God?" He stated that reverence is a feeling of profound respect often mingled with awe and affection, and that true reverence for God is inspired by a sense of His infinite greatness and presence.

At the close of this impressive

service we left, an unusally quiet church. How quickly God's children respond to a forceful reminder! O that we may each one learn the lesson of courtesy and reverence toward our dear Lord and Master! If we are truly reverent in our hearts, we will be reverent outwardly, and no longer will we embarrass God by our disorderly actions in His sanctuary.—

He reverently presents at the mercy seat His finished redemption for His people. Like David, we may now pray, "It is time for Thee, Lord, to work: for they have made void Thy law." The angels of God were protecting them from the assaults of the enemy. The prophet says:

"And he showed me Joshua the high priest standing before the Angel of the Lord, and Satan standing at his right hand to resist him. And the Lord said unto Satan, The Lord rebuke thee, O Satan; even the Lord that hath chosen Jerusalem rebuke thee: is not this a brand plucked out of the fire?
