The Educational Work of the Seventh-day Adventist Church . . . a Centurion in 1972

In the 1860's Ellen G. White's thoughts were turning to the role that the church could and must play in the education and training of workers for God's cause, and of the youth, in their homes as well as in church schools. Finally, in April, 1872, James White and she took part in a meeting where the question of organizing an educational society was openly discussed.

In June of that year, the first school to be opened as part of a denominationally sponsored program was located in Battle Creek, Michigan, under the direction of Professor G. H. Bell,

While this school was getting started, Mrs. White started to formulate her thoughts on education. Before the new year made its appearance, her first important statement on education was at the publishers, and appeared as the first section of a "Testimony for the Church." Referred to as "Proper Education," this statement is now found in Volume III of the Testimonies and Counsels on Education.

Her opening sentence hit a positive, optimistic note. "It is the nicest work ever assumed by men and women," she wrote, "to deal with youthful minds." She then proceeded to describe the role of parents and teachers in the education of the children.

The early church leaders were already cognizant of the need of preparing workers to assume the task of the church. They felt education was important, but that it should be within the framework of the goals and objectives of the great commission. "The great object of education," Mrs. White emphasized, "is to enable us to use the powers which God has given us in such a manner as will best represent the religion of the Bible and promote the glory of God." This has been the basic premise in the building of our schools.

To her contemporaries, this first school no doubt appeared as a small beginning, but in time it became part of a network of schools that was to encompass the globe. There are few flags in the world today under whose banners there are no Seventh-day Adventist schools.

In the United States and Ganada practically every state and province can attest to at least one church school. The early beginnings in Michigan were to mushroom a hundred years later into a complex of schools which in the North American Division number two universities, 11 colleges, 84 senior academies, and over 1,000 elementary schools and junior academies. This is certainly a tremendous undertaking when one considers the size of our constituency and how it is spread out across the continent.

Without question the factor which makes our schools unique, and which they must continue to exhibit if we are to maintain our distinctiveness, is that the Holy Bible is an integrating force in all areas of learning in each school. This, with our acceptance of the Spirit of Prophecy, was, is, and must continue to be, the modus operandi of our educational work.

This occasion of a century of Adventist education in 1972, should not be used as an opportunity for us to glory in the past, but rather for us to seriously contemplate where we are today, and where should we be going in the future! There are still too many youth in our churches today who have not had the blessings of an Adventist education. Is this not challenge enough for us to seriously contemplate the future direction of our educational endeavors?

deavor as of January 1, 1972. Elder Ed Peterson, for 13 years youth director for the Columbia Union, has been elected periodical manager of the Review and Herald Publishing Association. He replaces Elder Bruce Wickwire, who has

accepted a call to be associate secretary of the General Conference Publishing Department.

In his new responsibility, Peterson will be fostering the growth of numerous periodicals produced by the publishing house. He already has indicated a desire to see our official church paper, the Review and Herald, in every Seventh-day Adventist home. With the new and widespread interest in health evidenced by all age groups in our country, he foresees a tremendous increase in the circulation of Life and Health. Other journals receiving particular attention will include Liberty, Insight, Ministry, and the Junior Guide.

Born in Canton, New York, Peterson received his Th.B. degree from Atlantic Union College. He entered denominational work as a pastor-evangelist, serving in the Carolina and Northern New England Conferences. His natural talent for working with young people was early recognized in his call to MV and educational secretary work in the British Columbia and Canadian Union Conferences prior to his association with the Columbia Union.

Peterson is widely known as the founder of the Adventist Amateur Radio Network. He, along with his associates in this around-the-world organization, have served the church in linking up missionaries with loved ones in the homeland, particularly in emergency situations. As an active "ham" he visits regularly with interesting people from Pitcairn Island to Africa, and even as he drives to work a mobile rig permits him to carry on spirited conversations with other amateurs.

In speaking of his new position, Peterson says: "I don't intend to lose my contacts with youth in my new work. Young readers make up a sizable portion of the readership of our denominational literature. I definitely will be keeping them in mind."

The Petersons have two young people of their own, Bob and Donna, both of the Washington, D.C. area.

The World Literature Fund was established in 1960 for the specific purpose of making evangelistic periodicals available to institutions and individuals who could not otherwise afford to receive them, according to W. L. Crofton, SPA's periodical department manager. The fund is supported solely by voluntary contributions. Magazines used to fill requests include These Times, The Message Magazine, and Still Waters.


youth scene today! Street-people, 'acid-heads,' hippies, and 'speed-freaks' have found that the tinsel gods of free love, drug trips, and


Average nightly attendance ranged from 40 to 60, approximately 50% of whom were non-Adventists.

The church and property rests on a corner lot that includes approximately two acres of paved parking space, and two acres of cleared landscaped land. The entire lot is 5.66 acres in size. There are two separate buildings — one an "L" shaped school, the other a rectangular church and Sabbath school building. Sidewalks are all around the school, connecting both school and church. There is a seating capacity of 575 seats downstairs and 200 in the balcony of the church.

Connected with the church is an educational building which consists of six classrooms, one large auditorium, two regular offices, one large church office, and two bathrooms.

The Child Development Center is housed in the school building (separate from education building) and will care for 200 children. Here there are two assembly rooms with 12 small classrooms and they are being used for "little people" of primary and kindergarten age. This center is directed by Mrs. Ruthie Mitchell.

The cost of the entire facility was \$240,000.00 The total appraised value is \$498,000.00.

Brother Joe Williams was very active in distributing lessons and working closely with many of the graduates.


There were 50 persons who completed the course and 20 to receive diplomas.




Kerrville Goes Over the Top in Ingathering on December 4

A Great Door — Open

1971 is history — 1972 has already begun, a whole year in which we all will have exactly the same number of days and hours. The greatest leaders in the world won't have a minute more than

you in 1972.

This world is in desperate trouble. Scientists are predicting that we have 25 or 30 years (at the rate we are going) before the world will be so polluted it will not be livable. This doesn't seem possible, but nevertheless that's what some are saying. The old planet earth is a sinking ship. She's leaking badly and she's going down. Those who live for this world are going down with her.

The outlook is dismal — but the uplook has never been brighter or better. A great door of opportunity is open. Jesus is coming soon — and when I say soon — I mean soon. Whatever we

plan to do worthwhile we had better be up and at it! There just isn't much time left.

Those who are willing to work for Jesus will find unlimited doors of opportunity swinging open on every side. They key word in the above text is and. Most people would instinctively use the word but — because we know the minute you enter the open door of service, you will encounter "many adversaries." The apostle Paul knew this. He expected opposition. He experienced it many times in many ways. That is why he used the matter-of-fact expression, "and there are many adversaries."

Who are these adversaries? Who would keep you from working for Christ? Here are a few:

1. YOU. The first and biggest adversary you meet will be yourself. No one can stop you or discourage you more than you. You must forget self if you are going to be effective in working for Jesus.

2. CRITICS. There will always be critics. Pay no attention to them. You are working for Jesus,

not for Satan's agents.

- 3. FRIENDS. You didn't expect me to list friends but "friends" can stop you sometimes faster than your enemies. "You'd better be careful." "That's not for you." "Wait awhile." "You need more education." "Let the preacher do it that's what he's paid for." Ever hear words like that?
- 4. RELATIVES. Many a would-be worker for Christ is stopped cold by relatives. Who can cool you off faster? "You'll make a perfect fool of yourself." "You're not qualified." "You don't have it." "You married me not the church." "If you do that you'll do it by yourself." "I'm leaving."

5. SATAN. There is a real devil. If you ever doubted that enter the open door of service. You

will never doubt the existence of Satan again!

Yes, there are many adversaries. Expect it but don't let it stop you.

A great door is open — enter that door and you will find the greatest joy you have ever known. Jesus will go with you. He will "be with you alway, even to the end of the world."
