Will Books Win a Soul?

W HEN Colporteur Jose Maria Barboza began canvassing, he asked his companion: "Do you think these books we are selling will ever win a soul to the truth?"

One of the books was purchased by a Methodist, who did not appreciate it and therefore gave it to a friend. Nor did this friend like the book, so he gave it to another. This third party began reading the book, "This Decisive Hour," and started to talk to his friends regarding the contents of it, and they likewise became very interested. They came to his home, and the book was read aloud to a large number of friends, and they formed themselves into a group that was fully convinced of the truths.

The Adventists knew nothing of this interested and convinced group. Another religious body found them and, as usual, said: "We are the true church of God." These new believers rejoiced. But, as they soon noticed that the group did not keep the Sabbath, they asked regarding this. The religious leaders tried to refute the Sabbath truth, but the new believers returned to their book and found it clearly given with Scripture authority. Sunday keeping pastors of great renown were called, and they tried in vain to convince this group to abandon the Sabbath question. Finally, the ministers became angry and said to them: "You are Sabbath-keepers and are being taught by the Adventists." But the new believers knew nothing of the Adventists, nor did the Adventists know anything of this group.

Finally, news of this new group of Sabbath-keepers reached one of our Adventist ministers, who immediately went to the far-flung mountain range to visit them. He found one of the new believers, and he immediately ran and rounded up the group, saying: "Come quickly, a pastor has arrived who keeps the seventh day holy like we do."

As a result of the book, the studies, and meetings held by the pastor, twenty-five precious souls were baptized. Just think, twenty-five souls won by a book that gave the light of truth, sold by a colporteur who asked: "Will books that I sell win a soul to Christ?"

I have been a tither for twelve years, —becoming one shortly after becoming a Christian in 1936. God has always provided for us, sometimes only a day at a time, but He has always been faithful and has *never* let us down.

My tithe now is about the same amount my income was when we began to tithe. If we are faithful about the percentage. He will be faithful about the increase and blessings. I believe that stewardship of money and gifts begins over and above the tithe. The tithe, first fruits, belongs to God, and we are not givers until that is paid; we are robbers if we don't pay it. After the tithe is paid, then we get into the bracket of gifts, and I believe we are held accountable as stewards as to how we use the remaining nine-tenths of our income. In making appeals for tithers, I often close with the question in Luke 16:12: "And if ye have not been faithful in that which is another man's, who shall give you that which is your own?"

It is the meager expression of an infinitesimal appreciation. It carries with it the idea of a condescending remembrance to a servant who has done something nice for us.

Tithing, on the other hand, means "the tenth of anything." It is a custom as old as the devotion of the human heart, as laudable as the highest graces of the individual soul, and as binding upon the recipients of God's mercy as any law of reciprocity upon those who have been helped by others.

As we ponder over the above statements from "The Baptist Messenger" there comes to mind a statement taken from the Spirit of prophecy:

"If all the tithes of our people flowed into the treasury of the Lord as they should, such blessings would be received that gifts and offerings for sacred purposes would be multiplied tenfold, and thus the channel between God and men would be kept open!" — *Testimonies*, Volume IV, page 474.


