Awhile ago, a minister, passing through Washington, one Sabbath in his sermon told how at one time he moved into a double house in a certain city. The other side was empty. Not long afterward a family moved in. He remained in this locality a few months. labouring. After awhile he received an appointment elsewhere, and began moving out. When his household goods were being put on the dray, the lady came out upon the porch, and after some little hesitancy, inquired, "Are you not a Seventh-day Adventist minister?" He replied in the "Well," she went on, affirmative. "some time ago I heard a little regarding what you hold as truth. I heard much said against these doctrines, but a desire entered my heart to understand what was really true. I learned you were a minister, and had moved into this house. I moved in on the other side, in the hope of learning about these things: but during these three months you have not said one word to me about Bible truth. And now I see you moving away."

This minister said that it served as a lesson to him that he never forgot. God had blessed his efforts since in bringing three or four house-owners into the truth. He never went into a place seeking a new location for his home without earnestly seeking God to guide him where to go, that he might find someone who was searching for truth. And God remarkably guided him in finding such.

The lesson is obvious. God wants us to become acquainted with our near neighbors. But custom and our own inclination often lead us to neglect these, and what little we do, we do for those farther away.

Several thousand dollars have been spent each year to run the school with apparently no results for good. The school has run for about ten There have been many things vears. to prevent the prosperity of the work here. The students have been children of eight to fourteen years, and the enrollment has always been about eleven at the opening and six or seven at the close.

Though the school has closed, that does not stop the educational work for our people in this Union conference. Our conference president is working hard for schools among my people. He was with us several days a short time ago, closing up the sale and planning the work for the summer. He preached every night during the time he was with us. He says that we will have mission schools for my people in this state. So those who wish to help in this work send your donations to the Arkansas Tract Society at Fayetteville.

There is no such thing as failure to the one who goes for the love of souls and has a burning desire kindled by the Spirit of God to win souls. To such the mountain of circumstances is never so steep, or the ascent so rugged that the summit can not be reached.

We have just been together seeking the Lord with the whole heart for wisdom to know how to do better work, so new is the time to work. We have four who are going out in the work at once. They will make deliveries in March. We expect more to enter the work later on. We have some who are attending school here and some at Keene who will be in the work later. We expect by the Lord's help to make this the banner year for West Texas. Pray for us and the work here.

***** FIELD REPORT

LONE STAR-Since the Week of Prayer, I have had the privilege of visiting the companies of new Sabbath keepers at Troup, Elkhart, and Percilla. They all seem to be enjoying the blessings of God and are keeping up their Sabbath-schools. The little Sabbath-school at Sacul is doing well. I am now holding meetings at a new place and I am having a good attendance.

While I was at Elkhart, an old gentleman (Catholic) gave me a letter that he had received from his son who lives not far from St Louis. This old gentleman had attended the meetings which we, Brother McNeil and I, held here. We preached on the Sabbath question and much was said about it in the community. This man wrote to his son to ask their priest about it, and we give you the answer the son sent back, word for word.

Alton, Ill., Dec. 23, 1913. Dear Father, I will now answer your letter relating to the change of the Sabbath-day from Saturday to Sunday.

At a meeting of the young men's Sodality yesterday, I asked Father Tarrent to explain this matter clearly. This was done because the Church (Catholic) has this power as promised by Jesus Christ and in this instance she made use of the power given her. This is due to the infalibility of the church when teaching a dotrine of Faith or Morals. When Christ founded the church, He promised that he would stand by her and see that she did not err as stated Then he said to his Apostles above. "Whatsoever thou shalt bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatsoever thou shalt loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven." Therefore you see that he gave the church power to do as she has done, and so long as such is declared to the world as a doctrine of Faith or Morals, he has given the Church the authority of being infalible in its teachings.

The reason given for the change are mainly that it appears the greatest mysteries happen on Sunday such as the rising from the grave, and etc., and in commeration of these, and probably for many other reasons, the Church seemed very much justified in making this change, as it was in her power to do so anyway.

Well, I am not sure whether you can understand this from my explanation or not. I have tried to make it as plain as I could, but my knowledge of such matters is so small, compared with that of Father Tarrent, that I can not begin to make matters as plain as he can. I should have taken this matter up sooner but never had a real good opportunity until right at the meeting Sunday evening.

Father Tarrent says that denominations believing in the Bible alone, if they do not mean to believe in the Catholic Church's teachings, should keep holy the Saturday instead of Sunday. But it seems that the majority of them acknowledge, or at least, practice, that part of the Catholic religion to observe the Sunday instead of the Saturday. I believe it is the Seventh-day Adventists who speak of this point strongly (observing Saturday) but whether they do it in reality I do not know positively.
