Responsibilities of Membership

IN THE SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CHURCH

A leaflet bearing this title has been issued by the executive committee of the General Conference. Recently the executive committee of the Union of Southeast Asia considered this important subject, and voted ta print the substance of this leaflet in the MESSENGER. The material will also be placed in leaflet from in all of the languages served by our Union. A copy for a permanent personal record will be presented to each church member. The material contained in this leaflet appears below. We urge each of you to read it with care. Take particular notice of the three concluding paragraphs which outline a Seventh-day Adventist's responsibility to his own church membership. Let us guard our church membership, it is sacred.

"Now ye are the body of Christ, and members in particular." 1 Corinthians 12:27. "Although you may feel that you are the least of all saints, yet you are members of Christ's body, and through Him you are identified with all His human agencies, and with the excellence and power of the heavenly intelligences. None of us liveth to himself. To each is assigned a post of duty, not for his own narrow, selfish interests, but that the influence of each may be a strength to all." "We ... are complete only in Christ Jesus, who will uplift His people from the low level to which sin has degraded them, and will place them where they shall be acknowledged in the heavenly courts as laborers together with God."

"Christ has given to the church a sacred charge. Every member should be a channel through which God can communicate to the world the treasures of His grace, the unsearchable riches of Christ. There is nothing that the Saviour desires so much as agents who will represent to the world His Spirit and His character. There is nothing that the world needs so much as the manifestation through humanity of the Saviour's love. All heaven is waiting for men and women through whom God can reveal the power of Christianity.

"The church is God's agency for the proclamation of truth, empowered by Him to do a special work; and if she is loyal to Him, obedient to all His commandments, there will dwell within her the excellency of divine grace. If she will be true to her allegiance, if she will honor the Lord God of Israel, there is no power that can stand against her." Enfeebled and defective, needing constantly to be warned and counseled, the church is nevertheless the object of Christ's supreme regard." "The great day of the Lord is near; it is near, and hasteth greatly." Jesus says, 'Lo, I come quickly.' We should keep these words ever in mind, and act as though we do indeed believe that the coming of the Lord is nigh, and that we are pilgrims and strangers upon the earth. The vital energies of the church of God must be brought into active exercise for the great object of self-renovation; every member must be an active agent for God."

The church of God "on earth is to assume divine proportions before the world, as a temple built of living stones, each one reflecting light. It is to be the light of the world, as a city set on a hill, which cannot be hid. It is built of stones

laid close together, stone fitting to stone, making a firm, solid building. Not all the stones are of the same form or shape. Some are large, some are small, but each has its own place to fill. And the value of each stone is determined by the light that it reflects. This is God's plan. He desires all His workers to fill their appointed places in the work for this time."

"We should improve every opportunity of placing ourselves in the channel of blessing. Christ has said, 'Where two or three are gathered together in My name, there am I in the midst.' The convocations of the church, as in camp meetings, the assemblies of the home church, and all occasions, where there is personal labor for souls, are God's appointed opportunities for giving the early and the latter rain." "We must seek His favors with the whole heart if the showers of grace are to come to us." "Then let us not forsake the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhort one another; and so much the more, as we see the day approaching.'

"The church is God's appointed agency for the salvation of men. It was organized for service, and its mission is to carry the gospel to the world. From the beginning it has been God's plan that through His church shall be reflected to the world His fullness and His sufficiency. The members of the church, those whom He has called out of darkness into His marvelous light, are to show forth His glory. The church is the repository of the riches of the grace of Christ: and through the church will eventually be made manifest, even to 'the principalities and powers in heavenly places,' the final and full display of the love of God."

"We are not to feel that the work of the gospel depends principally upon the minister. To every man God has given a work to do in connection with His kingdom. Every one who professes the name

of Christ is to be an earnest, disinterested worker, ready to defend the principles of righteousness. Every soul should take an active part in advancing the cause of God. Whatever our calling, as Christians we have a work to do in making Christ known to the world. We are to be missionaries. having for our chief aim the winning of souls to Christ. To His church God has committed the work of diffusing light and bearing the message of His love. Our work is not to condemn, not to denounce, but to draw with Christ. beseeching men to be reconciled to God. We are to encourage souls, to attract them, and thus win them to the Saviour."

"God blesses the work of men's hands, that they may return to Him His portion. He gives them the sunshine and the rain; He causes vegetation to flourish; He gives health, and ability to acquire means. Every blessing comes from His bountiful hand, and He desires men and women to show their gratitude by returning Him a portion in tithes and offerings. -in thank offerings, in freewill offerings, in trespass offerings. They are to devote their means to His service, that His vineyard may not remain a barren waste. They are to study what the Lord would do were He in their place. They are to take all difficult mat-

ters to Him in prayer. They are to reveal an unselfish interest in the building up of His work in all parts of the world."

Excerpts from The Spirit of Prophecy.

Transfer of Membership

"When a church member moves from one locality to another for a period of longer than six months, he should, after becoming located, make immediate application for a letter of transfer to a church near his new place of residence, or in case he is isolated, the customary plan is to make application to join the mission church." Church Manual, pp. 58,59. Students are encouraged to transfer their membership to the church at the school which they attend, and to change it again promptly when they leave the institution.

Method of Granting Church Letters

Application for a letter should be made to the clerk of the church with which the member desires to unite. The clerk then sends the request to the clerk of the church from which the member desires to be transferred. On receiving this, the clerk brings the request to the pastor, if he is an ordained or licensed minister, or to the church elder, who in turn lays the request before the church board. After due consideration the board recommends to the church that such letter be granted. The pastor or elder then brings the recommendation to the attention of the church, announcing that this is the first reading. Final action is then deferred one week, when the request is again presented to the church and a vote of the church is taken. The purpose of deferring action is to give any other member opportunity in the meantime to object to the granting of the letter if he knows of any valid reason for withholding it.

Keep in Touch With Your Church

"It is a serious neglect for a church member to regard the obligation of church membership so lightly that he deliberately absents himself for indefinite periods and makes no report of his faith and hope to the church. If, because of age, infirmity, or other unavoidable cause, a member finds it impossible regularly to attend divine worship, he should consider it a duty to keep in close contact with the church leaders by letter or by other means ... After an absence of two years (a member whose whereabouts is unknown) may be dropped from the membership of the church by a vote of the church,, provided the church officers can certify that they have faithfully endeavored to locate him but without success." From Dead Gods to a Living Saviour By Del Delker, Voice of Prophecy Soloist

She smiled up at me, this bashful but radiant little 5-foot-or-less, 22-year-old Chinese girl from Singapore. What a sweet face she has, I thought—and a dimple in each cheek. "My name is Helena Yoong Foong-Chin," she said, clutching in her two hands her precious VOP diploma.

Helena comes from a Buddhist family. Her parents, have spent quite a sum of money in sacrifice to their gods, but they have received very little in return. It seemed that Buddhism held nothing for Helena. Her brothers and sisters were attending a Christian church which was liberal in its teachings, and Helena observed that they were learning little to help them behave themselves and really live good, constructive lives. So this serious-minded young girl decided to study into Confucianism. She studied it for six years but, found that "mixed up in some good teachings were many words which did not ring true."

Then one day she came in contact with Pastor Wu, a local Voice of Prophecy representative. He sensed that here was a girl who

was desperately looking for an understanding God, so he suggested that she study the Voice of Prophecy correspondence course. "Gradually," said Helena, "I found that 'the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom.' After all those years of searching for something that sounded logical and was satisfying, I was introduced to Jesus Christ, 'the way, the truth, and the life.' He performed a miracle in me, and I was born again in Christ. Through the help of Pastor Wu and the Voice of Prophecy lessons, I was changed into a different person; and since then I have really started to live. How happy I am. In these other religions where idols are worshiped, there is no real hope of everlasting life. The men who found them are dead, and millions of poor people worship dead gods. Now I serve a living Saviour who died for my sins, who rose from the dead, and who has made eternal life possible for me.'

Helena Yoong Foong-Chin was baptized "into Christ" December 27, 1958, and is now preparing for service as an ambassador for her Saviour.

Children Can Be Reverent Kathryn Barnett Cash

A few days ago I chanced upon question sent to one of our denominational periodicals by a mother who was concerned because her little three-year-old was restless and unable to sit still during the sermon hour. It would be well if more Adventist parents felt concern and would give thought to this situation. Our children must be taught to love and reverence the hours they spend in God's house, and it is up to us as parents to control their restlessness so that it does not get out of bounds. How shall we approach the problem?

It is well, also, to take into consideration the fact that the church and its equipment are planned for adults. The seats are large, hence little feet cannot reach the floor; what else can they do but dangle? The back of the seat in front of the child, as well as the person sitting in that seat, almost certainly cuts off his view of the minister. He is placed in an uninteresting cube of space and told to sit still and be quiet. He can hear the voice of the speaker, but rarely can he see him. Nor does he understand the words the minister uses. Is it any wonder that the child loses interest? Is it surprising that he cannot resist the temptation to turn around and look at those behind him?

When parents are able to face this problem by seeing the situation through the eyes of their children, feeling along with them their sense of strangeness, half the battle is won. Then it is time to set up certain criteria, and adapt every occasion to its principles. But once a "do" or a "don't" has been decided upon, carry it through.

Perhaps the following basic principles will help in formulating some of the standards that will meet your needs. First of all, since the "don'ts" are always with us, whether we like them or not, let us consider the negative aspect of the problem:

Don't try to keep a small child absolutely quiet for both the Sabbath school hour and the church service. If your church has a cradle roll, your child should be enrolled as early as possible. Do not wait until he is a year or two old. Our cradle roll leaders have planned their service to be interest-

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ing for these little ones, and if rightly conducted, from the earliest months a youngster will look forward to attending his Sabbath school.

Some mothers keep their babies with them until they are nearly ready for kindergarten. But we should remember that children learn by feelings and imitation long before they understand words, and they need to be near other children in Sabbath school in order to see and imitate them. Again, if the mother keeps the child with her in the senior division during Sabbath school it makes it doubly hard for the parents to help the little one be quiet during the following hour. Sometimes a mother must stay with her very young child in the cradle roll for the first several weeks, but the sacrifice is worth while, for the child thus becomes attached to the Sabbath school.

In some small Sabbath schools the cradle roll and kindergarten are combined. The division leaders should encourage the mother to bring her child to Sabbath school as soon as possible. The child may be allowed to sit on the mother's lap and watch the other children as they participate, and sometimes actually hold a bell, or participate in an activity of which he is physically and mentally capable.

Don't forget that unless the child is taken to the rest-room between services very likely he will demand to be taken out during the church hour. A child will soon learn that he is not allowed to get into the habit of being taken to the restroom once or twice during the church hour, if the parents take the initiative and plan ahead of time. When he is taken to the restroom between services, he should be told that he is not to

ask to go during the second service.

Don't neglect to take your wiggly and restless child out into the fresh air for a moment after Sabbath school, and perhaps even walk around the block with him. This little precaution will often enable him to be quieter during church.

Don't take a very young child, or one that tends to be restless, to the front of the church. Most churches that do not have mothers' rooms reserve the back pews for mothers with small children. If you have a choice of seats, select one near an aisle, and one that will separate your child from others by at least one or two seats.

However, as soon as your child is old enough so you know he will not break into sudden crying, and he is well into the habit of being quiet and reverent, it is time for you to leave the back seats for latecomers and mothers with smaller children, or little ones less responsive than yours. Away from the back of the church there will be fewer distractions for both you and your children.

Don't get into the habit of allowing your children to sit with their friends. Until a child has developed the responsibility of being reverent and quiet himself, you are placing temptation before him. Even juniors are not able to resist the temptation to whisper, giggle, and play when they are clustered together.

The positive side of developing a spirit of reverence and quietness within the hearts of the children often takes a bit of strategic planning. Here are some suggestions: Do teach your child the differ-

Do teach your child the difference between a monotone and a whisper. This is is harder than it sounds, but the earlier it is learned, the fewer will be your problems.

Do teach your children to kneel with the rest of the congregation during prayer, to stand when the hymn is sung, and participate in the offering. These little breaks serve a double purpose. They teach the child the procedure of religious worship, and also give him a chance to stand and stretch a bit, to change his position. If you call attention to the offering just as the ushers stand to receive it, this part of the service will occupy him for several minutes. He will eagerly clutch his offering in his dimpled hand, tensely awaiting the moment when the plate reaches him. Afterward he will likely watch until the ushers have finished.

Now just a word about children dropping their offerings. At first,

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give the child the coin just a moment or two before the plate arrives. As he gets older give it to him as the ushers take their place, with a warning that if he drops it we shall take it away. By the time this happens once the child knows we mean what we say, and strangely, the coin does not drop any more. Until a child is beyond the five-year-old stage, it is well not to give him more than one coin at a time for invariabley one or both drop with a clatter to the floor.

Do have something for your small children to occupy themselves with during the church hour. This will take planning and preparation on your part, but it will pay dividends in far greater proportion than the time and effort expended. Adapted from **Review and Herald**. April 14, 1960

With a very short time after its birth six month ago, our Malay Health Course became the topic of the day among the Malay community. The good wind carried the good news speedily to Malaya, Brunei, Singapore, Sarawak, and North Borneo. Applications came in so rapidly that within three months we had to curb enrollments for lack of funds.

Congratulations poured in from students, teachers, school principals, business-men, and clerks. The most encouraging of all is a letter from the office of the Ministry of Health in one of the above mentioned countries; "Considering the immense amount of expense you need in fostering your noble aim, why then not let the Ministry run the School."

A college principal says, "Pandu Kesehatan (Guide to Health) brings youth back to the aged, and life to the lifeless."

An elderly clerk writes, "Our once wretched home is now a little heaven after we let Pandu Kesehatan guide our lives. The money which otherwise would be wasted on tobacco and alcohol, can now be used to foster better education for our children."

"The nobility of your work surpasses all claims of those who profess to work for the good of the people." writes a Haji (Muslim priest).

Of the 312 graduates from the health course to date, 248 are now active in the Malay Bible Course. Truly the health message is proving to be the right arm, opening doors to the Message of the Three Angels. Pray that funds and workers may be found so that the work will expand.
