Our Next 13th Sabbath Overflow

The Inter-American Division, our nearest neighbor to the south of us, is one of the greatest mission fields in all the world. It has the largest baptized membership of all our overseas divisions. It is the fastest growing field in the world. During the year 1943 a new Sabbath school or church was raised up every 3.7 days. Nowhere in the world has a better record than this been made.

As one passes from country to country in the Inter-American Division, many things impress themselves upon the mind. But the most overwhelming thing that I saw in all the the countries I visited, was the need of medical work. This was common to all countries. It stood out far above every other need that I saw.

We are years behind with our medical work in this Division. To date we do not have a single medical institution in all this great field of some twenty-five different countries. There is not a single place where nurses can be trained. There is not a place where our people can be taught how to give simple treatments, or taught the first principles of sanitation. Surely these conditions should be changed.

One of the most interesting, yes, the most encouraging thing that I saw in the entire Division, was the little medical and dental clinic in Caracas, Venezuela. This clinic was started under the able leadership of

Elder A. R. Sherman. Besides a deep conviction that something should be done to help the people, about all that he had to start with was a courageous heart and a pair of dental forceps. But the work has grown beyond all expectations. Now four dental chairs are kept busy from 6 a. m.

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Straws Show the Direction of The Wind

Only two years ago the members of the Southwestern Union were giving in their Sabbath school offerings a sum of money which amounted to nine cents per capita for its members. The December report for the union pictured for 1944 a nice increase, and when the figures were compiled it was revealed that the members of the union gave a per capita of a little over twenty cents.

This is a magnificent incease over any previous year. We are happy because this liberality has placed many thousands of dollars in the General Conference treasury to be used in winning souls to Jesus. All through the years of Sabbath school offerings have been a factor in sending the message to lands beyond.

The year 1945 is opening before us, and with the prosperity that has been attending God's people there is no reason why we cannot make an-

other fine gain for missions. Even though we have made a decided improvement in cur giving, yet the fact remains that many of our members are giving about the same as they did in years gone by. These dear souls should remember that with increased wages and a larger income goes a greater responsibility, and by giving more in their Sabbath school offerings they show a desire to see the work of God finished in the earth.

- 2. Results: Thousands of souls have been influenced and won to this truth directly or indirectly through the Signs of the Times. In 1943 our people in Arkansas-Louisiana subscribed to 2,000 Signs. Last year we had a 33 per cent increase, which brought it to 3,000. This means about one Signs subscription per member in our field. You will be interested to know that every subscription for 1944 has been followed up by a personal letter and enrollment blank for the Bible Correspondence course sent out from our conference office. Some of the members of the Little Rock church mailed these letters and enrollment blanks out. According to Elder Mattison a large number have enrolled in our course. We plan to do the same for all subscriptions coming in this year.
- 3. PRICE: The English Signs in a club of five or more is \$1 per subscription. Single subscriptions to any address in the United States, \$1.35. The Signs also comes in the Danish, Norweign, German, Italian, Swedish, Spanish. Prices for these foreign periodicals can be furnished from our office.
- 4. DATE OF CAMPAIGN: February 24 to March 3. We trust that on these two Sabbaths strong emphasis will be placed on the Signs by the missionary leaders, elders and pastors. Special campaign prices will apply from February 1 to May 31. The goal for Arkansas-Louisiana is one and a half Signs per church member, or 4,500 Signs.

Our isolated believers, too, will rally to the support of the Signs. "More Signs, More Homes, More Souls". Arkansas-Louisiana will do its part. We are just closing a most successful Ingathering campaign. Tulsa Junior Academy

For many years Tulsa Junior Academy was housed in the commodious but poorly lighted and ventilated basement of the church. In the winter of 1942-43 the board decided a move must be made at the first opportunity. To this end a committee was appointed to investigate any and all possible locations. As site after site proved disappointing, the board became more unanimously in favor of remodeling the parsonage. Labor shortage seemed to make it impossible, but loyal patrons spent their Sundays and evenings on the new school so that for most of the 1943-44 term the elementary grades were housed in new flourescent lighted rooms. By the opening of the school year 1944-1945, the academy students were also in the new school building with all rooms made larger, refinished, and the academic students in new individual unit desks.

In the matter of scholarship aids, improvements have been made in that all text and workbooks used are those in line with the new course of study recommended by educators in and out of the denomination. Liberal use is made of our new duplicator and master copies for a number of seat-work projects in units for most of the elementary grades, and for tests, etc., for all.

Because of the great expense entailed in the remodeling, improving, and the maintaining of a three-teacher school, it was thought best to continue the use of our old heating equipment. A very sad incident this year proved otherwise so that now all of our heaters are fire safe and are circulators.

Recreation for recess for the upper grades has always been an easy matter for this school, situated as it is adjacent to Central Park which offers ample room for a dozen different running games. But for little children there was no place for swings, teeters, etc. Within a few days an old garage will be moved off the school grounds and in its place will

be erected steel supported swings and teeters for the little folk of our school.

The local Dorcas, always ready to help in every good work, has given the school the money for a substantial flagpole and flag that soon will be waving in front of the building.

In Tulsa Junior Academy books are recognized as secondary sources of knowledge. Trips to parks, public gardens, zoo, wild bird refuge, factories, stock shows, the well-equipped Carnegie Library, and radio studios make up a very important part of the yearly school program.

Plans for the future include major additions to the library and reference book shelves, reseating of the whole school with the best type of schoolroom furniture, and new desks for the elementary teachers. Since registration has increased from fifty to seventy also the grades continue to increase in size from the first up, definite plans must be made before long to increase the size of the rooms as they are already crowded. With a school-minded church, such as Tulsa following the aggressive leadership of Elder C. Ray Kinney and the live board, a new school building seems to hinge on when materials will be available rather than on getting the church ready for such an improve-

Miss Freida Helmer, with nine years of teaching experience, leading grades five through eight in a strong year's work, and Miss Lila Fehrer, doing the same for the first four grades, have made the church more school-minded. There is a good spirit throughout, all of which will be needed in reaching the goal of plans that mean an A-1 plant for Tulsa.

Leaving The Big City

For years we here in America have spoken with considerable pride of our free competitive economy. It has been part of the American way; and we still enjoy to a certain degree this flexible way. War fought on a total basis, however, tends to throttle this free movement. The state has to step in and put on the pressure for all-out production. Plants have to be erected and paid for by the government, operated and managed by the government. Our personal freedom of action in the field of economics is therefore of necessity greatly curtailed in time of a global war.

What will it be like after the war is over? Certainly we all recognize that there will be tremendous problems in connection with a program of reconverting industry. There will be great problems of unemployment, especially during the time of readjustment. No doubt the government will still have to take a strong hand in our economic program. Some go as far as to say that the restoration of a free competitive economy is the vision only of starry-eyed dreamers. They say a free economy is unworkable if prices are controlled by corporate groups, monopolies and trade associations or labor unions.

Now what does all this mean to a Seventh-day Adventist? It simply means this, that a Seventh-day Adventist day laborer working in a factory will no doubt have a most difficult time in many instances. It is not so difficult for us to fit into a competitive economy, but we will find ourselves square pegs in round holes trying to fit into a fixed or compensatory economy, which may be expected. Surely the words of the Spirit of / prophecy are worth thinking about: "To parents He sends the warning cry, 'Gather your children into your own houses. Gather them away from those who are disregarding the commandments of God, who are teaching and practicing evil. Get out of the large cities as fast as possible. Establish church schools. Give

your children the word of God as the foundation of all education."

If you know of someone who is anxious to heed the instruction of the Spirit of prophecy, why not give such an individual or individuals a hearty invitation to come to New Mexico or Texas where there is still plenty of room for those who want to live away from the cities.

Our prayer meeting attendence which is an index to the spiritual experience of the church, increased about 400 per cent, and this increase in attendence has been constantly maintained for the past five months.

This year we decided to do our Ingathering work in two weeks—a task never before accomplished by our church. Many thought it impossible. The super goal was about \$700 more than our church had ever raised before. But hundreds of our people caught the spirit and with a will went to work. One night about seventy went out in three singing bands and returned with pans full of silver and some currency. The silver gathered in that night actually weighed over 40 pounds. The total amount that night was over \$450.

By Tuesday night of the second week of our Ingathering campaign, we were past our super goal of \$2480. The total turned in to date is \$3641.41, which is \$1161.41 over our super goal, and the best part of it is that about 400 had a part, which is nearly twice as many as worked in the Ingathering the year before. The result was we raised more than twice as much funds in Ingathering as the Keene church ever raised before.

It was made very evident that the spirit of missions, and the vision of giving the gospel quickly to the entire world, has not died out in Keene when our people were given an opportunity by Elder McKinley to give for the restoration of our missions on February 3. Our goal was \$2500. On that day our people gave in cash and pledges (two thirds cash) \$3051.90.

Last year we did much to make our

church a suitable sanctuary for the Lord. This year we plan to improve it still more.

In Keene and Cleburne there are more than 25 who have expressed a desire to prepare for baptism. Pray for these dear souls.

to 10 a. m. every day except Sabbath, while teeth are extracted. Then from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m. medical cases are treated.

I dropped into the clinic one Sunday morning at 7 a. m. As I neared the place I saw people coming from every direction. To my surprise, when I reached the clinic I found over one hundred in the waiting room, and still they were coming. Over thirty had already pased through the clinic. More than two hundred people received dental help that morning. Never have I seen four men any busier than were those four men that morning, extracting teeth.

Many of these people that visited

the clinic had never before been in a dental chair. The condition of their teeth verified this fact. But how grateful they seemed for the help they received! It sounds almost unbelieveable, but during the year 1943 over 41,000 teeth were extracted in this clinic.

As one visits the medical department of this clinic, he is impressed by how much can be accomplished with so very little in the way of equipment. A few things for giving hydrotherapy treatments, a few lamps, a kind touch. and the miracle of healing happens. It is wonderful the relief that can be brought to human sufferers by a kind, symapthetic hand, even though one has little with which to work.

We are glad to learn that definite plans are under way for starting two sanitariums in the Inter-American Division. One of these is to be located in Mexico, and the other on the island of Jamaica. They surely are needed. These institutions will be training centers. Here nurses will be trained, and our health program properly presented to the people. No one can estimate the blessing these institutions will be to our work and to the people.

The leadership in the Inter-American Division believes in the medical work. Everything possible is being done within the division field to build up this work. But the resources within the fields are limited. They must have outside assistance. And here is where every believer in North America can have a part. The Thirteenth Sabbath school overflow offering for this first quarter of 1945 will go to the Inter-American Division for medical work.
