"Heavenly angels have long been waiting for human agents—the members of the church—to cooperate with hem in the great work to be done. They are waiting for YOU."—Ibid., Vol. 9, pp. 46, 47. Yes, brother, sister,

they are waiting for YOU. For YOU! But you say, "I am not qualified; I have not been trained; let those who are better qualified for such service do the work."

This alibi would be acceptable were it not for the solemn fact that God is waiting for YOU. Have you heard His urgent call? Have you? Have you answered it? Has the Holy Spirit been tugging at your heartstrings for months, or perhaps years, urging you to devote your life to literature evangelism? Has He?

No doubt, brother, sister, if President Eisenhower would send one of his personal representatives to go with you to perform a special task, that representative would not have to wait long. You would be ready and anxious to serve your President and country in such a striking and honorable way. One far greater than any

earthly king or ruler is waiting and anxious for you to answer the invitation to carry God's message for this time in the form of the printed page to a sick and dying world. He is waiting for YOU.

As you answer the call, learn the canvass, then go from home to home with a heavenly messenger in the form of an angel by your side, you will be performing a work second to none. "If there is one work MORE IMPORTANT THAN ANOTHER, it is that of getting our publications before the public, thus leading them to search the Scriptures."—Christian Service, p. 80.

"In a large degree through our publishing houses is to be accomplished the work of that other angel who comes down from heaven with great power, and who lightens the earth with His glory."—Ibid., p. 148.

But you say, "God does not call everybody to do colporteur work." Very true, indeed. But has He called you? Has He? Is He speaking to your heart just now? Is He?

As God speaks to your heart, brother, sister, telling you the hour is late and the field is already white unto harvest, do not turn a deaf ear to His pleading. Just drop to your knees and say, "Yes, Lord, I will do what You want me to do. I will say what You want me to say. I will go where You want me to go. I am answering the call just now. Here is my name and address and I am mailing it TODAY to the conference office, letting them know I have answered the call."

When in all sincerity you have done this, the responsibility for your training and necessary preparation for literature evangelism will rest squarely on the shoulders of the publishing department secretary, and ere long you will be ready for him to go with you from home to home doing one of the greatest forms of evangelism known today. No calling is higher in the sight of heaven, and no work more important.

"God has His workmen in every age. The call of the hour is answered by the coming of the man. . . . Who will go forth now with our publications? The Lord imparts a fitness for the work to every man and woman who will cooperate with divine power. All the requisite talent, courage, perseverance, faith, and tact will come as they put the armor on. A great work is to be done in our world, and human agencies will surely respond to the demand. The world must hear the warning. When the call comes, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' send back the answer clear and distinct, 'Here am I; send me.' . . .

"Some are better adapted than others for doing a certain work; therefore it is not correct to think that every one can be a canvasser. Some have no special adaptability for this work; but they are not, because of this, to be regarded as faithless or unwilling. The Lord is not unreasonable in His requirements. The church is as a garden in which is a variety of flowers, each with its own peculiarities. Though in many respects all may differ, yet each has a value of its own."—Testimonies, Vol. 6, pp. 332-334.

In preparation for the ministry, the servant of the Lord has said, "This will be an excellent experience for any who have the ministry in view. Those who are fitting for the ministry can engage in no other occupation that will give them so large an experience as will the canvassing work." —*Ibid.*, p. 334.

May God's richest blessing be yours as you sign your name and make application for entrance into the great army of literature evangelists that those who know not the truth of God for this time may be quickly warned and made ready for the second coming of Christ so soon to take place. God is calling for men and women who are successful in other lines of endeavor. It may be the plow, the vineyard, the office, or other branches of work. Will you say "yes" to the call of the Master today? Is He waiting for you? Is He?

THROUGH the years of our denom-I inational growth the influence of literature distributed has been very great. There are thousands of believers in our churches today who credit literature that came into their homes as being the agency that revealed the truth to them. What stronger argument than this is there for multiplying the printed page and circulating it still more extensively? If God can use the printed message to unfold the truth to some people, causing them to accept it and surrender their lives to Him, will He not likewise use increasing quantities of this literature to attract larger numbers to take the same steps?

How emphatically the Lord has spoken through His servant of the importance of scattering the printed page! We have all heard the expression that the message in printed form should be circulated like the leaves of autumn. That doubtless applies to all types of message literature, books, magazines, tracts. But the special work of colporteurs has been emphasized as of exceptional importance.

Writing on the importance of the colporteur work, Sister White stated in Volume 6 of the Testimonies: "We cannot too highly estimate this work; for were it not for the effort of the canvasser [colporteur], many would never hear the warning."—Page 313. In that same section appears also the challenging statement: "From the light given me I know that where there is one canvasser in the field, there should be one hundred."—Page 315.

In the very little time that may remain to us to bring God's message to the multitudes, the call is for volunteers, many of them, to join

"Thy People Shall Be Willing in the Day of Thy Power"

1952 was the best year Texico has ever enjoyed in literature sales by seven thousand dollars. Even though we delivered a little over thirty thousand dollars' worth, this was less than two and one-half cents per capita of our population-about enough to buy one small tract each. The latter-day prophet says our literature "should be scattered like the leaves of autumn," and one of the Bible prophets wrote centuries ago, "Thy people shall be willing in the day of Thy power." We are living in this time, and I am wondering if we really believe what we believe.

We have seventy-eight counties in West Texas, and all of the state of New Mexico, in our conference. There are two colporteurs in New Mexico and five or six in the seventy-eight counties of West Texas. We have good territory in some of the largest oiland gas-producing fields of the United States, as well as many government projects and a rich farming section along the Rio Grande and Pecos rivers of New Mexico and in the large irrigated section of West Texas.

The deliveries per hour in Texico are the highest in the Southwestern Union. We need at least fifteen more regular full-time colporteurs. There are many of our faithful members in this field who could be earning from one to three dollars per hour. Who knows but that someone is you?

To Double Our Colporteur Force by 1954

DURING the last General Conference the paramount theme that prevailed throughout the session was increased evangelism. A far-reaching action was taken to double the church membership during this quadrennial period. In harmony with this resolution the publishing department leaders at the 1950 Autumn Council adopted the following recommendation:

"We, the members of the Publishing Department Advisory Committee, meeting in Grand Rapids, Michigan, pledge ourselves to play our part in this mighty evangelizing effort and seek by God's help to double the present number of colporteurs and the souls won by their evangelistic labors by 1954."

Soon it will be time for the next General Conference session, and it is proper that we check our records to see what progress has been made toward reaching this objective. At the close of 1949, the last full year's report before the 1950 session, there were 4,649 colporteurs throughout the world field. Doubling that number we should have 9,298 literature evangelists within our ranks by the end of 1953.

Let's take a candid review of the picture as it appears from the time of the last session to the present. The table below indicates the church membership and our colporteur force, and also gives the average number of colporteurs each year.

According to these figures we find that in the three years the church membership shows a gain of 139,925, or almost 20 per cent. This is not up to schedule, to be sure, but it indicates a trend in the right direction. During this same period the list of world colporteurs has dropped from 4,649 at the end of 1949 to 4,565 in 1952, the latest full year's report, and

shows a loss instead of an anticipated gain. The monthly report for May, 1953, lists only 4,364 colporteurs in the world field.

If the Publishing Department had kept pace in its drive to increase the number of colporteurs in the same ratio as the membership, or 20 per cent, we would today have 5,578 colporteurs instead of only 4,565. It takes but a faint stretch of the imagination to figure what total subscription book sales would have amounted to had we advanced in the same measure as membership growth. Colporteur deliveries for 1952 were \$8,760,360.35. A 20 per cent increase would have amounted to \$1,752,094.07, giving a total year's business of \$10,512,454.42. The potential in souls saved would have averaged in the same portion.

The lesson is obvious, and actually only four months to work before the end of the year. It will be impossible to reach our original objective; however, it behooves us to put forth Herculean effort during this remaining period to recruit strong, consecrated men and women into the colporteur ranks, and endeavor to finish this quadrennium with an increased force in proportion to membership gains. May God direct toward this end.

When the angel touched the waters, the first entering the pool was healed of his infirmity. Hundreds of persons with infirmities and physical disabilities crowded the porches of the pool in an attempt to find relief from their suffering. John 6:2-9 relates an interview between

Jesus and a certain lame man who desired help. The man had wasted many fruitless years waiting for a chance to be first in the water. 

A \$500 Story

A NEWSPAPER story telling of the departure of a Seventh-day Adventist missionary recently proved the monetary value of such publicity to the tune of \$500.

The story, announcing that Dr. and Mrs. Ervin Winton would soon be sailing for mission service at Bhuket Mission Hospital and Clinic in Thailand, went out from the office of Art Sutton, assisting in public relations at the College of Medical Evangelists. Along with a picture of the Wintons packing for their journey, it appeared in the Redlands, California, Facts, San Bernardino Sun, Riverside Press and Enterprise, and Los Angeles Times. The next day the editor of the Redlands paper received a call from a local physician who wished to get in touch with the mission appointees. When the contact was made the non-Adventist physician presented his check for \$500 to help equip the hospital at Bhuket.

This experience demonstrates the worth of close interoffice cooperation. The General Conference Bureau of Press Relations had notified its Pacific Union public relations office of the Wintons' overseas assignment along with that of several other missionaries. That office in turn notified Mr. Sutton, who was in the home territory of the appointees. And Mr. Sutton made the suggested story a reality.

Each month similar alerts go out from press relations headquarters to conference press directors who have mission appointees leaving their areas. Some alerts are assigned to local church press secretaries for follow-up. These present a wonderful opportunity to tell the world through the public press the story of Advent mission activities, of a church whose members care enough for their fellow men to leave home and loved ones to carry the love of Jesus across the seas.
