News Notes

A meeting of the conference committee was held in Little Rock on December 19, at which time several problems concerning the work were studied. Besides the full committee, consisting of the following: I. C. Pound, J. L. Neil, Isaac Baker, M. L. Wilson, W. R. Elliott, Geo. M. Brown, and O. J. Bell, we were glad to have Elder R. L. Benton, our union president, meet with us.

One of the actions taken was to permit Elder R. E. Cash, who is attending the Theological Seminary at Washington, to take a two-period course instead of a one-period course. So he will be away from the office for about twelve weeks instead of six. We feel sure that the benefit that Elder Cash receives from this period of study and training will be manifest to the field as he resumes his work again. Elder Cash will be away from the office until the last of February.

The erection of the new church building in Shreveport is scheduled to get under way soon, according to present plans. For months our white brethren and sisters there have had to meet for their services in a rented building, and we feel sure that when they can move into their own house of worship there will be much rejoicing.

Quite a number of our Little Rock young people, who have been away to school, are back for the holidays, and it looks good to see their smiling faces again. We miss them when they are away, but we are glad that they are where they are—in one of our schools getting a Christian education.

The conference committee voted to make some changes which will affect three of the districts. Elder Cash, who has been superintendent of District 2, in which are located the following churches: Bonnerdale, Hot Springs, Little Rock, and Malvern, will take over the superintendency of District 3 in which are located the DeQueen, Hope, and Texarkana churches. District 3 was formerly under the charge of Elder W. E. Bement.

J. B. Ross, who has been serving as pastor of our Little Rock church, has been asked to take over the superintendency of District 2. District 8, consisting of the Searcy and Mount Pleasant churches, is also scheduled to have a change of leadership, which will be announced later. For the past year or two Elder Pound has been taking the responsibility of leadership in this district, but it was thought best to relieve the conference president of this added responsibility so that he can devote his full time to the needs of the entire field.
