Brandom Kitchens Needs Help

Brandom Kitchens needs additional help in all three of its plants: Keene, Texas; Gentry, Arkansas; and Corrales, New Mexico.

All three plants are now pushing their current employees to the limit in order to keep up with the orders placed by builders for the company's quality kitchen cabinets. The Keene plant began a 6 to 10 p.m. shift in the mill in late March to keep up with the demand, and several employees, student and full-time, are working two shifts to keep up. A shortage of employees was not a problem at the beginning of 1977. The company delivered about 8,000 cabinets during January and nearly as many in February. But production jumped nearly 80% in March, to more than 14,000 cabinets delivered! April is keeping up with March, and company officials see no let-up through the summer months.

Brandom's new warehouse and the shift to an assembly-line production accounts for much of this increase, as does the shift to marketing through distributors. Beyond that, however, is a boom in summer construction that is just underway in the Southwest. Of the 10 metropolitan areas in the U.S. where construction is moving the fastest this season, three are in the Southwest. Houston heads the list. Dallas is sixth, and New Orleans eighth. Brandoms is the exclusive producer of cabinets for the top five builders in the city of Houston.

"We need help, both full-time and student," said Garland Peterson, personnel director of the company. "This is an excellent opportunity for families to move to one of our plants to put their children through school."

50,000-WATT STATIONS

VOP Blankets Southwest on Four Major Stations

The Voice of Prophecy daily broadcast is now being heard Monday through Friday in the Southwestern Union on four more 50,000-watt stations, beginning February 1.


WWL, New Orleans, 870 on the dial, airs the programs at 8:00 p.m. (CST). Its coverage area includes Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas, and some 25 other states.

WHAS, Louisville, Kentucky, 840 on the dial, schedules the VOP at 10:30 p.m. (CST). Covering almost all of the eastern half of the U.S. at night, it can be heard in the Southwestern Union in Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, and eastern Texas.

KOA, Denver, 850 on the dial, airs the programs at 11:30 p.m. (MST). During the night hours, the station is heard in 17 states, including New Mexico, Oklahoma, and much of Texas.

KSL, Salt Lake City, 1160 on the dial, carries the Voice of Prophecy at 11:06 p.m. (MST). Its signal at night covers most of the western United States, including New Mexico.

"We do not have the money to cover the cost of these new stations, but we have moved ahead in faith to purchase time believing that the lateness of the hour demands it," said Dan Guild, VOP manager. "We know our fellow church members throughout North



America would want us to do this. We believe that when our supporters hear about this unprecedented opportunity, that sufficient funds will come into the VOP Readiness Fund to cover the cost of the new stations."

News in Brief

ADVENTISTS LAUNCH "PROJECT W.A.T.E.R." - What is "Project W.A.T.E.R"? It is the launching internationally of a vital project of the International Temperance Association and all national societies for the preservation and urging of the rights of non-drinkers.

W.A.T.E.R. stands for World Abstainers To Enjoy Rights. The goal is through publicity, press, radio, TV, and a public meeting to launch the plan in all 68 national societies around the world at the same time - May 16, and to keep before the public an emphasis on positive alternatives to maintain nondrinkers' rights and encourage others to unite in this act for total freedom.

W.A.T.E.R. will push a seven-point program:

- 1. Every abstainer has the right to pure water.
- 2. Attractive non-alcoholic beverages to be available at all social and civic functions.
- 3. Separate areas for abstainers (smoking and drinking) on all aircraft, buses, and trains till liquor is outlawed on all public transportation.
- 4. Prohibit liquor advertising and place health warning on all liquor containers,
- 5. Lower insurance rates for all teetotalers. 6. Abstinence is the cure for alcoholism not moderation. In fact, moderation is the cause.
- 7. Severe penalties imposed on all who provide liquor to children under legal age and all educational systems teach the joys, fulfillment rewards, and advantages of a life-style without alcohol.

ADVENTISTS FILE BRIEF ON SABBATARIAN CASE - A "friend of the court" brief has been filed with the U.S. Supreme Court in the case of Trans World Airlines versus Hardison.

The brief was filed by the Seventh-day Adventist Church. "This could be the most significant case to Adventists since the Supreme Court ruled on Sunday-closing laws in 1961," says Warren Johns, attorney for the church. TWA versus Hardison involves a member of the World Wide Church of God who was fired for refusing to work on the Sabbath, from sundown Friday to sundown Saturday. The case will be decided later this spring.

LLU RESEARCH ASSISTANT APPEARS ON NA-TIONWIDE TV - Research assistant in the Loma Linda University School of Health, Hulda H. Crooks, appeared on the Los Angeles television program, "To Tell the Truth," Monday, February 28, at 4:30 p.m. on KNBC-TV, channel 4. Mrs. Crooks, 80, taped the television program in New York City in late January. Her "secret" was that she has climbed Mt. Whitney in central California every year (except 1965) since 1962 when she was 66. In addition to climbing Mt. Whitney, Mrs. Crooks has hiked down the Grand Canyon (age 75), hiked down Havasu Canyon (at ages 76 and 77), and hiked the 212-mile John Muir Trail (over a two-year period at ages 77 and 78.) Viewers may call their local television station and inquire when "To Tell the Truth" show number 2971 will be shown. It is scheduled to be shown in over 100 cities throughout the United States over the next two years.

recruit doctors for Oklahoma. I was on I-40 in Amarillo and had just left the interstate to buy gas. I was stopped by a funeral procession at an intersection. As the cars passed I became aware of the large numbers of teenagers and youth in the cars and then noticed that this was an unusually long procession. As I waited I could not help wondering, "Was this one of the students of the local high school? Was he, or she a Christian? If not, had anyone taken the opportunity to tell this person about Christ?"

As I stated, this was one of the longest processions I had seen, so I had time to reflect. I thought of the many towns in Oklahoma where we have no churches or members. As I continued my trip I was keenly aware of this possibility as I passed from town to town through Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and into California. How many of these people know Christ and His last warning message for this time of earth's history? What is being done to tell them of a soon returning Saviour so they can be prepared?

Our Oklahoma Conference leadership is strongly committed to darkcommunity evangelism. Departmental men as well as church pastors are holding meetings and the Lord has blessed. Our last baptismal report shows 51 baptisms for January and February of 1977 as compared with 34 for the same period last year. We thank God for

this, but what about those we are not reaching?

I was not asked to write this article. Neither am I involved in a special These Times promotional campaign. But the thoughts that went through my mind the day of that funeral in Amarillo impressed me with the idea that These Times is an excellent tool to reach those in these "dark areas" of our conference. This is a way in which laymen can become involved with our leadership and pastors in taking the message of salvation to a world that is fast falling apart.

Personally, I do not think we should concern ourselves with reaching a certain goal of two subscriptions per member - or whatever the goal may be - then doing nothing more, saying, "I have done my part." I have seen too many funerals, and conducted too many for that matter; so I believe we should think of this possibility - with God's help, how many souls can we reach this year with These Times while they are still alive and can make a decision for Christ? With this approach, and with the Holy Spirit impressing us, we will far exceed any goal. I believe in goals, but the greatest goal of all is to reach as many people as we possibly can.

As I sat at that intersection the other day and watched and thought as the funeral procession passed, my mind reflected upon the statement I read not long ago in Desire of Ages which said, "When we love the world as Christ loved it, then we are fitted for heaven for we have heaven in our hearts." May the These Times campaign this year be the best ever - not because it is our duty to support a church program - but because we have seen the people as Christ saw them and had compassion and longed for their soul salvation and then became personally involved.







Who Can We Trust?

We live in a cynical age. People are losing confidence at supersonic speeds. Everything we have always trusted is now under scrutiny or outright attack. The government, the church, the Bible, the Spirit of Prophecy have all been looked at again — and in some quarters relegated to the trash heap.

Can you trust anybody or anything in this world today?

It doesn't take much imagination to criticize. You don't have to have any special talent to be able to see faults (especially if you work at it round the clock). You can cast away all your confidence in everything you ever believed in, if you will do the following:

- Expect everybody and everything that claims any merit to be perfect.
- Scrutinize everybody and everything good with 24hour surveillance, looking exclusively for faults.
- Once you've found them, dwell on them constantly — forgetting all their good and emphasizing all their defects.

It will work! especially if you are able to see yourself as some kind of latter-day prophet called of God to blind your eyes totally to all the good — and to advertising faithfully all found faults.

Let's put it straight — Nothing that is run by imperfect human beings will ever be spotlessly pure or perfectly perfect. Read your Bible — there's only one perfect One in that whole book. And even the Bible, they tell me, is not perfectly translated. The reason for that — man did it.

So, can't anything be trusted? Who can you trust? You can trust God. You can rely on Jesus 100%. He has never failed — not once.

I want to tell you something, friends, my confidence in God, His Son, His church, His truth is at a new high

peak. As I see this depleted, polluted world going down, I thank God every day for a beautiful uplook message. Don't you? The outlook may be pretty horrible, but the uplook has never been better!

The Spirit of Prophecy is a wonderful gift to the church. It is the great balancer — when heeded and followed. The time has come in this church for us to study how we can bring ourselves in line with this inspired counsel, rather than how we can sidestep or make of no effect some of the plain instructions given. Amen? Amen!

Pardon me for digressing, let's get back to that question — who can we trust? The book, *In Heavenly Places*, p. 176, by Ellen G. White has a statement that has been very precious to me. I have memorized it. I quote it every day. Great courage has been brought to my heart through these words at a time when I needed great courage. Listen:
