Years of Progress

Another year's records have been made up and at the same time we have come to the end of a quadrennial period.

Four years have slipped by since the last General Conference session. It hardly seems possible. But 1954 is here. The speeding months have been fraught with far-reaching events and incomparable possibilities for achievement in world evangelism. Above all, and most important, these years have brought us nearer to the great day of our Lord. Surely there can be no doubt now that « our redemption draweth nigh. »

These years of uncertainty and difficulty have revealed a throb of devotion and energy in thousands of hearts in Southern Europe. A thrilling advance has been made. A representative of the Catholic church, in an official statement, calls it « Astounding Progress. » The official reports for 1949-1953 show that 32,941 members were added to the church through baptism and on profession of faith. The church membership stood on December 31, 1953, at 94,700. This means that the Division as a whole, despite four years of East-West separation, made a net gain in baptized membership of nearly 50%. One of our fields, the Angola Union, in its first four years with Southern Europe, did a little better than to double its baptized membership.

The total result is only half way along the road marked out four years ago by the president of the General Conference. However, a lack of access to large sections of the Division field has been a crippling handicap. Our reports are only partial. I suppose the pages of eternity alone will tell the full story. Possibly only then will the leaders of some lands be able to join in the great chorus of praise to God for the exploits of His grace. However, great things have been done and yet greater things are in the offing.

The momentous events of today and the conviction that the end of all things is near at hand have instilled in Southern Europe the high resolve to do quickly the work of God and to attain a baptized membership of 100,000 in the very near future. This is possible with God's blessing. Our Sabbath schools already have a membership beyond 115,000. A large Sabbath school means large baptismal classes. Every department has yoked its forces in a program of integrated evangelism, so that many souls may be saved quickly for the Kingdom.

As I write, hundreds of workers and laymen are engaged in evangelistic efforts. We pray for them and join them in heart and hand. Let us make the message ring out week after week in

"Tarry Ye" *

Text: «But they constrained Him, saying, Abide with us: for it is toward evening, and the day is far spent. And He went in to tarry with them... But tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem until ye be endued with power from on high. » Luke 24: 29, 49.

«I wish to study with you this morning the most important thing that this Council ought to think about. I believe it is our greatest need as individual members. of the Adventist family, and surely it is the greatest need of the church in all the world. I have in mind the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. For a long time we have been preaching and talking about the day when the Holy Spirit would be poured out in all His power and we would-see a great awakening; when the Holy Spirit would take possession of men and women; when the Loud Cry of the Third Angel's Message would be heard. I wish to raise a few questions this morning: why have we waited so long for this outpouring? Why hasn't the Holy Spirit come upon the Church in all His power? Another question is this: Is there anything we as individuals or as a group can do to hasten the time when the Holy Spirit will be poured out in all His power?

« The message I wish to bring to you this morning is: there is no substitute in all the world for the power and influence of the Holy Spirit. No intellectual preparation, no social culture, no natural ability that we may possess will take the place of the Holy Spirit. All those things are good and necessary, but, brethren and sisters, if we depend solely on education and on culture and on acquired ability, we are going to delay the outpouring of the Spirit of God in all His power. More than this: there is no activity in service, no devotion of our duty to the Church that can meet the need in the life of the individual church member of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

There are many things we discuss in councils like this to improve our plans, our departments. But what we need is not better plans. We need better men and women executing those plans. And there is only one way I know of to become better: to seek God in prayer and plead with Him for the outpouring of His Holy Spirit.

«I may not look at the outpouring of the Holy Spirit in the right way. I may not look at it as you do. But as I study the Bible and the Spirit of prophecy, I find this outpouring of God's Spirit will not be a mass movement. It is a personal matter. It ought to start with the workers, and then we ought to lead our churches into a closer fellowship with Jesus. When we as workers are filled with the Spirit of God and can lead our churches to that state, then we shall see what we have all been praying for - a great movement in the world and the work of God closed up quickly. There is only one way to go out and save lost men and women: to go out in the power of the Holy Spirit. 'The preaching of the Word will be of no avail without the continual presence and aid of the Holy Spirit.' - Desire of Ages, p. 671. This is the only effectual teacher of divine truth. It is the only teacher. Again: 'No amount of education, no advantages,

however great, can make one a channel of light without the co-operation of the Spirit of God. — *Idem*, p. 672. The Bible and the Spirit of prophecy have made very clear the course of Seventh-day Adventist workers.

« When the Holy Spirit comes in as it should, then we as leaders will be willing to make any sacrifice. that God calls for. Anything. It means going all the way. It means clearing the King's highway. It may mean that some of us will have to make some things right. It may be that we have not dealt justly with our people in the churches and we may have to straighten some of those things out. Let us be men of God and do it. Clear the King's highway and then let us rededicate ourselves for service. If we will do that here at this meeting, this Council, then we shall see a great inflowing of the church next year. We are promised that. 'Ask ye of the Lord rain in the time of the latter rain; so the Lord shall make bright clouds, and give them showers of rain, to every one grass in the field.' - Zach. 10:1. That is a promise. Let us claim the promise at this meeting, and let us go out from this Council with a new determination to do a greater work for the Lord.

« Listen: 'When we bring our hearts into unity with Christ, and our lives into harmony with His work, the Spirit that fell on the disciples on the day of Pentecost will fall on us.' — Testimonies, Vol. 8, p. 246. That is just as plain and as clear as it could be written. We want the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. We have prayed for it. If we bring our hearts into unity with Christ and our lives into harmony with His work, then we have the definite promise that the Spirit that fell on the day of Pentecost will fail on us. May we claim that promise at this time.

c'Let Christians put away all dissension, and give themselves to God for the saving of the lost. Let them ask in faith for the promised blessing, and it will come.' — Testimonies, Vol. 8, p. 21. Brethren and sisters if we go away from this Council weak men and weak women, it is our own fault. The promise is there. Let us bring our lives into conformity with the message and the promise is sure.

« 'I saw that none could share the « refreshing » unless they obtain the victory over every besetment, over pride, selfishness, love of the world, and over every wrong word and action.' - Early Writings, p. 71. 'By prayer and confession of sin we must clear the King's highway. As we do this, the power of the Spirit will come to us. We need the pentecostal energy.' - Gospel Workers, p. 308. And brethren we do need it. It is our greatest need. You need money, you need more workers, but brethren this is our greatest need: a greater power, a greater infilling of the Holy Spirit. Personally I am convinced that we have almost reached the limit of our appropriations from the General Conference. But that should not discourage us at all, because the Lord has a thousand ways of finishing His work that we know nothing about. I believe, too, that if we would pray God to show us one or two of those ways during this

Council, we would see great progress in this Division. 'We need the pentecostal energy. This will come; for the Lord has promised to send His Spirit as the all-conquering power.' — *Idem*, p. 308.

a When the leadership, the ministers and workers in God's cause bring their lives into conformity to the life of Christ, when we study His Word and when we seek Him in prayer and daily work to clear the King's highway, then brethren we are going to be new men and new women in Christ Jesus, and we are going out to do a mighty work for God. The only way we are ever going to do the work the Lord has called us to do is for a new consecration to come into the

hearts and lives of the men and women preaching this message. When we have that personal experience, then the Lord will multiply our efforts and He will finish the work through frail human beings. Oh, I want that energizing power of the Holy Spirit in my life. I want to clear the King's highway; and my prayer this morning is that it may be the experience of every worker here in the Southern European Division: that God will take this little group of workers and multiply their energy and their efforts. 'Tarry ye here until ye receive power from on high.'>

Our 1953 Division Council

Almost three months have passed since the seventy-eight delegates to the 1953 Division Annual Council met in our Lausanne chapel from December 9-15. This meeting was in many respects one of the most important and profitable that we have ever held. From some parts of the field unfortunately no representatives could be present. Before the regular Annual Council, a precouncil was organized by the Educational and Religious Liberty Departments of the Division.

Once again we were favored in having three representatives from our headquarters in Washington, D. C. with us during the Council: R. R. Figuhr, vice-president of the General Conference; C. W. Bozarth, assistant treasurer; and E. E. Cossentine, secretary of the Educational Department. Their daily studies were a source of much encouragement and spiritual help to everyone in attendance, and the wise counsel they gave during the business sessions was highly appreciated.

W. R. Beach, the Division president, gave his inspiring report during the opening meeting. His remarks were based on the parable of the mustard seed, and he compared the present status of our field to that of 1929 when the Southern European Division was organized. At that time we had only 16,511 members. Today the 95,000 mark has been almost reached. Since 1946 the membership of the Division has more than doubled. Tithes and offerings have also increased during the year 1953, which is a proof of the fidelity and spirit of sacrifice of our members everywhere

A new hall and evangelistic center has been inaugurated in Le Hâvre, North France. A second evangelistic center and conference office building is under construction in Salzburg, Austria, as well as a chapel in Villach, Austria.

A nice school property has been purchased at Setubal, Portugal, and in the French Cameroun fifty hectares of ground are ready for the installation of the new seminary with a house for European and native teachers, a dispensary and dormitories for the boys.

The Gland sanitarium is being enlarged so that one hundred beds may be available.

The Lique Vie et Santé, is developing into an important channel of light and influence.

With the help of God the closed churches in Italy were re-opened last year,

In his closing remarks Elder Beach sounded the spiritual program for the coming year. 1954 should be above all else a year of sanctification of the whole church. Then the word SOULS should be adopted by every field as the watchword for all forces whether they be purely evangelical, administrative or institutional, so that by co-ordinated efforts greater results may be obtained. Finally our president made the suggestion of adding 6,000 members more during the first part of 1954, so that at the time of the General

Conference session in San Francisco, the 100,000 mark will have been reached for the Division.

The secretary's report showed that during the first nine months of 1953, 6,748 members were baptized. A goodly number of missionary families and single workers left Southern Europe during 1953 for Africa and the islands of the Atlantic, Indian and Pacific Oceans. The complete list of these missionary sailings appears on page 11 of this number.

The treasurer also presented a very good report which was unanimously adopted.

As evangelism always holds the first place in our Division activities, a new call to evangelism was sounded from this Council to all parts of the field. We consider this resolution of sufficient importance to be printed here in full.

EVANGELISM FOR WINTER AND SPRING OF 1953 AND 1954

WHEREAS, There is need for frequent short revival and evangelistic efforts to be held in all our churches, and

WHEREAS, Such combined short revival and evangelistic efforts are a mighty factor in establishing our members in the faith as well as in leading many to a definite decision who have been on the verge of the kingdom but who have not taken a definite stand for Christ, and

WHEREAS, Through this means many backsliders are reclaimed and hundreds of children of Adventists are gathered into the churches,

Be it resolved, 1. That during the coming winter and spring a supreme effort be made to conduct revival and evangelistic meetings of some seven to ten days' duration in every Seventh-day Adventist church throughout the world, in a mighty effort to gather as many as possible into the church during this period.

- 2. That as far as possible these meetings he launched on Friday night, January 8, 1954, and that this work be carried torward until every church is reached.
- 3. That wherever possible, church officers and qualified laymen be associated with the ministry to assist in home visitation, Bible work, etc.
- 4. That where churches are located in remote places making it impossible for a minister lo visit during this period, consecrated laymen from larger churches he requested to go two and two to conduct such meetings.
- 5. That an effort be made to conduct a baptismal service in every church before the close of the meetings.
- 6. That offerings be taken in the respective churches to defray the expense of these special meetings as far as possible.

- 8. That our entire office force in the respective fields, and as far as possible institutional workers, be urged to join our pastors, evangelists and laymen in conducting these meetings.
- 9. That public efforts be conducted wherever possible in every district during the winter and spring preceding the General Conference session, as may be arranged by the respective committees involved.
- 10. That we set a goal of gathering 6,000 new members into our churches throughout the Southern European Division during the period between January 1, 1954 and May 1, 1954.

Be it further resolved, That beginning with the first Sunday in January, 1954, a supreme endeavor be made to have an evangelistic sermon preached in every Seventh-day Adventist church throughout our Division where it is possible to hold public meetings and on every Sunday night thereafter.

Very interesting reports were given by the department secretaries of the Division, all stressing progress and the winning of souls.

A message was sent to our workers and believers as well as one to our valiant missionaries in the faraway fields, setting forth the beautiful ideals and standards committed to us by God, and expressing our sincere appreciation of the faithfulness and self-sacrifice of our ministry, laity and missionaries in Africa and the islands of the sea.

It may be that 1954 will be a year of trial and anxiety in some of our fields, but we know that it will also be a year of triumph and glorious victory as every worker and church member stands at his post of duty with deeper and truer consecration. The call has been sounded to advance. Let us then with the help of the Lord go forward in the power of the Spirit, in faith, and with new courage until all the work is done and the kingdom of God ushered in.

A Blessed Ministry

The Adventist message is now sounding over the waves of forty-five broadcasting stations in the different countries of the Southern European Division. Since the Bible correspondence course was launched in our territory, a little over 66,000 students have been enrolled in the 19 courses organized in 8 languages: French, German, Italian, Dutch, Spanish, Portuguese, Greek, and Malagasy. During this same period about 6,000 diplomas have been distributed to persons having completed the lessons, and the number of baptisms has exceeded 800.

Cheering reports continue to come to us from every field in the Division. Here, however, I shall mention only one: the great island of Madagascar. On December 2, 1953, Elder Girard, president of the Indian Ocean Union Mission, wrote as follows: « Last week a native Protestant teacher made a trip from Mananakara, 300 kilometers from the capital city of Tananarive, for the express purpose of asking me to send one of our evangelists to this little lown where fifteen persons are following the Bible correspondence course lessons. These persons would like to become members of our church and are asking us to organize a group in their locality. Similar requests are coming to us from every corner of the island. Even here in Tananarive the workers cannot find time to visit all the persons found through the radio broadcasts of La Voix de L'Espérance (The Voice of Hope).

But it is especially in the south of the island that a mighty interest is being manifested. H. Salzman, our European missionary in the south, is at present at Tuléar, an important center, where the people are asking us to begin evangelistic work. It is urgent that we have a missionary in this territory if we do not wish to lose the wonderful opportunities that these new openings offer us. If it were possible to send a missionary to that section, I am convinced that many groups could be organized rapidly, there where we have no work for the present. I pray that for the advancement of the work in Madagascar our request will be granted.

One of our good native evangelists, Brother Raminason, tells of a man who on three consecutive Sabbaths attended the services in our church at Antsirabé. The fourth Sabbath our minister went to him to ask some questions. His surprise and joy were great when he learned that this gentleman had taken the decision to follow the Bible principles which had been revealed to him by the Bible correspondence course of the Voice of Hope. This gentleman is now preparing for baptism. He has created a fine interest in his village where four of his friends are studying the Word of God regularly under his guidance. His wife, whom he has won to the message, attends the Sabbath services with two of her lady friends.

We have every reason to believe in the efficiency of the blessed ministry of the Voice of Hope. In a tormented world, where a growing sense of uncertainty is gripping the hearts of men, our radio program and the Bible correspondence courses are elevating the Christian faith and pointing men and women to the way of peace and hope. The radio work presents limitless possibilities of growth, and we are persuaded

This work is pleasing to the Lord, and on more than one occasion we have seen Him manifest His miraculous power in behalf of our church members.

Here is one most extraordinary incident: In one of the Balkan countries a sister was living alone in her village, doing her best to let her light shine through

The Church is not only the bride and body of , her friendly attitude and loyalty to her Lord. But nothing seemed able to break down the hostility and indifference of the villagers.

> This sister made a scanty living by tilling a little. garden plot. One day a neighbor woman entered her home with this abrupt greeting: « Now I know that you are a witch. » « What makes you think so? » quietly answered our sister. For a long time we have been watching the rich crops you get from your garden. You always raise the very best vegetables, even when others have nothing or their gardens are eaten up by insects. This morning when I saw your beautiful garden I gathered up a large box of caterpillars and threw them over the hedge into your garden. What do you think I saw? Those caterpillars crawling back into my garden as quickly as they could. Now I know you are a witch. » Our sister answered, « I am not a witch. But I am a child of God; and I can read the secret to you from the Bible, and opening God's Book she read the wonderful promises found in the third chapter of Malachi lo those who are faithful in tithes and offerings.

> As the neighbor woman listened with wondering awe her heart was touched, and for the first time she was willing to accept our sister's message. She decided right there to study the Bible and to pay tithe to the Lord. She and several other neighbors are now preparing for baptism, and there is a growing interest in this village.

The evening of December 30 we were shocked to learn of the sudden death, due to a heart attack, of Louis Vez whose name has been closely connected with the school life of our French seminary for so many years. In fact before he retired some two years ago, Brother Vez had been in charge of the garden of the institution since its foundation in 1921. Under his talented care year after year, the brushwood on the school grounds was transformed into a beautiful park. The muddy paths were replaced by well-built lanes bordered with rocks and flowers. Everyone who visited the seminary during the summer months could not but admire the beautiful adornment of flowers. Brother Vez believed in letting flowers give their lovely message of joy and friendliness during life and not only at the time of death. Several times in the course of Brother Vez's service, the school gardens received a prize from the Department of Agriculture. To the whole Adventist and non-Adventist community, Brother Vez was known not only as an expert gardener, but also as a true Christian, a peace-lover, a man of great kindness and friendliness, always ready to render a service to anyone whom he could help.

Standing by his open grave at the time of his burtal, the mayor of the Collonges village spoke these touching words of esteem and sympathy: « It all men had resembled him, we would have peace in the world today. Work was his life. If the seminary possesses a beautiful park and garden, it is because of him. We have always admired the good taste with which he beautified the grounds of your school.»

Brother Vez rests from his labors until the glad resurrection morning, but the slopes of the Salève surrounding the buildings of our seminary, adorned with graceful trees, shrubs and flowers planted by his hands, will stand as a living monument to his life of devoted service until his Master appears in the clouds of heaven. To his bereaved family we here renew the expression of our deepest Christian sympathy.
