

be finished by Sept. 27. Another large force of more than 4000 volunteers under Major General Barclay are out on their annual maneuvers. There is much intensity and considerable strategy shown as citadel after citadel of the enemy falls. Over to the east another large force of nearly 3000 is battling for the Master who never lost a battle. Away in the west still another force of 1500 is bombarding the enemy.

This is no mimic war, for Satan, the commander of the opposing force, is thoroughly entrenched and is battling every inch of the territory. Were it not for the fact that angels of God are helping the righteous in this struggle, the outlook would be dark indeed. As it is however, with this added help banner after banner of the enemy has been taken, and many citadels occupied by the enemy are now in the possession of the men in the ranks.

God's troops are out after souls and dollars. Last week multitudes of the enemy had their minds turned to Jesus, and more than \$4,000 dollars came from the enemy's strongholds into the treasurehouse of the King of kings.

In this campaign the men in the ranks are given proper credit for the

victories thus gained. Now that the foes are retreating it is planned to put on a "blitz" that will require the services of every layman in the field. With the officers working and fighting with the men in the field, there is no reason why an overwhelming victory cannot be won by the end of September.

Any information that you desire as to expense, etc., should be directed to Elder V. W. Becker, Educational Superintendent for our conference.



Word has been received also that Dr. Dick will be present to lead out in the training work of the camp. Naturally, there will be other efficient help to make it worthwhile to all who attend.


The cost of the camp for each boy is approximately \$30. This is within the reach of all our young men.

Medical Cadet Training Camp

THIS camp is to be held on the Oklahoma campground, from October 30 to November 19.

PURPOSE

1. To give to all Seventh-day Adventist men of draft age a better spiritual preparation for the problems before them.

2. To fit them to render acceptable service for our nation in the Medical Corps of the Army, in case they are called to serve in the Army.

3. To give them elementary training in army courtesies and practices, which will be invaluable in solving problems of Sabbath keeping.

4. To provide instruction in defense against gas and airplane attacks, and the more common types of modern warfare.

5. To form a spirit of unity among Seventh-day Adventist youth, to be a strength to them in every personal crisis.

6. To acquaint them with the rights of noncombatants, with our laws, and with the documents and forms used at this time by the Army.

PROGRAM

The spiritual preparation to be given to the young men who attend will consist of a thorough preparation in Seventh-day Adventist doctrine. The course will be comprised of the following: a study of Bible doctrines, *Messages to Young People*, *Steps to Christ*, and the last section

of *Great Controversy*. This series of studies, carried on every day of the camp, will be similar to the work of the Advanced Study and Service League, as recommended by the Missionary Volunteer Department of the General Conference.

The program is strenuous, consisting of 12 hours of activity each day. The drill and physical exercise will be interspersed with instruction in first aid, litter drill (stretcher bearing), anatomy, camp hygiene, personal hygiene, organization of the Army, defense against gas and airplane attacks, army regulations, and the rights of noncombatants in time of war. Two hours a day will be spent in recreation and games. Two hours daily will be given over to spiritual instruction and man's duty to God.

Aside from this, there will be discussions each evening of the principles of noncombatancy during war time, of what comprises real conscientious objections, of how to conduct oneself in the presence of the officers and the other soldiers. Every effort will be put forth to give our young men the instruction that they will need to stand the test.

It is desired to call special attention to the matter of social activities during the camp. All social activities other than those provided by the camp will be entirely out of the question, as the program does not permit for any outside activities.

WHO MAY ATTEND

All S. D. A. men between the ages of 17 and 35 who are in good and

regular standing in the church may attend. Those older who feel they would like to attend and carry on the full program will be welcome. However, it is urged that all in the ages mentioned attend.

EXPENSES

Plans are being made to make it possible to give the full benefit of the camp for \$15. This will cover registration fee, uniform, medical examination, books, and tuition. As can be seen, the cost has been cut to the minimum. Then in addition to this, will be the expenses of room, meals, and laundry. All travel expenses are also in addition to the above.

We are estimating that room and meals for the three weeks will not be less than another \$15, and it may exceed it a little.

A registration fee of \$5 is required of all, which should be sent with the blank to the union office. That will leave a balance of \$25 at least that each one should have to meet other expenses.

ARTICLES TO BRING

1. Bedding.
2. Personal toilet articles.
3. *Bible, Christ in Song, Sabbath School Quarterly, Morning Watch Calendar, Messages to Young People, Steps to Christ, and Great Controversy.*
4. Proper clothing for outdoor work, and whatever you desire for Sabbath. The uniform will be provided upon arrival, and will be used almost entirely. Shoes should be black. Also, bring a black necktie and tennis shoes.
