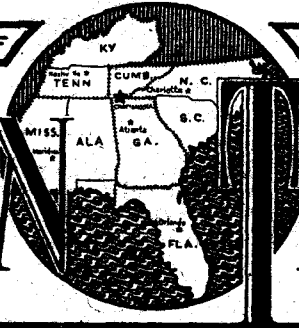

OUR UNWORKED CITIES OF THE SOUTH No. 7

"Many, many are approaching the day of God doing nothing, shunning responsibilities, and as the result they are religious dwarfs. So far as work for God is concerned, the pages of their life history present a mournful blank. They are trees in the garden of God, but only cumberers of the ground, darkening with their unproductive boughs the ground which fruit-bearing trees might have occupied.

"Those who neglect their duty in the home and among their neighbors, are, by their unfaithfulness, separating themselves from God. . . .

"In the day of God how many will confront us and say, 'I am lost! I am lost! and you never warned me; you never entreated me to come to Jesus. Had I believed as you did, I would have followed every judgment-bound soul with prayers and tears and warnings.

"In that day the Master will demand of His professed people, 'What have you done to save the souls of your neighbors? There were many who were connected with you in worldly business, who lived close beside you, whom you might have warned. Why are they among the unsaved?'

"Brethren and sisters, what excuse can you render to God for this neglect of souls? I would present this matter to you as it has been presented to me, and in the light from the life of the Master, from the cross of Calvary, I urge you to arouse. I entreat you to take upon your own hearts the burden of your fellow-men.

"No one who professes to love Jesus can long retain the favor of God if he feels no interest for sinners around him. Those who seek merely to save their own souls, and are indifferent to the condition and destiny of their fellow-men, will fail to put forth sufficient effort to secure their own salvation. In hiding their talents in the earth, they are throwing away their opportunities to obtain a star-gemmed crown."—*Review and Herald*, May 22, 1888.

"There will be a blessed commendation, a holy benediction, on the faithful winner of souls. They will join the rejoicing ones in heaven, who shout the harvest home. How great will be the joy when the redeemed of the Lord shall all meet,—gathered into the mansions prepared for them. Oh! what rejoicing for all who have been impartial, unselfish laborers together with God. What satisfaction will every

reaper have when the clear musical voice of Jesus shall be heard saying, 'Come, ye blessed of my Father, come and inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world! . . .

"The Redeemer is glorified because He has not died in vain. With glad rejoicing hearts, those who have been co-laborers with God see the travail of their soul for perishing, dying sinners, and are satisfied. The anxious hours they have spent, the perplexing circumstances they have had to meet, the sorrow of heart because some refuse to see and receive the things which make for their peace, are forgotten. The self-denial they have practiced in order to support the work is remembered no more. As they look upon the souls they sought to win to Jesus, and see them saved, eternally saved,—monuments of God's mercy and of the Redeemer's love,—there ring through the arches of heaven shouts of praise and thanksgiving."

ALABAMA-MISSISSIPPI NEWS NOTES

Sabbath, June 6, has been set aside as Religious Liberty Day by the General Conference. A suggestive program for this day has been sent out to all the church elders and pastors in the conference. We hope that this program will be presented to the churches on June 6. The offering on that day should be for the Conference Religious Liberty fund. Last year our churches contributed more than \$85 to this fund, which was used in sending subscriptions to the *Liberty Magazine* to the legislators of Alabama and Mississippi, as well as to a few prominent lawyers and judges in our conference. The importance of the *Liberty Magazine* cannot be over estimated; and this year we hope that the offering will be much larger than last year in order that more of the influential men in our conference may be reached.

On Sabbath, May 2, Elders Keate and Butterfield organized a new church of eighteen members at Ellisville, Miss., where Elder Butterfield has recently been holding an effort. Some of these members were transferred from the Laurel church, which is located only a few miles from Ellisville. Elder Butterfield now plans to hold an effort in Laurel, which, under the blessing of God, will increase the membership of that church.

Word just received from the workers at Dothan, Alabama, states that there were forty-five out to Sabbath school on May 2. They expect to have at least twice that many next Sabbath. They are now holding meetings every night in the week, and report that the interest is growing steadily.

Fire is a wonderful servant to man, and a terrible master. Friday, May 1, very early in the morning, in some unaccountable way, fire broke out in the kitchen at Pisgah School and succeeded in devouring both kitchen and dining hall. Only the dining room equipment was saved; and as the building lacked insurance the loss is quite complete. As the need for some sort of dining room was very acute the conference loaned the school a fifty-foot tent to use temporarily.

Two years ago when our church building at Parkstown, La Grange, burned there was a fair amount of insurance money collected. Brother Jackson, the leader, made an effort to get another building erected. A building of fair size, with a tiny school room attached, and built of cement blocks, was begun. Misunderstandings hindered its progress, and possibly providentially, because the school room needed more size. Now the work is going forward again, and it is hoped will continue until the people have a commodious house of worship.

The new church building in Salisbury is going forward very steadily and satisfactorily under Elder

Taylor's energetic and wise leadership and direction. The frame is up and about ready for the roof, and it is confidently hoped the services will begin in the new building before Elder and Mrs. Taylor leave for General Conference.

Elder and Mrs. Shuler left for General Conference early Friday morning May 1, driving via Montgomery, Alabama, where they held some meetings with the church, and then on to Meridian, Mississippi, where they plan to join Elder and Mrs. Keate and drive on to San Francisco.

Elder and Mrs. Griffin and Brother and Sister Smith are busy with preparations for the public meetings to be opened soon in Winston-Salem.

Elder and Mrs. Kneeland plan to leave for General Conference about May 15, to be away from Charlotte a little over a month.

Brother Bland is soon to open a series of public meetings in Columbia, S. C., which will certainly bring great encouragement and new spirit to the No. 2 church there.

Miss Nannie May Smith of our Sabbath School and Educational Departments and Miss Elizabeth Hilbert, our faithful stenographer, are driving to Washington for the College graduation exercises. Miss Hilbert looks forward anxiously to June 1 when she leaves us for her home in Indiana.

Mr. Robert Gardner, who came from Nashville, Tennessee, to help us in our Book and Bible House work for a time, left us May 1 for his home; and the same day Mr. N. B. White came to us from Florida to help in the same line of work.

One of our own girls, Miss Mary Jane Spivey, is growing into a valuable office helper and stenographer here. She works by day and goes to school in the evening, and is developing all the while.

The sale of the pictures for Missions Extension funds has exceeded our fondest expectations, and we are constantly having to telegraph the manufacturers for more. We're doing our best to supply the demands. We have a good stock of the books, "Our Changing World" and "Prophecy Speaks," both of which are excellent missionary material. Did your church make its goal in the Missions Extension fund? Do you know? Did you put in your own goal, and your own full share? Better do it now, if you have not done so.

The Home Bible Study League work carried on in various conferences brings us names of interested Carolinians who have been found by this work through the mails. We have received names from the conferences in New York City, Georgia, and Minnesota.

Not boasting, but Carolina Conference heads the list in March for *Watchman* subscriptions, with 3497. This fine result is largely to the credit of our fine band of twenty and more colporteurs.

Also, with the exception of Florida, Carolina shows more increase in *Signs* subscriptions than any other conference in this Union.
