"SHE HATH DONE WHAT SHE COULD"

BOUT eight months ago a call came from one of our members who had moved into a country district far away from any of our churches. This brother and his family had, in their humble way, tried to live and talk the truth to their new neighbors. A number became interested and soon our brother found that the need was bigger than he alone could fill. When the call came for a worker to follow up this interest, we found ourselves unusually short-handed and unable to send anyone, but after a time we did manage to send a Bible woman.

This sister met much opposition and persecution. Enemies of the truth tried to secure the help of local officials to drive her out, but the officials knew that religious liberty had been granted to the people of China and they gave her protection as far as they could. She worked untiringly, never calling any time her own. No distance was too great to travel if she could minister to the physical or spiritual needs of the people she was sent to help, and God blessed her work.

Then a terrible sickness went through the country, a very dangerous form of malaria that broke out in all that section. People died by the hundreds in less than twenty-four hours after becoming ill. Our sister, having worked beyond her strength, fell a victim to the dread disease. For about two weeks she was delirious and desperately ill, but the Lord mercifully brought her back to health. Starting in to work again with even greater earnestness than before, she was able to organize a Sabbath school of more than twenty members. At the present time she has ten persons fully prepared and awaiting baptism.

In this mission we have fifty stations where Sabbath schools are conducted, but

twenty of them are without workers. Seven others are cared for by only a woman worker in each. The responsibilities and burdens of a mission station are so great that a woman should not be called upon to bear them alone.

In this territory there are scores of large cities without a believer, to say nothing of a Sabbath school. Dozens of counties are still in darkness in so far as this last message of warning is concerned. We believe that one reason why the Master has not yet returned-because there are honest souls in this field who have not seen the light nor heard the call. It is true that "Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved," but "How then shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent?" Rom. 10:13-15.

And should our missions be so financially crippled that we must send a frail sister off into a new place to work alone? When Christ started men out in evangelism He sent them out by twos and He did not consider that too many. We still hear His words ringing in our ears as He said, "The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few: pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He would send forth labourers into His harvest." Luke 10:2. Have we forgotten this command? Let us obey Him by daily praying for this very thing and then do our best on the coming thirteenth Sabbath, as well as every other Sabbath, to help God answer that prayer.

PINE FOREST ACADEMY AND SANITARIUM 7

Pine Forest Sanitarium is now equipped and ready for immediate use. The sanitarium is located in a beautiful spot on the campus of Pine Forest Academy seventeen miles from Meridian and five miles from Chunky. It affords a lovely secluded place for rest and relaxation away from the noise and din of city life.

Miss Opal McKinney, a graduate nurse of Madison Sanitarium, is in charge. Miss McKinney is trained in the Battle Creek methods of giving treatments, and will prove very efficient in caring for the work at Pine Forest. This is the third sanitarium that has opened up in this field. Another very beautiful sanitarium is that located at Florence, Alabama, operated by Erother and Sister Neil Martin. "El Reposo," as it is known, has become a real haven for many of the people in that section of the conference, and it is spoken of very highly.

Pine Hill Sanitarium, located a few miles from Eirmingham, under the direction of Erother Archie Page, is also doing good work and is rapidly growing into a first class institution. We feel very happy to have three Adventist-operated sanitariums like these in the Alabama-Mississippi Conference.

One thing that makes us very happy about the Pine Forest Sanitarium is the school that is developing in connection with it. Considerable progress has been made in the past year to develop that institution, and we hope that before long a new boys' dormitory will be erected and other needed improvements made. It is the aim of the management to make Pine Forest Academy a real place of opportunity for young people in the conference who desire a Christian education up to twelve grades.

At the present time there is an enrollment of twenty in the academy and church school. The faculty consists of Mr. and Mrs. G. E. Hochstetter, Mr. and Mrs. M. Burris, Mrs. M. C. Norrell, and Miss Cpal McKinney.

Brother Clyde O. Franz, from the Kentucky-Tennessee Conference, at Nashville, recently stopped in at the school and brought us an adding machine which is a joy to the office workers.

Elder and Mrs. H. W. Walker, Miss M. G. Seitz, and Mr. J. M. Jansen, visited our school one afternoon recently, and met with the faculty to help lay plans for further advancement of the work at Pine Forest Academy.

Mrs. M. C. Norrell, our church school teacher, has not only accomplished much for her own five pupils, but has given literature to the colored grade school teacher. One of the papers was a temperance number. This the teacher read to her pupils and explained very forcefully. One of the older boys, whom the teacher knew had been slipping out to smoke, was given a short peem to memorize. The next day when he repeated the poem he asked for permission to say something to the school. When permission was granted he made the following statement: "I'll never smoke again, and when I say that I won't, I mean it." That one paper completely changed the course of that boy's life.

Their investment amounted to eleven dollars. Last year no investment came in from this school. I had the privilege of attending this program. Cur Investment programs will greatly increase our per capita. I am confident that we will reach our conference goal of \$1,000.

The rumors which are coming in from the Sabbath schools all over our field indicate that the coming Thirteenth Sabbath offering will break all former records. Crders are arriving continually for extra fourth quarter mission quarterlies and other Thirteenth Sabbath program material. It seems that all our officers are determined to have an extra large Christmas Thirteenth Sabbath offering. As one district superintendent wrote, "We are working to make an extra gift to our best friend, Jesus, on this Thirteenth Sabbath."






VOICE OF S. P. A.
