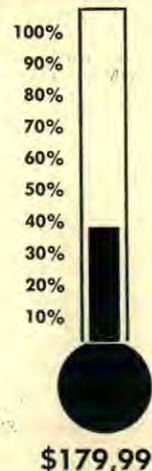

Mrs. Earl Osborn, Home and School leader, reported that the project netted \$140.27, since most of the food was donated by parents. School principal, Albert Schaefer, said that the money would be used to purchase special school equipment and he sends a sincere "Thank You" to all who helped make the day a real success.

What Good Thing Must I Do That I May Have Eternal Life?

"I was shown that some children professing to believe the truth, would, in an indirect manner, influence the father to keep his means for his children, instead of appropriating it to the cause of God while he lives. Those who have influenced their father to shift his stewardship upon them, little know what they are doing. They are gathering upon themselves double responsibility, that of balancing the father's mind so that

he did not fulfill the purpose of God in the disposition of the means lent him of God to be used to His glory, and the additional responsibility of becoming stewards of means that should have been put out to the exchangers by the father, that the Master could have received His own with usury.

"Many parents make a great mistake in placing their property out of their hands into the hands of their children while they are themselves responsible for the use or abuse of the talents lent them of God. Neither parents nor children are made happier by this transfer of property. And the parents, if they live a few years even, generally regret this action on their part. Parental love in their children is not increased by this course. The children do not feel increased gratitude and obligation to their parents for their liberality. A curse seems to lay at the root of the matter, which only crops out in selfishness on the part of the children, and unhappiness and miserable feelings of cramped dependence on the part of the parents.

"If parents, while they live, would assist their children to help themselves, it would be better than to leave them a large amount at death. Children who are left to rely principally upon their own exertions, make better men and women and are better fitted for practical life than those children who have depended upon their father's estate. The children led to depend upon their own resources generally prize their abilities, improve their privileges, and cultivate and direct their faculties to accomplish a purpose in life. They frequently develop characters of industry, frugality, and moral worth, which lie at the foundation of success in the Christian life. Those children for whom parents do the most, frequently feel under the least obligation toward them." *Testimonies*, Vol. 3, pages 122-123.

Dispelling Distress Divinely

About forty years ago H. G. Wells portrayed biology as a panacea for the world's problems. At the close of his life, however, he saw that biology alone could not realize his expectations, and the very man who advocated that man could evolve into a higher, happier sphere fell into an abysmal pit of despair.

Our present generation is not minimizing biology, but it is definitely stressing psychology. There is no end to the writing of books reminding the reader of the unreserved sources of power within him, to tap his reserves, to plunge into the deeper part of his unconsciousness, and to make of himself a new dynamic creature.

No thinking person will deny that most men use only a small fraction of their God-given power; nevertheless, there is rampant today a gross exaggeration in thinking that man by using some new psychological tricks can make himself different than he is.

It is vain to believe that a hundred horse-power motor can be transferred into a thousand horse-power motor by merely changing the brushes or by removing the insulation from the wires. On the other hand, quick lifts are indeed given to the mind by an act of the will, but one soon runs out of such enthusiasm.

When the hungry multitude followed our Master into

the desert, He was moved with compassion and commanded His disciples to feed the people. The answer given by the disciples was that there were only five loaves and two fishes. The obvious lesson was that human capacities and reserves were totally inadequate to the task of feeding five thousand. No matter how much physical or psychological affectiveness we may have for unselfish service, our souls are baffled at the triviality and bewildering poverty of our powers.

At this point of human helplessness there intervenes a divine power which lays hold of our slender resources. Instead of man thinking that he can get out of the morass and swamp of his own despair and futility, he realizes that God will do wonders with his little bit if it be but offered to Him in consecrated service.

We are required to bring the loaves and the fishes that He may have and put them unreservedly into His hands. If we have but one talent, we will not be censured because we do not bring five. We are censured only because we bury the one.

Even now it is not too late to place in His hands an Ingathering Offering, so that He can dispel the distress of those who dwell in darkness. The Ingathering goal is still only twenty-five dollars per member.
