

History of the Bayou Chene Church

IT WAS in the Spring of 1932 while located in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, that I received word from the conference that no funds were available for holding evangelistic efforts during that year and that each worker would be obliged to do what he could to strengthen the work already established.

A year before this I had conducted an effort on Bayou Plaquemine which resulted in a number accepting the message, among them certain persons who had formerly lived at Bayou Chene. These new believers became intensely interested in having their relatives and friends hear the message and made frequent appeals that an effort be held "on the Chene." (Pronounced shen, meaning "oak.")

This little settlement is located in the bayou country of south Louisiana between Plaquemine and New Iberia. This entire country is a system of deep flowing rivers, bayous, lakes, and islands. There are no roads whatever, all travel being by boat.

Brother William Watson in 1932 was located on Bayou Plaquemine engaged in towing and barge building. Being informed of the word I had received concerning our inability to hold evangelistic meetings, he agreed to take one of his boats and convey our tent to Bayou Chene, help us erect it, and return for it later free of charge, provided we would conduct an effort there. This we agreed to do. Shortly thereafter Brother Watson and I went out by

boat to secure a location and get acquainted with the situation. On our return trip the engine in our boat refused to work longer, and we spent the night on the bank of a bayou to the great delight of at least ten thousand mosquitoes.

Some days later we loaded our tent and equipment including a piano, lumber, family tent, etc., on board a barge and started for our location on the Chene. It was on Sunday that we arrived and set about pitching our tent immediately. It was located in a beautiful spot near some wide snreading oak and pecan trees, within fifty feet of the large and swiftly flowing river that was ninety feet in depth. Our tents were well screened against the many insects that inhabit this section.

When the opening night came it was interesting to hear motor boats approaching along the waterways that lav in every direction. They came night after night for four weeks. The people listened attentively and showed much interest in the message, but were oute reserved and slow to respond. We continued the effort for another two weeks beyond the period we had planned, during which time a goodly number of souls took their stand for the truth. Most all of those have remained true and faithful until now.

It gave me great pleasure to be with them again on September 13 after an absence of six years. On this date thirty-six men. women, and children, including Elders Benton, Roy. Ross, Neil, and myself, went out by boat for the dedication of the little church building which they

erected some months ago. Four persons were baptized by Elder Neil on this occasion also. A little building is being erected at this time for a church school.

The influence of this quaint, but very interesting and faithful group of believers has been felt throughout all this bayou country of Louisiana. We expect a further harvest of souls among the people of this section in the near future. I. C. POUND.

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mending them to the army as Adventist non-combatants. The record of their work will be kept on file by our office, and if at any time later they become Adventists, the regular Medical Cadet Certificate will be issued to them.

2. Bring winter underclothes, a pad or mattress for a single bed, and rubbers in addition to what you have already been told to bring in the RECORD of September 15.

3. A flat rate of \$30 has been set as the complete charge for attendance at the camp. This will give instruction, books, meals, lodging, medical examination, uniform, and all necessarv for the camp except transportation and laundry.

4. A special program is being prepared for the last day of the camp to which all are invited. Without doubt we will have some of the state and army officials present to see what the young men have learned.

We are counting on the conference workers and church leaders to contact every person who ought to attend this camp, and to help him make proper arrangements. There are only a few days left in which to do this. Thank you most sincerely for all you can do. R. J. Roy.


