Visual Aids in Sabbath School

Occasionally we meet some sincere Christians who feel that the second commandment is violated when pictures of Jesus Christ are used during the Sabbath school exercises. This conscientious view is worthy of our examination. Let us look at the section of the commandment that deals with "graven images."

"Thou shalt not make unto thee a graven image, nor the likeness of any form that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth; thou shalt not bow down thyself unto them, nor serve them:" Exodus 20: 4, 5.

Some well-meaning folk who, because of this commandment, will not

have their own photograph taken, refuse also to have any picture whatsoever in their homes.

This, however, could not have been the divine intention. For immediately after the giving of this commandment, among the pattern of things pertaining to the tabernacle, in the very holiest of all, two images of the cherubim overshadowed the mercy seat. On the borders of the garment of the High Priest also as he went into the holy place to minister, there were bells and pomegranates. Man was NOT forbidden to make a representation of anything. He IS forbidden to use the representation as an aid to worship.

In the very closing words of the commandment, lies the force of its meaning, "Thou shalt not bow down thyself to them, nor serve them."

In the famous Westminster Abbey in London, today, there may be seen many vacant niches where images once stood. They were removed,

not because they were statues, but because lamps were burned in front of them and worshippers knelt before them. That was essentially a violation of the second commandment. Man was not to bow down himself before an image nor to serve it.

This view is succintly portrayed in the Seventh-day Adventist Commentary, v. 1, p. 602. "This commandment does not necessarily prohibit the use of sculpture and painting in religion. The artistry and representation employed in the construction of the sanctuary, Exodus 25: 17-22, in Solomon's temple, I Kings 6:23-26, and in Numbers 21:8, 9; II Kings 18:4, clearly prove that the second commandment does not proscribe religious illustrative material. What is condemned is the reverence, the worship, or quasi worship, which multitudes in many lands give to religious images and pictures."

It will be remembered that God commanded Moses to make a brazen serpent in the wilderness. Surely no one would accuse God of violating His own commandment! The problem lies in our interpretation thereof.

The brazen serpent was actually destroyed in Hezekiah's time because it had ceased to be an artistic relic and had become an object of worship. II Kings 18:4.

From this narrative it is crystal clear that the Lord commanded Moses to construct a brazen serpent. As long as the people looked upon the serpent, they were following the command of the Master and their lives were spared and their sicknesses healed. But when they worshipped the serpent, they violated the command of God. To correct this abuse, the serpent was destroyed.

Can we not apply this same principle to our Sabbath school visual aids? I think we can. Visual aids do help our students to retain more of the Sabbath school lesson. Let us ever remember that the second commandment is not an attack upon artists and sculptors, but upon idolaters.

This picture is of the new church and welfare building just out of Batesville, Arkansas, on Highway 11. Some of you have previously read of the marvelous work that Brother and Sister William Ashton are doing there.

Here is a building that would cost, by contract, close to \$15,000 including the Sabbath school and Welfare rooms on the reverse side of the building, which does not show in the picture. There is also a balcony and a beautiful interior. This building is a credit to any builder. Best of all, Brother Ashton, who served as a postal clerk for the United States Government for more than 30 years, retired with a conviction that God had a work for him to do and the Lord has used him with his picture machine, the lectures he has given with the Temperance film, "One in 20,000," and many other follow-up Bible studies. Now the church is filled from Sabbath to Sabbath with interested people. Elder George Green, the district pastor, is cooperating and holding a series of meetings at the same time he is conducting his Ingathering program.

This has been a faith proposition from the beginning when the land was given Brother Ashton by a non-Seventh-day Adventist lady for the purpose of erecting this edifice. The Ashtons moved their trailer onto the lot, backed it up, leveled it, then took off the tires and sold them for their first investment. They have given liberally from their meager income from month to month. Friends have sent them money for this project — as much as \$500 and even more at

one time. It will take still another \$1,000 to complete the detailed interior and exterior grading so that the elevation will stand out more prominently on this busy highway.

We are indeed grateful for the response of Brother and Sister Ashton in helping us to enter these dark counties and build up a work for God. In the very near future this building will be dedicated, free of debt. At that time we'll make an announcement for all of the friends, and especially those who have given of their means to complete this building to be present. With about \$8,000 of personal and donated money, Brother Ashton has completed a project that is, in reality, worth twice that figure.

May God bless our laymen who have a vision and a willingness to serve.

The church is located on the south fringe of the main street of Eagletown.

Three preaching services were held while my wife and I were there. Neighbors and friends show a real interest in the "spoken word." About twenty teenagers gathered that Sabbath evening for a songfest which Brother Clough directed and managed most admirably. It is apparent that a great work is being done at Eagletown for children and young folks. Enthusiasm permeates the atmosphere.

God Works in Wonderous Ways!

One morning as we were finishing our weekly workers' meeting in Bogota, we heard a knock at the door. It was Antonio Guisa, who formed part of a group of interested people near the town of Florian, Santander. He had come with a special petition. The local priest had sent word that he was going to pay a visit to their meeting place the following Sabbath. Brother Guisa wanted someone to go back with him in order that the new believers would not be intimidated by their former spiritual leader. Seeing the importance of standing by these brethren, Brother Pedro Garnica and I saw the need and met the emergency.

Friday night found us out in the mountains with these sincere seekers for truth. After our meeting that night I lay in my hammock praying. I asked the Lord to overrule in the affairs of the following day so that the believers would be strengthened by the events and not frightened by them.

The next morning we were gathered together with about forty interested people under a shed that protected a homemade sugar-cane mill. There was not a one of them baptized as yet. Suddenly, in the midst of the lesson study, explosions were heard in the distance. All the folks present knew that at that moment the priest was leaving the town and starting for our meeting place. A certain anxious expectancy seemed to commandeer the feeling of all present.

When Brother Garnica finished his presentation of the lesson study, I stood to my feet and began telling those present something about the way our church is organized. Soon I noticed the people looking behind me with frightened looks on their faces. I sensed that the crisis had come. I told everyone to be calm and then stepped out from under the shed in time to see a mob coming down the hill. In the midst of the people was a black-clad figure shaking his fist and shouting that the meeting had to stop and that Brother Garnica and I had to leave that place immediately.

The people stopped when they got to where I was standing. They were shouting and threatening and gesticulating as the priest led them in their ovations. "Viva la religion Catholica, Viva la virgen Maria, Abajo con los protestantes," they shouted in unison. Then he asked them in a loud, boisterous voice, "Who is the spiritual leader of the citizens of Florian?" "El Padre," the mob shouted in reply. "Who is the best friend of the people around this section of the country?" "El padre," was the frenzied answer. "Who saved Florian in the time of violence?" the priest screamed. "El padre," was the reply. Suddenly the voice of one of our believers interrupted the cheering. "That's a lie; it was the God of heaven that saved us from death and destruction."

This statement jarred those who had been shouting almost incoherrently into relative silence.

Then I began to reason with the priest using the Catholic Bible as the basis of my statements. A change began to be seen in the faces of some. Finally the priest drew nearer to us, extended his hand and bid us good-bye with a warmth that seemed impossible after the threats he had made a few minutes earlier. At his command those dozens of people followed him as he started up the hill and away from our meeting place.

As the mob left the site, one man left its ranks, stepped under the shed, and sat down. He stayed through the meetings of the day listening intently to all that was said. In our next visit to Florian the attendance had just about doubled. What a joy it was to baptize nine of those folks, the firstfruits of the work in that place. One of those nine was the man who had come with the mob but had been impressed by the Holy Spirit to stay when the others left.

Months have passed now. The work has been carried on in Florian in spite of many imprecations and threats and not a little persecution. A church has been organized with over forty charter members who are now actively working for their neighbors.

As in Florian, the Lord is opening doors all over Colombia so that His messengers can enter and make known His truth. The harvest is ripe indeed, and we are praying that the Lord will impress His people all over the world to give as never before on this 13th Sabbath that more laborers may be sent forth into the harvest field to gather in the souls who are standing on the verge of the kingdom waiting only to be gathered in. Today is the day of opportunity. Tomorrow may be too late.
