"The world is to receive the light of truth through an evangelizing ministry of the word through our books and periodicals. . . Let us now, by the wise use of periodicals and books, preach the word with determined energy."—Id., Vol. 9, pp. 61, 62.

It behooves every Seventh-day Adventist to do his very best to distribute our books, periodicals and tracts, that are filled with the message God has given us. "Let every soul who has received the divine illumination seek to impart it. Let the workers go from house to house, opening the Bible to the people, circulating the publications, telling others of the light that has blessed their own souls. Let literature be distributed judiciously, on the train, in the street, on the great ships that ply the sea, and through the mails."—Id., Vol. 9, pp. 122, 123.

Many of us feel that we cannot sell our literature all the time. We will allow that this is true; but not being able to sell it all the time should be no excuse for any of us not selling it any of the time. We all can endeavor to sell our truth-filled books some of the time. And this being so, let us all work together and do what we can along this line during this coming Big Week, beginning April 30. work of God needs us and we need the work. There are none too many of us if we all undertake to carry forward His work. God grant that all of us may earnestly undertake the work of God, and to keep at it more of the time. That is the way to finish the gospel work in this world.

That is the way to hasten the coming of our Saviour and the time of our going to the heavenly home. "Were every one of you a living missionary, the message for this time would speedily be proclaimed in all countries, to every people and nation and tongue."—Id., Vol. 6, p. 438. "Let the gospel message ring through our churches, summoning them to universal action."—Id., Vol. 7, p. 14.

Action not inaction. That is God's program. Campaigns are the order of the day and they will continue to be until the work is finished. Campaigns don't hurt anybody except those who don't take part in them. When God gives us ability to work for Him and opportunity, and we don't improve them, we soon lose them. "What can we expect but deterioration in religious life when the people listen to sermon after sermon and do not put the instruction to practise? The ability God has given, if not exercised, degenerates. More than this, when the churches are left to inactivity. Satan sees to it that they are employed. He occupies the field. and engages the members in lines of work that absorb their energies, destroy spirituality, and cause them to fall as dead weights upon the church."—Id., p. 434.

Beautiful sermons that don't give us anything to do for our Lord who has done so much for us, are altogether too visionary. We don't need them though they please us. A slacker for the Lord is a worker for Satan, though he never does anything at all. "There will be no idler, no slothful one found inside the kingdom of heaven."-Id., Vol. 6, p. 434. In view of the solemn times in which we are living and the urgent need for expanding our work in the mission fields, and the crying need of our neighbors for the truth contained in our good books, in view also of these solemn admonitions, let us by the grace of God, one and all, rally to make this coming Big Week the biggest, and best in all our history.

Boldly emblazoned and unmistakable is the sign of a consecration and devotion to the third angel's message which will radiate from the humble, devoted, prayerful worker and gain an admission into homes that would otherwise be barred to his effort.

In Big Week work, as in any other book-selling campaign, timidity and fear on the part of the individual

worker prove to be catastrophic, indeed, to the desired results. This excessive caution is due, undoubtedly, to a lack of conviction and confidence. First one must be sure in his own heart and mind that the message contained in the books to be sold is veritably eternal life itself to those into whose hands they are to be placed; then courage to present the books, courage to enthusiastically and earnestly urge their purchase will be forthcoming.

Courage is a fruit of consecration, and likewise courtesy a fruit of courage. And it takes courage—all one can summon, and consecration, too, to courteously urge the purchase of a set of books when met with insolent rebuffs; but courtesy is one of the signs marking the way, and must be followed if the ultimate end is reached.

the Sabbath. A goodly number are working on the Investment Plan. I think it will be a success. One sister has set a hen on nine eggs, and seven chickens hatched out and are growing fine. Some have other plans, but they are all taking hold right along. Pray for us."

LA.-MISS. CONF. REPORT

Attention is here called to special items of interest in our statement of offerings to missions. It is encouraging to note that out of the sixteen churches listed, ten have made a substantial gain this year over the same period for last year. In this I refer to the conference. In the colored department 3 only have made gains, while ten show a loss. Deducting the net loss in the

colored department from the net gain in the conference leaves a net gain in offerings of \$143.21.

While the demands on the missions treasury are hear y, and we have fallen far short of the sixty cents a week for the period, yet there are encouraging features to this report, and we have much for which to be thankful. While the gain thus far is small, it will be noticed that the membership on which the offerings is based is seventy less than for 1926. So the gain per member is more than is indicated by the figure showing the net gain.

The Jackson church leads in per capita offerings, being exactly sixty cents per week. Others are close seconds. The average for the conference is thirty-six cents, and for the colored department, fifteen cents.

Let church elders and leaders and Sabbath school superintendents encourage the increase of offerings in each church so that the next report will show a decided gain in all the churches.
