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"THE connection of the visible with the invisible world, the ministration of angels of God, and the agency of evil spirits, are plainly revealed in the Scriptures, and inseparably interwoven with human history.

"We are informed in Scripture as to the number, and the power and glory, of the heavenly beings, of their connection with the government of God, and also of their relation to the work of redemption. Says the prophet, 'I heard the voice of many angels round about the throne,' In the presence-chamber of the King of kings they wait-'angels that excel in strength,' 'ministers of His, that do His pleasure,' 'hearkening unto the voice of His Word.' Ten thousand times ten thousand and thousands of thousands, were the heavenly messengers beheld by the prophet Daniel. The Apostle Paul declared them 'an innumerable company.' As God's messengers they go forth, like 'the appearance of a flash of lightning,' so dazzling their glory, and so swift their flight.

Who Are the Angels?

THERE is real help and comfort, assurance and encouragement, for every soul, in the Scriptural doctrine of angels. Angels are mentioned two hundred and eighty-five times in the Bible from Genesis to Revelation. Hence this is one of those important truths that every Christian needs to understand and accept.

Angels are not the spirits of the departed righteous dead. The angels were in existence before the first person ever died. The idea quite generally prevails that every good person who dies becomes an angel. Many a mother has sung her little babe to sleep with the nursery rhyme,

"Hush, hush, little baby, don't you cry; You'll be an angel by and by."

This sounds well, and rhymes nicely, but it is not according to the Scriptures of truth. Anybody can see with just a moment's thought, that if the angels are the spirits of the departed righteous dead, there would not and could not have been any angels in existence till the first good person died. But the Word of God shows that the angels were in existence before anybody died. In the very beginning, when the first man, Adam, and the first woman, Eve, were expelled from the garden of Eden because of disobedience, angels from one of those angelic orders known as "cherubim" were stationed at the east of the garden of Eden to guard the way of the tree of life.

Thus it is written: "Therefore the Lord God sent him forth from the garden of Eden, to till the ground from whence he was taken. So He drove out the man; and He placed at the east of the garden of Eden cherubim, and a flaming sword which

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turned every way, to keep the way of the tree of life." Gen. 3: 23, 24.

Scripture shows that the angels were in existence even before this world was made and the first man was brought into existence. In speaking of the creation of man, the Psalmist says: "Thou hast made him a little lower than the angels." Ps. 8: 5. This shows that the angels were in existence before Adam, the first man, was created, and that the angels are a different order of beings from man. No human being ever has become an angel, and none ever will. In Luke 20: 35, 36, Jesus tells us that when the redeemed of earth are taken to heaven at the resurrection day, they will be made equal unto the angels, in that they will never die any more, but He does not say that they will be angels, or that they will take the place of angels.

We learn in Job 38: 3-7 that the angels were present at the creation of this world. When the Creator laid the foundations of the earth, and fitted up this planet as a habitation for man, "the morning stars sang together, and all the sons of God shouted for joy." In the symbolism of the Bible, angels are often referred to as stars. Even today people speak of outstanding personages as stars. When the angels saw that mighty exhibition of God's wisdom, love, and power in the creation of this world, their hearts burst forth in an adoring song of praise to their Creator. "The morning stars sang together, and all the sons of God shouted for joy.'

ORIGIN OF THE ANGELS

Some will ask, "If angels are not the spirits of the departed righteous dead, where did the angels come from?" Our answer is that the Bible shows that the angels are an order of created beings created by Christ, the eternal Son of God, before He made this world and placed the first man in it. The Apostle Paul, in speaking directly of Christ as the One "in whom we have redemption through His blood, even the forgiveness of sins," declares, "By Him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible." Col. 1: 14-16.

In speaking of Lucifer, who prior to his rebellion was one of the highest of the angels, one of the covering cherubs of the throne of the Almighty, the Lord declared: "Thou wast perfect in thy ways from the day that thou wast created, till iniquity was found in thee." Eze. 28: 15. Note that Lucifer was created by the Lord. As with Lucifer, so with all the rest of the angels. They were brought into existence by creation at the word of God.



ANGELS REAL BEINGS

ANGELS are called spirits (Heb. 1: 7), but that does not mean that they are disembodied creatures without form or parts, but rather that they are spiritual beings. They have spiritual bodies. Paul tells us that there is a natural body and a spiritual body. 1 Cor. 15: 44. We who live in this present world have natural bodies. The angels have spiritual bodies. All the human family who are finally saved will be made equal to the angels, in that they will be given spiritual bodies at the resurrection day.

While this spiritual body is of an infinitely higher order than our present natural bodies, yet it is as real a body as the one we have now. Angels are not disembodied spirits, or incorporeal phantoms. They are not imaginary beings like fairies. Angels do not consist of beautiful thoughts. They are real tangible beings—just as real as any man or woman who walks the earth today.

In Gen. 18: 1-8 and 19: 1-3, is recorded the visit of two certain angels to Abraham in his tent on the plains of Mamre, and later to Lot in his work at Sodom. The record shows that these angels were as real as any person who has ever come to your house to eat dinner with you. In the case of Abraham, the angels washed their feet and then ate a dinner of roast veal, corn bread, butter, and milk. We may be certain that anyone who can sit down at our dinner table and eat yeal and corn bread and drink milk is not some imaginary spirit, or phantom, or merely a happy passing thought, but on the contrary he must be as real a being as we are. In talking about the cherub angels, the Scripture speaks of "their whole body, and their backs, and their hands, and their wings." Eze. 10: 12. This proves that angels have real bodies.

Some will say, "If the angels have real bodies, and they still come to this world as in Bible times, why don't we see them or hear them?" It is because they have power to make themselves visible and invisible at will. Num. 22: 22-31.

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MODERN SCIENCE

SINCE modern science is now daily accomplishing miracles, things that were considered impossible fifty years ago, it is really unwise for any man to rule out as impossible the existence of millions of angels in the unseen realms of the spirit world, or the many other supernatural things of which the Bible speaks, merely because those things strain his imagination or are beyond the power of his natural eyesight.

The scientist tells me that the head of a common pin is a universe, and that inside it millions of atoms move in regular cycles, like the planets in our solar system. Some scientists claim that it would take 25,000 years to count the atoms in the head of a pin. To me that is inconceivable; it transcends the powers of my imagination. But we do not reject the scientist's statement as untrue merely because we find great difficulty in imagining it.

We do not deny that the air all around us is filled with music, even though our ears cannot hear it without the aid of a radio set. We do not deny that there are countless red corpuscles in a tiny speck of blood the size of a pinhead, even though our eye cannot see them without the aid of a microscope. We do not deny that the stars of heaven are innumerable, merely because without a telescope our unassisted eye can see only a few thousand. On the same basis, no man ought to attempt to rule out as impossible the existence of angels, or the many other supernatural things of the Bible, merely because they appear impossible or are beyond the power of his natural eyesight.

You cannot be guided altogether by the appearances of things in this world. You dip water from a brook and remark how clear it is. You observe the bark of a tree and think it smooth. Yet a powerful microscope shows that each drop of water is swarming with animal life in a jungle of vegetation, and it reveals mountains and valleys on the smoothest bark.

While you are reading this article you may think you are sitting still, but in reality you are travelling at the rate of hundreds of miles a minute. The earth rotates at the rate of twenty miles a minute. It revolves around the sun at the rate of 1,140 miles a minute. Our solar system is travelling toward the constellation Lyra at the rate of 720 miles a minute.

THE UNSEEN WORLD

IF the limitations imposed upon our eyes in these natural bodies could be removed, and the curtain drawn back, we would see Jacob's dream of



the bright, shining ladder of ascending and descending angels as something that is going on every day. The angels of God are the connecting link between the visible and invisible worlds. Angels are ascending to present the cries of God's needy children to the great Father above, and other angels are descending with help, hope, and comfort from our Father to those who put their trust in Him.

When God opened the young man's eyes, as recorded in 2 Kings 6: 15-17, he was able to see the angels who were guarding him and Elisha. But the angels were there before he was able to see them. They were present when he could not see them, just the same as when he was given additional seeing power to behold them in all their glory.

Angels with their spiritual bodies have powers that far exceed anything that man can even think of doing. In Rev. 18: 21 an angel had power to pick up a mighty millstone and hurl it into the sea as a boy would hurl a small pebble. Probably a half dozen men could not have moved that millstone even a foot, to say nothing of tossing it about.

Men have dreamed of death rays to slay thousands in an instant, but in Isa. 37: 36 we learn that one angel had power to breathe death to 186,-000 Assyrian soldiers in one night.

Angels have power to move faster than the lightning (Eze. 1: 14), which travels at the speed of 186,000 miles a second, or eleven million miles a minute. Such are some of the powers of these angels that excel in strength, who have been assigned by our Father to watch over His children, to minister to their needs, and to defend them from the adversary.

But while one angel can do so much for weak human beings, God is not limited by what one angel can do. Myriads wait to do His bidding. Daniel in vision saw the throne, with the Ancient of Days seated upon it. And he adds, "Thousand thousands ministered unto Him, and ten thousand times ten thousand stood before Him." Dan, 7: 10. And John in the Revelation tells us, "I beheld, and I heard the voice of many angels round about the throne: . . . and the number of them was ten thousand times ten thousand, and thousands of thousands." Rev. 5: 11.

And this immense throng of heavenly beings is intensely interested in the welfare of the dwellers on this earth. Many of them have been assigned responsibilities in connection with human beings, and they wait to carry out the Lord's wishes in regard to this earth. May they ever be our helpers, and not the emissaries of punishment for an offended God in our case.



When War Was Near

HERE in Australia and New Zealand we live far removed by broad, rolling seas and wide continents from the scenes of momentous happenings in Europe. We read the news day by day in the local newspapers, but it is often necessary to read the newspapers published abroad to be brought, as it were, a little closer to the throbbing pulse of life in Europe.

In one of the English weekly papers we read the following concerning the anxious days when England was preparing for the threatened war, which happily was averted:—

"Already we have had some memorable days. It was with astound indeed that one heard the public crier in a quiet square summoning the householders to set out at once and have themselves measured for their gas-masks!

"It was a moving thing to see men making deep furrows in our lovely London parks, where on any fine afternoon of the year the children from the poorest parts of the city play without restriction, as though these lovely fields and flowers were their own-as indeed they are.

"Most affecting, however, to ourselves it was to stand in a long queue with others waiting to be measured for our gas-masks. There they were, old men and women, husbands and wives, who had survived the earlier war, bestirring themselves to do what the authorities asked them to do.

"The quite obvious good feeling of the younger people to such elderly ones; the quiet behaviour of younger couples, waiting arm in arm, not without a certain moisture in their eyes, which, if they had spoken, might have overflowed; the quick and dainty young girls on their way back from business; the young men glad almost of the opportunity to show by small acts of assistance or concession, that gallantry might be a deeper thing than they had supposed: these were amongst the impressions and incidents which disposed an observer to lift up his heart or to let it down in sudden grief."

These words help to make more realistic to us the experience of Lon-

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doners during the trying and anxious days mentioned. It is indeed a mercy that war was restrained. Had it occurred, Great Britain and the Empire would now be engulfed in a struggle for very life—in a life-anddeath grapple that would be threatening civilization itself. Had war occurred, the lives of hundreds of thousands of people now living would have been lost, and leading towns of all the belligerent countries would have shown ghastly evidences of the deadly work of bombs.

The tragic and sorrowful scenes that always follow on the outbreak of war have perhaps never been more rhetorically and touchingly described than by an American orator, in speaking of his own country's terrible Civil War in the early sixties of last century. Speaking of the recruits as they left their homes and loved ones for the grim and dreadful scenes of the battlefield, he said:—

"We see them part with those they love. Some are walking for the last time in quiet woody places with the maidens they adore. We hear the whisperings and the sweet vows of eternal love as they lingeringly part for ever. Others are bending over cradles, kissing babes that are asleep. Some are receiving the blessings of Some are parting with old men. mothers, who hold them and press them to their hearts again and again, and say nothing; and some are talking with wives, and endeavouring with brave words spoken in the old tones to drive from the hearts the awful fear. We see them part. We see the wife standing in the door with the babe in her arms-standing in the sunlight sobbing; at the turn of the road a hand waves; she answers by holding high in her loving hands the child. He is gone, and for ever."

Thank God that His beautiful plans for man envisage and provide for a kingdom in which war's alarms will never come. In the plans of the Almighty Father, who rules the universe, this sin-cursed and warstricken world is finally to be made new, and made the home of God's people for ever. More than one scripture tells us of the new earth, which God will eventually bring into being when sin and sinners are no more. See 2 Peter 3: 13; Revelation 21.

The root cause of war lies in sin —in the sinful nature of the human heart. Did the human race the world over yield itself to the Christ, to love Him and to serve Him, the danger of war would be completely removed. In the happy earth made new, where the righteous will dwell, there will be no sin, no pain, no parting, no sorrow, and no more death—and, praise God, there will be no more war! K.

ANOTHER ROYAL GOVERNOR

ANOTHER royal Governor has been appointed to rule this world, and soon He will be coming to take office. How the thought should thrill our hearts with pride and joy! For the coming Prince is none other than the Prince of heaven, the Son of God.

That appointment was made long centuries ago; it was made when this world cast off the dominion of God, and rebelled against His wise and kindly rule. The purpose of the appointment is to link earth to heaven by a tie so strong that it can never be broken.

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As was to be expected, the false ruler, the one who had usurped the throne, did all in his power to thwart the plans of the Deliverer. Constantly that humble life, moving about the dusty pathways of Palestine, and spreading wherever It went the fragrance of loving-kindness and gracious service, was beset by fierce temptations and bitter trials.

At last when the hour of the power of darkness had come, the strong Son of God, in the lowly garment of humanity, was captured, and subjected to such cruelties and indignities as only devils could devise. Then He was crucified, bearing all the odium of the lowest of criminals.

But this very act, the crucifying of the Son of God, which seemed to mark the defeat of the principles of righteousness, and the triumph of evil, was in reality the reverse. In the words of Francis Thompson:—

- "'Twas on a day of rout they girded Me about,
 - They wounded all My brow, and they smote Me through the side:
- My hand held no sword when I met their armèd horde,
 - And the conqueror fell down, and the Conquered bruised his pride.
- "What is this, unheard before, that the Unarmed make war,
 - And the Slain hath the gain, and the victor hath the rout?
- What wars, then, are these, and what the enemies,
 - Strange Chiei, with the scars of Thy conquest trenched about?"

The conquest of Christ was something foreign to human experience. Never before had the Slain had the gain, and the victor had the rout. But by treating the Son of God with such fiendish cruelty, when He had showed nothing but love and pity for all, the devil overstepped himself, and revealed his true spirit. Never again would the watching universe believe his lies.

Again, it was by His death that Christ paid the ransom price for humanity. He tasted death for every man, and henceforth all who would receive Him could have His death counted for theirs, and claim the promise of eternal life.

It was by coming the first time as a little babe, and going the way of poverty, humiliation, and death, that Christ prepared the way to come again in triumph and glory to rule over His everlasting kingdom.

"UNTO US A CHILD IS BORN"

THE government was finally to be given to the Son who should be born to the human family: "For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given: and the government shall be upon His shoulders." Isa. 9: 6. He who came out of Bethlehem as a little babe was finally to bear rule: "But thou, Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall He come forth unto Me that is to be Ruler in Israel; whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting." Micah 5: 2. Of the Son who was to be born to Mary it was said: "He shall be great, and shall be called the Son of the Highest; and the Lord God shall give unto Him the throne of His father David: and He shall reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of His kingdom there shall be no end." Luke 1: 32, 33.

Yes, He who is coming to govern this poor old world is the Son of God, though He became the Son of man. Though linked to the human family by ties that shall never be brokenthe ties of human kinnship, and of divine love-the coming Governor is linked also to the throne of the universe.

THE SIGNS OF HIS COMING

HE is coming soon. All the signs that were promised to show when His coming was near are fast fulfilling. The selfishness and hatred of those who have rejected the rule of God are becoming more pronounced, and are giving rise to dreadful wars, which the increased knowledge that the prophecy said would characterize the "time of the end." has made more frightful than any known in previous ages. Selfishness and hate are being manifested, too, in the class tensions, the strife between capital and labour.

And another great sign is that the gospel of the kingdom is being preached in all the world for a witness. Christ will not come to establish His kingdom of peace until all have had an opportunity to accept or reject Him. The heathen strongholds, the habitations of cruelty, are being opened and enlightened by the entrance of the Word of God. Those who lived in fear and dread are rejoicing in the glad tidings of freedom, and are looking for the blessed hope of the returning Lord.

When the Son of God comes in His glory and power to receive His kingdom, He will find many who have waited for Him through suffering and hardship and persecution. They will immediately be delivered from those who hate them; "delivered from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God." Triumphant, immortal, and filled with everlasting joy, they will rise to meet their Lord in the air, ever to be with Him.

But there will be some who persist in their rebellion against God, who refuse all offers of eternal life, and who cling to sin in spite of all calls to forsake it. These must be destroyed

before the kingdom can be made safe and happy.

A sublime picture is given of the coming of the Son of God in power to receive His kingdom:-

'And I saw heaven opened, and behold a white horse; and He that sat upon him was called Faithful and True, and in righteousness doth He judge and make war.

"His eyes were as a flame of fire, and on His head were many crowns; and He had a name written, that no man knew, but He Himself.

"And He was clothed with a vesture dipped in blood; and His name is called The Word of God.

"And the armies which were in heaven followed Him upon white horses, clothed in fine linen, white and clean.

"And out of His mouth goeth a sharp sword, that with it He should smite the nations: and He shall rule them with a rod of iron: and He treadeth the winepress of the wrath of God.

"And He hath on His vesture and on His thigh a name written, KING OF KINGS, AND LORD OF LORDS." Rev. 19: 11-16.

We in Australia rejoice, and rightly, that a prince of the royal family is coming to be our Governor-General. But how much more should we rejoice to think that the Prince of heaven is coming soon to rule over His kingdom! His coming will mean peace and joy for His people; it will place them beyond sorrow, pain, suffering, and death. His reign will wipe sin and all its traces from the universe of God.

Should we not make suitable preparation to meet the coming Governor? For whether we meet Him in peace. and at His coming receive immortal life and everlasting joy, or whether we are ashamed at His coming, and receive the everlasting destruction that must be meted out to the devil and his angels, and to all who choose to follow him, depends entirely upon ourselves. God has set before us the way of life and the way of death; He does not force anyone, but calls upon us to "choose life." Can we refuse so great a gift? н.

Solomon, the wise man, said: "Say not, I will do so to him as he hath done to me: I will render to the man according to his work." Prov. 24: 29.

Jesus said: "Ye have heard that it hath been said, Thou shalt love thy neighbour, and hate thine enemy. But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you." Matt. 5: 43, 44.



★ FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT SPIRITISM CAN THE DEAD TALK WITH US?

T is a belief among many people that the souls of the dead are fluttering around in the air about us, and can communicate with the living through mediums. In all the islands of the South Seas, you will find natives believing in the spirits of the departed. The stories of the Indians of North America are full of tales about the spirits. The Indians of South America believe that the reason a dog howls at night is that he sees the spirit of some person who has just died, walking around. In India, the fakirs will tell you that their power for magic depends upon the spirits of the dead. While aboard an Oriental steamer, I saw a Chinese buried at sea. Into the water where the body was lowered, food was thrown. This was done that the spirit of the dead might have something to eat. The Japanese worship the spirits of their ancestors.

Spiritism, the belief that departed spirits communicate with men, is not a new religion, but one of the oldest religions in the world. Its beginning dates back to Adam and Eve. The serpent asked Eve, "Yea, hath God said, Ye shall not eat of every tree of the garden?" Eve replied: "We may eat of the fruit of the trees of the garden: but of the fruit of the tree which is in the midst of the garden, God hath said. Ye shall not eat of it, neither shall ye touch it, lest ye die." Gen. 3: 1-3. Who is this serpent? "The great dragon was cast out, that old serpent, called the devil, and Satan, which deceiveth the whole world." Rev. 12: 9. God said to the pair in the garden that in the day when they ate of the forbidden fruit they would surely die. The devil said, "Ye shall not surely die," and the world has been believing the devil's lie ever since.

SPIRITISM NO NEW THING

THE theme of the song, "There Is No Death," was composed by the great deceiver in the garden of Eden. The philosophy of natural immortality was taught by the pagan philosophers of Egypt and Greece. Thales, one of the seven Greek sages who lived six hundred years before Christ, dismissed the whole question of life and death by saying, "There

is no difference between life and death." Heraclitus, another pagan Greek philosopher, taught that man's divine being was bound up with the baser substance until death, and then set free.

Professor James H. Hyslop, formerly of Columbia University, became a great spiritist leader. In commenting upon the belief in the immortal soul, as taught by the pagan Greek philosophers, he admitted that it was "pure and unadulterated spiritualism even of the modern type"; also that the teachings are totally opposed to the Bible, and were probably arrived at through mediumship. Thus instead of the immortal-soul teaching coming from the Bible, it came from the séance room of spiritism.

Other spiritistic writers teach today exactly what the devil taught back Professor Alfred Wallace there. says: "'Ye shall not surely die.' It demonstrates as completely as the fact can be demonstrated that the so-called dead are still alive." But he took for his authority the lie of Satan. Emma Britten, another of these writers, says: "We found beyond a shadow of a doubt or peradventure that death had no power over the spirit, could never touch the soul, or destroy one attribute or property of the soul life. In a word, we found our so-called dead are all living, aye, and living so near to us that they breathe our very atmosphere, share our very thoughts."

BORN IN DECEPTION

Nor only did the devil introduce the idea of the survival of the soul after death, but in the garden of Eden he gave a demonstration of the first séance. Spiritists admit that the speaking of the serpent in that instance was a demonstration of a séance. I believe so, too. But who was the one who spoke? Some dead loved one? That could not have been, for nobody had ever died. It was the devil himself who spoke.

Is it at all possible for the dead to come back and speak and act as the spirits do in the séance? What does your Bible say? "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might; for there is no work, nor device, nor knowledge, nor wisdom, in the grave, whither thou goest." Eccl. 9: 10. The dead cannot act, think, or talk, the text says. "David slept with his fathers, and was buried in the city of David." I Kings 2: 10. Some would have us believe that David is still alive, but the Bible says that he is sleeping. Where does a man go when he dies? "Thou takest away their breath, they die, and re-turn to their dust." Ps. 104: 29. Man came from the dust, and he returns to the same place. How long will he stay in the dust? "The hour is coming, in the which all that are in the graves shall hear His voice, and shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil. unto the resurrection of damnation." John 5: 28, 29. Everyone will stay in the dust until Jesus comes back to this world, and then He will raise the righteous to life everlasting. The wicked will go to destruction. But isn't it just the body that rests in the grave, and not the soul? "God will redeem my soul from the power of the grave." Ps. 49: 15. So the grave also has power over the soul. Both soul and body rest in the grave during death. If anyone should have gone to heaven when he died, it certainly should have been David, for God called him a man after His own heart. But did David go to heaven when he died? Peter, while he was under the power of the Holy Spirit on the great day of pentecost, said, "David is not ascended into the heavens." Acts 2: 34. Thus the Bible is very clear that it cannot be the spirits of the dead that operate in spiritism.

AN INTELLIGENT PROMOTER

Some say that the good angels are the ones who operate in the séance room. I do not believe, friends, that a good angel would be a faker and purport to be the spirit of a dead loved one when he is not. I am also very sure that a good angel would never lie. There is only one class of beings these spirits could possibly be: they are the devil and the imps of hell. When the devil started the first séance, he found that it worked so charmingly to deceive people that he has kept it up to the present time.

Who is the devil? "There was war in heaven: Michael and His angels fought against the dragon; and the dragon fought and his angels, and prevailed not; neither was there place found any more in heaven. And the great dragon was cast out, that old serpent, called the devil, and Satan, which deceiveth the whole world: he was cast out into the earth, and his angels were cast out with him." Rev. 12: 7-9. Do we have any idea as to how many angels fell with him? "And his [the dragon's] tail drew the third part of the stars of heaven." Verse 4. The stars referred to are not the planets and the worlds that we see, for not one single planet of the starry heaven has ever fallen to this world; but the term "star" is used in the same way that we use it today, that is, an outstanding personage. And with millions and millions of angels still in heaven after one-third of them fell with Satan, there must have been millions of angels that were cast down to this world with the devil.

Of course, you can imagine how the devil felt toward God when he was defeated. No defeated foe feels very good about it. As the devil came reeling down toward this world, he undoubtedly hissed back vengeance against God. When he and his angels landed in this world, the scene of the conflict between God and Satan was changed to this spot, and the battle has waged here ever since. Now, the devil is not the half-witted, forked-tailed, cloven-footed creature that the artist depicts; he is one of the keenest-minded personages in all the universe. He does not present himself and his angels in the form of demons, but most often he shows himself in the form of an angel of light. "Therefore it is no great thing if his ministers also be transformed as the ministers of righteousness." 2 Cor. 11: 15. A minister of righteousness is one who operates in religion. The devil and his imps have set themselves to the task of teaching false religion, and the first doctrine that they taught was the principle of the immortal soul. They have been so successful that they have injected their doctrine into nearly every religion under the sun.

The devil is not content with this one deceptive teaching, so he is, at the present time, teaching and imitating the genuine outpouring of the Holy Spirit. He is imitating the genuine gift of the Holy Spirit in the

healing of the sick and speaking in tongues. Healing the sick and speaking in tongues have accompanied spirit manifestations in all the world. Even the heathen possess the power of miraculous healings and power to speak in unknown tongues. Then how are you going to tell which is the genuine and which is the false, if they both appear the same in the outward manifestation? An easy way to test whether the supernatural demonstration is from God or from the devil is to find out whether the demonstration is accompanied by the teaching of the devil's first lie, that was first uttered in Eden, that man "shall not surely die." A person

under the influence of the genuine Spirit of God will never teach the devil's lie that nobody ever really dies.

THE PROPHETS WARNED OF IT

THE Bible prophesied the coming of such beliefs in the last days. "Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils; speaking lies in hypocrisy." I Tim. 4: 1, 2. Christians are to be led astray by the doctrine of devils that have seducing spirits and that teach lies hypocritically. You find the seducing spirits in the séance room where the dead, who know not anything, are personated by hypocritical spirits that profess to be ministers of righteousness.

Why does the devil do such things? "There shall arise false christs, and false prophets, and shall show great signs and wonders; insomuch that, if it were possible, they shall deceive the very elect." Matt. 24: 24. It is the studied plan of the devil to deceive and destroy the very men and women who are Christians waiting to be saved when Christ comes. The devil cannot touch God; but if he can

destroy, with false doctrines, everybody for whom Christ died, the death of Jesus would be in vain. Satan would be content if Christ came to this world and suffered and died in vain. Religious deception is the mightiest weapon of the devil. The only way that anyone can miss being deceived is by studying the Word of God and believing it entirely just as it is written. God placed in the Bible a mighty text to help us: "When they shall say unto you, Seek unto them that have familiar spirits [spirit mediums], and unto wizards that peep, and that mutter [unknown tongues]: should not a people seek unto their God? for the living to the dead? To the law and to the testimony [the entire Bible]: if they speak not according to this Word and the Bible teaches that man is mortal and has no knowledge, wisdom, or power in death, Eccl. 9: 5, 6, 10], it is because there is no light in them." Isa. 8: 19, 20.

You hear the doctrine that the spirit of the dead person comes back and talks—no light! You hear people preach that man has an immortal soul—no light! Over the door of the immortal-soul doctrine God has written—No LIGHT! The Christian cannot afford to be where there is no light.

LIGHT IN PLACE OF DARKNESS

A BLIND man was once sitting by the side of a building reading his Bible aloud. As he was reading, an ex-convict happened to pass along, and heard him read: "If we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin." I John 1: 7. The criminal asked him to read the text over again. "Will the blood of Jesus wash my sins away if I walk in the light?" he asked. The blind man assured him that it would. "Then would you pray to that Christ, so that I might walk in the light, and pray that His blood will wash my sins away?" And there in the little alleyway, a blind man and a criminal bowed their heads. The blind man, looking through the darkness of the world into the shining face of Jesus Christ, asked forgiveness for the passer-by. The man who came by on the darkened pathway of sin stepped out into the light of Jesus Christ, and his sins were all washed away.

How thankful we should all be for the blessed blood of Jesus Christ, the only thing that can wash away the stain of sin! What a dark world this would be if there were no chance for forgiveness of sin and for cleansing in the blood of Christ! But the devil has sworn vengeance on the blood of

The Everlasting Gospel of the JUDGMENT HOUR

T HE message that announces the judgment hour is termed the everlasting gospel. This is the name used by the message itself. Listen: "And I saw another angel fly in the midst of heaven, having the everlasting gospel to preach unto them that dwell on the earth, and to every nation, and kindred, and tongue, and people, saying with a loud voice, Fear God, and give glory to Him; for the hour of His judgment is come." Rev. 14: 6, 7.

Going out to all the world with the stirring announcement of the coming of the King in the clouds of heaven, this message is wrapped up in the gospel. Yes, it is the gospel. The everlasting gospel. That is very plain. And the King to whose glorious second advent attention is directed by this message is none other than the Saviour. He it is who is "the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world." He is the One of whom the angel spake in the long ago: "Thou shalt call His name Jesus: for He shall save His people from their sins." Jesus is that Sav-iour. "There is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved."

The gospel takes that name to all men, so that all men may come to the knowledge of that Saviour, Jesus Christ, and be saved. That is the purpose of the gospel. That is why Jesus Christ came down from heaven and was born in Bethlehem. That is why He walked among men teaching them that "God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perisb, but have everlasting life." John 3: 16.

Down from heaven, Jesus brought the gospel of salvation to men. When His baby cry broke the stillness of the Bethlehem stable, the song of the angels took up the refrain: "I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord." Luke 2: 10, 11.

CHRIST'S MISSION

THAT gospel purpose grew and developed and unfolded with His life. Hear Him as a child among the Address given by Evangelist J. W. Kent from Radio Station 2HR, West Maitland, October 23, 1938.

doctors declare: "Wist ye not that I must be about My Father's business?" Luke 2: 40. That business of the Father was the salvation of men through the gospel of His Son. That is still the Father's business. And it is summed up in the everlasting gospel now being preached in the judgment hour. We must never lose sight of that. Jesus never lost sight of it through all His ministry. It was the sole reason of His mission among men. He declared by the Sychar well: "My meat is to do the will of Him that sent Me, and to finish His work." John 4: 34.

Jesus went out from His home in Nazareth, and that purpose was firing His life and dominating every impulse of it. Every sermon unfolded it, and every miracle revealed it. He lived to bring men to God, and He died to save them. Never did He lose sight of that commission from His Father to save men. It was born with Him. It lived with Him through all His ministry. He entered Gethsemane with it throbbing in His heart. There the greatest battle of all the ages was fought. And it was fought over His commission from His Father to bring salvation to man. That was the cup of salvation which Jesus refused to surrender. To have Him do so was the studied purpose of the devil.

Into that garden the legions of darkness came down, and the forces of hell, marshalled and led by Lucifer, went out to meet the Son of God beneath the old olive trees in the garden. The destiny of the world hung in the balance then. It was decided there. Evidently the Saviour sensed it all when He chose three of His disciples from among the twelve to stand by Him. Peter, James, and John went with Him to the crisis. Read the record in Matt. 26: 37-44 and Luke 22: 41-46. It will stir your heart. Even then He could not permit the chosen three to witness the struggle, so terrible was that conflict. But bidding them to pray, He went on to meet the challenge alone.

THE AGONY IN GETHSEMANE

A LITTLE removed from His disciples, Jesus fell to the ground. "Let this cup pass from Me," He gasps. That was the cup of salvation Christ received from the Father for lost mankind. Then He thought of a world eternally lost; of you and me, and of millions of men who would go down to the grave of the ages without hope. Lost! Eternally lost! Remembering that, He clung to that cup that brought salvation to you and to me and to all lost sinners down all the ages.

That battle was so bitterly waged, and the struggle so intense that "His sweat was as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground." Luke 22: 44. That is what the everlasting gospel cost the Saviour to bring to us. God help us to understand and appreciate its meaning.

Rising from the ground, He staggered back to the disciples for some comfort. He found them asleep. The adversary against whom He contended had seen to that. He was alone in the conflict. He trod "the winepress alone," wrote Isaiah, "and of the people there was none with Me," Isa. 63: 3. When He awoke the disciples, they

When He awoke the disciples, they knew Him not. His face had changed so. His furrowed features revealed the anguish of the struggle. Said the prophet: "His face was marred more than the sons of men." Gethsemane did that.

"'Tis midnight: and for other's guilt The Man of Sorrows weeps in blood; Yet He that hath in anguish knelt Is not forsaken by His God."

From the struggle in the garden, the Master went out to meet the challenge of Calvary. "Rise, let us be going," He bade His disciples; "behold, he is at hand that doth betray Me."

ON THE CROSS OF CALVARY

FROM the time that Jesus fell into the hands of His tormentors, and all through that terrible night to the morning light, the cruel persecution of evil men and devils never relaxed for one moment.

At last He was uplifted upon the cross, and a curious, mocking throng gathered to see the last. While from the scene, with its cruelty and shame, even nature veiled her face. The sun refused to shine, and darkness came down over it all. The cry rang out in the darkness. The Saviour's head fell forward on His breast, and this cry parted His pain-parched lips, "It is finished." And, my dear fellow sinners, the cup of salvation was in your hands and mine. Jesus carried it from the skies for sinners, even through the revolting scenes of shame and suffering. That cup is filled with the everlasting gospel of salvation for lost mankind. And today, like Paul, we glory in "preaching the unsearchable riches of Christ."

JESUS COMING AGAIN

THANK God, that everlasting gospel speaks of an hour when that same Jesus will come back again. Acts 1: 9-11.

"So Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many; and unto them that look for Him shall He appear the second time without sin unto salvation." Heb. 9: 28.

Calvary is not an end in itself. It is a means to an end. That end is the eternal kingdom over which Jesus will be King. "Then cometh the end, when He shall have delivered up the kingdom to God, even the Father; when He shall have put down all rule and all authority and power." I Cor. 15: 24.

To deliver that kingdom from the hand of the devil, from the power of cruelty and wrong, Jesus endured the cross. Gethsemane's struggle was fought over that. "The prince of the power of the air, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience," and the Prince of Peace contended for supremacy there. For such a deliverance the Master taught a lost world to pray, "Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven."

The suffering, the shame and spitting, the thorn crown, the blood sweat, the cross, and the broken heart were the price paid for the re-purchase of that kingdom to come. It was the suffering of Jesus according to the gospel that made it possible. The prelude to that time when "at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth; and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God," is this, and it is all told in the preceding verses of the Philippian letter: "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus: who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: but made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness

of men: and being found in fashion as a man, He humbled Himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross. Wherefore God also hath highly exalted Him, and given Him a name which is above every name." Phil. 2: 5-11.

Jesus, in the hour of His humiliation before Pilate, declared the purpose of His mission to earth: "Pilate therefore said unto Him, Art Thou a king then? Jesus answered, Thou sayest that I am a king. To this end was I born, and for this cause came I into the world, that I should bear witness unto the truth. Everyone that is of the truth heareth My voice." John 18: 37.

Born to be a king—thank God for that truth. May we, as the blessed Master says, be of the truth, so that we may understand His words. The hour is fast approaching when He will return as King of kings, and Lord of lords. And when He shall appear, He will take His people to be with Him in His kingdom. "I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto Myself; that where I am, there ye may be also."

"He's coming once again, To set His people free: That where He is in glory bright, His saints may also be. Then lift the drooping head, Look up, rejoice and sing; He comes, in majesty sublime, Salvation's glorious King."

To make all that possible, Jesus went to the cross. That is the message of the everlasting gospel. We have reached the time of its last call. It is even the supper-time hour. The hour of the judgment. And this message of Rev. 14: 6-12 is going out to all the world, bidding mankind everywhere to prepare to meet their God; "for the hour of His judgment is come." May God prepare our hearts to meet the issue of the great judgment hour.

Christ. It was the blood that cast him and the imps of hell out of heaven. We read in the Scriptures: "They overcame him [the devil and his angels] by the blood of the Lamb." Rev. 12: 11. It is the devil's studied plan through his religion to get rid of the blood of Christ. The late Sir Conan Doyle said, in a lecture given in London some years ago, that spiritism would "sweep the world and make it a better place in which to live. When it rules over the world, it will banish the blood of Christ." Friends, stay away from a place where people are taught to hate the blood of Christ. The greatest punishment that God has in store is waiting for the man or woman who fights against the blood of Christ. "He that despised Moses' law died without mercy: . . . of how much sorer punishment, suppose ye, shall he be thought worthy, who hath trodden underfoot the Son of God, and hath counted the blood of the covenant . . . an unholy thing?" Heb. 10: 28, 29.

You may tell me that you do not believe in spiritism and its fundamental belief in the immortal soul. But merely not to believe is not enough. You must believe the truth. Satan will work "with all power and signs and lying wonders, and with all deceivableness of unrighteousness in them that perish; because they received not the love of the truth, that they might be saved. And for this cause God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie: that they all might be damned who believe not the truth." 2 Thess. 2: 9-12.

The greatest crisis of Christianity is just ahead. The devil has succeeded in making millions of people, Christians and others, believe that the wages of sin is not death; that man came into existence by evolution-that he is growing better. This prohibits the belief in the fall of man. If there were no fall, there is no need of atonement by the blood of Christ. Thus the immortal-soul idea and evolution are the two great lies that will be forced upon everyone who does not love the truth of the Bible. Wherever they go, they are constantly at war with the blood of Christ.

All the world is again standing before the cross raised on Golgotha's hill. The imps of hell are crushing out the life of Christ. On which side will you stand—with them or with the Lamb of God?

GOD'S TENTH and MAN'S MITE

ANY years ago a lad of sixteen was obliged to leave home because his father was too poor to support him longer. So he trudged away with all his worldly possessions in a bundle dangling from his hand, resolving, as he journeyed, to set up in business as a soapmaker in New York.

When the country boy arrived in the big city, he found it hard to get work. Remembering the last words of his mother and also the godly advice given him by the captain of a canal boat, the youth dedicated his life to God, determining to return to his Maker an honest tithe of every dollar he earned.

So, when his first dollar came in, the young man sacredly dedicated ten cents [five pence] of it to the Lord. This he continued to do. And the dollars rolled in! Soon this manufacturer became partner in a soap business; and when his partner died a few years later, he became sole owner of the concern.

The prosperous business man now instructed his bookkeeper to open an account with the Lord and to credit to it one-tenth of all his income. The business grew miraculously. The honest proprietor now dedicated twotenths of his earnings; and then threetenths, four-tenths; and, finally, fivetenths. It seemed as if his sales increased in exact proportion to his generosity, so that soon his make of soap became a household word throughout the world.

The late William Colgate was this man whom God so signally prospered in return for his faithfulness to his Maker. While this story is not written with the object of advertising Colgate products, it is related because it illustrates so well the blessings that accompany the faithful payment of an honest tithe.

The name of the ointment made from the prescription of a doctor friend soon came to be known far and wide in the United States, and Mentholatum sales brought Albert Hyde out of the ditch of debt and placed him on the peak of financial prosperity. Rather, tithe faithfully paid on Mentholatum earnings did it-so much so, that, in addition to paying his tithe, Mr. Hyde supported for years a mission school in India, maintained a missionary boat in Africa, and kept three missionaries in China, besides donating to many other charities of which few but Mr. Hyde knew.

Again, the makers of Kerr-Mason jars place in every case of canning jars they sell a pamphlet advocating tithe paying. Somebody in the business has apparently found benefit in returning to God that which is His own. In fact, here is the personal testimony of the writer of the tract. We abbreviate for lack of space:—

"Some time ago the writer of this pamphlet read about Jacob's vow to tithe, and how the Lord blessed him.

..... My attention was called to the fact that the Bible related how Jacob returned to his home in twenty years with riches and blessings as a result of his covenant of tithing. With some doubts and with a desire to test if the Bible is true, and to prove without a shadow of doubt that there is a God, and that His promises are for everlasting and to everyone, I made a special covenant to set aside a certain percentage of my income or increase. At that time I had a mortgage on my home, owed heavily. and was burdened with cares and worry. I determined to prove God."

How did God bless this act of faith? Listen to the ringing testimony to God's faithful care in return for unselfishness in tithe paid:—

"Within three months unexpected and unforeseen blessings came to me, and God opened my eyes to see His love and faithfulness to His promises. Since that time, I have been blessed beyond my expectations in every way, and prospered in everything I have put my hand to."

The same blessings have come in varying measure to thousands of others around the globe as a result of their returning to God that which He claims as His. I myself can testify to God's care and providence as a result of unswervingly returning the tithe at all times. The fact is that there is no one too poor to pay tithe. We really cannot afford not to return to God the tenth of all our increase.

FAITH REWARDED

A FELLOW minister of the gospel relates how God rewarded a poor woman who was tempted to think she was too poor to pay tithe. This preacher reports: "Thirteen years ago I held a series of evangelistic meetings in New York City. Among those who attended was an elderly spinster who later came to be affectionately known to us as 'Sister Clancy.'

"When she learned about tithing, she was troubled. She waited until I had shaken hands with all the others after the meeting, and then she approached me. 'You said that all God's children should pay one-tenth of their income to Him?'

"'Yes; that is, I read it from the Bible.'

"'That's what I mean. Now I want to know if you think that I should pay tithe. I am alone in the world. I have no relatives but one niece. I am beyond the age when I can work. And my sole support is furnished by this nephew by marriage. He sends me six dollars a week.'

"Well_"

"Wait a bit till I tell you more. The cheapest room I can get costs me \$4.50 a week, and it remains that low because I have lived there a long time and a good-hearted landlord has never raised the rent. And so I have \$1.50 a week to live on; and that's all I have. Now if I pay tithe on my income of \$6, or 60 cents a week, I shall have, after paying my rent, just 90 cents a week to live on. Tell me, do you think God expects me to pay tithe?' ?'

My friend confesses that if he were ever tempted to say, "No, poor soul, God does not need your sixty cents a week," he was then; but, realizing that the old woman would miss a blessing if she disobeyed God, he suggested that she try it. This is how a loving Father requited the poor woman who paid her mite week after week:----

"Months later she came into my study," the minister relates, "and she told the following story of the remarkable providence of God:—

"'That nephew by marriage of mine, bless him, wrote me a letter. Here 'tis. He tells me in it that his income has increased, and as he thought of how to use the extra money, it was borne on him that I might not protest if from now on he sent me \$10 a week. And here is the first ten-dollar payment. And now, praise be, my tithe goes up to \$1,

And instead of having 90 cents a week to live on, I now have \$4.50. Ah, pastor, how faithful the good Lord is to do all His promises!'"

THE RIGHT MOTIVE IN TITHE PAYING

HE surely is, as others will testify who also thought that they could not afford to tithe their meagre incomes. God's word is at stake when He guarantees, "Honour the Lord with thy substance, and with the first fruits of all thine increase: so shall thy barns be filled with plenty, and thy presses shall burst out with new wine." Prov. 3: 9, 10.

Abraham practised tithing. Gen. 14: 20. The Bible records his prosperity thus: "Abram was very rich in cattle, in silver, and in gold." Gen. 13: 2.

However, we must not pay tithe with the object of getting rich. God will not be bribed. Neither does He assure us that all who respect His financial requirements will become Colgates, Hydes, and millionaires. We are required to return a tenth of the increase that God gives us, be-cause "all the tithe of the land, whether of the seed of the land, or of the fruit of the tree, is the Lord's: it is holy unto the Lord." Lev. 27: 30. To withhold the tithe, therefore, is to rob God. He says: "Will a man rob God? Yet ye have robbed Me. But ye say, Wherein have we robbed Thee? In tithes and offerings." Mal. 3: 8.

God says, "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in Mine house." Verse 10. The ministry, which bears the gospel to all the world, is to be supported by the tithe; and when God's portion is withheld, there is a famine in His household. He is robbed. And, moreover, we are deprived of a blessing.

As in the ancient temple of the Jews the priests were supported by the tithe, "so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the gospel," which must go to all the world in these last days, "should live of the gospel." Num. 18; 21; 1 Cor. 9; 13, 14. Those who seek first "the kingdom of God," will have all their earthly needs supplied. Matt. 6: 33.


lives that they had a happy childhood and a devoted mother. I don't believe in harsh methods with little folk."

CHRISTMAS AIR MAILS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM AND EUROPE

THE Deputy Director, Posts & Telegraphs (Mr. R. N. Partington), advises that the air mail closing at the Elizabeth Street Post Office, and the General Post Office, Spencer Street, Melbourne, at 6 a.m. on Tuesday, December 13, 1938, is due in London on December 23. This mail affords readers a final opportunity of sending small packets (not over two pounds) and greetings to relatives and friends in the United Kingdom and Europe for delivery before Christmas Day. The reduced air-mail fees are applicable to Christmas mail for the United Kingdom as well as other Empire countries. Post Office officials will be pleased to furnish information regarding the airmail fees payable.

It should be remembered that small packets for overseas must always be handed in at a post office counter, and must bear a customs label, which is obtainable at any post office.



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AROUND THE WORLD

THE curious and widespread notion that to break a mirror brings seven years of bad luck originated with the Romans about the first century of the Christian era.
