Call to Advance

All about us today is evidence of the end of the world. Leading men of all nations are crying "Unite or Perish," and the common people, seeing their leaders in fear, are stricken with terror. Their faith in the promises wanes as they observe war and general confusion unloosing every wicked influence that can be imagined. God's people must recognize that, "All over the world, men and women are looking wistfully to heaven. Prayers and tears and inquiries go up from souls longing for light." Vol 6, p. 71.

This is the hour when God desires to do great things for humanity, through His professed followers. It is undertood by His people that, "This gospel of the Kingdom shall be preached in all the world ... AND THEN shall the end come." Matt. 24:14. Unfortunately, "There are those who for a lifetime have professed to be acquainted with Christ yet who have never made a personal effort to bring even one soul to the Saviour." D. A. p. 141.

Today the world needs hope—the Advent Hope. Just a few days ago, in Korea's freezing winter weather, I saw an orphan boy sitting asleep, outside a large doorway. He was poorly clothed. He had no stockings and just one shoe. The concrete upon which he sat was as cold as a cake of ice. Upon it rested his bare foot. He appeared too weak to shiver. Next we observe a soldier, broken and bruised from war, as he asks, "Why doesn't Jesus come?"

Whether it be in Singapore, Korea, Berlin, London or New York there are many, many, who know not the truth. "They need to hear the call to come to Jesus. The sorrowing are to be cheered, the weak strengthened, the mourners comforted. The poor are to have the gospel preached to them. . . . He (God) calls upon His church to arouse and become acquainted with the situation. . . . Let them send forth laborers into the field." *Colporteur Evangelist*, pp. 32, 33.

The story is told of two explorers approaching the North Pole. There they found a small tribe of people who thought they were the only people in all the world until the explorers came and told them differently. These people stayed to themselves giving no heed to others. There is a similar danger with the people of God in this frustrating hour of life when God longs to relieve humanity's suffering and extend to men everywhere His eternal plan.

In the Far Eastern Division we have approximately 1,100 colportsur evangelists and publishing house workers, publishing and selling literature in 24 languages and dialects. Following are a few soul-stirring statements and experiences from these gallant men and women.

Indonesian colporteurs state that, "People awaken us all hours of the night to buy books and have us speak (preach) to them."

In Malaya one becomes aware of the fact that language barriers are being broken down. Recently I observed an Indian colporteur selling Chinese literature to a Chinese family, by conversing with them in the Malay language. There are no opposing language or geographical barriers to our earnest colporteurs.

Recently a subscriber to the "Signs of the Times," subscription edition, wrote to the editor and said, "I would like to subscribe for this journal eternally." The servant of the Lord writes, "I saw them holding papers... in one hand, and the Bible in the other, while their cheeks were wet with tears; and bowing before God in earnest, humble prayer, to be guided into all truth... And when the truth was received in their hearts, and they saw the harmonious chain of truth, the Bible was to them a new book; they hugged it to their hearts with grateful joy, while their countenances were all aglow with happiness and holy joy." *Colporteur Evangelist*, pp. 28, 29.

From the Philippines we recently learned the climax of a colporteur's sale of "Great Controversy" some twenty years ago. The story came to full light when another working interior, found three groups of commandment keeping people. They were happily surprised to learn that there are approximately 40,000 people in the Philippine Islands who believe the same Bible truths. Just recently 89 of these precious souls were baptized into the great Adventist family.

"Why haven't I heard these things before?" or "My pastor must never have heard these plain truths, I must tell him; he is such a wonderful man." These and similar statements fall daily from the lips of sincere souls around the world.

Today there is need for thousands more of our people to separate themselves from worldly enterprises and enter the growing bookman army. Approxmiately five thousand Seventh-day Adventists have already separated themselves from worldly interests and are now engaged in this specialised phase of God's service for man. They have found that the promises of God are sure. They invite you to join them now. A need made known and the ability on our part to meet that need, is a call.

The pen of inspiration records the following stirring challenge to the church of God: "My brethren and sisters, remember that one day you will stand before the Lord of all the earth to give an account of the deeds done in the body. Then your work will appear as it really is. The vineyard is large, and the Lord is calling for laborers. Do not allow anything to keep you from the work of soul-saving. The canvassing work is a most successful way of saving souls. Will you not try it?" Colporteur Evangelist, p. 33.

On June 22, 1953 the Vietnamese government authorized our mission by written permission to begin immediately a weekly Sunday morning radio broadcast from nine to nine-thirty over Radio Dalat. With the permit they enclosed a copy of their latest radio log which already reads: "Sunday....9:00 to 9:30 — Tieng Noi Tien-tri" (The Voice of Prophecy).

The first tape recording for this series of emissions was presented to Radio Dalat some weeks ago. They are only awaiting several extra tapes to hold as emergency purposes before beginning the broadcasts.

Since at least 1947 we have tried on numerous occasions to secure radio time on Radio Saigon. This has never been granted. This year, after the opening of a radio station in Dalat, we applied there, and are happy to have our long desired privilege granted. With the threat of heavier war clouds approaching, truly the Third Angel's Message must be quickly sounded throughout Viet Nam's heavens with a loud voice, that all might have access to its life-giving power in this midnight hour. Pray for its success.

The First Malayan Union Youth Camp By Mrs. J. L. Pogue

The palm-lined sandy beach of Pulau Ubin with its rolling tides was an ideal spot for the first Malayan Union Mission Youth Camp. There close to Nature and Nature's God, thirty-three campers and nine counselors enjoyed a week of refreshing fellowship

together in the many activities. Each day began with consecration to God around our Morning Watch prayer circle. Mr. K. T. Kong, our Camp business manager, supplied ample food and it was well-prepared by the skilful nands of our Camp Matron, Mrs. K. T. Kong, and our Camp Nurse, Miss E. Rogers. We are happy to report that because of the good food supplied many of our campers gained weight, and the few cuts and bruises were quickly taken care of by our nurse.

The inspection of each unit's quarters every morning was to impress upon our youth the need of order and cleanliness. First, second and third honours were given daily to the units which had cooperated the best in all activities of the camp. All worked faithfully and diligently to capture these honours each day.

Our Camp Council under the direction of our Camp Pastor, Elder W. J. Hackett, was a highlight of the day. In this council hour every morning he made Crristianity practical. His talks centered

Some who knew nothing about swimming on going to camp had learned the first fundamentals well before leaving. This was under the able leadership of our swimming instructor, Miss Helen Lee, assisted by Mr. James Wong and Mrs. Pogue.

The free time just before supper was occupied by group games and volley ball, which became very popular. Our line calls were made snappy and straight by the order of Mr. Albert Tan and Mr. James Wong. All the campers down to the mascot, Jerry Pogue, (age 5), learned the real meaning of "Attention" and remaining there until the command was changed. Malayan Youth Camp Health Check

The first Youth Camp in Malaya opened August 26, 1953 with thirty-two campers in attendance. After registration they were weighed and had their temperature, pulse, and respiration taken.

During the week there was very little medical care that had to be given. One boy had fever one day with diarrhea and vomiting. One girl sprained her ankle a couple of days before we left camp. Another girl had a sore throat one day which kept her from swimming. Other than that we had a few cut fingers from washing dishes or preparing vegetables and there were a few scratches and blisters. I was so thankful we had no major accidents—no tragedies that would have spoiled any effort to hold a camp in the future.

Each camper was weighed the day he landed in camp and again the day camp broke up. The result are very interesting. Some gained and some lost. But here are the figures:

- 2 girls were the same weight-no gain, no loss.
- 1 girl lost 1 pound.
- 2 girls lost 2 pounds each.
- 1 girl lost 3 pounds.
- 1 girl lost 4 pounds.

Total weight loss-12 pounds for the girls.

- 3 girls gained 2 pounds each.
- 1 girl gained 3 pounds.

Total weight gained—9 pounds for the girls. Net loss—3 pounds for the girls.

- 1 boy the same weight.
- 1 boy lost 1 pound.
- 1 boy lost 2 pounds.

Total weight loss-3 pounds for the boys.

- 4 boys gained 1 pound each.
- 4 boys gained 2 pounds each.
- 4 boys gained 3 pounds each.
- 4 boys gained 4 pounds each.
- 2 boys gained 6 pounds each.

Total weight gain—52 pounds for the boys. Net weight gain—49 pounds for the boys.

Total net gain for boys and girls-46 pounds.

So you see, this part of our Youth Camp was good. There was plenty of good wholesome, nourishing food, served at regular times each day. There was no eating between meals. The campers were out of doors much of the time and the different activities built up their appetites. At meal time the trays were heaped up and the campers could go back for more as long as there was more to go after. Let me say again in closing, I am thankful we had no tragic accidents, no serious mishaps. I am thankful I was Camp Nurse for our first Youth Camp in Malaya.

Latest Addition to the Bangkok Sanitarium and Hospital

Another step forward is being made on the grounds of the Bangkok Sanitarium and Hospital. The accompanying picture shows the perspective plans for the new midwifery section as being that under the two flags. The entrance to the mission office section is at the left, and thus will face the entrance to the church. The piling for the building is almost all in and they are coming right along with things. The contractors expect to have it completed by early November. The building will not only provide spacious room for an enlarged mission office, Book and Bible House and Voice of Prophecy office, but will also house the school of midwifery and provide complete facilities for deliveries, nursery and thirty in-patients. The out-patient maternity and public health clinic will be on the ground floor. We believe it will be a very fine building and will contribute much to the public health effort of the Bangkok Sanitarium and Hospital and to the good will the institution already enjoys, besides providing our school of nursing with a midwifery unit that will enable us to give our students a very well-rounded complete training.

They streamed out like flags, and I was given to understand that they were the gifts to the couple."
