OUR troubled world today needs something more dynamic than mere decency. There is a crying need for men who are not only upright but uplifting. It is commendable to be a gentleman who keeps his word; it is still better to care enough for truth to find out the facts and make one's word worth keeping.

The Sabbath schools we have visited around the world are truly unlike some modern church organizations which act as a mob of hermits, each carrying his cup of self-satisfaction to be filled at church once a week, and then carrying it back to his own little cave. Vibrant Sabbath school members find themselves not so much possessing something as being possessed by something to which their head, heart, and hands belong.

A good share of our Sabbath school students are eager and willing to do their Christian work well. They want to see their total task clearly and are anxious to have someone suggest well-formulated plans on the know-how of Christian service. Usually they will take an assignment and do it splendidly if they are convinced of its importance and are familiar with the procedure.

Under the enthusiastic planning of Elder Cyril Miller, together with the virile leadership of Brother V. D. Singer and the wholehearted co-operation of the Gentry, Arkansas church members, a new day for Sabbath School Investment has dawned.

About six Adventist families liv-

ing in that rural, rustic and rigorous locality have invested thirteen acres of land for the Lord. A similar number have invested their farm machinery to work the land. Another group purchased sweet potato sets and fertilizer, while yet another group of people set out the plants. God is sending the sunshine and the rain.

The thirteen Investment acres are receiving much tender care. The Sabbath school members are working and praying for a good harvest. The brethren in Gentry believe they will invest at least \$2,000 for the Lord this year. This speaks well for the 254 faithful Sabbath school members who are ever on the lookout to attempt greater exploits for the Lord.

### Two Million TV Lessons Corrected

During the time that the General Conference was in session in Cleveland, the 2,000,000th Faith for Today Bible Course test paper was corrected in the New York City headquarters, marking a most important milestone in the history of the television ministry. Nearly half a million individuals have written requesting the privilege of studying the Bible under Adventist guidance. More than 30,000 have completed the lessons which include two on the Law and three on the Sabbath. Of this number, over 2,000 are already bap-

tized burden-bearing, tithe-paying members.

Announced each week as a presentation of the Adventist church, the Faith for Today telecast is an untiring preacher of the last warning message. This evangelistic marvel of the electronic age takes no vacation, but its witness goes out without fail even while you are on vacation.

Thousands of you supply yourselves with TV logs and Bible school enrollment cards before you start your summer holidays. Reports indicate that vacationing members are doing most excellent missionary work as they travel across the country.

Not everyone takes an annual vacation, however. A recent letter from such a couple contained a check for \$50 — an amount that represented a real sacrifice. Here's the message that accompanied the letter:

"My wife and I have felt that we could not afford to take a vacation trip this year. But, when we read your little note, we felt that we could not afford NOT to stretch ourselves a bit to help make sure that Faith for Today is not denied to any watchers and listeners who should receive it. So, we are digging a little deeper into the bag and are sending an extra \$50 this month. How we wish that it could be many times more, but this little is accompanied by our prayers that God will multiply it. May the excellent work you are doing never be hindered by a lack of means."

With the third million lessons starting on such a note of devotion and sacrifice, the Faith for Today workers join you in heartfelt rededication. May multiplied thousands find their way into the kingdom as a result.

### \$1,000 Vacation Bible School At Little Rock

The Seventh-day Adventist Church, 3400 South Hayes Street, Little Rock, Arkansas has just finished a very large and successful Vacation Bible school. This is the first time that the church here has conducted a Vacation Bible school and so it was considered a real adventure in child evangelism. All those who participated as leaders and teachers received a blessing and were encouraged by the response that the students showed to the Christian educational activities.

The school was under the direction of Alfred L. Heitzmann, the principal of the Little Rock Junior Academy and at the present time acting pastor of the church. He did a splendid job of co-ordination and con-

tributed much toward making the school a success.

The division leaders were: Mrs. W. G. Larson, junior division; Mrs. Edith Bowers, primary division; Mrs. Juanita Brown, kindergarten division. Those capable leaders were supported by the many able teachers and helpers found in each division.

Twenty individuals were involved in leading out and teaching and an additional five or six persons helped out in other capacities such as working on the committee for the care of the children, (children too young for Vacation Bible school who belonged to teachers in the school), committee on transportation, committee on advertising, and the committee on refreshments. The splendid co-operation of all individuals concerned and the smooth functioning of the organization to a large extent accounted for the mechanical success of the school. The attitude and Christian spirit of the teachers influenced the hearts of the children to respond to the promptings of the Holy Spirit as He came to each one of them.

Many wonderful testimonies voluntarily stated by the children encouraged the leaders and led us to think that our Vacation Bible school was second to none.

Twenty individuals were enrolled from the junior department in the Bible Correspondence Course. Nine of this number were from non-Seventh-day Adventist homes. A number of non-Adventist children have been attending Sabbath school since

the closing of Vacation Bible school. All of these things have boosted the spiritual morale of our church and have certainly increased good will toward us in the community.

The total enrollment stood at 95 students. The average daily attendance was approximately 80. Fifty-five per cent of all boys and girls attending were from non-Seventh-day Adventist homes.

It has been calculated that if all the teachers and leaders were paid a wage of 75c per hour, in addition to the usual expense of literature and material, this Vacation Bible school would have cost \$1,000. However, with the volunteer work contributed by all persons, the total cost will come to only a fraction of this amount.

We are encouraged here at Little Rock by the way the Lord has blessed this missionary venture in child evangelism. We feel that it has been good for the church, the students, and the community. The work was hard, but enjoyable, and we are looking forward to another Vacation Bible school next year. LEO HERBER, M. D.,

### Wedding



### ELDER JAMES W. EVANS TO PASTOR THE KEENE CHURCH

Elder James W. Evans, who for the past three years has served as pastor of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in San Antonio, has accepted the invitation to become pastor of the Keene church. He succeeds Lawrence G. Scales, who is now president of the Southwestern Junior College.

Elder Evans preached his first sermon as pastor of the church at Keene at the eleven o'clock hour, August 2. Elder Ben E. Leach, president of the Texas Conference, introduced him to his congregation.

The new pastor is a native of Ohio. He attended Emmanuel Missionary College, Berrien Springs, Michigan, and is a graduate of Southern Missionary College, Collegedale, Tennessee. His first pastorate was in the Kentucky-Tennessee Conference.

Before coming to the Southwestern Union Conference, Elder Evans served as pastor of the New England Sanitarium church in Melrose, near Boston, Massachusetts. Prior to that he ministered in Connecticut where he built a new church in the Bridgeport district.

★★ The kitchen cabinet division of the Bandom Corporation, located on the campus of Southwestern Junior College, has been on a 24-hour day working schedule for the past few weeks. Roy W. Crawford, director of student labor, reports that there are still openings in the plant for students who are 18 years of age or older.

#### Important Seminary Announcement

Students not currently in residence at the Seminary who have credits toward the Master of Arts degree but who have not completed degree requirements, should plan to return not later than June 22, 1959 to finish requirements for the degree.

After August, 1959, the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary, a division of Potomac University, will cease to offer the Master of Arts degree. Students who desire to qualify for this degree, matriculating for the first semester of the 1959-60 year and thereafter, will register in the School of Graduate studies.

This means that prospective candidates for the Master of Arts degree in the Seminary must begin studies September 15, 1958, February 2, 1959, or at the beginning of the 1959 Summer Session, June 22.

Ministerial students desiring to qualify for internship according to General Conference recommendation, who matriculate in the Seminary in September, 1959 and thereafter, will receive a certificate of internship after completing the prescribed curriculum of two semesters and one summer session. This curriculum is the first stage of the three-year Bachelor of Divinity curriculum.
