SOME TIME back I saw a picture of a great concern praying before their heathen god for special help-help that never came; but today there comes to my mind another picture of over three hundred thousand worshippers of the true God praying to the God that made Heaven, earth, the sea and the fountain of waters, asking unitedly for helphelp that is promised if we ask-help for the missionaries and the mission fields under the direction of Seventhday Adventists, clear around the What a privilege to know world. that a definite day has been set apart by the leaders, in which all our people are asked to join in seeking God in behalf of our missions that have been planted under the providences of God, and now are threatened with retrenchment. God surely does not want retrenchment-we do not want it-then if we pray earnestly, believing that He hears us, will we not have our request, and will God not open the way for the missions to advance rather than retrench?

If we are Seventh-day Adventists, how can we keep from entering into this blessed prayer service? Surely we will want to spend much of the day on Sabbath, November 19, talking with God about our heart's desire to have the missions expand and quickly bring the return of Jesus.

This same day brings us to the opening of the Week of Sacrifice, which also affords us an opportunity of uniting with our brethren around the world in making a special sacrifice, placing a gift with our prayers, in behalf of the expansion of our missions.

Our conference employees everywhere are asked to give a whole week's wage, and at the same time it is suggested that our members could give at least an average of \$2.00 per capita. Now if we all enter heartily into this, who knows but what God will be pleased to hear His children's prayers and answer them through a spirit of sacrifice within our own hearts.

As I forwarded a part of the Week of Sacrifice offering to the treasurer, with our regular tithe and church expense, the other day, I tried to picture all the offerings of all the brethren some in dollars, some in pounds and sixpence, others in marks, franks, and still others in yen, rupees and pesos, congregating before the mission board, at a time when they are greatly perplexed to know how to sustain the missionaries, and unitedly all these gifts exclaim, "Her am I, send me." Will your prayer precede this giving, brother, sister? And will your gift follow the praying? May it be even so, and a real blessing come to us all here in the Southwest as we begin to climb to new heights in missions support, and begin in earnest to press our way to the City of God.

Remember, on Sabbath, November 19, we all unite in praying for our missions, and then on the following Sabbath an opportunity will be extended us to "Covenant" anew, "by sacrifice".

Yours for a joyful prayer service, and a sacrificial giving that is more blessed than to receive.

### 0 A Sunset Table in the Record

T THE recent Fall Council it was  ${f A}$  voted to discontinue the sunset tables now appearing in the Morning Watch Calendar, and to request the union conferences to publish this in their union papers. This was agreed to at the meeting of the Southwestern Union Conference committee held last week.

In order that it may benefit the largest number of our members, we are giving it in three sections. First, under the Arkansas-Louisiana de-

partment head for two states. It will be figured on the 92° 30" meridian, which runs north and south through Little Rock, Pine Bluff, and Alexandria. The time given will be approximately for these points. To those living east of this line, sunset would come a little earlier, according to the distance. Those living west of the line would figure a little later according to the distance.

The southeastern portion of Louisiana would have to figure on New Orleans time which is almost exactly on the 90th meridian of Central standard time, and would be fifteen minutes earlier than that given for the rest of Louisiana.

The time for Oklahoma and eastern and central Texas would be figured on the meridian of 97° 30", which runs north and south close to Oklahoma City, Ardmore, Fort Worth, Waco, Austin, and Corpus Christi. As in the other case, those living east would figure earlier and those west would figure later than the time given.

Under the Texico Conference heading we shall give two times, one for West Texas which is on Central Standard time, the meridian running through Amarillo and Lubbock on the 102d degree. and the other for the State of New Mexico which is on Mountain time. This would run north and south on the 106th meridian, through Santa Fe and Alamogordo. Those east would figure earlier, and those west would figure later.

We would suggest that this RECORD which gives this information be carefully preserved, to be referred to in case there is any confusion in the minds of any regarding the plan.

We are told through the Spirit of Prophecy that we should sacredly guard the edges of the Sabbath, and it is with the hope that this can more easily and faithfully be done that we give this information week by week. In order that it may not fail to reach all in time to be of use we are giving this information a week ahead.

## \_\_\_ Calling

A LETTER received at the General Conference office from J. Gronert, the superintendent of our Sierra Leone Mission on the West coast of Africa, says:

"I am glad to tell you that the work is moving forward also in this field. We feel the present depression very much, but in spite of that I must say that the outlook for our soulwinning work has never been so bright as the case is this year. Requests come from new places here and there, and people living in the darkest places of the Protectorate seem to be longing for something better. About two months ago, a request for a teacher came from a place far away from any of our stations. We were not able to do anything for them, but over and over again came a message from them. Once some of their leading men traveled all the way to our nearest station to see one of our African ministers who is working there. He found them very earnest and we arranged that he should go to the place to see what it was like.

"He found it was a far away place in the bush, but after that visit, he too, started to plead for these people and asked to be sent to them. We had no money, but then the people started to prepare a house for the teacher. On the next visit, our worker found that the house was completed, and after another visit he says in a letter received two days ago that now the school building is there too. Now they are waiting for the teacher.

"When the Catholics heard about this, the priest came along and wanted to send a teacher, but the people refused to receive him. 'We do not want palaver,' they said. 'We want the people who are living a pure life and preaching a pure doctrine. We have heard about them and we want them to come.'

"How we wish we could do something for the people in such a place; but will our money be sufficient? We are now trying to find a way so that we need not let these seekers of truth perish."

With people calling to us for help in all parts of the world, surely as God's people we should bind about our wants and enter heartily into a week of sacrifice for missions.

## Obituary


REED-Norma Florene Reed was born in Van Zant County, Texas, January 13, 1920 and died at Shreveport, Louisiana, November 8, 1932.





# One More Call

ND still the facts before us are that Texas is on the tail-end of the procession in the Harvest Ingathering. With only one half of the amount of last year raised to date I wonder what the great body of this conference propose to do. Our per capita is not even \$2.00 per member and yet the goal is \$10.00. Somehow I cannot let myself believe that our people are going to admit defeat in this time of tremendous need. I know that there are disloyal ones among us who even dare to breath out loud that we are sending too much money abroad for the salvation of the heathen. God help such ones to seek forgiveness at the throne of grace and turn before they are consumed by their own shortsightedness. Did not Jesus Himself give us the commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel"? Who then dares to throw into the face of the Almighty God the charge that He has called them to a task too widespread? The great congregation that surrounds the throne of God have come out of "every nation, kindred, tongue, and people."

I do not say that we should neglect our work at home, but I do emphasize that the work in fields beyond "must not stop for want of means". We do have a responsibility at home, but shall we permit the magnitude of the task cause us to lose our vision and fail to do our appointed work? This is not a time to sit down and bewail the difficulties that have overtaken us. It is a time to look to God for strength, for power, for courage to face the task. Murmuring among the children of Israel always delayed them in their advance; let us not murmur nor complain as we feel the chastening hand of our Heavenly Parent upon us.

Will you not at this time call upon the friends and business men with whom you are acquainted and make a tremendous effort, a prayerful effort, to turn the tide and hold our missionaries in the fields beyond?

The last record coming to this office from the General Conference shows to date for North America, \$333,003.70.

Remember the words of David to Solomon, "Be strong and of good courage, and do it: fear not, nor be dismayed: for the Lord, even thy God, will be with thee, until thou hast finished all the work for the service of the house of the Lord." I Chron. 28:20.
