A New Spanish Church



Which New "Car" Will You Choose?

Many of our people with whom I have visited of recent weeks tell me that they are ready with their cash to buy a new automobile. Some of the new cars are now being shown, but due to the several industrial strikes, the manufacture of new cars have been stopped or slowed up during the last several months. Some automobile sales agents have told me that civilians ordinarily should not expect to obtain an new automobile for many months to come unless they have several hundred dollars of "side money" to "turn the deal."

When the time comes, the Lord in kindness sparing our lives, so we can drive our next new car, I trust you will have chosen the best make of car available. Most of these modern cars are good in the hands of a sensible driver! There is, however, only one make of "car" I feel constrained to warn you against getting into. This make of a "car" is described in the fellowing paragraph:

"Satan has tried to the uttermost to sever the chain that unites men to Cod; he desires to bind their souls to his own car, and make them slaves in his service; but we are to work against him, and draw men to the Redeemer." Mrs. E. G. White in Colporteur Evangelist, p. 63.

Could it be that there are Seventhday Adventists in our churches who are in the wrong "car"? I fear that many of our people who are in the world's work and business are so fully occupied in the cares of this life until they have lost the sense of the principal object of church membership, and the service which God has for them in drawing many honest souls to the Reedemer.

Dear Seventh-day Adventist reader, is God calling you to "change cars" and devote your talents to Him in the colporteur ministry? The Southwestern Union has at present 355 counties in which are many prosperous cities and towns where there is not a Seventh-day Adventist church and not a regular colporteur nor a resident minister proclaiming the third angel's message.

Not only should we use great care in the selection of the right "car" but the course we take is of important consequence to us and others.

"The destiny of earth's teeming multitudes is about to be decided. Our own future well-being, and also the salvation of other souls depend upon the course which we now pursue." Great Controversy, p. 601.

"We have not time now to give our energies and talents to worldly enterprises. . . . Let every talent be employed in the work of God." Vol. IX, p. 104.

While we urgently need many more colporteurs in our great far flung union I would not even infer that all should engage in the colporteur work. Only such should engage in this work who have a conviction that God has called them to do for Him at this time. Having found your place in God's service, whatever that line of service it is, may God help you to do it with all your heart, because the Southwestern Union needs real soul winners in every line in order to measure with these opportune and solemn times.

Sabbath School Grading

On January 29 the Sabbath school secretaries of the Southwestern Union met in council to study the grading question. The thought was to formulate a system that would be a challenge, yet goals that could be reached by diligent effort.

After hours of prayerful study and deliberation a grading plan was worked out, and then brought before the Southwestern Union Committee which was in session at the time.

A. Membership Goal

Realizing that there are hundreds of members in the Southwestern Union who are not members of the Sabbath school, and feeling that every member of the church ought to par-

ticipate in the blessings of Sabbath school membership, we definitely recommend a strong program of promotion to enroll every member of the church in the Sabbath school, and as a basis for a goal-Upon a motion duly supported, it was

Voted: That we adopt the church membership as it appears on the church tithe and mission offerings statement as the Sabbath school membership goal; and further, as a basis of counting absentee members on the local membership goal, who are attending a Sabbath school elsewhere, a definite report confirming this must. be received by the Sabbath School Council and passed upon.

B. Financial Goal

Whereas it is recognized that our Sabbath school mission offerings should be definitely increased to meet the needs of the great world field, Upon a motion duly supported,

Voted: That we make the alternate goal for the Sabbath school a 15 per cent increase over the corresponding quarter of the preceding year in all churches that have not reached the General Conference goal of 30 cents per week per member.

C. Daily Lesson Study Goal In order to encourage daily study of the Bible, it was

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A Fire in Their Bones

"For he will finish the work, and cut it short in righteousness: because a short work will the Lord make upon the earth." Romans 9:28.

"Those whom God chooses as workers are not always talented, in the estimation of the world. Scmetimes He selects unlearned men. To these He gives a special work. They reach a class to whom others could not obtain access. Opening the heart to the truth, they are made wise in and through Christ." Testimonies, Vol. VIII, p. 25.

In one of our conferences a man, who never had the advantages of an education but did have a burden for souls, ctarted a lay effort in a community where our church work was at a low ebb. Not only were souls won, but the church was greatly strengthened. When verbs and adjectives came into this man's mind, it was too bad for them, as they were sure to be abused. Yet, notwithstanding this handicap, this brother in another state raised up a church.

'God will move upon men in humble positions to declare the message of present truth. Many such will be seen hastening hither and thither, constrained by the Spirit of God to give the light to those in darkness. The truth is as a fire in their bones, filling them with a burning desire to enlighten those who sit in darkness. Many, even among the uneducated, will proclaim the word of the Lord. Children will be impelled by the Holy Spirit to go forth to declare the message of heaven. The Spirit will be poured out upon those who yield to His promptings. Casting off man's binding rules and cautious movements, they will join the army of the Lord." Testimonies, Vol. VII, pp. 26,

Not only will humble men be called to the work, but even children will be impelled to declare the truth. In our Ingathering campaign in one church, the children raised hundreds of dollars. They told the people that they were missionary volunteers for Jesus. A prosperous saloon keeper became interested in the message through a magazine sold to him by one of our sisters. This man accepted the truth, went into the colporteur work, and in 1944 sold and delivered nearly \$14,000 worth of our literature. The day of miracles has not passed.

Hundreds should be out holding meetings. "There are men who never gave a discourse in their lives, who ought to be laboring to save souls. Neither great talents nor high position is required. But there is urgent need of men and women who are acquainted with Jesus, and familiar with the story of His life and death." Life Sketches, p. 274.

The Southwestern Union has prepared a syllabus to help our brothers and sisters who are going out into the rural sections to give the message. Your home missionary secretary can give you information regarding how

to obtain a copy.

The year 1946 should be a year of soul winning. The Spirit is searching for those individuals who will go. Why not send back the answer "Here am I: send me."

Voted: That we encourage the Sabbath school members to study their lessons daily, asking them to keep a record of their daily lesson study in

their lesson quarterlies, and that we adopt the goal of 50 percent average daily study computed on the Sabbath school membership; and that the record be taken each week in each class by the teacher's asking for a show of hands of all who have maintained a perfect daily lesson study record for the current week, the teacher recording only the total number and not the individual records. In the children's divisionscradle roll, kindergarten, and primary—the parents are to be responsible for giving the record for their children at the close of the quarter on the regular cards provided for that purpose.

Basis of Computing Goals-

An "A" School—all three goals reached

A "B" School—two goals reached A "C" School—one goal reached

This plan was adopted for the Sabbath schools in our union. Each Sabbath school will receive a letter from its conference Sabbath school secretary explaining more fully the new plan, and giving suggestions as to how each goal can be achieved. We believe this new plan will be a help to all of our Sabbath schools.

"Thanks Be to God"

I desire to present a brief report of the Lord's blessings upon our church here at Fort Worth during the year that has just passed into history.

Naturally, we are not satisfied with what has been accomplished, but we do recognize that God has been good to us and feel that the readers of the RECORD will be pleased to have this report.

For the first time in the hictory of the church has the membership reached the 300 mark and gone over. The present membership stands at about 320. Thirty-three were added by baptism and profession of faith during the year 1945. Our church is filled every Sabbath with worshippers and we invite you to come in and worship with us any time it is convenient for you.

Because of the need of more seating space we have just placed new opera seats in the balcony, which makes the balcony a very comfortable as well as desirable place.

Our Ingathering was finished in two weeks. The goal was \$1,810 and in the two weeks we raised \$2,207. This means that we will be about \$500 over our goal by the time the rest of it comes in. We appreciate the faithfulness of our constituency, the individual members of every church which make these kind of reports possible.

During the year the church paid \$28,167 in tithe; \$6,434 in mission

offerings, and the Week of Sacrifice, the largest in the history of the church, was \$951. In other words the church turned in funds this past year to the extent of a grand total of \$45,041. We trust that there figures are an indication of the spiritual progress of the church as well. Certainly God has been good to us and blessed his people. Progress has been noted along every line. We are constrained to cry out with the Psalmist, "God hath done great things for us, where of we are glad."

We appeal to all our members to be faithful in the future, for surely, the Lord's coming is near. We do want to be ready to meet him in peace, unashamed and unafraid. Pray for the work in Fort Worth.

Labor Union Difficulties

The General Conference has adopted and announced a policy regarding industrial relations and membership in labor unions. This has been published in the *Review and Herald* and placed on record with the government and the great labor federations.

The General Conference has also brought into being a Council on Industrial Relations to give counsel and assistance to our members in this field as the War Service Commission did in the field of military relations.

For many years it has been the conviction of Adventists that they should stand apart from secret societies and labor unions. Such a conviction has been based on the plain teaching of the Word of God, as well as the *Testimonies to the Church*.

A large amount of correspondence has resulted from the announcement of the creation of the Council on Industrial Relations and its offer to assist in labor union difficulties.

These difficulties are rapidly increasing. Inquiries regarding procedure are coming from all parts of the United States and Canada.

While the headquarters of the Council on Industrial Relations is in Washington, each of the ten union conference organizations in the North American Division has appointed regional representatives of the council to serve its respective members. Some local conferences have done the same.

The regional representative for the Southwestern Union Conference is Elder J. B. Ross. He may be addressed at union conference head-quarters.

In cases of labor union difficulty arising in this union conference territory, Elder Ross should be informed, and his help sought. He has supplies of the forms of agreement we are requesting local unions to negotiate in behalf of our members, and individual identification cards which are a part of the agreement.

Local unions in several places have already signed agreements recogniz-
