MAY COLPORTEUR REPORT.

I am just a bit late this time getting my report to the RECORD, caused by one of the field secretaries not reporting to me until the 15th, and I have been greatly rushed with my work. I just finished my delivery in Arkadelphia, Ark., where I delivered seventy per cent of my orders. I thought I would have done a little better and I would have had it not been for the Arkadelphia mills almost closing down. Many hands were out of work and some had moved away.

Our May report was not very large, something like it was in April, but I think we will do a good job of it for June. The students are in the field and good reports are coming from all directions. This is the Big Week and

I am happy to tell you that I shall have my report in on time for that. I put in my Big Week in South Texas and the Lord certainly did bless me.

I am greatly encouraged seeing what the workers are doing at this time, especially the students. They are running from \$100 to \$400 a week and it is very encouraging, not only to myself, but to the field secretaries. We are all delighted with what the Lord is doing through our students, as well as our regular workers. I hope every one will plan to put in the Big Week in July. That begins the 13th and runs until the 19th. It will be our last Big Week in this union this year. I am thankful the way all the colporteurs are taking hold on these Big Weeks. Do not forget that when July comes, and let every one who can plan to enter

and have a part in that Big Week. There will be no camp meetings in July, so there will be no reason why all of our colporteurs cannot take an active part at that time.

I hope the students will not forget that their biggest day in the June Big Week will go to the publishing house to build up the work in South America. I want all of our students and colporteurs to take an active part in this campaign. I have turned in my money already and I know our field secretaries and others are doing the same thing; and I am sure every one who does this will be blessed for doing all they can to help get the literature to the people in these foreign fields.

I am at home now for a few days, but will probably go out in the field again soon and do all I can to stir up our people and induce them to enter the work as soon as possible. If they cannot do it now maybe they can catch the spirit so this fall they can go out and do something and arrange for permanent work in the field.

May the Lord bless all our workers and those interested in the work at this time.

NEW CONFERENCE OFFICE BUILDING IN SOUTH TEXAS.

About a year and a half ago the conference in partnership with the San Antonio church bought a fine lot at 917 South Presa St. The lot extends from Presa to Garden affording ample room for office and church buildings. The Hot Wells car line is on Presa, the office side, while the church will be a block off the car line. So we feel that it is exactly what we need.

Just a few weeks ago we finished our conference building. It is brick veneer. The building is right up next to the sidewalk with plate glass windows in front, so we can make a good display of our message-filled books.

We have separate offices for all the secretaries and the stenographer. There is a private room for the president. We have a nice large stock room with plenty of shelves for books. The building is modern in every respect.

The approximate cost of building is \$4,000.00. That amount may seem large to some, but when you give it due consideration, I believe you will agree with me that it is not too much for the conference office. The preceding three years we paid out \$1800.00 for rent and then we were in an obscure office building down town. We shall have no more rent to pay, besides our building is of such character as to give our work prominence in the city. It will not be long until all will know of our office and our work. It seems to me that this alone will be worth much to the cause. Before we paid \$50.00 rent per month. Now our total ex-

pense in insurance and taxes will be about \$10.00 per month.

The building was dedicated to the cause of the message at the time of our church officers meeting, April 29. Elder Van Kirk gave the dedicatory address and Elder Stewart offered the prayer. A lot of friends were present and enjoyed the program very much.

We trust that this fine building may be a great blessing to the cause of God in the South Texas Conference. Our people are always welcome to call at the office at any time. We shall try to carry on the work in this building in such a way that we may invite the presence of the angels and heaven's richest blessings.

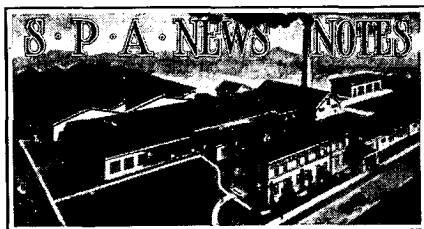
