

Evangelism in Saigon

The Saigon evangelistic effort conducted by Dr. Daniel Walther, (professor of Church History S.D.A, Theological Seminary), is now in its eighth week. God has indeed blessed these meetings beyond what we had even expected. That His Spirit is mightily at work within the hearts of men and women in Saigon is plainly evident. Thus far the highest attendance, which was on the second Sunday night, has been 1,000—the full seating capacity of the large Theatre Norodom. On other nights attendance

ranged from 400 to 800—the weather occasionally being contrary. A good portion of the auditors have been Europeans who have shown genuine interest in the truths presented. "I've never in my life heard anything like that before," "I didn't know such things were in the Bible," and "That was most illuminating," are expressions that the writer overheard after the meeting on Daniel 2. While it is difficult to give figures on baptismal interests this early in the series, there are several that have definitely spoken about and plan on baptism. There are many more who are sufficiently interested so that they will surely make the same decision in due time.

Another evidence that the Spirit is working is manifest by the unprecedented zeal and fervor with which the evil one is at work. Never before has this been so obvious. It is a good sign, however, as Satan has never been known to give up without a struggle. Much religious pressure has been placed directly upon some of those who are in the balances between leaving the old and joining the true. Religio-political pressure has taken from us our favorable evening hour for Sunday's meetings so that attendance the last week had fallen to around 200-leaving apparently, those who are really interested. We have been forced to identify, not only our name on every piece of advertising, but have also been dictated to as to the dimensions of the letters that we must use in indicating our name. This did not, however, appear to cripple attendance at the immediate meetings following. Finally the hall rent was boosted 300%, and then we were told that for further meetings we could not be informed as to what hours we could even have the hall until it was too late for the advertising to give the hour.

Ingathering at the Malayan Union Seminary

Once again Ingathering Days have come and gone at the Malayan Seminary. The Ingathering Committee gave careful study to the proper promotion in the different divisions of the school. They were also fortunate to receive the additional services of other enthusiastic Ingathering veterans, who brought words of cheer and enlightenment to the group, as to the good that this program is doing for the denomination throughout the world and for the Seminary itself. On our campus there are standing today, memorials of past Ingathering days as a witness of what two days, of unselfish service can do; thus the appeal for another mileston⁴ in the Seminary expansion programme was cheerfully responded to by students and workers.

On October 6 and 7 about seventy groups were formed, excluding the many who could not participate because they had not reached sixteen years of age, made up mainly from the Secondary Division students consisting of Standards Five to Nine, inclusive. Their determination to make the hours of the two days count could be felt in the very atmosphere. The threatening weather on the first day did not scare them, nor did the heavy down-pour of rain on the second day deter them.

About half of the student body were included in the group too young to Ingather but they also did their part. Their form teachers explained to them how they could take part by asking their parents to donate. Almost two thousand dollars came from this source, including personal solicitations made by the teachers.

The two special English classes which meet in the afternoon caught the spirit of the occasion and brought in nearly two thousand dollars. One group of two boys from Standard Seven brought in \$725.00, and Mr. Ngo Beng Lim an Ngo Beng Ho, together, brought in \$1,241.50! Workers from the Industrial and the Administrative Departments, as well as several from the Union office, joined our happy bands and shared in the joys of this intensive campaign.

It was felt, due to the business slump in commercial Singapore, that seven thousand dollars could be considered a good goal for the two days work. How grateful we are that with the help of God the amount raised far exceeded our highest expectations. Aside from the \$13,585.24 gathered in, we are happy to report that 2,500 Seminary promotion leaflets and 1,500 Chinese and English "Signs of the Times" were distributed.

God has richly blessed the efforts put forth to gather funds for the strengthening of His work in the Seminary.

It is a busy place from morning till night as together the two doctors see about eighty outpatients and about seventy in-patients every day.

Mrs. Nelson is office nurse for her husband, looking after the out-patients and attending to the many duties required by such a position. They both enjoy their work immensely and love Penang, the beautiful island.

Just before they left the states, Mrs. Nelson had graduated from the nurses course, having taken her Pre-nursing at Atlantic Union College, and Dr. Nelson was serving on the staff of the New England Sanitarium. He comes of a missionary family, his father having been a missionary in India for thirty years. His brother, Roger is a doctor in Bangkok.
