When told that we were, they would say, "We believe in your program, for we know what it has done for the Martinez family." As a result of witnessing with their lives as well as their lips, our consecrated laymen are influencing the hearts and lives of peoples of other faiths to support the Advent program throughout the world.

But the good work does not end with Ingathering. About eight months ago a new Sabbath school was organized in Abo, near Mountainaire, where several people manifested their interest in further study of God's word. To date, two people have been baptized and others will soon follow in that sacred rite, as a result of these radio programs sponsored by our lay members in the Texico Conference.

Literature evangelists in New Mexico enjoy calling on the homes of people who have listened to our laymen's radio broadcast. As a result of their testimony, the literature evangelists find easier access to the homes of the people and thereby greatly increase their sales.

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

In some places there is a growing tendency to skip the church services altogether or to go home right after

plain that their non-Adventist husbands or wives expect them to be home exactly at twelve o'clock and have dinner ready and therefore they either must leave early or miss church altogether. Still others have medical or dental appointments and naturally are not able to be in two places at once.

Let us look at each of the reasons given above and check up on ourselves to see whether or not they can be considered sufficiently convincing as to satisfy the Lord whose house we leave and upon whom we turn our backs. It is a problem to struggle with small children, and it is hard to get much out of the service when we stay. Then, too, it sometimes distracts the attention of those nearby, and we feel that we are spoiling the church service for them. But the servant of the Lord tells us that we should be in church with our small children. They can be taught at a very early age to be quiet. More and more of our churches are providing nurseries and mothers' rooms where they can take care of the children without annoying others. Even where there are no such provisions, mothers with small children can sit close to the back of the church and if it becomes necessary to leave for a few moments, they can do so without disturbance. Then, too, it should be pointed out that older members should learn to concentrate on what is being said and not be so easily distracted that a little baby's crying or cooing will rob them of the blessing the Lord has for them.

The servant of the Lord tells us that whether or not we like the preacher we should be faithful in our church attendance. This is the poorest and most unworthy excuse for non-attendance that I know of. We go to church to worship God and to meet with His people. Regardless of who the minister is, even though he may be unworthy, the Lord still has something in every sermon for every member of the church. If you are going to allow this to keep you away from church, the chances are that you will allow it to keep you out of heaven, too. You need to gain the victory over such an attitude, and you cannot please God until you do, regardless of how pious you may appear or sound.

It is a strange thing how some of our sisters, especially, can have dinner an hour late, or not at all, for their unconverted husbands any other day of the week, but it must be right on the minute on the Sabbath. Your first obligation in life is to God, and it is not too much for him to expect you to give him first place in your time and life on His holy day. Your husband will not starve if dinner is a little late on Sabbath. He may fuss about it, it is true, but if he does not fuss about this the chances are that he will about something else if that is his nature. Don't let a husband, wife, father, mother, son or daughter, or anyone else cause you to lose the blessing that comes from the worship service each Sabbath morning.

We all need to catch a clearer conception as to the meaning of true Sabbath observance. These doctors appointments should be made at some other time than on the Sabbath, and only in cases of extreme emergency should one make such a business appointment on God's holy day. You have a more important and more pressing appointment with God on Sabbath morning than any that you might have with any doctor, regardless of the nature of his work. Do not let him rob you of your sweet fellowship with God and His people on His holy day. If an adjustment is necessary, let him be the one to

make it. He will cooperate if he understands your problem.

Come to church. Stay for the entire service. Worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness. Even your very small children need to learn that this is the most important and blessed day of the week, and to meet with God is their most precious privilege. May God help us all to reform along these lines.

Twenty years ago, colporteur Jose Espinosa stood on the mountain overlooking Vallecitos Canyon. He was

about to descend into the valley for visiting the homes of that little community with gospel literature. But before entering upon his work, he earnestly prayed that the Lord would give him at least one soul out

of that community which spread out before him. The Lord answered his prayer, and as a result of his work, Deciderio Chacon took his stand to obey the commandments of God. That was many years ago, but Brother Chacon has held aloft the torch of truth in that tiny mountain community. Today, surrounding him, are his family and their families, together with others who have been won to the cause largely by lay effort, the result of that original book sold twenty years ago.

It was our privilege to meet with this company in the public schoolhouse on Sabbath, April 7, in company with Elder and Mrs. Joseph Espinosa, son of the veteran colporteur. For that meeting, ten adults and twenty children were present. From there we drove over the mountain, through great forests, to the other side, where we saw the ruins of the Tusas church in which our people worshiped many years ago, and which, because of shifts of population, was now standing vacant. We drove on farther eastward to another mountain community, Tres Piedras. There again was a monument erected to the glory of God through literature ministry, for in those early years Estevan Gurule responded to the colporteur's invitation and, together with his companion, formed the nucleus of a company in that interesting and beautiful mountain valley. Here, in the afternoon, worshiping in the home of Brother Gurule, we ministered to the needs of approximately ten adults and eighteen children.

Continuing on, we reached another mountain settlement within a few miles of the Colorado border. There, nestled in the valley, is the little town of Questa. Conspicuously located beside the road and with an interesting sign over the door, we saw the Seventh-day Adventist House of Prayer. We observed it was meticulously kept, under the leadership of our veteran layman, Daniel Cisneros, also the fruitage of literature ministry years ago by Jose Espinosa.

It was our privilege to join Elder and Mrs. Joseph Espinosa, leaders in that district, in the service that evening, at the Dixon church. Here again, in mountain surroundings, interlaced with beautiful orchards, watered by snows of the lofty mountains all around, we gathered in the church for an evening meeting. A number of villagers came to meet with us, and before the opening of the service, there were more than one hundred waiting to enjoy the program of the evening.

Our Spanish radio group "Los Heraldos de la Manana" was present to present their ministry of music and song. This part of the program was greatly appreciated by our brethren there in the Dixon church, and we pay tribute to the enthusiasm, sincerity, and devotion of our brethren comprising this special evangelistic group.

At the close of our service in the Dixon church that evening, we made an appeal for reconsecration on the part of our brethren, and also for those who would take their stand for the first time to obey the commandments of God. Fifteen responded.

It was an inspiration to meet with these good people and to observe their devotion to the cause of God. There are many evidences of growth in this district. Laymen in these companies and churches are being aroused to do great things for God in witnessing among their friends and neighbors. A baptism is being planned by Elder Espinosa on April 21 which will draw candidates from a number of churches within the district. H. P. Evens,



#### Science Institute To Be Conducted At PUC July 8 - August 2

A one-month institute, sponsored by the physical science division of Pacific Union College, including departments of chemistry, mathematics, and physics, will be held on the college campus at Angwin, Calif., July 8 to August 2.

This summer institute for advance work, the first of its kind ever planned by an Adventist college, and the only such session available this year, will offer six hours of credit applicable toward the Master of Arts in teaching degree.

It will feature modern developments in the fields of science, this teaching to be done by lectures, discussions, and demonstrations of the phenomena under consideration. Seminar sessions will give opportunity to work on teaching methods and techniques. There will also be lectures on astronomy in connection with the use of the Newton Observatory, and field trips into nearby research establishments will supplant lectures and classroom studies.

Dr. I. R. Neilsen, chairman of the PUC physical science division, and head of the Physics Department, will direct in the general program of the institute, and serve as one of the instructors. Associated with him will be regular instructors in the division, supplemented by any others who may be added to the faculty. On the list now are: Dr. G. C. Jorgensen, formerly of Union College, recently called to be head of the PUC Chemistry Department; A. V. Winn, associate professor of chemistry; Dr. C. L. Woods, head of Mathematics Department; Walter Bolinger, instructor in electronics; Prof. R. L. Nutter, assistant professor of physics, and Miss Geneva Durham, assistant professor of astronomy and mathematics.

Science and mathematics teachers and others desiring further information may write to Dr. J. P. Stauffer, director of the PUC summer session, Angwin, Calif.
