Dedication of Cunningham Hall at Oakwood College

MARCH 17, 1948, was a high day at Oakwood College, the occasion being the dedication of the new women's residence hall. This new dormitory contains seventy-four student rooms and a very commodious apartment for the dean of women. A large worship room and parlor occupies the wing of the first floor. The ground floor will house the cafeteria, kitchen, matron's office, a smaller dining room which will be used for small group gatherings, a kitchenette, storage room, trunk room, refrigeration room, and a furnace room.


President F. L. Peterson acted as master of ceremonies at this dedication service. The program for this occasion consisted of selections by a male chorus under the direction of Elder C. E. Moseley, the academy

choir directed by Professor C. E. Dickerson, the college choir directed by Professor C. H. Thomas, a biographical sketch of Sister Cunningham's life by Dr. Eva B. Dykes, and a tribute to a college mother by Miss Mary Lamson. Miss Lamson served as a dean of women for many years in our denomination. The dedicatory address was given by Elder V. G. Anderson, President of the Southern Union Conference; the dedicatory prayer by Elder G. E. Peters, Secretary of the General Conference Colored Department. The benediction was pronounced by Professor E. E. Cossentine, Secretary of the General Conference Department of Education.

It is very fitting that this new women's residence be named Cunningham Hall, for Sister Eugenia I. Cunningham, a "mother" of Oakwood, has been connected with the institution for thirty-six years—a number of which she served as dean of women.

I would like to quote a tribute paid by one of her girls: "As a dean of women, Mother Cunningham has been a power for good, wielding a mighty influence to direct the youth to a better day and a better world. Hundreds of students owe their success in the main to this unselfish Christian woman. Her fascinating and forceful personality, coupled with her pleasant smile, distinguishes her as a leader for God. As dean, she was able to help mold and train the youth for leadership in God's work.

"We could always confide in Mother Cunningham. She took time out to assist anyone who was in trou-

ble. Though firm, she was kind. When she said a thing, she meant it, but she always thought twice before speak-

ing.

"Our dean had a wise and understanding heart and seemed to know just how to deal with each individual. She realized that each one of the students had been placed in her care; so she was faithful to her post of duty. Before retiring at night she wearily mounted the flight of steps to the third floor to make sure everyone was

safe and comfortably tucked into bed.

"I shall always remember the early morning devotional exercises conducted by our school mother. Her instructions, the simple life she led, and the Christian influence she exemplified shall never be forgotten."

President F. L. Peterson and his associates are carrying on a strong work at Oakwood College. May the Lord continue to bless their ministry in behalf of the youth at Oakwood College.

The Calendar Situation

Every effort is being made by the sponsors of the World Calendar to press it on the attention of statesmen and get the approval of important organizations to have it enacted into law and substituted for the present Gregorian Calendar beginning January 1, 1950.

The Foreign Affairs Committee of the House of Representatives and the Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate have taken no action upon the legislation now before them favoring the World Calendar. Whether they have been deterred from this by the vast amount of protests our people have sent in, or whether it has been crowded out by far more important matters touching the world situation, we do not know. We think it likely that both these things have influenced these committees.

Every effort has been made by the World Calendar Association to get the World Calendar item restored to the agenda of the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations now in session at Lake Success, New York. At this writing it has had no success. The calendar is not on the agenda of that organization at present.

At the meeting of the Pan-American Conference at Bogota, Columbia, the delegate from Argentina has been instructed by the Argentine Government to request the approval of that conference for the World Calendar. This has been also the action of Chile. The latest information we have received is that they have not been suc-

cessful in bringing it up for discussion. Perhaps the murderous revolt that disrupted the proceedings of this conference in Bogota may have been used to prevent consideration of this item.

There is reason to believe Catholic leaders are shifting their position on the blank-day calendar from one of opposition to one either of indifference, or an unwillingness to oppose what they think may become popular.

Mr. Westy Egmont, who has been the most active and aggressive advocate of the World Calendar, and who obtained its listing on the agenda of the Economic and Social Council last July, and was very successful in getting the approval of many different organizations to the World Calendar, died the latter part of March. He was director of the World Calendar Association, Inc., and editor of the Journal of Calendar Reform. We are reminded that Mr. Eastman, who pressed blank-day calendar revision before the League of Nations, also died tragically at the heat of that former campaign.

The danger of blank-day calendar revision is still acute. Any of these various bodies may give it attention at a minute's notice. Every day we can stave it off, however, is serving to bring it to ultimate defeat so far as 1950 is concerned. May I again urge our people to be very active in disseminating information regarding the anti-religious features of this blank-day proposal.

Every reader of this volume will be strengthened by the spirit of assurance and certainty that fills its

illuminating pages.

The author's long association with Mrs. E. G. White through his twenty-eight years of official leadership in the denomination enabled him to set down in this book the most satisfying convictions that her messages came from God. We often need to refresh our minds with the messages God has left for the church in these closing days of earth's history, and it is the function of this book to do this for us in a concise and gratifying manner. Every Seventh-day Adventist home should possess a copy of "The Abiding Gift of Prophecy."


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
