Home Office News

SALES report for week ending July 12, 1913: Total number bound volumes, 5,395; Watchman, 8,782.

The Home Office begins to feel that the busy season is near. Last week brought in many large orders. As several of the office workers were sick or absent on vacation, it pressed to the limit the workers who remained to get out the work. All have shown a splendid spirit of willingness, and not one word of complaint has been heard. The Lord will bless such a loyal, faithful spirit as this.

The Lord is indeed blessing our work in this field. In some sections the month of June has fallen a little behind that of the corresponding month last year. This is caused, we believe, by the absence of so many of our field men attending the General Conference but we believe the inspiration gained by attending that meeting will show up in their future work, and that from now on our reports will be one of gains all along the line.

An order just received calls for sixteen cases of books to go to our Atlanta Branch. Brother Randall requests that this order be rushed. Evidently things are moving in the Southeast.

Mrs. Agnes Gray, stenographer of the Book Department, has been absent from her work all last week on account of illness. She lost twelve pounds in weight but was able to be back at her desk Monday morning.

Miss Hazel Wood, the Manager's stenographer, has returned from an extended visit with relatives and friends in the East, visiting Staten Island, New York, and different points in Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine, returning via Illinois, her former home. She returns looking well, and we believe these occasional visits are a benefit to our workers.

Brother G. B. Thompson of Jacksonville, Fla., a former employee of the Publishing House, was an office visitor Monday morning. Brother Thompson is conducting a very successful bath and message parlor in the Windsor Hotel of the Florida city, and brings a good report of the meetings recently held in Jacksonville by Elder Haynes. He reports fifty new members added to the church as a result.

Last week we received orders for fifty-seven cases of books, having a total weight of about three tons. Eleven cases of these were for "Past, Present, and Future." The mail last Sunday brought in orders for 1,000 of these books to be shipped out of our territory, so we have every reason to feel encouraged at the progress the work is making. Let us not forget to pray for the faithful colporteur who is going from door to door.

In a letter just received from Brother A. F. Harrison, we quote the following:-

"Up to date, the first six months of the year have gone but we have made a gain over the first six months of last year of \$2,200 in orders and \$3,500 in books delivered. Now I think that is pretty good, and I am now urging all to come to the front and let's make a hundred thousand dollars. I believe we can do it if we will. I leave for the South Texas camp-meeting Wednesday morning."

The chapel hour Monday morning was occupied by Brother Hook Jr., who has just returned from Atlantic City, N. J., where, with Brethren Ford and Curtiss, he has been attending a meeting of the Southern Classification Committee.

In his opening remarks he said: "On my way up north this time I was impressed with the fact that the Lord's hand was over us. Our train stopped suddenly at the little town of Chuckey, Tenn., and everyone got out to see what was the matter. It seemed that the track had just dropped into space. Just before the train got to that place, it had disappeared, and it took them three hours to repair the track so we could continue the journey. Now, I do not believe that these things just happen. I think they are evidences of the Lord's care over us. It is important that we stay in the line of duty, for when we are in that line we are safe."

His talk was based on the fifth chapter of James and is given in part as follows:---

"These texts were made very prominent to my mind while in this great seashore resort. It is a city of amusement. The garments of the men and women were the most extreme I ever saw in my life. People pay fifty cents an hour to ride along in little wheel-chairs. There were thousands of these little chairs on the Board Walk which is six miles long, lined almost its entire length with hotels, cafés, amusement piers and business houses. Two hundred and fifty thousand people visited Atlantic City on the Fourth of July, and many thousands of dollars were spent there on that day solely for pleasure.

"As Brethren Ford, Curtiss, and myself were attending the meetings of the Classification Committee, I felt that we represented something very different from what the other shippers present represented. I felt that our thoughts were different, our ways, our aims, our hopes were different. The point we had in mind was that we might get reduced freight rates in order that the money might be saved to the cause, and used in the promulgation of the third angel's message; those men were there with the sole thought of making gain and paying greater dividends to stockholders.

"When we presented our claim before the Classification Committee, we were quite sharply cross-examined by nearly every member of the committee. A number of questions were presented, and we found it necessary to use great care in answering these queries as a number of them were catch questions put to us for the sole purpose of getting us to commit ourselves. If the Lord is in this matter, and we believe he is, we believe that ultimately we shall gain our point. If the Classification Committee does not grant our request, then we have the right of petitioning the Interstate Commerce Commission which acts in the capacity of the Supreme Court in settling these questions that are in controversy between shippers and the carriers.

"The following are a few of the interesting things which impressed me during my absence. Last Sunday while in Philadelphia, I heard a loud voice, finally locating it on a nearby corner, and found a blind man standing there quoting Scripture. He knew the Bible by heart. I could not help but feel that he was doing some good, for though he had but a small audience, yet as the crowds passed by they could not help but hear the Scriptures he was repeating. They were very much to the point and will undoubtedly cause some of the hearers to think.

"I was much impressed with the plain dress and manner of the Quakers. Philadelphia, you know, is a Quaker City and many of these people still dress in the old style, all of the ladies wearing poke bonnets. I noticed that on the bulletin boards of their churches they refer to Sunday as First-day.

"I was surprised to learn of the number of bottles of beer and coca-cola that are sold in Chattanooga. Attending the meeting of the Classification Committee was a manufacturer of bottle caps, who stated that he sold 297,000 gross of bottle caps in that city in one year. This would be 42,768,000 bottles for the year. Isn't that one of the signs that the coming of the Lord is near? Are not men giving themselves over to the pleasures of this world and spending their money for that which is not food?

"One evening Brethren Ford, Curtiss, and myself went through the Heinz pickle exhibit at Atlantic City. Here they have samples of all their products, also giving a stereopticon lecture taking the audience on a trip of inspection through their factory. They have their own glass factory which turns out 24,000 bottles per day. The girls who handle the Heinz products, before taking up the day's work have their hands manicured by a special manicurist, hired by the company."

SISTERS Rebecca Moore and Lura Reed have finished canvassing Fulton, Ky., and have gone to Clinton, Ky., to work that place.

I am glad to say that Brother Williman, who has been ill for two or three weeks, is back in the field again.

During the four weeks of June we made a gain over the five weeks of May of \$269.25 worth of orders and \$156.75 worth delivered.

We now have a good corps of workers in the field, and if all are faithful in putting in good time in the field, we will make a fine showing in this conference.

Brother Chenault has taken \$854.50 worth of orders since he began work in April. It is very dry where he is at work, but in spite of the fact that the crops are suffering for rain, the Lord is blessing him with \$75 or \$80 worth of orders a week.

Nashville Tent Meetings

At this time the Lord is calling upon men and women to give of their means that this message may go quickly to all the world. Many are holding back that which should go into the treasury of the Lord. The Lord can not bless such as he would like to do. He has told us that if we would be faithful in the paying of our tithes and offerings he would pour us out a blessing in such measure that there would not be room enough to receive it. Now brethren, that is what we need right now in our day. The message needs our means, and we need the blessing of the Lord in order that we may have greater power in the giving of the message to others. God has promised to give us rain in the time of the latter rain. The time for the latter rain is dawning upon the earth, and we will want the Spirit of God in this time; but we must consecrate ourselves fully to him or he can never pour out his Spirit upon us. Sister Rogers said, "When I think of the sacrifices of these poor native people, I have no hesitation in urging you to give liberally."
