Christian Education Progresses

It has already been my happy privilege this fall to visit the thirty church schools in the Texas Conference, also Jefferson and Valley Grande Academies. The church schools show a 3.5 per cent increase in enrollment this year, and the academies are holding about the same as last year. Twenty-seven of the teachers took special class work this summer to further their education, and we are pleased indeed that four received their B.A. degrees this summer and two their M.S. degrees. We have 83 full-time teachers and 22 part-time personnel teaching our 1355 students.

As I visit the classrooms I am thrilled at the fine work our teachers are doing. The spiritual life of the schools is truly uplifting. Teachers are endeavoring to meet the varied

learning requirements of their pupils. They are studying to keep pace with the developing changes in arithmetic, science and social studies. I am sure, too, that students and parents appreciate the many hours of donated teaching time, bus driving service, maintenance work, etc. that are so often given by many of our faithful church members.

It is very gratifying to see the new school buildings that have been erected, the many improvements made, and new teaching equipment purchased for the schools. This all adds up to more effective teaching and a more acceptable program of education of which we need not be ashamed. Several schools have been rated this fall, and we are pleased that we now have three schools in the conference

that have rated as a Model school. They are Dallas Central Junior Academy, Houston Central Junior Academy, and the Berea Elementary School at Jefferson. As other schools are rated there may be a few more that will receive the Model rating.

May we commend all who are doing so much to improve the quality of Christian education in the Texas Conference.

Arkansas-Louisiana Teachers' Convention

Arkansas-Louisiana teachers met for study and fellowship at beautiful Mather Lodge of Petit Jean State Park. The last days of September found 47 persons participating in the institute held atop lovely Petit Jean Mountain near Morrillton, Arkansas.

In addition to lectures, discussions, and devotional meetings, there was time for hiking, games, enjoying the scenery, and also a visit to Winthrop Rockefeller's "Winrock Farms," a show place on the mountain.

Among the topics given special attention were "Teaching the Problem Reader," "School Discipline," and the "Modern Approach to Math." These discussions were directed by Professor Robert Wagner of Southwestern Union College.

Elder R. A. Nesmith, union educational secretary, presented, "Christian Education, Keystone of our Denominational Future," a message which indicated the vital role of our school system in continuing and finishing the work of God on earth.

Elder O. D. Wright, president of the Arkansas-Louisiana Conference, spoke on the teaching profession in his sermon entitled, "The Nicest Work."

The institute was concluded by union president, L. C. Evans, in a message in which he presented the evangelistic nature of the teacher's work. "Leading the youth to Christ is our most important work," he emphasized.

One afternoon Mark Twain, who lost more than one hard-earned fortune by investing it in enterprises that looked good at the moment, observed a tall, spare man, with kindly blue eyes and eager face, coming up the path with a strange contraption under his arm. Yes, it was an invention, and the tall man explained it to Mark who listened politely but said he had been burned too often. "But I'm not asking you to invest a fortune," explained the man, "You can have as large a share as you want for \$500." Mark Twain shook his head; the invention didn't make sense. The tall, alert gentleman started away.

"What did you say your name was?" asked Mark.

"Bell," replied the inventor a little sadly, "Alexander Graham Bell."

Humanity is so homogenous. Frequently we spend money for that which is not bread, and withhold our God-given gold from dispelling darkness in benighted areas.

Where would we be if all men grew cynical and bitter over the times in which we live? Chauncey M. Depew, the great American lawyer, legislator and orator (1834-1928) once confessed that he had warned his nephew not to invest \$5,000 in Ford stocks because "nothing has come along to beat the horse." Annual Denver Trip

On October 15, fourteen pre-nursing students from Southwestern Union College made the annual visit to the Clinical Division of the Union College School of Nursing at the Porter Memorial Hospital in Denver, Colorado. The group arrived by bus Thursday evening in time for supper in the new cafeteria. The first evening was set aside for getting acquainted with the Union College nursing students.

After an assembly Friday morning, the students were taken sight-seeing to the Denver mint and Denver Museum of Natural History. In the afternoon the nursing school faculty and students gave some interesting nursing demonstrations in the new two-million-dollar hospital wing. After supper and evening worship, the visiting students joined student singing bands in the hospital; later they attended the Missionary Volunteer meeting.

Sabbath morning the students were taken to the Glacier View Youth Camp where the Sabbath school and church services were held. The students met in the main camp building before a large fireplace.
