these, however, are many honest souls, and the call from heaven to them is: "Come out of her, my people." As God's ambassadors, Seventh-day Adventists, with the last message to go to this world, are to be used in passing this call on to the honest in heart. God pictures the work of the remnant church, in the prophecy of Revelation, as swelling into a loud cry, represented in the message and work of the angel in Revelation 18. He has told us that it is largely through the literature work that this loud cry is to be accomplished.

The canvassing work, properly conducted, is missionary work of the highest order, and it is as good and successful a method as can be employed for placing before the people the important truths for this time. ... God has ordained the canvassing work as a means of presenting before the people the light contained in our books, and canvassers should be impressed with the importance of bringing before the world as fast as possible the books necessary for their

spiritual education and enlightenment." "Colporteur Evangelist," p. 5.

The Lord emphasized the need of this type of work in these words: "Canvasser-evangelists are needed to hunt and fish for souls. The canvassing work should now be earnestly and decidedly taken up." Id., p. 31. "Where there is one canvasser in the field, there should be one hundred. Canvassers should be encouraged to take hold of this work, not to canvass for story-books, but to bring before the world the books containing truth essential for this time." Id., p. 7.

That brings us to the subject of this article, "The Call." On pages 41 and 42 of the "Colporteur Evangelist" we read: "The Lord calls for many more to engage in the canvassing work. . . . For Christ's sake, my brethren and sisters, make the most of the hours of the new year to place the precious light of present truth before the people." Further on page 42, "Jesus is calling for many missionaries, for men and women who will consecrate themselves to God, willing to spend and be spent in His service." And on page 79, "Missionaries are wanted everywhere. In all parts of the field canvassers should be selected. not from the floating element in society, not from among men and women who are good for nothing else and have made a success of nothing, but from among those who have good address, tact, keen foresight, and ability. Such are needed to make a success as colporteurs, canvassers, and agents." And He has told us, "As long as probation continues, there will be opportunity for the canvasser to work." Id., p. 99.

So today the Lord is calling for

men and women with good business judgment and a deep Christian experience to enter into successful colporteur work. The call is for many fishers and hunters, for many men and women, for many canvassers to take orders for our large subscription books containing the message. We have the message; we have it in book form. We have light not only on the doctrines, but on healthful living, Christian education, and homemaking. Our books were brought into existence in order that we might supply large armies of colporteurs with material that would bring the light of present truth to the millions now in darkness. Let us encourage one another and others to forsake the call of the world, and answer the call of God for faithful colporteurs in the Southwest.

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them, its power is lost. While there has been a quick foresight to discern the necessity of laying out means in facilities to multiply books and tracts plans to bring back the means invested, so as to produce other publications, have been neglected. The power of the press, with all its advantages, is in their hands; and they can use it to the very best account, or they can be half asleep, and through inaction lose the advantages which they might gain. By judicious calculation they can extend the light in the sale of books and pamphlets. They can send them into thousands of families that now sit in the darkness of error." "Testimonies," Vol. IV, p. 389.

One year after this appeal one recruit came forward. He really stood alone, without human encouragement. Nevertheless he remained undaunted in his desire to launch the plan. It was at the General Conference Session in 1881 that George King's wish finally prevailed, and the publishers consented to open the way and permit him to try the plan. So sixty years ago this year of 1941, the colporteur work was born. George King did not go out to try the plan. He went out to prove it, for his faith was anchored to the divine instruction given the year before. The plan worked, and is still working.

The Southwestern Union field has been blessed with a band of men and women who also heeded the divine appeal. During the year of 1940 they delivered \$38,267.07 in books and magazines, and this in spite of a number of changes in the local leadership.

Thousands of pages of truth-filled literature in the form of periodicals and books have gone into many homes. Individuals are today reading the meaning of the events taking place today.

If the printing press had never been invented, what an immeasurable loss we would have sustained. We would not have heard of George King. We would not have read an experience like this:

"Twenty years ago one of our colporteurs, who is now sleeping in Jesus, sold a copy of Patriarchs and Prophets to a man living near Frostburg, Maryland. The purchaser of the book later became ill and then spent much time in the study of its precious contents. The contents of the book were discussed by the family, and its truths were fixed in the minds of the children as they grew up and established homes of their own. About a year ago an effort was held in this city, and at its conclusion the grandmother, the wife of the man who purchased the book twenty years before, led the way into the baptismal pool, as thirty-two children, grandchildren, and relatives, followed in the sacred rite of baptism. Five more have been baptized, making a total of thirty-seven."

There is no single factor among us more potent in bringing men and women to a knowledge of this truth than the sale of our denominational literature. The silent pages are doing a marvelous work in many lands. This is our day for seed sowing. Let us remember that there can be no harvest without a seed sowing. A pamphlet written by Luther on Galatians fell into Bunyon's hands, and converted him, and today over one hundred translations of *Pilgrim's Progress* is the result.

A number of times I stood looking at the monument before the church of the Consistory of Paris. Here a Frenchman stands with a Bible in his hand. This Frenchman had been wounded at the siege of Saint

Quentin. As he lay languishing, his eve saw a tract on the coverlet. He read it and was converted by it. He became known as Admiral Coligny, the leader of the reformation of France. But that tract had not yet finished its work. It was read by Coligny's nurse, a sister of mercy, who penitently placed it in the hands of the Lady Abbess, and she, too, was converted by it. She fled from France to the Palatinate, where she met a young Hollander and became his wife. The influence which she had upon that man reacted upon the whole continent of Europe, for he was William of Orange, who became the champion of liberty and Protestantism in the Netherlands.

Yes, think of what has been accomplished since 1881 when George King proved that our books could be sold. But God promises to do greater things with the printed page. No failure in the work, for I read—"The publishing house is Thine own instrumentality, and we will not fail or be discouraged." "Testimonies," Vol. VII, p. 211. Jesus wants you in this work. Why not respond today? This is the very work God would have you do today.

section of the United States. That it is a fruitful field for the gospel colporteur is proved by our record of literature distribution covering years past. The opportunities awaiting those who have a mind to work are still unlimited, since we have many counties where as yet our bookmen have left no footprints.

As we think of the many cities, towns, villages, and extensive reaches of countryside that lie within our borders, as yet unwarned, our despairing cry is, "How can we ever finish the work of God in this our own field?" Yet the answer to this question was given many years ago when we were told, "In a large degree through our publishing houses is to be accomplished the work of that other angel who comes down from heaven with great power and who lightens the earth with his glory." "Testimonies," Vol. VII, p. 140. But our publishing houses shed forth their light through colporteur evangelists, whose ministry has thus been described by a prophet of old, "How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him that bringeth good tidings, that publisheth peace; that bringeth good tidings of good, that publisheth salvation." Isaiah 52:7.

The need of the Arkansas-Louisiana Conference is for its church members to lift up their eyes to see the vastness of the harvest field as compared with its few toiling laborers. Every member should clearly understand that God's plan for finishing the work is largely a matter of scattering our literature into every nook and corner of our territory. Every believer should be engaged in its circulation, giving, loaning, selling it wherever possible. We are not doing a tithe of what we can do, and must do, ere the work is finished. And we should see many strong, courageous men and women go forth into these unentered places as full-time colporteur evangelists determined under God to carry the light of truth to those in darkness. How dare we wait longer to undertake that which the Lord has told us to do? What excuse can we offer for being idle in an hour when heaven and earth is throbbing with activity? May we arouse from the subtle lethargy that has settled upon us, and find our rightful place in service before it is too late.

Let us scatter our books, magazines, and tracts as never before during 1941. Every member should be a circulating library of the third angel's message in his own community. And as the Master, looking over vast expanses where no reaper now labors, sends forth the call, "Who will go for us?" may many who are now occupied with less important things be led to respond, "Here am I; send me."

The Gospel Must be Published

may be found the following prophetic words: "And the gospel must first be published among all nations." Mark 13:10.

This prophecy, given by our Lord nearly two thousand years ago, is today meeting with a marvelous fulfillment. No method has proven more effective, more economical, and more rapid in the carrying out of the gospel commission than the ministry of the printed page. God has ordained that, "The world is to receive the light of truth through an evangelizing ministry of the Word in our books and periodicals." "Testimonies," Vol. IX, p. 61. And now, in fulfillment of this divine prediction, we find that our books and periodicals, "the wings of the message," are swiftly bearing the truth to all parts of the world.

During the year 1940 our colporteurs sowed the seeds of truth in the form of gospel literature to the amount of nearly \$15,000 throughout the states of Arkansas and Louisiana. A number of souls have come to a knowledge of the truth, one colporteur having reported three people baptized, as a result of the literature ministry.

A few months ago I was privileged to visit one of these new converts. This sister, an elderly lady, was very enthusiastic and profoundly happy over her new-found faith. Her face revealed the joy and peace that come through a full acceptance of the third angel's message. Then, as I saw the book *Bible Readings* in that home and realized that God had used those printed words to bring about this transformation, I was convinced anew of the miraculous power of the press.

Many people are longing for a message of hope as the following experience, sent in by one of our student colporteurs last summer, indicates. "I

canvassed a lady who was in a bad condition physically, but who became interested in the book at once. She placed her order with \$1.50 down. When I told her the book would not be delivered until October, she was somewhat downhearted. 'Young man,' she said, 'I don't see how I could wait that long. Would there be any possible chance of sending it next week? I feel that I shall soon pass from this world, and before I do I want to read that book.' Many are waiting to hear this message. Let's spread it now before it is too late."

God is calling for volunteers to join our army of bookmen in publishing this gospel to all the world. "A great work is to be done in our world, and human agencies will surely respond to the demand. The world must hear the warning. When the call comes, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' send back the answer clear and distinct, 'Here am I; send me.'" "Testimonies," Vol. VI, p. 333.

Among the many significant signs souls within the confines of our conference? Well might we consider the *Cherokee Indian Mission* the base for such a work.

And then, too, when we consider the *Enid District*, more than two colporteurs might be at work giving of their best for the cause.

Who will hear the call for the fertile *Okeene District*? This section of strong German churches ought to support at least one magazine worker and a regular book worker.

Prospects are brighter for the Oklahoma City District. Four workers were in attendance at the Colporteur Institute, and with a reorganization of the magazine work, there should be an increase of souls won this year from the Oklahoma City area.

We are thankful that the *Shattuck* and *Vinita Districts* accept the challenge to carry the burden, too, for this year promises to see greater advances with the printed page in both areas.

In the Weatherford District there are a few faithful part-time magazine workers for the Elk City area. Who will carry the lighted torch into Clinton, Sayre, Altus, Mangum, Hobart, etc.? Soon, we believe, a much stronger work will ensue in Lawton and Fort Sill.

Our colored brethren have a serious responsibility to reach the quarter million of their race in Oklahoma. More should be taking the *Message* Magazine and the volume, "Hope of the Race," to the thousands who sit in spiritual darkness.

Would that all districts in Oklahoma were Tulsa districts! Both *Tulsa* and *Muskogee* churches are ultra loyal in support of a strong and dynamic colporteur program. However, brethren, are we giving of our best to the Master? Where there is one worker, there ought to be many more to cooperate and extend the work.

In conclusion, let me say that if we will all pray for a great advancement this new year, greater things may be evident a year hence. The past year fourteen souls have been baptized as a result of the colporteurs' efforts, whole or in part. Two others are studying preparatory for that rite. Let us experience some enthusiasm: OKLAHOMA TO THE FRONT!

Because I have confidence in God and His willingness to guide every honest soul, I believe those books that were placed years ago will still do their appointed work, and especially when that time comes for the loud cry of the third angel's message, hundreds will be lead to read themselves into our message. We will never warn the 6,000,000 people in this great State of Texas unless our present forces are doubled and trebled. I believe there has never been a time since the beginning of the last World War when people have been so inquisitive about what the Bible says concerning present day conditions as they are right at this time.

I take this opportunity of extending an invitation to both men and women to consecrate their lives to the finishing of the work of God by joining the ranks of our workers.

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The Colporteur Work in Texico and the Prospects for 1941

IN SUMMING up our colporteur work for 1940, we find that 11 souls were baptized as a direct result of the work of our colporteurs, and that we made approximately a 20 per cent gain in deliveries over 1939. While we are very happy to see this progress in the

work, yet we are far from being satisfied with these results. For 1941 we want to see at least 20 souls baptized, and a 40 per cent gain in our deliveries over 1940, and with God's help and blessings we are planning on realizing this goal.

I am on my second recruiting tour since the first of the year, and the prospects for reaching our goal this year look very favorable. On the first trip there were 3 full-time and 2 parttime workers recruited, besides 2 good prospects for later on in the

year. Then thus far on the second tour, 4 full-time and 2 part-time colporteurs have been lined up. Along with this good start for increasing our colporteur force in Texico comes word from Elder Delafield at San Angelo that he has started out a fine colporteur there. The recruits are persons who have had from 4 to 25 years' experience in the work. This reminds me of the words of the servant of God when she said that the Lord is calling the colporteurs back to their work. I am sure that there are many other old colporteurs who will read these lines with whom the Holy Spirit is pleading to return to His work. May you listen to His pleadings, dear reader, and sit down and write a letter to your field missionary secretary who will be happy to help you return to the Lord's service.

Those who go to make up the others recruited this winter are those who have recently accepted the message. They are in their first love with a burning zeal to carry this message to those who do not know it. The Lord will bless that zeal and give. them success. These dear believers have heard the call of God to them and have consecrated their lives to His service, and the Lord is calling still others who have not yet responded. I beg of you that you do not put off the response to that call until it will be too late, for the work is fast being brought to a close.

Now the question comes to you who have been a long time in this blessed truth. The Lord may be calling you to His literature ministry. If the call rings out clear in your heart, will you respond to that call? When Philip heard the call to go down into the desert, he not only went at once, but he ran, and by responding in that manner he made the connection with the eunuch who received the message, and was converted.

The need for more colporteurs in the Texico Conference is great. If the Lord is calling you to this work, may you not give Him a deaf ear is my prayer.
