AMONG THE CHURCHES IN FLORIDA

FROM the 3rd to the 6th of July I spent with the church at Lakeland. Four meetings were held, two of which, by invitation of the pastor, were in the Cumberland Presbyterian church. I never had a warmer reception in my life than was accorded by Pastor Gracey and his people. I believe a good impression was made. The Lakeland church had been without ordained officers ever since its organization. Brother Rothrock, an old burden-bearer who has recently moved to Lakeland from Illinois, was chosen elder, and Brother John Mitchell, Sr., deacon. Brother Mitchell was ordained at this meeting, and Brother Rothrock had been ordained in Illinois.

I went to Bartow the 6th, intending to go on to Orlando the 10th, but the brethren persuaded me to stay over Sabbath. I spoke three times at Bartow, and baptized one sister. On Sunday night quite a large audience assembled, and seemed much interested in the discourse.

At this writing (July 15) I am enjoying the hospitality of Brother Shreve at the sanitarium property at Orlando. He expects to secure title to the property this week, and has already taken possession. So he will be ready to give us title before we are ready to receive it; but he says that need not interfere with the progress of our work. Our general, union, and state conference officials have approved of this move, and we hope to be ready to open the institution by the middle of October. Brethren, do all you can to help us. My stay here at the sanitarium property has inspired me with still greater determination to make this enterprise a success.

Some went to the mayor, asking that we be warned not to begin meetings. He referred them to the owner of the lot. He (the owner) was besieged by remonstrants, but he proved to be a man who had a mind of his own. The pastors of the city warned their respective flocks. The result of all this opposition has been that our congregation has increased until it has been necessary to lengthen our cords by placing seats around the tent on the outside. At the last meeting (Monday, the 20th) fully four hundred people listened to a discourse on Dan. 7:25.

Friday morning George returned home, leaving me alone. I hope soon to have help. I am sure our brethren will pray for the success of the work in the various places where our workers are stationed.

TO THE ALABAMA CONFERENCE

OUR brethren have been placing before us the great need of increasing the offerings to foreign missions if the work already started is to be carried on, to say nothing of the many openings yet to be filled in all these lands.

In every paper we take up we read of calls for help, and for means to enlarge the work already started. Secular papers are full of the accounts of the awakening of these nations. Rev. E. W. Thwing, in the Missionary Review of the World for May, 1908, tells us, "To-day China presents the grandest opportunity for gospel preaching the world has ever known. In all the provinces the doors are standing wide open. For many years the missionary has been asking the Chinese to come and hear. To-day the Chinese are asking the missionary to come and speak. Now is the time to go forward. In every Christian land the church of Christ should put forth special effort to bring the power of

the gospel of Jesus Christ to the Chinese today. Christians have been long praying for the opening of the great empire to the preaching of the gospel. China is open to-day as never before. The work now done will bring forth fruit a hundred-fold in the near future." The same is true of other lands. India is holding out her hands and appealing for help.

Now in order for us to help meet the demands upon us, a plan has been inaugurated called the ten-cent-a-week plan. You have all heard of it. Some may feel that they cannot give even that, but there are others who can give a good deal more, so both together giving what they can, ought to raise the required amount easily, especially as the Sabbathschool, annual, and mid-summer offerings are all to be a part of it.

According to our latest reports, we have in Alabama three hundred and one Seventh-day Adventists. Ten cents a week from each one for the year would mean for Alabama 1,565.20. All our offerings to June 30, have only amounted to 500.54, leaving us still the sum of 1,064.66 yet to be raised by December 31. We have only raised one third in the half year; now we have the other two-thirds for this half year. We can do it though, for this is the best part of the year, and we can make no better use of the means entrusted to us than investing it in carrying the last message to these far-off lands.

Any wishing to read the resolutions adopted by the different conferences regarding this can find them in the REPORT OF PROGRESS dated April 28, and in the *Review and Herald* of April 16.

We show our appreciation of what the truth has done for us by the way we help to get the gospel to other poor sinners. God's purpose in giving it to us is just the same as when he gave it to Abraham. "The Scripture, foreseeing that God would justify the Gentiles [or nations] by faith, preached the gospel beforehand unto Abraham, saying, In thee shall all nations be blessed."
