

In the early 20th Century in upstate New York, there were summer education centers which provided education, combined with entertainment in the form of lectures. These functions were presented outdoors, preferably under a tent, and became popularly known as a Chautauqua, according to Webster's dictionary. In the latter part of the 20th century, the Southwest Region provided 20 Bible Chautauquas or learning centers outdoors under tents, primarily to proclaim the good news of salvation, to the 2,000,000 Blacks residing in this fivestate region. The ministry and laity alike are committed to doing everything possible to disseminate the everlasting gospel in the context of the three angels' messages. Every facet of this conference has been vibrant during the three quarters of 1980 to tell people that the King is coming, and that they must prepare to meet Him.

Over the years we dreamed of baptizing 1,000 souls in a year's time. In 1979 we broke the 500-soul barrier for the first time. 1980 promises to be a glorious year for we have fielded 20 tent meetings, or Bible Chautauquas, and the end results look promising. As evangelistic reports stream into the conference office our 20 Bible Chautauquas were successful in that it appears we are nearing a plateau of 700 souls for the first three quarters.

Every person in the Region whose heart has been warmed by the good news that God loves Him is sharing with others "The Old, Old Story of Jesus and His Love." We believe the effort to proclaim the gospel will bring untold blessings to both givers and receivers.

General Conference Statement on Recent Russian Incident

A knowledgeable official at the Seventh-day Adventist world office in Washington, D.C., in response to a UPI release from Moscow said recently, "Rosislav N. Galetsky, 31, who is reported to be an Adventist preacher in the Soviet Union, is not connected with this denomination in any way."

Galetsky, who dissident sources say was seized July 1, at a railway station in Leningrad, is alleged to be the designated head of the True and Free Seventh-day Adventist Church — a group the Soviet Union considers illegal because they refuse to accept any state control over religion.

Alf Lohne, vice-president of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists added, "Galetsky's predecessor, Vladimir Shelkov, the 84-year-old patriarch of the sect who is believed to have died last January in a Siberian labor camp, had separtated from the Seventh-day Adventist denomination 56 years ago (1924). Church leaders here in the U.S. have had no direct contact with either Shelkov or Galetsky."

From a humanitarian and compassionate point of view, Seventh-day Adventist believe in human rights for all peoples and the free expression of religious belief and practice for all. At the same time the church tries, as far as possible, to maintain a neutral attitude toward political matters.

Harder, executive director of the Board of Higher Education, presented the awards to the presidents of the following: Pacific Union College \$3,000; Andrews University \$2,700; Southern Missionary College \$600; Union College \$600; and Walla Walla College \$600. These grants make possible guest lecturers, transportation expenses to internship jobs, departmental library expansion, and student scholarships.

Huguley Receives Certificate for Fight Against Rising Costs

Huguley Memorial Hospital was recently awarded a 1980 Certificate of Participation in the Texas Voluntary Effort by the Texas Hospital Association (THA). The certificate cited Huguley for its outstanding effort in containing rising health-care costs.

In announcing the receipt of the certificate, Huguley President John D. Koobs said, "Our hospital's cost containment goal is very ambitious. In the face of double-digit inflation, it will require great dedication and support from our governing board, medical staff, and employees to continue the successful containment of our increased expenses.

"We are determined," Koobs said, "to contain costs while preserving the quality and availability of services we currently provide to the community."

He said that in order for the hospital's cost containment

Pesky Birds

Magpies are beautiful black-and-white birds with iridescent green and greenish-blue feathers in wings and wedge-shaped tails. This relative of the crow (about 17-22 inches in length) is despised as a thief and scavenger in the western part of the United States. When cattle or sheep are slaughtered the magpies come to compete for the scraps. Two of these birds will puff out their chests and walk toward each other. Many times it's beak-to-beak and chest-to-chest before one concedes. The first one to break the fanfaronade leaves the choice morsel to the swaggerer.

The magpies attack weak or injured stock and peck at open branding scars, preventing their healing. In fact this pesky bird will peck at the blood spots on horses left by the bite of large flies. Finally there is a large, open, raw sore that birds continually pick and enlarge. Horses cannot tolerate this treatment so they run faster and faster to escape the birds and eventually commit hara-kari by jumping over a cliff to a peaceful sleep.

Sometimes people employ magpie tactics. A wound or sad experience of life is almost healed but some "bird" has to pick at the scab. Speech is a precious gift and should be used to praise. We have been counseled not to use harsh and cutting words.

The lesson in this article can be summed up in this quotation. "If every [person] ... would make an effort to restrain all unkind and discourteous words, and speak with respect to all; if he would bear in mind that he is preparing to become a member of the heavenly family; if he would guard his influence by sacred sentinels, that it should not scatter away from Christ; if he would endeavor to have every act of his life show forth the praises of Him who has called him out of darkness into His marvelous light, what a reformatory influence would go forth ...!"

parents will follow Jesus and become more mature-minded than those who have no interest in their eternal welfare?

The Revised Standard Version of the Bible has given us this translation of our text "May our sons in their youth be like plants full grown." This expresses a hope that they will be: (1) strong and well-rooted in the faith, (2) rightly cultured and nurtured in the religion of their parents, (3) not morally dwarfed but spiritually mature at an early age, (4) fruitful and useful in the work of their Master, (5) planted in an environment that will ensure rapid spiritual growth.

This last item enumerated can be the means to bring about the fulfillment of the previous four. Adventist schools offer this privilege and environment. It is the place where education is based upon the Word of God. "Instructing, cultivating, polishing, and refining the youth and children should be the main burden of both parents and teachers." *Child Guidance*, p. 296.

Schools Double in Arkansas-Louisiana

The explosion in Christian education which began five years ago in September of 1976 continues to mushroom in the Arkansas-Louisiana Conference school system with the addition of ten new church schools. Under the leadership of Superintendent of Schools, J. Wayne Hancock, the system of church schools has doubled in size from 18 elementary and intermediate schools employing the services of 39 teachers to a system of 36



schools employing 66 certified teachers on August 25, when school bells rang signaling the first day of the 1980-1981 school year.

There is a "prairie fire" sense of urgency among many Adventist parents to find schools for their children that will not be at cross purposes with the teachings of the home and the church. True Christian parents and church leaders alike are becoming weary of trying to compete with public education for the minds of their children and young people.



The surging growth in Seventh-day Adventist schools clearly represents an on-going current in the Arkansas-Louisiana Conference. Increasing numbers of Bible and Spirit-of-Prophecybelieving Adventists are insisting on the continuance of this new direction. There is an increasing "grass roots" wave of parental concern that our children not only need to be prepared for this world, but also for the world to come. The current trends indicate that the Seventh-day Adventist school explosion has just begun.

For example, in the church at Houma, Louisiana, last year the school opened with seven students. This year, under the direction of Pastor Richard Hall and teacher Kathy Weigand, the school has reported an opening enrollment of 19

active students. This has produced an increase in students of 171% making it necessary for Connie Daigle to volunteer her time as a teacher's aide.

Three years ago Roger Rustad, pastor of the Fort Smith church, reported to the superintendent that he was concerned about the small size of the church school in his district. After some serious discussion about his dream for his church, teacher Eva Hevener was employed to teach the six-student, one-room school. Together pastor and teacher worked to increase student enrollment. Before school began this year, three teachers were employed and school opened with 43 students for a 616% increase. Elder Rustad, when speaking about plans for the future, has inquired about the possibility of expanding the eight-grade school into a junior academy. Elder Rustad's dream has also included the opening of a new school at Clarksville, Arkansas, where teacher Nelda Scoggins has helped by recruiting for the new school nine children. Nelda, who is working on a missionary wage, is a marvelous, degreed teacher according to a number of parents.

Pastor E. E. Roy, of the Texarkana district in Arkansas, is noted, not only for his dynamic lectures at teachers' conventions in various conferences, but also for his tremendous ability to build model church school enrollments in his district. In his traditional, systematic, organized way, Pastor Roy made an early request for a new school at Hope, Arkansas. But recognizing that this new school would take one third of the enrolled students from the Texarkana school, he began an active recruiting program which continued for almost nine months and ended with dramatic results. The school in Texarkana, with 17 students at the end of last school year, lost five of those students to the new school at Hope which opened this year with eight students. Texarkana,



which worried about an enrollment of 12 students, nevertheless employed two teachers, Vickie Lehman, and Ella Schmiege, and opened with an enrollment of 23.

Ron Rusco, new principal of Shreveport Junior Academy, approached student recruitment with great enthusiasm and a new style. Working closely with his board and the pastors of the multichurch area, Ron purchased radio spots on KEPT, the religious radio station which broadcasts to the Ark-La-Tex, and thus stirred unusual interest and put Shreveport Junior Academy on the front page of the Shreveport Journal. Ron's wife, Carol, has also brought to the school a new five- and six-year-old kindergarten program which is remarkably different from any other kindergarten program in the city.

When Elder Hancock was asked what accounted for the supernatural growth taking place in Christian education in the Arkansas-Louisiana Conference, he responded, "Supernatural pastors and teachers working in tandem driven by a divine spirit." After that he said, "I suppose it depends heavily upon outstanding, well-qualified, dedicated Christian teachers willing to give everything there is of themselves to the education of our youth." He concluded, "The Holy Spirit will bless and see to it that the explosion in Christian education will continue to mushroom."

Two requests for church schools next year have already come to the conference department of education. School boards are currently studying the standards which must be met in order to open schools fully accredited by either the state of Arkansas or the state of Louisiana and the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Will your church, guided by the Bible and the Spirit of Prophecy, be among God's progressive churches who refuse to be satisfied with anything less than total Christian education?

New Church Is Organized in Yukon

On May 23, 1977, the Oklahoma City Central church board voted to select the city of Yukon as its target community, with the objective in mind of raising up a new church within three years. A plan of witnessing was put into operation using the "gift cards" for a free copy of Bible Readings enclosed with the Ingathering brochure, and an evangelistic tabloid sent to all Yukon residents containing several free offers. The responses from these two projects provided opportunity to become acquainted with some of the fine people in Yukon. The Central church sponsored These Times to all rural route patrons during the months of March, April, May, and June 1979.

On March 17, 1979, a story hour and Bible class was begun which met for many weeks in the Yukon Community Center and the Roundup Club Building. During the summer Wesley Wilbanks worked with Pastor Tim Ponder in visitation in preparation for Elder Jac Colon's "Revelation Now" Crusade during July-August 1979. At the conclusion of this exciting crusade 17 united with God's commandment-keeping church and it was decided that it was time to begin meeting on Sabbath morning as a separate group from the Central church. The Yukon group was organized as a Company of the Oklahoma Conference on September 8, 1979. At this time Pastor Jerry Mayes assumed leadership of the

company and served until January 1980 at which time Pastor Tim Ponder became the pastor and activity began in preparation for a crusade to be held in March by Elder H. B. Petry. Bible study cards were distributed during the snowy weather and Bible studies were begun by Pastor Ponder and some of the members.

The Oklahoma Czech Building was the site of the "Peace for Life" Crusade. March 14-29. Steve Vail worked closely with Elder Petry and Pastor Ponder in a program of visitation and personal study with interests. Nine wonderful souls joined as a result of this crusade which greatly encouraged the members of the company. During the last week of the crusade Elder Petry located a house which he felt had potential for remodeling into a church. He helped the members see the advantages of buying their own property which was purchased the second week of April following numerous providential occurrences. 

Those Wonderful Theologians

Oliver Wendell Holmes defined the higher approach to creative thinking in this way: "There are one-story intellects, twostory intellects, and three-story intellects with skylights. All fact-collectors who have no aim beyond their facts are onestory intellects. Two-story men compare, reason, generalize, using the labors of their fact-collectors as well as their own. Three-story men idealize, imagine, predict; their best illumination comes from above, through the skylight."

I like to think of most theologians as two-story men who "compare, reason, generalize, using the labors of their factcollectors as well as their own." Theologians are wonderful people. I have just spent most of two weeks with some of them and my mind is still filled with wonder and amazement! They know so much about what most of us have never heard of before that it leaves you a little dizzy! (Or perhaps it was the light at 10,000 feet in the Colorado Rocky Mountains!)

What is theology and who are theologians? In a few words theology is a noble intellectual discipline once considered "the Queen of the Sciences." They are experts in language and words. They know words inside out and they can tell you what the Bible "may be saying." (If their definition of a word is the one the author really meant to use, that is.) These lucid interpreters of the faith do not always agree with each other, but they will agree that the position they hold is right. It sort of befuddles an average mind like mine, but I came away from that mountain with a kind of confused enlightment as far as theologians are concerned. I know more about *them* but I still am mixed up on some of the connotations they are able to cluster around some of their words.

I heard of one preacher in a popular church who after studying several interpretations of several modern-day theologians read his text like this. "Except ye repent as it were and be converted after a fashion ye shall be damned to a certain extent."

Our Seventh-day Adventist theologians are special — extra special in an unbelieving world. They are strongly in agreement on the basic fundamentals of the truths that Seventh-day Adventists have believed and preached through the years. They support the church and its beliefs. They may have certain areas of variance (a big word up in the mountains) but basically and fundamentally they stand united in belief. This really is a contrast to what is seen among the theologians generally in the world today. Many of them are known best for hair-splitting confusion. Many of their arguments are trivial and even ridiculous.

I am proud of our Adventist theologians. They have kept the faith and they are performing a service of inestimable value to the church at this time. God bless them. God guide them and God use them.


Theology is accepted today as an integral part of religion. But you don't have to be a theologian to understand the Bible or to be a Christian. Thank God for that. Jesus Himself was not a theologian. He spoke with a simplicity that even a child could understand. There were plenty of theologians around when Jesus walked the roads of Palestine. These theologians were responsible for the diverse sects that filled Jerusalem. One day some of these sectarians confronted Jesus and bluntly asked Him about His doctrines. Jesus ignored their question and said, "Ye do err not knowing the Scripture or the power of God."

We can know so much about the Scriptures (as the Scribes in Christ's day) that we lose their message and their power. It is through the Scriptures that we learn of Him and His power. It is through the Scriptures that we learn of divine guidance through His spirit.

I like to hear good theological analysis. It brings a certain satisfaction. It woos a "scientific order from continuous process." It introduces an awareness of stages. It turns over hidden meanings (and sometimes more meanings than are there!). But forever remember, you don't have to understand all that to accept Christ and know His salvation. You can be a "threestory intellect" with a skylight illuminated by God's Spirit, born again into His kingdom by simply saying, "Lord I believe" — for it was He who made it so simple by saying: "Believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved."

The skylight factor is the secret of wisdom. Through quietness, meditation, and prayer you can know the wisdom of heaven by opening your heart and mind to that great flood of light from above.
