A Cable for You

In this our land of privilege and peace, of prosperity and plenty, it is exceedingly difficult for our people to comprehend the needs of their brethren and sisters in less-favored lands. At the risk of seeming to be too insistent and biased in our outlook and burden I feel again to bring to the attention of our membership the desperate plight of our people in these lands, in the hope that there may be a very generous response to the relief offering to be received in our churches of North America on October 29.

Effort has been made to acquaint our people with conditions and needs in central Europe. We repeat that the situation there is desperate. Food is the first essential need. Unless they receive special help, many, many, will perish. Their present food allowance is not adequate. It is a slow starvation program. Their second need is for clothing. Practically no textiles are available, and these of poor quality and exceedingly high in price. Clothing must be supplied.
