"I Do Not Care"

COME time ago I was holding some N meetings, and after we had presented the Sabbath question, a man said he thought I was preaching from an Adventist Bible, so he was going to town the next day and buy a Bible of his own. The following morning, after he had been to town, he brought a Bible out of the house to show me that his new Bible did not have the Sabbath commandment in it. I took the Bible, which was the King James Version that I had been preaching from, and read the commandment to him. He then said, "I do not care. I will not keep it anyway."

There are thousands of people in the world who are like this man. They want to live a careless life, choose their own paths, and then hope that God will save them. How many times people say, "I know the Bible points out certain things, but I don't care. I will live a good moral life, and Jesus will save me." Not long ago a church member took to drinking. When he was approached about what the Bible says in regard to "look not thou upon the wine," he became very indignant and said he did not care, for God could save him anyway.

God has placed His Word in the world to be a light unto our path. (Psalm 119:105.) Not the hearers of the Word are just before God, but the *doers*. Some are eating swine's flesh but hope God will overlook it and let them go to the kingdom. The prophet of old says, "They that sanctify themselves, and purify themselves in the gardens behind one tree in the midst, eating swine's flesh,

and the abomination, and the mouse, shall be consumed together, saith the Lord." Isaiah 66:17. A man said to me one time, "I know I swear some, but I do not care, for I know the

Remember March 1

ABBATH, March 1, has been designated as Home Foreign Day for North America. On this date, every church is expected to have a special program to emphasize this important part of our missionary program. To aid the church leaders in planning effective presentations, an interesting program on the topic, "Witnessing to Foreign-Speaking Neighbors," has been placed in Go magazine for use on March 1.

The 1950 census has proved that there are 10,147,000 foreign-born people in the United States. Included in this number are 267,000 displaced persons that have arrived during the past three years. These people are numbered in different parts of the country as follows: Northeast, 5,216,000; North Central, 2,625,000; South, 735,000; West, 1,571,000. Of the total it is estimated that 2,000-000 do not understand the English language. As shown by the census figures, foreigners have scattered to every part of the country. Careful observation will show that there may be some in every church district.

foreign-language ministers The are reaching only a few of these people. All churches must now assume the responsibility for giving the message of salvation to foreigners wherever they are located. Home visitation gives opportunity for contacting foreigners in the communities. Some may speak English fairly well, but they can read and understand best in their mother lan. guages and usually are attracted by literature because they enjoy reading in their languages. One of the best ways to interest foreigners in our message is through literature.

There are publications available

in most of the languages that will be encountered. Weekly missionary periodicals may be ordered in German, Swedish, and Danish-Norwegian at the same subscription rates as the English Signs. There are monthly missionary journals in the Italian, Ukrainian, French, and Spanish languages. Many items of inexpensive missionary literature, such as small books, tracts, and correspondence lessons dealing with the main teachings of Seventh-day Adventist doctrines, are available in twenty languages. This literature may be ordered through your church missionary secretary or the Book and Bible House.

It is utterly impossible to cover all the homes at one time, so it is most important that our churches and districts be so organized that there will not be any duplication in succeeding home visitations.

Could not many more of our churches plan for home visitation once a week, or at least once a month? This plan has brought new life to many churches. We cannot afford to lose the blessing that comes to those who engage in this wonderful work. May Sabbath, March 8, be the best Home Visitation Day we have yet had.

BAPTISMS.

It is always a pleasure to look back over the records of the year and to see how the Lord has blessed in a very material way in the soul-winning endeavors of our ministers and laymen. Especially is this true in 1951, for 294 souls were united with

the church by baptism and profession of faith during this year.

A hasty glance over the records shows that the churches in Fort Arkansas, Smith, New Orleans, Shreveport, and the conference church had additions to their membership each quarter either by baptism or profession of faith. Thirteen churches had baptisms during the year equalling at least ten per cent of their membership at the beginning of the year. These churches are Fort Smith, Decatur, Springdale, Harrison, Bonnerdale, Malvern, New Orleans, New Orleans Italian, Shreveport, Pocahontas, Searcy, DeQueen, and Plaquemine. A number of other churches reported baptisms for three quarters, and several lacked only one soul of reaching their goal of ten per cent of the membership in baptisms. Certainly the workers and laymen have cooperated in a remarkable way to make this achievement possible. We want to thank each one of you for this marvelous achievement during the year.

Another outstanding feature of the report is the fact that of the twelve districts, eight report baptisms from 21 to 45. This has been done without intensive evangelism or large efforts, but rather as an all-over program in which the laity and the ministers have coordinated their efforts and pushed forward.

Our only concern as we look into the future is to guard lest the evil one upset a program of progress and cause each one of us to slacken his pace or to become entangled in the snares of the world. Shall we not pray now and plan for a greater baptism in 1952? Let each church set as its goal the addition of souls by baptism and profession of faith equal to ten per cent of its membership at the beginning of the year, and to plan for a baptism in every church every quarter in 1952. If we do this, we can be assured of church every quarter in 1952. If a close.

20th Century Bible School
