
### VICTORY

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Surveying the seething maelstrom of universal unrest and confusion that meets our gaze at the beginning of 1939, we cannot but believe that "the final movements" are already under way.

"Since 1931," said Mr. Roosevelt in his opening address to Congress, "world events of thunderous import have moved with lightning speed."

Indeed, the rapidity with which epochmaking changes have taken place of late is positively staggering.

In recent months a complete transformation has come over the entire world situation. Governments have been overthrown, solemn treaties violated, vast territories occupied by invading armies, great cities desolated, multitudes driven into exile.

A startling realignment of the nations has come about. The balance of power has been altered.

Countries that a little while ago were considered invincible in their armed might, today find their supremacy challenged by their once crushed but now resurrected foes.

New philosophies have arisen, challenging the old to mortal combat. All over the world Christianity is face to face again with its deadly enemy, paganism.

ANY years ago, in comparatively mocracy is fighting with its back to the line of danger from within and from wall.

Intolerance and persecution have returned, together with all their ugly concomitants of torture, brutality, confiscation of property, and exile.

Suddenly, in the midst of the brilliant civilization of the twentieth century, the spirit of the Dark Ages has reappeared, more loathsome and diabolical than of old.

It is as though a violent eruption of subterranean forces had suddenly burst through the thin coating of civilization that patient hands, through long centuries, have laid over the crater of human passion and greed.

The very earth shakes with the shock of these constant upheavals, and well may we wonder what fresh surprises await us in the days just ahead.

Of one thing we may be certain. There will be no slowing of the pace, no braking of this time express on which we are traveling at breakneck speed. The year 1939 will be but another wildly rushing year, its first-magnitude events crashing upon our consciousness with bewildering and ever-increasing frequency.



First, and above all the most important, is the number of additions to our membership, and I know you will rejoice with me to know that through the efforts of our ministers and our membership four hundred sixty-one new members have been added to our membership by baptism or profession of faith.

The economic situation of our world has been uncertain, but through the faithfulness of God's people in our conference, our tithes amount to \$83,492.13, being an increase of \$1,181.45 over the previous year. Our gifts to missions are indications of faithfulness on the part of God's people and all funds to missions, including Sabbath school and Ingathering amounted to the fine sum of \$40,472.21.

We have entered upon another year with a renewed program. A very helpful Workers' meeting was held at the beginning of the month and the Sabbath school superintendents from the various churches were in for a week-end convention. We feel that this started the year out correctly and that this year will see greater results for God than the previous.

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Several efforts will be in progress immediately. Elder Banks has built a modest tabernacle in Nicholasville and we pray for him that a fine church may be established there. Elder Whitsett is continuing a wonderful interest, developed through his Columbia Hall efforts the latter part of last year, in holding Sunday night meetings in the church. Fine results have already been obtained from that effort and further baptisms are planned shortly as a result of the very successful effort conducted there.

Brother Esquilla is spending three weeks in Lawrenceburg, Kentucky, holding revival services every night with the object in mind of leading several in the Valley of Decision up upon the Mountain Top of Decision for God.

Brother Bartholomew begins an effort next Sunday night in the armory at Bowling Green. Let us pray definitely for that aristocratic little city that it may yield its share of souls for the kingdom.

The tabernacle used in Nashville a year ago is being rebuilt in Memphis this week. More will be said about the effort to begin there later.

Brother Colburn over in the Stearns area is just finishing up a little church building for the believers out at Cave Creek.

Elder Shaw, announced previously as the pastor of the Nashville church, has been delayed a couple of weeks in arriving on account of sickness but is expected to take over his duties on this coming Sabbath, the twentyeight of January.

So the work is onward. Other workers might be named in connection with the work that is being done but we will leave further mention to a later issue. May these thoughts challenge our people to expect great things of God and to pray for our workers in a way that will bring the baptism of God's Holy Spirit upon them. We want 1939 to be the best year Kentucky-Tennessee has ever experienced.
