## ITEMS OF INTEREST AND PROGRESS FROM THE FLORIDA SANITARIUM AND HOSPITAL

**1**T HAS been suggested that as Chairman of the Board, I write for the TIDINGS a report of the work of the Florida Sanitarium and Hospital, located in the beautiful city of Orlando, Florida. I think it is safe to say that this Sanitarium, which is a Southern Union Conference institution, has one of the finest locations of any of our Seventhday Adventist Sanitariums in North America. The beautiful palms, and the lake on which it fronts, make it a very attractive and desirable place for an institution that seeks to restore health and strength to those in need of rest and medical treatment.

This past winter, the institution was crowded to capacity with a waiting list part of the time. Only recently a very fine modern hospital building has been completed. This building is modern in every way, and greatly adds to the efficiency of the institution. It cost about \$50,000, and the interesting part of this is that it is all paid for. About \$10,000 of this was raised from patients and friends of the institution, in a solicitation campaign by the workers in the Sanitarium.

A number of new concrete sidewalks have recently been added to the growing list of improvements. Perhaps we can safely say that with the new hospital and equipment costing approximately \$50,000, and the new men's hydrotherapy building and equipment of about \$18,000, together with a doctor's cottage and other improvements in the past three years, at least \$75,000 to \$80,000 have been spent to make the Sanitarium up-to-date in every way. Still other improvements are contemplated in the near future.

The Sanitarium provides an outlet for the milk and cream supplied by the Forest Lake Academy dairy, and also through the sending of its linen to the Academy for washing and ironing, furnishes work for a considerable number of students who work in the Academy laundry. The Academy does this work at a fair price worked out between the two institutions, thus one helps the other.

Doctor C. J. Larsen, who is the Medical Director of the Sanitarium, is a splendid physician and surgeon. Brother R. G. Bowen is the Business Manager, and is doing his best to keep the institution up to a high point of efficiency in the matter of improvements, repairs, etc.

A recent Board meeting was held at the Sanitarium, which was attended not only by the full board, but by Doctor H. M. Walton, Medical Secretary of the General Conference, Miss Burnett, head of the General Conference Department of Nursing, and Elder O. O. Montgomery, who resides in Orlando. Plans were laid that we trust will mean continued progress for the institution in the days to come. Elder H. S. Prenier, a man of long experience as a teacher of Bible in our schools, is the Bible teacher and chaplain, and is rendering splendid service. Splendid consideration is given to our Seventh-day Adventist church members, and we invite those who are sick to favorably consider our own institution, the Florida Sanitarium and Hospital, when you find it necessary to go away from home for medical care.

Even though we acknowledge that the "fields are white, already to harvest," we still confess that we have not found a definite place in the work of God.

To be an idler in the market place at this late hour is a most dangerous position to be in. Cod sends the message to every one of us. "Wake up, wake up, my brethren and sisters, and enter the fields of America that have never been worked... 'Haste thee, flee for thy life,' is the call to be given to those dwelling in sin. We must be terribly in earnest."—"Testimonies," Vol. 8, p. 36. Yes, my Christian friends, we should be "terribly in earnest" and if we are, we surely will find a place in God's vineyard of service, and find it quick.

To each soul among His remnant people, God repeats the call, "Wake up! Wake up! You have a work to do, and your sun is fast hastening to its setting. Your powers are becoming enfeebled; but all there is of you, every particle of your ability belongs to God, and should be used earnestly and disinterestedly in His Service. Work while the sun still lingers in the heavens, for the night cometh when no man can work"—"Testiomnies," Vol. 2, p. 429.

#### FLORIDA SANITARIUM NEWS NOTES

Work on the original hospital building, which was moved in January and located at the north end of the new unit, is rapidly going forward to completion. The exterior is being modernized, with parapet walls extending up to the same height as the new building, and covered on the outside with stucco and paint so that when finished it will conform in appearance to the rest of the hospital. The convenient ambulance entrance is located in the space where the two units join and a permanent connection of concrete block walls will bring the two sections into one unit. It is expected that this work will be completed within the next month, readv for permanent use.

A recent improvement in the new hospital building that is very much appreciated is an application on the ceiling of the second floor corridor of quietone sound-deadening board. This greatly reduces the transmission of sounds through that part of the building, and it is planned to make a similar application in first floor hall as soon as funds are available.

The cement sidewalk to the dormitories has now been completed. This has been done in stages, the last stage being the stretch from the medical directors' cottage to Eastwin. The students and all others living on that end of the campus are appreciating this improvement very much.

National Hospital Day, May 12, was observed by open house, conducted tours throughout the institution showing visitors the improvements that have been made during the past year, particularly in the new hospital. The Orlando Medical Cadet Corps, who have been using the sanitarium recreational hall for their semi-weekly meetings, conducted litter drills and other demonstrations on the sanitarium lawn, and special music was furnished by the W. P. A. band.
