It seems a miracle that any of them would ever become Christians. And yet some do, and very sincere Christians indeed. Their trials make them stronger, if they stand at all. Let us take advantage of our opportunities now. When the night comes, what will we say about those whom we have permitted the world to teach? What will they have to stand on?

While there we met the sub-committee which included Elders Glenmore Carter. Lee Carter, Professor Pierce and Elder Baker. Quite a large number of items came before us and we believe that the Spirit of God was present as we 'discussed each individual problem. We all recognize that Brother Pierce and his wife have done much in building up the Ozark Academy, and we could not ask anyone to sacrifice more than this dear couple has.

It was a pleasure to meet with the faculty of this school. We were impressed with their sincere desire to carry the work God has given them to do in a way that will meet the approval of heaven. I don't know when we have seen a more enthusiastic, robust student body than we have at our academy.

We visited a number of the classes and found the students with a desire to learn and giving attention to their class work. I do trust that with the help and counsel of the committee, each faculty member felt that his work has been strengthened.

Brother Woodland and Miss Duce. who have charge of the intermediate grades. are doing good work at the school. Their rooms would indicate the artistic turn of both of these teachers, and we are glad to learn that the Gentry church is carrying its full share in looking after the financial part of the church school. It was a real pleasure to meet Elder H. S. Miller, the Bible teacher of the academy and also pastor of the Gentry church. He presented plans that had been discussed by the Gentry church for a new church building, and anyone who is conversant with their situation would agree that they do need a church building. Brother Miller informed us that the congregation had already pledged approximately \$2500 toward a new building and they would like to begin at an early date to excavate for this building. We were sorry to inform them that the present plans of the denomination are to get the approval from the local and union committees before spending money.

We invite the members in our conence to earnestly pray that the Lord will help us in providing the proper educational and church facilities for the young people who attend our school.

You who have made pledges to the Ozark Academy and have not yet paid them are invited to turn your money into the church treasurers so that we can have the money in hand to complete the projects that are in hand.

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M. V. Corner

EVERY one of the 55 members of our Ephesus Junior Academy M. V. Society is working on at least one vocational honor. Every member of the society is also a member of some praver band. They have formed a servicemen's correspondence band. This would be a good plan for more of our societies to follow.

Brother and Sister Donald E. Mote of New Orleans report they have given out thousands of pieces of literature' near their home during the last few months. As a result some of their neighbors are about to take their stand for the Master.

All fourteen members of the Hammond M. V. Society are reading the current Reading Course books. During the month they distributed 165 pieces of literature. Every member of the M. V. Society in the New Orleans school, primary room, has a faithful record of observing the Morning Watch for the month of November. The 16 members of the Italian M. V. Society of New Orleans made seven missionary visits, conducted 28 gospel meetings or Bible readings, and distributed 304 pieces of literature during the month of November.

The primary room of the Shreveport school has set out to win one of their members who comes from a non-Adventist home. The last report is that this youth is now attending Sabbath school quite regularly. Even though the Monroe Society has only eight members, yet they spent 45 hours in Christian help work during the month of November. They also made 22 missionary visits, and gave three Bible readings.

The Shreveport M. V. Society, colored, reports that they have been praying for a certain young man who is in the armed services of our country. Recently he started paying tithe. They are now praying that he may soon take his stand definitely for Christ.

The one dozen M. V.'s of the Shreveport intermediate room are all observing the Morning Watch regularly. One of their number is not systematically reading the Bible through. They made 68 missionary visits, and spent 77 hours in Christian help work during the month of November.

As a result of the faithful prayers of the members of the Grand River M. V. Society, one entire family has now started attending Sabbath school. Several members of the Baton Rouge M. V. Society, primary room, were recently baptized. Another baptismal service has been planned for the near future when more of these J. M. V.'s will unite with our church.

Our largest M. V. society is the one located at our academy at Gentry. The senior society has a membership of 110. Their average attendance for the month of November was 120. They conducted eight gospel meetings and put in 57 hours in Christian help work. Fifty of this number are studying for a vocational honor. The Gentry M. V. Society, intermediate room, reports an enrollment of 28. They report 17 Bible readings or gospel meetings held, 150 hours of Christian help work, 55 articles of clothing given to the needy, 44 missionary visits, 42 taken to Sabbath school or other gospel meetings, and 60 persons given needed help during the month of November. These are only a few of the excellent things they are reporting.

The senior society at Shreveport recently gave out hundreds of temperance pamphlets, thus helping to cause two wards in their parish to vote dry at a recent election.

Subscriptions to the Youth's Instructor are really beginning to pour in as a result of the campaign which closes December 31. A number of societies are quite determined to win the Reading Course books.
