Ingathering and Welfare Work Combined by Roswell, New Mexico, Members

Sister Emma Head of Roswell, New Mexico, really loves Ingathering. She has been doing this work for several years and she thought she wasn't going to get the privilege of going out this year. At camp meeting time, Sister Head was in very poor health. She told her pastor, Elder Sam Elie, that if something didn't happen soon, she didn't see how she would feel well enough to go out this year. So she requested special prayer from the prayer committee. The Lord heard her prayer and she has raised so far this year nearly \$800.

Mrs. Head doesn't always get cash donations from her solicitation. This year as she worked through Hondo Valley, she gathered in two pickups and one station wagon full of apples. Again this year, Mrs. Head and some of the other fine ladies from the Roswell church planned a Thanksgiving dinner for unfortunate people of the city. Whenever a merchant said he couldn't give cash, Sister Head asked him if he didn't want to help with their Thanksgiving dinner. Nearly everyone was more than happy to oblige.

One man who operated a creamery said he couldn't afford to give cash, but he did donate 30 half-gallons of milk, 25 one-pound cans of cottage cheese, and 15 frozen pumpkin pies. Two bakeries donated 50 loaves of bread each. Several grocery stores gave food.

A wholesale house gave a case of green beans for this Thanksgiving dinner. Sister Head needed another case of vegetables so because she appreciated this man's gift, she went back to him and offered to buy a case of another kind of vegetable. He replied, "I'm sorry I can't sell you any vegetables, for we are a wholesaler and aren't allowed to. But I do have another case of green beans just like I gave you, and if you like, I'll just give those to you."

Sister Head went down to see the owner of a cafe building that had gone out of business to see if he would rent the building to them for their Thanksgiving dinner. He donated that to the church free of charge.

The Roswell ladies served approximately 150 people a delicious Thanksgiving dinner, and they had enough food left over to feed another hundred. They have this food in a deep freeze waiting to be fed to more unfortunate people at Christmas time.



Animal stories delight any child, but particularly delightful are two animal books just published by Pacific Press - Billy Bison and Cats Are for Keeps.
