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Doors Are Opening Everywhere

"For He will finish the work and cut it short in righteousness; because a short work will the Lord make upon the earth." Romans 9:28.

Somehow I never understood the above quoted scripture so clearly until my recent experiences among the Rungus people in the Kudat area. To make clear how greatly the Lord has worked for their salvation, I need to go back about a year to the time when Pastor Youngberg and I had the first privilege of visiting our little Chinese church in Sikuati, thirteen miles from Kudat. Then there were just two Rungus men in attendance. These two men begged that we conduct night meetings in their village, which we did, and it thrilled our hearts to see the whole village turn out to attend the meetings. We left that village that night rejoicing in the anticipation of seeing them accepting the message.

In the meantime brother Chong Ku En kept up the interest of the people and of the neighborhood. Six months later on our second visit, we were surprised and overjoyed to see the church packed up to overflowing; so much so that our Chinese brethren had to hold their services separately in another home.

After a lapse of three months we made our third visit and found the whole village determined to do away with their customs of hundreds of years and to become Christians, members of the remnant church.

Immediately after the Sabbath service a woman from another village stood up and said, "Mr. Pohan, please come up to our village and help move away our idols and charms from our houses. We will gladly do away with heathenism and become Christians." Soon another woman stood up and then another, all with the same request. Finally their chief who was also then present, joined them. Feeling impressed that God was guiding and that I should avail myself of this opportunity, I agreed to go.

On Monday morning we started on the rough trip, up and down hills and mountains. Reaching the village we found them all at home and eagerly awaiting our arrival. It was a long house of 40 rooms — a room to a family. We were certainly given a warm reception and when all were gathered together a meeting was conducted for them. From start to finish all children and grown ups were quiet, attentive and reverent as if sensing the presence of the Unseen. That the Spirit is working mightily among these people is evident, impressing their hearts with a need for something better than they have had.

At the close of the short meeting I was guided to each room to watch them remove their idols and charms and to have them surrendered to me. Oh it was thrilling to see for the first time in my life a whole village surrender their idols to a missionary and accept Christianity in the place of their heathen customs which they frankly admitted to be lies and vanity and unprofitable, thus fulfilling the words in Jer. 16:19. "Surely our fathers have inherited lies, vanity and things wherein there is no profit." It was really a great day of victory which God had wrought for us.

We believe the work is closing rapidly. Everywhere doors are open for the acceptance of the last warning message. The devil and his forces tremble to witness its advance. This was shown by the following experience. Two days after we left the village mentioned above, two men came down to see me and related a dream which two men of their village had had. The dream had greatly impressed all the villagers and had been a source of encouragement to them. In the dream they saw a crowd of people sitting on the ground around their long house. When urged to come up to the house these people replied, "We won't come up to you. We are longer friends, for you have chosen a new friend,

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Jesus. Now we are afraid of you. We are going away to the other heathen villages and leave you to your destiny." To all concerned the interpretation of this dream was that these people were all the evil spirits they had worshiped for past centuries and that now that they had accepted Christianity these spirits were leaving them in fear and trembling.

The news of this victory spread rapidly, and many of the neighboring villages want to do the same thing. Three weeks later, on my return trip to Jesselton, a delegation from another village was sent to meet me at the wharf. The message from their Chief was, "We are fed up with heathen customs, so we want to be Christians, members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Please come up at once, without fail, to help us remove our idols and charms as you have done in the other village."

I would have been happy to return to help this village but the District Officer refused to give me permission until he could see the Chief concerned. However, I hope to be able soon to visit this village and others who have requested my help. Please pray that I may be kept a humble and fit instrument to gather in these dear people before it is too late.

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Progress at Youngberg Memorial Hospital Continues

It is a pleasure to give our believers throughout the field encouraging news of continued progress at

the Youngberg Memorial Hospital in Singapore. Since its inception in 1948, the hospital staff has been growing, and during the past year has watched with anxious anticipation the construction of the greatly needed new wing. The grand opening of this new unit on April 24, 1952, was reported in a recent issue of the *Messenger*.

On the following Sunday, the new unit was opened to patients. This, however, did not fully answer all the problems; for other remodeling and enlarging was needed. With the doubling of our patient beds, new and larger culinary facilities were necessary. The kitchen was expanded to more than twice its original size. The former clinic has now been very attractively remodeled to accommodate the third-class clinic patients, and this includes a physio-therapy department.

Dr. G. G. Innocent left on furlough to the United States the first of June, leaving the medical work in the care of Dr. G. H. Coffin, Acting Medical Director, and Dr. Luke Tsai. These men along with Miss Elizabeth Rogers and her corps of nurses are carrying a heavy load. It is hoped that very shortly Dr. Everett Dick will join our staff in sharing this pressing load.

Thus far, the first two weeks of August have been the busiest, or rather the in-patient count was the highest ever. Additional beds had to be placed in some rooms and the count remained at or very close to 60. During this same period over 1,000 people have been cared for in the out-patient clinic.

The spiritual phase of the work at Youngberg Memorial Hospital, under direction of the writer, ranks high in the mind of the staff and plans are being laid for it to bring more and more in the way of spiritual help to the patients. Bibles and religious literature are provided for each patient. Only religious and health journals are placed on the tables in the waiting rooms. Mrs. Amy Tan spends some time each day visiting and studying with the patients. Her cheering smile brings comfort and courage to every one. Each week approximately 200 *Signs of the Times* are mailed to former patients; and our other journals, *Life and Health*, Chinese *Signs of the Times*, and *Listen* are distributed as they arrive each month, or quarter, as the case may be.

The courage of the staff is good; the needs are pressing, and the hour is late, so remember the work here in your prayers.

Preparing for the Future

"The greatest want of the world is the want of men,—men who will not be bought or sold; men who in their inmost souls are true and honest; men who do not fear to call sin by its right name; men whose

conscience is as true to duty as the needle to the pole; men who will stand for the right though the heavens fall." *Education* p. 57.

To produce such men for the cause of God is the responsibility of Christian education. Part of that responsibility is to teach the student to be self reliant and to have a love for souls. Along with this is the task of teaching them the methods of reaching the hearts as well as the minds of men. Each of these requirements is admirably fulfilled in the student colporteur program.

That this is true is demonstrated by the fact that almost without exception, the leaders of this Advent Movement spent summers and sometimes years in the colporteur work during and immediately after their schooling. One man, who is a very successful evangelist today, chose six months of full time canvassing in preference to a course in a university when he began to feel that some additional training in soul-winning was a necessity in his ministry.

It is the aim of this Union to fulfill this responsibility, and in accord with this aim a strong student colporteur program is carried on each vacation period. This month forty-one students from the Malayan Seminary have been trained and sent into the field. Sunday morning, August 10, there was quite a scramble to get ten students started by train and ship for various destinations in the Federation of Malaya. The next day two more left by train, and the remainder started to work in Singapore.

These students are under the direction of Brother K. T. Chin, the publishing secretary for the Malay States Mission, and they have received valuable instruction as well as practical demonstration in the field in methods of persuading people and in placing truth filled literature in the homes. Someday our work will be turned over to some of these young people, and the call will find them with a practical training for the task.

Elders H. W. Peterson and R. A. Pohan spent some time in Kota Bahru in the interests of the Malay work there. A building has been located which can be used for a meeting place and for a home for a worker. Brother M. T. A. Siahaan has responded to the call for a worker and has gone to Kota Bahru to live and to labor for the people in that place.

Voice of Prophecy students and workers in Penang and Ipoh will be happy this week when they welcome Mrs. L. C. Wilcox, Elder H. W. Peterson and Brother Chong Tat Kong who have gone there to conduct rallies and to meet with the students.

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Baptism at Dalat

Twelve new converts joined the church by baptism on June 21, 1952, in the Dalat lake. Three are Vietnamese and nine are the first-fruits of our work among the Moi race.

During the year 1949, there attended the Indo-China's Workers' Training School, our first convert from among the Moi's as a student. At the close of the year he returned to his mountain village to preach to his fellow countrymen the same Gospel that had become so dear to him. In a few months he had several people interested (one of whom was his wife) and continued studying with them faithfully. This he has done for nearly two years, and upon examination these nine Moi candidates were found to be thoroughly grounded in the faith.

Present to help celebrate this happy event was the president of the Mission, Elder L. E. A. Fox who gave us a very stirring message on the text, "How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation?" Heb. 2:3. It stands to reason, as seen from the experiences of some patients who have neglected small sores which have resulted in death, that we must not neglect to bring to our Great Physician the root of our sin, small though it may be; otherwise we shall be spiritually dead and must finally be buried.

At the conclusion of this address, Brother Ruel who had been invited from Tarad church, took a few minutes to publicly examine five baptismal candidates who were then accepted and baptized by Pastor Fox. 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通天之道

如果你是攀登一座高山，你一定不會在山麓的小丘就停下來，你還是向上爬，你繼續地向前進，你可能時常感到疲乏，前面的路途可能是崎嶇不平，但你必繼續前進，否則你必不能到達山頂。

聖經描述基督徒的生活正如一條通往天庭的道路，先知以賽亞說它是『聖路』，(卅五章八節)所羅門王告訴我們說：『義人的路，好像黎明的光，越照越明，直到日午。』(箴言四章十八節)

當我們一開始走基督徒的路時，便不應有回轉的念頭，有時我們可能猶豫不前，有時我們可能滑了一交而倒退了幾步，但我們千萬不要灰心地道：『我不能完成了。』每當躊躇之時，我們應當站起，鼓起新的勇氣，信靠那一路上與我們同行的嚮導，繼續前進，所以使徒保羅說道：『我們應當離開道理的開端，竭力進到完全的地步。』(希伯來書六章一節)他也告訴他們說，基督是『我們信心創始成終』的主，所以我們要『忘記背後，努力面前的，向着標竿直跑，要得上帝在基督耶穌裏從上面召我來得的獎賞。』

但今日有許多基督徒只願意在山麓的小丘盤桓，他們雖已開始走基督徒的路了，但却遲遲不前。這是一件危險的事，若是一個人失去了基督徒經驗中之成就的快樂，那他就是失去了初信時的愛心，於是他便很容易流於『不冷也不熱』的境況中，他事事採取漠不關心的態度，所以保羅強烈地指摘那些不在基督內長滿身量的人說：『論到那些已經蒙了光照，嘗過天恩的滋味，又於聖靈有分，並嘗過上帝善道的滋味，覺悟來世權能的人，若是離棄道理，就不能叫他們從新懊悔

了；因為他們把上帝的兒子重釘十字架，明明的羞辱祂。』(希伯來書六章四至六節)保羅在這裏指示不生長的基督徒之危險。不錯，有一些背道或不冷不熱的信徒會被救回，但大體上說來，這等人絕少願意回轉來的，所以上帝對之也屬愛莫能助。上帝只能拯救那些願意得救的人。

我們應如何纔能使基督徒經驗時刻生長和活潑呢？保羅叫我們進到完全的地步究竟是何意思呢？

首先，我們應當知道，除了那引導人們悔改的初步道理外，我們還要明白其他更深的教訓。單知道耶穌是我們贖罪的羔羊還不够，這乃是基督道理的開端而已，我們還得進一層明白祂是我們的大祭司，每日在天庭聖所為我們代求，並還要再來迎接我們，進入上帝為我們所預備的佳美家鄉。基督的美德與全能應當是我們此生與來生所思想的事情。我們應當時刻有一種更明白祂的慾望，只有藉着詳細的和虔誠的查考聖經，我們方能達到此目的。

我們對於那位創造和救贖我們的主應有何責任呢？罪人單祇相信基督而被從罪惡裏救出來還是不夠的，他應有積極的行爲，他應有順從的信心，願意去做上帝期望他所做的事，以致能進到完全的地步。耶穌說：『你們若愛我，就必遵守我的命令。』(約翰十四章十五節)基督徒勸讀聖經之時，他便日益明白自己應對上帝所盡的本分，他將快樂地說道：『我的上帝阿！我樂意照祢的旨意行；祢的律法在我心裏。』(詩篇四〇篇八節)
