Such being the case I should appreciate it if you would send me some literature and give me the address of either a church in this locality or of some person who can explain just what you practise, etc. It is possible that I am on the way to Seventh-day Adbecoming a ventist.--FLC.

As you ingather you will meet souls who are weighed down with sickness and trouble; others who bewildered and concerned are about world conditions, as well as those who have suffered disappointments and frustrations in personal plans. Here are occasions to speak a word in season. Some will open their hearts to you and a profitable religious discussion may be started. Take time to enter into conversation. Direct their attention to the Bible Correspondence Course offer, mentioning that they are entitled to receive this interesting Bible Correspondence Course. Be on the alert to note interest, jotting down name and address after leaving the home,

offering prayer wherever possible, encouraging enrolments in the Bible correspondence course, arranging to call back with the missionary-book-of-the-year, or one of our missionary periodicals, and endeavouring to make an appointment for Bible studies.

If you do not find people at home on your first visit do you call back, making sure every family has been contacted?

Around the world pastors, members and youth follow the counsel given to Gideon in Judges 7:9 when confronted by odds that seemed all against him. "Arise, get thee down unto the host; for I have delivered it into thine hand." When Gideon went down to the host he heard something that him courage. (See brought Patriarchs and Prophets, p. 500). As you go from door-to-door to. make missionary visits in the Ingathering crusade you will receive Ingathering encouragement. Someone will live in heaven because you made your Ingathering call a real missionary visit.

Ingathering is a missionary programme from which we receive soul-winning dividends from Ingathering contacts made in person. It is also a programme whereby soul-winning dividends by proxy come to us through the missionaries we support. The inspired counsel from the Lord indicates:

"We will work for souls that are about us, and we will send our prayers and our gifts to sustain the labourers in more needy and destitute fields." Testimonies, Vol. 6, p. 30.

When we ingather we demonstrate mission loyalty by supporting thousands of workers in their medical, educational, welfare and evangelistic service in 196 countries. In the ingathering crusade you are partners with them in soul winning.

At the beginning of the Ingathering campaign one of our sisters became very ill, and the diagnosis was-cancer! She was confined to her bed. She decided that she would still carry on two important missionary projects. By her bedside she kept a supply of Bible correspondence school cards, Ingathering magazines, and an Ingathering container. When non-Adventist friends visited her she presented the Ingathering appeal and also invited them to enrol in the correspondence course. She raised Rs. 200 for Ingathering and enrolled quite a number in the Bible Course.

Aisake ran off toward the "mbure" pastor's whilst poor Miriami rolled on the ground frothing at the mouth and groaning. About her stood a group of frantic natives. To them devilpossession was real and frightening. It was not the first time that they had seen this sort of thing. All of them knew that unless something was done soon the evil spirit would gain such a grip on poor Miriami that it would be almost impossible to help her.

Pastor Peni Tovondi is a Fijian, a tall dark man with a smiling face and thick frizzy hair. He is also the grandson of a cannibal chief of the famed and warlike "Bure" tribe of Viti Levu, the main island of Fiji. Peni's grandfather was a wild and ferocious fighter. He was fearless and cruel. On two separate occasions he took by surprise one of his brothers, clubbed him to death and then cooked and ate him. He wanted nothing to do with Christianity because he thought it would make him weak.

It was Peni's grandfather who had worshipped the evil spirit, "Tauindama." In fact he was in

allegiance with him. This devil was a snake spirit and even today is greatly feared and even worshipped by some of the people.

It was this spirit that Peni came face to face with when he came running to poor Miriami. The spirit spoke through the girl.

"I know you. You are the grandson of Nakasamai my servant. Why must you fight me and trouble me?"

Pastor Peni then commanded the spirit to come out of the girl in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. The spirit cried out, "I have to go, you serve the most High God. I cannot stand before you."

Peni Tovondi Nakasamai is an interesting person. Though a Fijian he was born in far away New Guinea. His father accepted the Third Angel's Message, trained as a missionary, and went to work for twelve years in New Guinea where Peni was born. Later Peni trained at the newly established Fulton Missionary College and became its first graduate. Listen to a little of his work.

After one year in the work he was asked to work on the island of Gau. There was so much opposition on his arrival that the mission

president told him that he could choose to stay or go. He chose to stay. Driven from the village by prejudiced natives he lived for several nights without shelter under a big mango tree. During this time one of his little sons became chilled and died but that year Peni baptized 13 souls.

His evangelistic zeal has never lessened. In 1960 he conducted two public evangelistic efforts and baptized 47 souls. In 1961 he became Assistant President of the large West Fiji Mission. But he did not stop working. In that same year he baptized 62 souls. In 1962 he has brought many others to the Lord.

Recently he came to me and told me that there was need for more workers in Fiji. "Could we," he said, "accept a lesser salary so that more workers could be employed?" He told me that he had asked several of the other workers if they would be willing to surrender some of their wages to employ more and so finish the work quicker. All of them agreed to do so. It is no wonder that the work hastens on apace in this beautiful but needy land.

Pastor Peni's surname, Nakasamai, originated from his cannibal grandfather who offered refuge to escaping exiles so they would fight with him. Today Peni is happy because he can offer refuge to those who are seeking to escape from sin.

Why tell you about Peni Tovondi? Two reasons mainly. He is a fine example of the type of workers that is spreading the gospel in these awakening lands of the Central Pacific, Secondly there are scores of potential Peni Tovondi's at the Fulton Missionary College. And there is a third reason too. You. Sabbath School member will be helping students, the future leaders of our work in the Central Pacific Union Mission as you give your offerings this coming Thirteenth Sabbath.

Christian Stewardship

God, the Supreme Owner

A T THE very beginning we want to establish a very important basic principle of God's workmanship, and in establishing this principle, there are a number of texts we wish to quote:

All things were made by Him. . . . (John 1:3).

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth (Gen. 1:1). The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it (I Cor. 10:26 R.S.V.)

These are basic texts setting forth the principle that God made the world and thus He is its Owner. We, as Christians, naturally admit this principle, yet many of us do not acknowledge it by our actions.

During the next four articles we shall endeavour to set forth the principles of Christian stewardship and what it means to our individual spirituality. Many times we think that stewardship pertains to money and money alone. This is not true! Stewardship is more comprehensive, and we hope to develop this theme as we go along.

If we first acknowledge that God is the One who made all, owns all, and that all that we have has just been loaned to us, we will begin to understand the true principle of stewardship.

We understand that God.is absolute because He has power to create with no limitation and He owns with no dependence on others. God owns all this world, and all that we have because He made it. He was the Creator of all. We read in Colossians 1:16, 17:

For by Him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in the earth, visible and invisible, whether they be thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers; all things were created by Him, and for Him: and He is before all things, and by Him all things consist. In referring to this text, Mrs. White commented in *Thoughts* from the Mount of Blessing, page 66:

All things come from God. We have nothing that we have not received.... Everything we possess comes to us stamped with the cross. ... Hence there is nothing that we have a right to pledge as if it were our own, for the fulfilment of our word.

Thus we can readily understand that all we have or expect to have comes from God. Basically we have life. This is the most important principle. Without God we are not. God gives us the air we breathe; in fact, it is because of Him we exist.

Another important text is Psalms 50:10-12:

For every beast of the forest is Mine, and the cattle upon a thousand hills . . . for the world is mine and the fulness thereof.

He gives us the health, intelligence, and strength to make our livelihood, to care for our families, to supply housing for our families, to care for the house of God, to spread the good news of the gospel.

The more we contemplate this first principle of stewardship the more we are made aware of the need of our studying deeper into this theme. We can see that the very start of stewardship is the basic understanding that God has permitted us to make use of those things that He alone owns. But let us be quick to remind ourselves that God still owns them, even though we use them. He is still the possessor.

We refer again to the statement in *Thoughts from the Mount of Blessing*, page 66, "Everything we possess comes to us stamped with the cross." In other words, Christ joined God in the creation of the world and of man. Since man sinned, someone had to redeem him. Thus Christ took upon Himself this purchasing power and died on the cross for us. Thus the cross became a symbol of not only the first creation but our re-creation, and we owe everything to Christ for this sacrifice. Everything we own is thus stamped with the cross.

Yes, God is our bountiful Benefactor, and in closing this first article we want to share a few sentences with you from the pen of inspiration.

The power of God is manifested in the beating of the heart, in the action of the lungs, and in the living currents that circulate through the thousand different channels of the body. We are indebted to Him for every moment of our existence, and for all the comforts of life....

He loads us with His benefits. We are indebted to Him for the food we eat, the water we drink, the clothes we wear, the air we breathe... the sun... the blue sky... the green earth... all speak to man of his Creator's love... He watches over us with more tenderness than does a mother over an afflicted child.— "Counsels on Stewardship," p. 17.

All the abilities which men possess belong to God. "Testimonies," Vol. 5, p. 277.

We should appreciate God so much that we will put Him first in our lives. Our proper attitude toward Christian stewardship will strengthen our spiritual relationship to God. Stewardship will become a partnership in God's church.

She lived until she was ninetyfour years old and wrote eight thousand hymns-some of them songs that will be sung till Jesus comes. Here are her best-known song poems: "Blessed Assurance, Jesus Is Mine," "Pass Me Not, O Gentle Saviour," "Safe in the Arms of Jesus," and "Saved by Grace." She also wrote "Rescue the Perishing." Here is how it happened:

One summer evening she preached at the Bowery Mission in New York City. She could not see her audience, but she was impressed that there was a young man present who had been reared in a Christian home, and had wandered away from God. At the close of her message she said: "If there is a boy here tonight who has wandered away from his mother's teachings, I would like to meet him after the services."

Sure enough, after the service an eighteen-year-old boy came forward, and asked, "Did you mean me?" Then he told her of his promise to his dying mother that he would be a Christian and that someday he would meet her in heaven. Fanny Crosby talked to him earnestly. Then they had prayer together, and he gave his heart to God. When she went home that night, she sat in her room and wrote these familiar words:

- "Rescue the perishing, care for the dying,
- Snatch them in pity from sin and the grave:
- Weep o'er the erring one, lift up the fallen.
- Tell them of Jesus, the mighty to save."

Isn't it wonderful how Jesus can help us to do good in this world when we are consecrated! Can you think of another woman who became great in spite of her handicap? Perhaps you are thinking of the famous teacher, Helen Keller, who is not only blind but deaf. How much courage she has brought to handicapped people!

"A Thorn in the Flesh"

Paul had "a thorn in the flesh." Perhaps it was his bad eves. But he became the greatest teacher and evangelist in the Christian church.

Whatever the handicap we may have, let's make it serve us instead of shaming us. If you are short, stand tall. If you are tall, stand taller still and be proud of your height. If you have poor vision, learn to concentrate your mind and your sight on the subject at hand and to hear more keenly. If you are fat, be jolly and your friends will love you (but don't eat too much). If you are skinny, try to build up your muscles and your appetite, but don't act embarrassed or ashamed.

I know a junior girl who is very bashful because she thinks she is ugly, but she is a Christian, and I think she is very beautiful. Why should she be timid and afraid? If we love Jesus, we may have all His sufficiency in all things. God is not looking for genius so much as genuineness-not for great talents so much as great hearts. Whatever your handicaps, juniors, give all that you have to God's service. and He will make the world happier and better because you are here in the world to bless it!-Review and Herald.

A Junior Story from the Island of Fiji

A Little Child Shall Lead Them

•• BULLA vinaka," this is the way that the Fijian boys and girls would greet you, and like boys and girls everywhere they love to play and sing—and how they can sing!

Our story today is about a boy named Tamani, (Tar-mar-nee). Tamani lived in his village with his mother and father and five brothers and sisters, he was the second youngest in the family.

When he was small his father loved Jesus, and taught Tamani and his brothers and sisters to do the right things, and to follow Jesus. His father's training wasn't complete however, as they never had family worship in their home.

One day after years of happy life together something terrible happened in the family. Father stopped going to church with his family. Tamani, his mother, and brothers and sisters were made very sad, and all they said to father couldn't get him to go to church again with them.

Weeks, months, went by with Tamani always trying to be helpful, loving and kind. The day came when he had to go away from home to the Fulton Missionary College.

Here his days were very full with work, classes and study, but all the time he couldn't stop thinking about his own father, and praying that he would give his heart back to Jesus.

Tamani asked a minister to go

and see his father, but his heart was very hard and he wouldn't listen to the minister and what he had to say. Again Tamani asked another minister to go and see him, again he wouldn't listen to what this minister had to say. So for the third time, he asked another minister to go and see him. The minister went but he didn't get on with Tamani's father any better than the other two ministers had.

What would Tamani do now? He prayed to Jesus about it, and somehow something said to him, "Why don't *you* write a letter to your father," and so this is what he did. He wrote one letter, two letters, three letters, four letters and then he wrote the fifth letter, all the time praying very earnestly.

After his father received the fifth letter from his son, his heart was touched and he then sat down to write one letter to his son who had been so faithful to Jesus. In the letter he told his boy that by his letters to him he had helped him find his way back to Jesus and he wanted to be rebaptized. He also said he wanted to be ready when Jesus comes for His people who are faithful. You can imagine what a happy day that was for Tamani and his mother and brothers and sisters when their loved one was rebaptized.

When you give your offering on Thirteenth Sabbath it will go to help children like Tamani as they learn to be ministers and tell others about Jesus.

The boys and girls of Fiji say "Vinaka voka levu," which is "Thank you very much" for what you are going to do for us in your Thirteenth Sabbath offering to help us, that more of us may have the opportunity of attending school and being trained to serve Jesus as Tamani did. The book of Psalms has many writers. They were not all composed by David. He composed 73, Asaph, David's song leader, wrote 12, the sons of Korah 11, Solomon 2, Moses 1 and Ethan 1. We do not know who wrote the remaining 50. These poems, set to music, were probably collected into one book by Ezra. This book became Israel's hymn book.

The 150 Psalms are divided into five books. They are Psalms 1-41; 42-72; 73-89; 90-106; 107-150. Each book closes with a doxology. Psalm 119 is the longest chapter in the Bible, while Psalm 117 is the shortest. Psalm 118:8 is the middle verse of the Bible.

There are 116 quotations from the Psalms in the New Testament.

Many of the Psalms contain references to Christ. Some of these were written about 1,000 years before He came. They are called the Messianic Psalms. Study should be given to the following: Psalms 2, 8, 16, 22, 45, 69, 72, 89, 110, 118, 132. It would be good to make a list of the expressions which refer to Christ and find where these words are used in the New Testament.

A few of the Psalms are written in an acrostic form. This means that each verse begins with a different letter of the Hebrew alphabet, running in order: viz. a, b, c, etc. This probably helped in committing them to memory. These Psalms are numbers 9, 25, 34, 37, 111, 112, 119, and 145.

Some Psalms reflect David's sorrow for his sins. They are called Penitential Psalms. They are numbers 6, 25, 51, 102, 130, 143.

Psalm 46 is called Zion's Battle Song. It formed the basis of Luther's famous hymn, "A Mighty Fortress is our God."

Psalm 68 is a favourite with Crusaders and Huguenots.

Encouraging Daily Lesson Study

With all classes, daily study of the lessons is a basic objective. Adults can be induced to do this, just as children can, but the means adopted are different.

Usually it is not too difficult to encourage children to study the lesson daily. Such methods as the offering of rewards that all children who have a perfect record in daily study can qualify for are always effective. Then too, working devices and charts are always effective in the children's divisions for the encouragement of daily study of the Sabbath school lesson.

When it comes to encouraging an adult Sabbath school member to study his Sabbath school lesson daily, different methods of encouragement that appeal to the more mature mind must be used. It is true that in some village Sabbath Schools where the adult has limited education and often the standard of maturity in adulthood is not as high as in the towns and cities of our land, some of the methods used to promote daily study in our children's divisions can and are being used effectively among the adult villagers. However, "childish" methods will not usually appeal to the more mature adult mind. We must, therefore, devise ways and means of encouraging daily study among our adult Sabbath school membership that will be effective and have appeal.

An alert, devoted teacher, with an enjoyable class study is one of the most effective stimuli in creating a desire on the part of the pupils to study daily. Improve your teaching standard in your Sabbath Schools, and it will automatically have a reflex action of improvement upon your daily lesson study record. Exceptionally indifferent cases may call for prayerful study and a little personal work of a special nature. Once more, the key figure in the encouragement of daily study is the class teacher.

A frequent show of hands of those following the daily study plan will keep this important objective before the Sabbth School class.

God can do much through a teacher who is intent on bringing every member of his class into daily contact with the Bible and with the Saviour.
