State Department Makes Strong Protest Against "World Calendar"

SOME time ago we urged people to write to the Secretary of State requesting that he oppose the proposed "World Calendar." This suggestion was made to help counteract a world-wide campaign launched by the World Calendar Association, in which they encouraged people to write to Secretary of State Dulles and to their congressmen, urging the adoption of their proposed calendar.

Our people responded to the suggestion in a marvelous way. Actually thousands of letters were written to the Secretary of State expressing opposition to the so-called "World Calendar." As a result of articles appearing in the Reader's Digest, the Catholic Digest, the Saturday Review of Literature, Sunshine Magazine, and scores of other publications, as well as programs that appeared over the radio, television, and those that were given in business and professorganizations urging their readers and listeners to write to the State Department and to members of Congress urging the adoption of the "World Calendar," the great majority of letters and messages that were first received by the State Department were in favor of calendar reform and the "World Calendar" in particular.

Then the opposition to the proposed "World Calendar" began to be heard from increasing numbers. Hundreds and thousands of letters began pouring in to the State Department expressing opposition to the "World

Calendar," or to any form of calendar change that would disrupt the weekly cycle.

A number of organizations also sent in their protests. Among them was the National Association of Evangelicals, representing a number of denominations. Various Jewish organizations made their protest, as did the Seventh-day Baptists and other Sabbath keeping organizations. The Lord's Day Alliance of the United States protested the disruption of the weekly cycle. Many institutions sent in letters of protest to the Department in behalf of their particular organization, and a letter from Elders R. R. Figuhr and W. R. Beach, as President and Secretary of the World Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, protesting the adoption of the proposed "World Calendar," and any change of the calendar that would result in disrupting the historic weekly cycle, was also lodged with the State Department.

Some hundreds of thousands of copies of the phamphet, "Do You Know How the Proposed World Calendar Will Affect Your Life?" were placed in the hands of professional and influential citizens throughout the country. Programs appeared on Faith for Today, the Voice of Prophecy, and the American Religious Town Hall Meeting. Many personal contacts

were made with government officials and other prominent men.

We not only want to take this opportunity of expressing appreciation for the wonderful way in which you good people responded in this important endeavor, but we want you to know that the Lord greatly blessed your efforts which resulted in a marvelous report by the State Department of the Federal Government in its answer to the questionnaire sent out to all nations to ascertain their attitude toward calendar reform and to the proposed "World Calendar."

I have the text of the United States reply to the Secretary General of the United Nations before me. It specifically states that "the United States Government does not favor any action by the United Nations to revise the present calendar." It goes on to say that "large numbers of the United States citizens oppose the plan for calendar reform that is now before the Economic and Social Council. Their opposition is based on religious grounds, since the introduction of a 'blank day' at the end of each year would disrupt the sevenday sabbatical cycle." It then declares, "Moreover, this Government holds that it would be inappropriate for the United Nations, which represents many different religious and social beliefs throughout the world, to sponsor any revision of the existing calendar that would conflict with the principles of important religious faiths." In conclusion, the Govern-

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ment recommended that no further study of the subject should be undertaken, declaring, "Such a study would require the use of manpower and funds which could be more usefully devoted to more vital and urgent tasks," and that "any additional study of the subject at this time would serve no useful purpose."

We are indeed grateful to God for this magnificent report. Again the efforts of the proponents of calendar reform have been overruled. While we do not have final reports, it appears that a number of nations have expressed their opposition to the proposed "World Calendar." Some nations have refrained from making any report. It should, however, be said that a number of countries have expressed themselves in favor of calendar reform and of the "World Calendar."

These reports from the various nations are now in the process of being compiled by the Secretariat of the United Nations. The complete report will then be turned over to the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations, which will be studied by that body at its resumed 19th Session, scheduled to convene in New York in May. The Economic and Social Council is, in turn, to make its recommendation to the General Assembly of the United Nations.

We must not assume that as a result of this splendid report made by the State Department that our work has been completed. It is not likely that the proponents of calendar reform will give up yet. We must continue to educate the people as to the results that the "World Calendar" would have upon the people of the world if it were to be adopted by any country. The great majority of people are not acquainted with, nor do they understand, how the "World Calendar" disrupts the weekly cycle by the use of the so-called "Worldsday," or "blank day," and that its adoption would result in multiplied economic, social, religious, and political confusion.

With the position taken by our Department of State that a mandate to modify or change the calendar must come from the United States Congress, a bill may be introduced into that body at any time, proposing the

ment recommended that no further adoption of the "World Calendar."

When that is done we shall have to turn our endeavors to the Congress. For the present it does not appear that there is any particular need to send any more letters to the Department of State, and we suggest that you wait for further word before launching an all out campaign on Congress. However, it will be helpful to continue the general program of education in informing neighbors, friends, professional people, and all people in general concerning the evils of the proposed "World Calendar."

We are endeavoring to keep in close touch with developments and will try to keep you informed concerning them. We thank you for your assistance in this matter and express to God our humble gratitude for His blessing.

As Elder Nesmith arrives a little later to take over the departments that I have represented, I think you will find him an excellent leader with a vision for real progress. I solicit for him the same fine spirit of cooperation that has been granted to me during my work here in the union.

100th Million Dollars By April 23, 1955

During the fourth quarter of 1954 our 19,262 Sabbath schools around the world donated for missions at the average rate of \$136,219.64 per week.

The 98th million-dollar mark was reached December 17, 1954, and took eight weeks and three days to raise.

If the offerings continue coming in at the average rate of the first and second quarters of 1954, the 99th million dollars will have been raised by February 17, 1955, and the 100th million dollars will be raised by April 23, 1955.

Seventh-day Adventists began giving offerings for missions in 1886, when we only had 813 Sabbath schools and 23,362 Sabbath school members in all the world, and it took us twenty-five years to raise our first million dollars. By this time—1911—we had 4,149 Sabbath schools with 102,869 Sabbath school members.

It took us only three years and three months to raise our second million dollars.

In 1920, our 6,215 Sabbath schools with 202,547 members gave over a million dollars in one year.

In 1942, our 14,129 Sabbath schools with 644,101 members gave over two million dollars in one year; and the very next year, 1943, we gave over three million dollars.

By 1946 we had 14,142 Sabbath schools with 702,009 members and we gave over five million dollars in one year.

In 1951 with 17,373 Sabbath schools our membership passed the 1,000,000 mark and we gave over five million dollars to missions in that year.

n 1954, with 19,262 Sabbath schools and 1,257,209 members we gave almost six million dollars for missions.

The largest offering ever given in one day was the 13th Sabbath of the fourth quarter of 1954 when the Sabbath schools around the world gave \$279,934.56, resulting in an overflow for Formosa of \$65,986.91. With a little extra lift I believe we could give half a million dollars on April 23 to celebrate the raising of our 100th million dollars for missions.

Institute of Scientific Studies For the Prevention of Alcoholism

The sixth session of the Institute of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism will be conducted at Loma Linda, California, July 11-22, 1955, according to announcement by W. A. Scharffenberg, chairman of the Board of Directors.

Dr. Winton H. Beaven, formerly of the University of Michigan, associate secretary of the National Committee for the Prevention of Alcoholism, will serve as the director of the Institute.

An outstanding program, consisting of lectures, forums, and field trips, has been planned for the sixth session. The lectures will be devoted to a scientific presentation of the physiological, neurological, psychiatric, social, economic, moral, legal, and educational aspects of the alcohol problem. Visits to the Norwalk State Hospital, the program under the auspices of the Los Angeles Police Academy, and the visits to the Los Angeles courts, will correlate with and supplement the lectures presented at the Institute. As the trend in modern medicine is toward prevention rather than mere curative procedures, emphasis will be placed on a practical discussion of public health, religious, and educational measures that will effectively prevent the rise and spread of alcoholism.

The Institute of Scientific Studies is conducted under the auspices of the National Committee for the Prevention of Alcoholism. Dr. Andrew C. Ivy, chairman, Dr. Haven Emerson, vice-chairman, and other distinguished physicians, judges, and educators will participate in the Institute.

"Seven people were brought into the message" will read the official report of the series of meetings just finished in the small church at Empire, near Parkdale, Arkansas, but to Elder Ray Stephens, to Brother and Sister G. About two and a half years ago, Sister Shain sold a used sewing machine to a good lady not far from her home. In the drawer was an old copy of a tract named "Survival of Faith." The good woman read it, studied it, and enjoyed its truths. She called Sister Shain a few days later to inquire about the tract, and if she should return it. "Keep it. ves. and I'll bring you more," was Sister Shain's ready reply. And so Mrs. Lola Wright started a chain reaction, in her husband, his brother and wife, and another family next door. Brother and Sister Shain started Bible studies, special prayers, and trips back and forth bringing these interested ones to visit the services. After a year and a half or more, four were baptized, and moved away to Monticello.

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
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

Our schools, churches, and other institutions are receiving what is termed a "recommended" list of feature films for SDA's or "films approved for SDA's." These lists are published by a large film corporation that deals in 16 mm. films produced

primarily for regular theater showings in 35 mm. and merely reduced to 16 mm. for so-called non-theatrical presentations.

DO NOT BE MISLED—This company is sending out information on the basis that any film which has been ordered by a Seventh-day Adventist church or school at least three times is accepted by the denomination, and the title of that film is placed on this list in spite of the fact that those ordering such films, after previewing them, may never have shown them.

For the sake of our youth, please preview any and all films which you intend to show, even though you have heard such a film has been shown by one of our churches, schools, or institutions. They may regret having shown this film, but you would have no knowledge of this fact.

The General Conference has published a leaflet (MV No. 47) entitled, "Motion Pictures and Television" which gives you the needed information in determining standards by which your preview committee can adequately decide on a film. This leaflet may be obtained without charge from your Union MV Department.

To date the General Conference, the Union Conferences, and the local conferences have not published any recommended list of feature films portraying emotional story plots such as are shown in the theaters. On the contrary, we have consistently condemned such films.

The Pacific Union Supply offers a catalog of sound films in 16 mm. carefully selected by the film preview committee. In some cases they have made them appropriate by deleting objectionable portions, and in others the films have been made appropriate by the producers shooting special scenes to comply with our standards. You will not find these special versions in any other film library, though the titles be the same.

These character-building motion pictures are suitable for schools, evangelistic services, church socials and other gatherings of our people. You will find a variety of subjects such as educational, health, nature, recreation, temperance, travel, doctrine, and mission. These films are available on a rental basis. The catalog gives a description of each film,

its running time, rental price, and whether available in color or in black and white, with instructions about ordering. For your free catalog, or further information about these films, write to the Pacific Union Supply Film Rental Library, Box 432, Glendale, California.

"Signs" Wins Jamaican Prisoner and Others

"Thou art found guilty of death, and thou shalt be hanged by the neck until thou art dead, and may the Lord have mercy on thy soul." In a personal visit with the young man on whom the death decree had been pronounced some years ago, on the occasion of my recent visit to Jamaica, I heard one of the most thrilling Signs stories of recent years.

The story had its beginning a little more than ten years ago when Aston Samuels became involved in a defensive altercation with a drunkard who had attacked him. The drunkard died as a result of the struggle and Aston was dragged into a Jamaican court and pronounced guilty of murder in the first degree. Some of his friends interceded in his behalf, however, and as a result he was granted a retrail. Abundant evidence was produced to prove that he was not guilty of premeditated murder in the first degree, and his sentence was finally commuted to fifteen years in the Jamaican Penitentiary.

Elder E. H. Schneider, the Home Missionary Secretary of the British West Indies Union, in a recent letter to my desk presents the thrilling story of subsequent developments through the intervening years in the following message:

"Brother Samuels was committed to the state prison which is the General Penitentiary in Kingston. He was there eleven months and then was transferred to the Richmond Farm prison at Richmond in the parish of St. Mary.

"While there on the prison farm a Seventh-day Adventist passing by threw a Signs of the Times over the fence, which landed near Samuel's feet. He picked it up and read of the return of the Lord with great interest. He noted in that Signs that a free correspondence course was offered to the readers of the Signs. He immediately wrote to California ask-

ing that he be enrolled. His name was returned to the British West Indies Bible School who sent out the course to Samuels and which he pursued from beginning to end in the most diligent manner.

"During the course of his study he was contacted by a number of our ministers and Bible School workers and a real friendship developed. He was anxious to enroll the other inmates of the General Penitentiary to which he had been returned after a brief stay on the prison farm. He enrolled 180 of these including a number of the warders (guards), one of whom accepted the third angel's message and is now a member of our North Street, Kingston, church.

Transfer To CME School of Dentistry Difficult

A caution comes to us from the School of Dentistry in the College of Medical Evangelists. Because of lower tuition costs in some universities, some Adventist young men are registering for their dental education in such schools with the hope that if they later encounter Sabbath class problems they will transfer to College of Medical Evangelists School of Dentistry without serious loss of time. Dr. M. W. Prince, dean of our

School of Dentistry, issues helpful information regarding this possibility. We quote from Dr. Prince's Letter:

"Another problem of the School of Dentistry is the Adventist student who deliberately enrolls in another dental school, believing that he can transfer at any time if he encounters difficulty. Such optimism is unwarranted. Curriculums in dental schools vary widely, likewise sequence of courses. It is not easy to accept transfer students, and the School of Dentistry strongly urges students to enroll at CME at the beginning of the course, thus eliminating the possibility of losing perhaps a year of effort."
