

Sept. 27 to Oct. 4 Special Ingathering Drive

WITHOUT doubt this is the best Ingathering year in the history of the Southwest. We are going forward with increasing success. The only discordant note in the program is the fact that all our forces are not mobilized in this campaign.

In consultation with the Home Missionary Secretary today, we gave study to what we could do to encourage all our members to participate in the Ingathering at one time. Army Commissions

APPROXIMATELY 17,000 Seventh-day Adventist men have registered under the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940, and are subject to the draft. Somewhere in the neighborhood of 1,200 Seventh-day Adventist men are already in the army as a result of the draft. Many others, we do not yet know how many, are in the army by their own choice, either by voluntary enlistment or acceptance of an officer's commission. We learn of others who are in the navy, all of whom have voluntarily enlisted, for no draftee has yet been assigned to the navy.

The inquiries coming in to the National Service Commission regarding the matter of accepting commissions in the army, or voluntary enlistment are increasing. There are Seventh-day Adventist doctors who have applied for and accepted commissions in the medical department of the army under the impression they were complying with denominational counsel, who now raise the question as to whether this impression was correct.

It was not correct. The denomination has given no counsel with reference to the matter of Seventh-day Adventist doctors seeking or accepting reserve or active army

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commissions. It has not counseled, and does not now counsel, for or against it. It lets every man make his own decision.

Graduating classes at our medical college, I am told, have had presented to them by army officers the qualifications for reserve commissions. Seeming benefits and advantages of obtaining such commissions are no doubt described on such occasions. Perhaps it is because of this that the impression has developed that the denomination is urging our medical men to obtain army commissions.

To the question, "Is there anything inconsistent in a Sabbath-keeping noncombatant voluntarily enlisting or seeking or accepting an officer's commission?" army officers reply without hesitation that there is a most positive inconsistency.

They point out that in accepting a commission an oath of obedience is required, and it must be taken *without reservation*,—an oath pledging obedience to the lawful commands of superior officers.

Article 64 of the *Articles of War* declares that "Any person subject to military law who, on any pretense whatsoever . . . willfully disobeys any lawful command of his superior officer, shall suffer death or such

other punishment as a court-martial may direct." *Manual for Courts-Martial, U.S. Army*, p. 218.

Explanation is made that "The order must relate to military duty and be one which the superior officer is authorized under the circumstances to give the accused," and it is made plain in the interpretation military authorities give this matter that no defense for disobedience for such an order will be accepted when made on the ground of conscience or religion. The exact wording of the interpretation is "That obedience to a command involved a violation of the accused's religious scruples is not a defense." *Id.* pp. 148, 149.

This further explanation is made in the published *Articles of War*:

"The form of an order is immaterial, as is the method by which it is transmitted to the accused, but the communication must amount to an order and the accused must know that it is from his superior officer; that is, a commissioned officer who is authorized to give the order whether he is superior in rank to the accused or not.

"PROOF.—(a) That the accused received a certain command from a certain officer as alleged; (b) that such officer was the accused's superior officer; and (c) that the accused willfully disobeyed such a command. The command of a superior officer is presumed to be a lawful command." *Id.* p. 149.

How can a Seventh-day Adventist noncombatant take an oath without reservations when he knows he has reservations, and is determined to make those reservations known when an issue arises demanding it? If he is a faithful Seventh-day Adventist, he has reservations regarding both noncombatant service and Sabbath observance. If his commission is in a noncombatant unit, then he has reservations regarding Sabbath observance. If he takes such an oath avowedly, without reservations, and is then ordered to perform service on the Sabbath, which he is unable on grounds of conscience to perform, in what light does this place his conscientious scruples?

Officers are quick to come directly to the heart of the question by asking, as they have in more than one case most recently, "You say you have a conscience about the Sabbath; do you have no conscience about the oath of obedience you have taken?"

You claimed to have had no reservations; now you make clear you had reservations all the time, and we discover that fact only after you have obtained your commission on an avowal we now find to be false. When you said you had no reservations you said what you know to be untrue, for you did have reservations and have had them right along. You concealed that fact from us and by that concealment obtained a commission which you would not have been given if the truth had been known. What sort of a conscience is it that prompts you to do such an inconsistent thing?"

If, therefore, a Seventh-day Adventist doctor, dentist, or member of any other profession or craft, decides that it is his desire to go into the army or navy of his own choice, let him by all means be entirely honest and candid when doing so, and make known the fact that he has reservations about taking the oath of obedience when he takes it, not concealing this at the time, and then making it known later.

To follow this counsel may cost him his commission, but surely that will be preferable to obtaining a commission by concealing the truth.

The time to make his reservation known is the time of taking his oath. This may possibly keep him out of the army or navy. If so, this will be on the army's or navy's decision, not his own. He will at least have the satisfaction of knowing he has been absolutely straight-forward and honest. If, however, with his reservations about Sabbath-keeping and noncombatancy known, he is still given a commission, he will be entirely justified later in claiming his right of noncombatancy and his Sabbath-keeping privileges if and when such claim is to be made.

Oklahoma Going on the Air

WE ARE certainly living in the most serious time of the earth's history. The world is embroiled in the "Greatest Battle of the Ages" at the present time with more than nine million men facing each other across a front more than 2,000 miles long. Nor is this all, for in the last speech to the nation by the President of the United States, our country's great navy has been ordered to shoot on sight any raiders or submarines operated by the axis powers. This just about puts us into the conflict. Surely the text in Daniel 12:1, "there shall be a time of trouble, such as never was since there was a nation," is being fulfilled today.

While the armies of the world are mobilized for action, and the fighting forces of our own country are just concluding the greatest war-time maneuvers ever conducted by the U. S. To make a long story short, we are going to be permitted to use this great radio station, and in a few weeks will be broadcasting every Sunday morning, probably at 9:30 a. m. What a marvelous opportunity for the Oklahoma conference to preach the message over the air so that hundreds of thousands of people in every village and hamlet in this great state can hear the third angel's message. But all of this will cost money. Are you ready to help us in this great undertaking? I just know that you are!





We like it here in the Southwest, and trust we shall like it even more


Basic Conference


