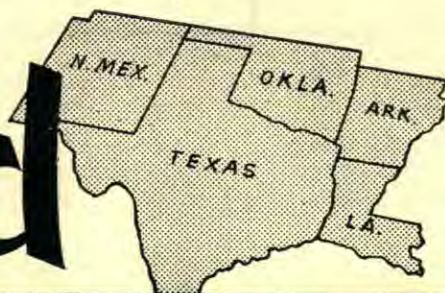

Another HOSPITAL For TEXAS



WORK is already under way on the remodeling and equipping of a 20-bed hospital and 50-bed retirement home in Menard, to be operated by the Texas Conference. A beautiful 4-story, 60-room brick hotel is being remodeled to take care of the medical needs of that area.

The county of Menard recently held a bond election to see if the people of Menard wanted to issue bonds to purchase the building and furnish the equipment for the Adventists to operate a hospital in their midst. When the votes were counted, 95% were in favor of the project.

The building is located in downtown Menard with a lovely park directly across the street. The first floor will have space for two doctor's offices, laboratory, X-ray, administrative offices, kitchen, dining room, and lobby. The second and third floors will be left about as they are for retirement home guests.

Most of these rooms have private baths. The fourth floor will be for operating room, delivery room, nursery, and all necessary facilities to care for 20 hospital patients.

The plan is for the county of Menard to purchase the building, do the necessary remodeling and furnish the equipment, beginning supply inventory and operating capital. The Texas Conference will lease the building and equipment for \$1.00 per year and have complete control of the operation of the hospital and retirement home.

This is another step forward in the medical missionary program for the Texas Conference. The "right arm of the messags" is going forward in Texas in a miraculous way. We ask an interest in the prayers of our people that this project will go forward according to God's plan.

There Is Hope

Hope is not the superficial by-product of favorable circumstances. It springs from a man's character, from what he is and cares about and believes in, and underneath all else, from his deep conviction that God is not dead, nor has He abdicated His throne.

"While there is life there is hope," runs the old proverb, but a deeper truth emerges when the saying is reversed — "While there is hope there is life." It makes a profound difference, however, by what route one arrives at that indispensable quality of courageous confidence. Alike in personal and public affairs, the most resounding triumphs ever won on earth have been won by those in whom, by God's grace, trouble produced endurance, and endurance character, and character hope. (Romans 5:3,4 Moffatt)

We commonly think that hopeless situations make people hopeless, but it is also true that hopeless people make situations hopeless.

As we turn the pages of history back a century or so, we find that the world was dominated by a political philosophy which Francis I of Austria put into unashamed words, "I require obedient subjects, not enlightened citizens." This bold, cold, unthoughtful, unchristian philosophy fanned the fires of hope in the hearts of a small minority. Always it has been the men and women in whom, amid towering difficulties, the future tense loomed large and spoke powerfully, who shook the world out of its lethargy.

Real hope, therefore, is no happy mood borrowed from fortunate situations, nor is it a lotus land of comfortable escape from ugly facts. Real hope is an attribute of strong

character, the daring venturesome attack of uncontented souls determined to create something new on earth.

How do we arrive at this destination? What backing and resources are there that can sustain such a courageous attitude despite hell and high water? Look at the same Bible verse quoted in the 5th chapter of Romans, "And hope maketh not ashamed; because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us." Paul believed something, not simply about what ought to be or might be, but what is — an everlasting truth about the nature of this universe. In times like these it is of great importance that we go deep into the

profounder meanings of life's future and what to do with it. We always do something with it. To fill it either with despair or with superficial optimism is fatal. Despair ruins us and superficial optimism collapses. But to fill it with hope, reached by Paul's route, is creative.

Last week while visiting our Ardmore Sanitarium and Hospital in Oklahoma, I met an interesting SDA gentleman, Harry Vought, a man filled with hope. Upon listening to Brother Vought for just a few moments it was obvious that he generated hope. During the course of our conversation I learned that 27 years ago, Brother Vought was an active literature evangelist. In those days the conference did not have the modern pay-by-mail plan. Nevertheless Brother Vought surmounted his problems with hope. Besides selling and delivering the truth-filled literature, Brother Vought conducted a two-month evangelistic campaign

SEVENTH-DAY Adventists have undertaken the greatest task ever attempted by any religious group in the history of the church — the task of carrying the everlasting gospel to all the world in one generation.
