The James White Library at Andrews University was opened formally to the public at the dedicatory service held in the Pioneer Memorial Church on October 24 at eleven o'clock.

Dr. Walter R. Beach, Secretary of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists with headquarters in Takoma Park, Washington, D.C., was the guest speaker at the dedication of the James White Library. Dr. Beach has distinguished himself as a scholar and author. He has served in important administrative capacities in the Seventh-day Adventist Church both in North America and in Europe.

"Books are the tools with which knowledge is most rapidly and most successfully acquired. They put into our hands the key that opens the door of human commonplaces with a world of boundless horizons," stated Beach in the opening remarks.

After tracing the historical development of libraries, Dr. Beach concluded: "This library is not just an-

is a monument to truth. It should undergird the total educational program. In this act we establish the James White Library under God as the cornerstone of Andrews University's total educational process."

Costing in the neighborhood of \$750,000, the library has 45,000 square feet of floor space with shelving capacity for 280,000 volumes. Equipment including walnut tables and chairs, study carrels, card catalog, Rolodex record file, storage cabinets and microfilm reader, cost \$100,000. An annual budget of \$30,000 has been set aside for the purchase of books.

Approximately 120,000 volumes comprise the united library. It subscribes to nearly 1,000 periodicals, has 7 professionally-trained staff members, 4 sub-professional staff members, 2 library assistants, several clerical workers, and provides over 300 hours of work a week to 25 undergraduate students.

"Arise, and be not afraid," were the words of our blessed Lord spoken on the Mount of Transfiguration. But this command not to fear could equally well have come from a score of other situations. To passengers on the deck of a storm-tossed ship Jesus said, "It is I, be not afraid." To Jairus and to his mourning friends who were overcome with sorrow, Jesus said: "Be not afraid, only believe." To the disciples gathered in the upper room for the last supper Jesus said, "Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid."

There was nothing which Jesus felt called upon to challenge more frequently than fear. As a friend He saw that fear hounded His comrades from birth to death. As a teacher He discovered that fear blinded the minds of man making them unable to look facts in the face or to trust themselves to truth. As the great physician, Jesus found that fear paralyzed men's faculties, poisoned their emotions, and sapped their strength. He would never have retained the title of Master if He had not been able to control fear.

"Arise, and be not afraid," is a counsel characteristic of our Lord, and desperately needed in our time. Our era has been called the great age of fear. We have conquered nature, and now we are afraid of our very power. But Jesus Christ has the faculty of stirring up in others the gift of God which as Paul said, "Is not the spirit of fear, but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind."

As Jesus mingled with the people in His day, He made others forget many of their fears. His air of assurance dispelled many a mirage of fear. As you know there is a mirage of fear just as there is a mirage of hope. People can be deceived by seeing dangers which do not exist just as travelers in a desert can be deceived by seeing water which does not exist. It is a well-known fact that fears may deceive us quite as cruelly as hopes sometimes do. Christ restored and restores in man that health of spirit which cures him of

wishful thinking on the one hand and wasteful anxiety on the other.

As we take up our God-given work during this Ingathering Crusade, let us do so with the command of our Saviour ringing in our ears, "Arise, and be not afraid." With elasticity in your step, go from home to home letting your light shine. Let the people know that you have contributed to this cause and then determine within your heart to reach at least one minuteman goal within two weeks' time. Why not join the Apostle Paul who said, "I can do all things through Christ who strengtheneth me."

Mother wouldn't tell me her age, but she pledged all she received for cutting hair for six months — total, \$37. Father had some little

"Next year," quoted Mrs. Joe Willa Watkins, the Deming church press secretary, "we plan to have another vacation Bible school, but we will be mindful of it from now until then, making contacts, lining up supplies, and we will be better prepared than we were this year."

Educational Association Convenes

Seven literature evangelists of the Oklahoma Conference spent the entire week of October 29 to November 2 in Woodward and Shattuck, Oklahoma, on a group-canvass evangelistic program. Success crowned their efforts from the very start, for 27 people requested Bible studies in their homes by some qualified person. We are proud of this, for it tells us God is using the work of our faithful bookmen to bring about large amounts of baptisms just as He uses any evangelistic team.

In addition to this, 88 more people requested the Bible correspondence course to be sent, and in still other homes were left our small books such as *Marked Bible*, *Steps to Christ*, and *Bible Made Plain*, plus hundreds of pieces of free literature including *Facing the Future Unafraid*.

The Lord also blessed in sales, for nearly \$3,500 was the amount of truth-filled pages left that week, representing \$500 for each colporteur — quite a nice average. This kind of delivery doesn't come by accident, however, for it took some 300 hours to make this possible, but for it all we give thanks to our heavenly Father and pray that more and more men and women will continue to step in and join the ranks of the literature evangelist. The Oklahoma Educational Association held its annual convention October 27 and 28 in the Municipal Auditorium in Oklahoma City. Among the various displays could be found a double booth representing the Home Health Education Service. Many of our books, journals, and other material handled by the literature evangelists were up for exhibition.

Registration was held for each teacher, and 10 volumes of the *Bible Story* were awarded to 10 different teachers from a drawing held Friday afternoon.
