Information Regarding Registration on October 16

EVERY male citizen of the United States and every male alien who has declared his intention of becoming a citizen, who is, on October 16, 1940, between the ages of twenty-one and thirty-six, will become liable for training in land or naval service, and on that day must register for selection and such training and service in case he is called.

Among those registering on October 16 will be thousands of Seventh-day Adventist men. For the purpose of giving them helpful information which will have a bearing upon their rights and their status, articles have been prepared and will appear in the issue of the Review and Herald dated October 10.

If you do not happen to be a subscriber to the *Review and Herald*, then by all means get a copy of this issue of the paper and obtain the information which will help you in your registration.

Seventh-day Adventists are non-combatants by reason of their religious teaching and conviction. Under the Selective Service Act they can claim non-combatant status in the army.

It is not entirely clear when claim for noncombatant service should be made. If information on this point is not available before the day of registration, those who register should make inquiry of their registration boards as to the proper time to present their claim as conscientious objectors, and to request noncombatant service. The following information, given to one of our congressmen, is all that we have been able to obtain thus far:

"In answer to your first question, it appears that the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940 does not require a conscientious objector to make a claim or identify himself as such at the time of registration. The opportunity for the making of such claims will be afforded subsequent to registration and at the time the registrant fills out his questionnaire.

"In answer to your question No. 2, it appears that there is no provision for registering for noncombatant service except the making of a claim as a conscientious objector.

If at the time of registration, on October 16, registrants are asked to decide whether they care to take advantage of the benefits of War Risk Insurance, you should be prepared to answer that question and make that decision. Our counsel is that our men should accept this insurance.

For whatever help it may be, an affidavit of church membership in a Seventh-day Adventist church has been prepared by the General Conference and sent out to local church clerks and these can be obtained upon application. This is in the form of a card which can be kept on the person

at all times. It may help in establishing a non-combatant standing.

Additional information regarding the denomination's stand on non-combatancy, information about conscription, and information about registration will all be found in the October 10 issue of the *Review*. Do not fail to get a copy of this paper as quickly as it is obtainable.

Request to Adventist Men 21 to 36 Years of Age

IF YOU desire to secure recognition as a noncombatant you should secure the card which your church clerk has for you, stating you are a member of the Seventh-day Adventist church and where, and have it legalized by securing the signature of a notary public before Oct. 16.

The above is a recommendation of the General Conference, and the cards of identification referred to above have been prepared by the General Conference for every man who is of draft age. The authorities who have to deal with this will recognize these cards as official from our church, and they will carry great weight in securing recognition as noncombatants. Those of our men who do not have these cards will find it very difficult to secure this recognition. Therefore we strongly urge that this notice be given the widest publicity among our members, and each person involved be properly informed.

This is a worthy aim and a splendid example for all other churches that have debts hanging over them. And are we keeping our church properties in repair, so that they present an attractive appearance? How is it with your church?

The members of the Little Rock church are mailing or delivering two hundred Good News each week to persons who have expressed a desire to receive literature. Some interesting reports are coming in as the result.

Attention, pastors and district lead-

ers! The new believers, baptized since January 1, 1939, ought by all means to have the Testimonies and the Conflict Series in their homes. So important is it that these new believers have access to the writings of the Spirit of prophecy that the publishers are making them a liberal discount on sets of either the Testimonies or Conflict Series. All such new believers will be entitled to a special reduction of \$3.05 on either set, making the cost as fol-Testimonies, four volumes, cloth, \$8.95; limp keratol, \$12.95. Conflict Series, five volumes, cloth, \$8.20; limp leather, \$13.20. Partial payments can be arranged if desired.

On October 16 all the young men throughout the country between the ages of 21 and 35 inclusive, are required to register under the Selective Service Act. Seventh-day Adventist young men affected can claim exemption from combatant service, because the denomination's stand on non-combatancy is recognized by the government. The General Conference has prepared "Affidavit of Membership in the Seventh-day Adventist Church" cards to be furnished to all registrants who are members of the church, and desire them. See your church clerk, or if an isolated member, write to the conference office and the card will be sent promptly. It will be of help in establishing the non-combatant status of the registrant.

The October 10 issue of the Review will be a special issue carrying articles on the matter of conscription, non-combatancy, and registration. It will furnish important information to the registrant, acquainting him with the provisions of the Selective Service Act, under which non-combatants can claim exemption from combatant service. The conference is furnishing a copy of this issue of the Review free to every one of our members affected by the draft. So please write for it. We can not furnish it free to others, but a copy can be furnished to any one desiring a copy, for only five cents.

Brother Kelsey writes that another young person from El Dorado has gone to school at Gentry, and two left for college.

Elder Pound is nearing the close of his fifth and last evangelistic effort of the year, which is now in progress at Monroe, Louisiana. He sends the following encouraging word: "Last night was our first call to a decision, and at least fifteen persons stood signifying their intention to follow Jesus in everything, including the Sabbath. This was an encouraging response, and we feel sure others will follow later on. Of course not all of these will finally join the church, for the sifting and sorting work must now be done for them. 

Another Place of Worship Dedicated in Oklahoma

A PLACE of worship for the colored believers in Enid, Oklahoma, was dedicated free from debt on Sabbath afternoon, September 14. The weather was ideal, and a large number of both white and colored were present. Every seat was filled and a large number stood on the outside. Among those present were Elder J. L. McConaughey, Elder F. W. Johnston, Elder W. N. Wittenberg, and Elder J. G. Dasent. From the brief history of the work given by Brother W. S. Lee, the colored minister in charge of the work in that district, it was learned that as a result of the faithful seed-sowing of Brother and Sister Owens, of the white church, a colored family, Brother Trawick and his wife, accepted present truth. This was many years ago. They too, by precept and example, called the attention of neighbors and friends to the saving truth of the third angel's message. Thousands of pages of literature were distributed and an interest was aroused. In the winter of 1939-40, Brother and Sister Lee went to Enid and held a series of evangelistic meetings; and after weeks of hard toil and varied experiences they were able to gather some fruit from their labors.

The dedicatory sermon was preached by Elder Dasent; the prayer was offered by Elder McConaughey. Others on the platform were Brother Columbus Mills of Oklahoma City, Brother Trawick, and Brother W. S. Lee. After complimentary remarks




icatory services in Enid, two weeks were spent by Elder Dasent in Oklahoma; the most of the time was spent in Oklahoma City strengthening the believers and encouraging them in the Harvest Ingathering work. Newby, Edna, Muskogee, and Okmulgee were also visited. On account of the departure of Brother W. S. Lee to his new field of labor in Florida, and Elder Trotter's evangelistic meetings in Okmulgee this summer, the churches in Oklahoma were late in getting a start in the Ingathering. Nevertheless, in every place visited the believers are of good courage and have a strong hope of reaching their goal by the end of October. In Okmulgee Elder Trotter has the problem of finding a suitable place of worship for the more than fourteen new believers, and of taking care of

the interest created in the hearts of many more as a result of his labors there this summer.

It is gratifying to note the interest the Educational Department of the Oklahoma Conference is taking in the Christian education of its Negro constituency. Spanish Schools

THIS year we are operating three Spanish mission schools in the Texico Conference. These schools are called "Spanish mission schools" because they take in children from non-Adventist homes and that is one good way of reaching these homes with the message.

At Dixon, we have a junior academy with an enrollment of between fifty-five and sixty where last year the enrollment was only twenty-six. We are spending right at \$250 on equipment and improvements for this school and the funds are coming largely from the Educational Equipment Fund. Many of our own people are taking advantage of the school facilities at Dixon and have moved there from as far away as Santa Fe, Albuquerque, and Reserve to give their children the privilege of a Christian education.

At Las Cruces the enrollment is slightly smaller this year than it was last, but we hope that within a short time it will increase even beyond the number of last year.

The Socorro school will have an enrollment of between twenty and twenty-five to begin with. This will be the first year that we have had a school at Socorro and we are looking forward to a very successful year there.
