They had welllaid plans for the following week which quite possibly may put them over the top.

Just as we are writing this note for the TIDINGS, the Western Union boy has handed us a wire from that conference, reporting a total of \$4,-243.71, week ending August 13. Surely Kentucky-Tennessee is to be congratulated for this fine start, even before the official opening date of the campaign. ## INGATHERING AT FOUNTAIN HEAD

Almost ever since I can remember, one of the things that came around just a little too often, and lasted a great deal too long to be pleasant was the Harvest Ingathering campaign. It always reminded me of the whooping cough. If you caught it in the fall, you expected to whoop all winter. When the Ingathering campaign started in the fall, you just expected it to stop only because you could not turn in anything after January 1 of the following year. That was the reason we hated to start early-we knew it would last just that much longer.

I have often wondered if the campaign could be made almost painless by getting out and getting through and forgetting about it, but I had never been in a church that tried it.

The church officers at Fountain Head talked things over this year quite early and decided to try at least once to put over a short, intensive campaign. We set as our goal the objective of finishing in two weeks. We had a Sabbath service in which we tried to put before the church the importance of Harvest Ingathering and the duty of each to take an active part in it. At the end of the service we made an appeal to each one to pledge what he would be responsible for raising in two weeks. We did not urge anyone to raise any specified amount, for we knew that some could raise twenty-five dollars with the same effort that some one else could use to raise fifty cents. We urged each one to do what he thought was right, and we told them that they were expected to have in what they pledged in two weeks. After figuring the amount of the pledges, we were pleasantly surprised to find that we had five dollars over our goal.

Well, we just went out and started to work. Every active member went out the first week and did something. Brother Dysinger and I went to the business concerns that we deal with and we found them more than cordial. One man gave us \$20, and said he was surely glad to help such a worthy cause. We were able to raise over \$50 in four hours, and it was really enjoyable work. This was the first time that either of us had ever solicited business people without a conference worker being along, and we learned that it is not necessary to have a preacher along with you to get good offerings.

When we checked up the first Sabbath we had over \$85, which was more than three-fourths of the goal. Everyone was really enthusiastic by this time, and we knew that we would be over by next Sabbath. On Tuesday we checked up and the goal was reached, but no one wanted to stop, so we kept right on working.

At the fifteen-minute service on Sabbath the money was turned in and counted. You can imagine our pleasure at finding \$40 over our goal. Everyone who had worked was asked to raise his hand. It looked as if every hand in the audience was raised as high as it could be stretched. We all looked on as the goal chart was completed and both thermometers were run to the top. Then as everyone stood and sang "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow," tears were seen in many eyes and there was a tremor seen to run over many frames as the realization came over them that a real achievement had been made.

Let me add in closing that to me the Harvest Ingathering campaign has been changed. I will never look upon it again as a necessary and dreaded evil, but will look forward to the privilege of getting out and getting a wonderful work finished as soon as possible. Our church is not through. Some of the members cannot realize that it is time to quit. We expect to do more, but it will be because we want to do it and not because we are expected to. ## RESPONSIBILITY OF OUR COLPORTEURS IN HARVEST INGATHERING

### HORIZONS BEYOND

From seven o'clock in the morning until nine o'clock at night, the library at Southern Junior College presents a scene of busy educational activity. Occasionally, a student selects a magazine from the rack or pauses before the open-shelf collection of books for general reading. Another student may be observed thumbing through the card catalog in search of material, perhaps, for a term paper. But by far the larger number may be seen at the tables intently poring over the "reserved" books, books in which assignments of collateral reading have been made in connection with the various classes. Over all scans the watchful eye of the monitor, lest the really serious intention of the many to study be diverted by a careless someone whose mind is running truant.

Modern educational practice recognizes that it is impossible to have a good school without a good library. The student's education should begin with teacher and textbook, but it should not end there. Circumscribed would be the outlook of a student allowed to feel that all the important knowledge on a subject is encompassed within the pages of the textbook. The student must go to the library and glimpse the far horizons. the vast ramifications, the detailed sources, the clashing viewpoints which make up any field of knowledge. Otherwise he will have little idea of the processes by which conclusions are reached and by which their validity may be tested. Since the student in college can not investigate all subjects and will remember but a modicum of the facts he does peruse, the objective of his college course should not be merely the acquisition of facts. Rather his education should bring an appreciation of the scope, implications, and value of knowledge and an understanding of the methods by which in after life he may find, organize, and test the detailed facts upon any subject which he may have occasion to investigate. He must be able to mine the mountain of truth for the particular ores which he needs and at the time when he needs them. A library provides a laboratory in which the student may acquire a knowledge of such methods. Hence one wise man has said, "The true university is a collection of books.'

At Southern Junior College the importance of an adequate library is fully recognized. Seven thousand volumes line the shelves, and over fifty periodicals are received regularly. Any one student will use but a small fraction of this material. Nevertheless, the process of expanding the library never ceases, and every year a regular appropriation is spent for a large number of new books. Thus, Southern Junior College is determined to provide ever wider horizons, with room and to spare, for the expanding vision and insight of its students.
